Rulemaking - A Difficult Task

