

On March 4 the Board of Directors moved forward with several decisions on the project to repaint Village housing units. Following several Town Hall meetings, Board members were able to ascertain the mood of the community and set a direction for the project to begin. The Board approved the hiring of Pam O'Toole of PPG Paint Corporation as the colorist, who recommended a pallet of eight primary colors and six alternatives with two trim colors each to the Board. On March 28, the Board chose eight of the pallet colors, which will be used for Phase One of the project.

To move the paint project along, several residents submitted proposed color schemes (pictured above) that would brighten the appearance of the community. There is no indication that the Board has considered these proposals or will accept multiple paint designs on the buildings.

It began with a request from her children: "Write about your life for us," said Veronica Pinckard's children. What followed became a published memoir, "A Damned Fine Growth," plus a book of short stories tracking back to her ancestors in the American Revolution -"On the British side," she adds with a smile. At 92, Veronica's English accent has softened; her memory has not. Her story begins with the number sixteen.

Veronica was the youngest of sixteen children...a twin born unexpectedly thirty minutes after her

brother David emerged. "That's a damn fine growth" was her father's description of the surprise infant. But childhood in such a large family was not "fine" for her. She was removed from her London home a year later, diagnosed with rickets and malnutrition and spent two years recovering in a convalescent hospital.

Her family's life hadn't improved much when Veronica returned home. But soon she was ready for school, and as she describes it, "Teachers were my guardian angels." She attended "very good schools," she says, where teachers coached her after class. She began to feel strong



and capable. Then came September 1, 1939. War against the Germans was imminent. So 24,000 London children were evacuated without their parents to the safety of the English countryside to live with people they didn't know. Veronica left on a train alone. "I wasn't frightened. I thought we'd be gone a week," she recalls. She was away for three years. But the good fortune for Veronica was that her stay was with "Mrs. Murphy," she says. "She nurtured my education, she loved me and became my role model forever. We stayed in touch all her life."

After the war, Veronica married a man with wanderlust, she says. They had four children and moved from England, to Canada, then New Zealand, and finally to California, where the marriage ended. Her lifelong instinct to keep learning led her to master secretarial skills that grew into a career as a court reporter. Later, she married an American businessman. They were together for forty years until he died.

Veronica says September 1st again became an important date – this time in 2016 because that was the day she moved into Leisure Village. She first learned about it from several couples she met on a cruise. "They talked about how welcoming the Village is, and they were right. I love it here," she says. And she's busy, playing the organ with the Music Club, helping with the Saturday Night Dances, and traveling (her photo is featured on an Alaskan Kayaking brochure). Veronica's focus has remained constant throughout her life, "It's not where we came from that's important; it's where we are going."

Newest LV Club: Grapes R Us

The great LV wine uprising started out innocently enough, as most such rebellions do, with a casual street conversation in Village 5. That's when, in May of 2017, Bo Husher, Judy Kavanaugh, Lynn Lindsay and Gil Gordoen hatched a plot to get together with a few friends at the Husher home to enjoy some wine, a little wine conversation, and sample some tasty victuals. By September of last year, following 17 months if incubation, it came time to kick the young eagle out of the nest for it's maiden flight, said Rita Lindsey, club president.

From that first get-together on May 25, 2017, consisting of about eight neighbors in Village 5, the group had grown to a monthly chautauqua of some 20 folks, all elbow to knee-cap in a home, sipping the grape and tasting hors d'oeuvres. Launched in September, 2018, with some 30 members on the roster, the club, now christened Grapes R Us, numbered 9071 members by March, 2019, Lindsey said.

"It started at my house on May 25, 2017, because I had the room, said Husher. "At first everybody brought a bottle of wine and a little something to eat, but after three or four months in, Gil wanted to buy the wine, so we started with \$5 (each)" After a few months, though,

things began to get a little ungainly, Husher said, when the crowds got up in the 18-head range. "I didn't have enough chairs!" So, after about a year, others began to host the monthly tastings. "I loved it, but it is quite a bit of work."

Gil Gordoen, sommelier and wine author, said at first the group was small and intimate. "There were probably eight of us, most of us in Village 5. It grew from eight to about 20 people and it became quite an event, with everybody bringing about 20 different dishes of food and all the wine; it was quite an event," Gordoen said.

With all the sustained interest, by late 2018 a decision was made to make it a legitimate club. A that point, Rita Linsey volunteered to direct her considerable skills toward establishing Grapes R Us as an approved Village club. Grapes R Us members meet monthly at 7:00 p.m. on the third Friday in the Santa Rosa Room. Lindsay said each member brings a wine glass, a bottle of water, and \$6 chip-in fee for the wine. Non-members and guests are also welcome, with a \$10 wine fee required. Snack donations are optional.

Gordoen said club leaders are plotting future events to include presentations by local wineries, Grapes R Us visits to area wineries for group tastings, special Camarillo City concerts in the park for club tasting events, and summertime wine and bar-b-q gatherings in the LV Pavilion area.

Perspective Grapes R Us rebels are cautioned, however, that future membership could be limited. TastingsMeetings are held in the Santa Rosa Room, the second largest venue available at the Rec Center., with a capacity of about 65. "There's going to be a limit to the membership because of the room." Gordoen said.

At 90 71 members, and growing, Grapes R Us is likely to continue to increase in popularity among Village dwellers, for at least one good reason; "It's always fun to try different wines." That, according to club member/RSVP wrangler Janis Kajita, "And doing it side-by-side, allows you to taste-compare different wines. "For me, it's to learn more about wine and the different kinds and styles of wine, trying to find some that I would enjoy."

Leisure Village Urban Forest

As one enters Leisure Village by way of the main gate kiosk, vehicles proceed thru a tranquil grove...a mix of tall maturing boulevard trees. This arboreal setting heralds a distinctive landscape feature that extends the length of Leisure Village Drive and along Mountain View Drive. Diverse categories of worldwide types and species of trees, have been planted thru the decades. Trees abound within our Village neighborhoods, surround the LV Rec Center complex and frame other support complexes. Trees grace the 18 hole golf course, and are scattered about the living tapestry of LV's vast greenbelt and common areas. For 40 years+ our evolving Village Urban Forest habitat has been enjoyed by both LV folks and nature's creatures. Managing this forest has been a daunting assignment.

The installation of a diverse array of Village urban-adaptive tree species began in the 1970s. It has

been in flux and transition since. Some of the Village's original trees became casualties due to episodes of severe weather. More recently other tree species became victim of the secondary consequences of extended drought, elevated saline soil thresholds and secondary impacts of reclaimed irrigation and plant disease. Landscaping is a "living" art form and a blend of horticulture science. Aesthetic savvy of growing Village ornamental plants: trees, turf and the other plantings, requires professional teamwork. Being lucky or having a "green thumb" is not nearly enough. Implementing the Horticulture Equation-The Right Stuff vastly increases the odds (in our favor) that our crafted Urban Forest environs survive and hopefully thrive. THE RIGHT STUFF...the Right Plant, in the Right Place, the Right Soil, the Right Spacing, the Right Care and all done at the Right Time...promotes a wise sustainable partnership between Villagers and nature.



During the January meeting of the Residential Landscape Committee, Mike Undem-LV Landscape Superintendent explained some issues to be pondered.

1. The Leisure Village Tree Replacement List needs updating. Contracted arborists have identified a soil-borne fungus that suddenly is weakening and killing our pink flowering Silk/Mimosa Trees. Many native White Alder trees and introduced Liquidambars are declining. Varieties of Pines and some Eucalyptus must not be replanted. There are smarterchoice, tree species available to replace or be added to the Village New Trees



Updating Your Home Exterior



Leisure Village is a collection of 2,136 homes built in the 1970's on over 455 acres of land surrounded by an expansive landscaped greenbelt. Unfortunately, the exterior façade of our homes have basically remained the same since they were built.

Because we are located in a Planned Unit Development (PUD), making changes to the exterior of the home is limited and must comply with our CC&Rs. That being said, we do have several options for exterior modifications that can significantly update the look of the home. They can be as simple as replacing an exterior light fixture to something more complex as adding a patio enclosure. Other modifications can involve removing or updating exterior wood door and window trim, replacing exterior doors, removing wood boxes found under exterior windows of some model homes, or installing patio pavers in a garden bed to provide an expanded seating area.

Before making any change, it is very important to educate yourself as to what can be done to your home. It is advisable to first review the Architectural Guidelines and then select a contractor or handyman to help achieve your goals. The California State Contractors License Board and the City of Camarillo Building & Safety Department also provide a wealth of information on how to pick a contractor and what rules they must follow while working on your home. This information is available on their websites.

Once this is done, fill out an Architectural Permit Application. These are available in the Association Office and in the form holder outside the Recreation Center office. When completed, bring it to a permit session held on the first or third Friday of each month at 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. in the Garden Room.



Without the support of the LV community and its donors, these achievements would not have been possible. Even though most of these efforts are part of a hobby, it does prepare us for a time when emergency communications may be needed outside our area and possibly California. We thank you for your continued support.




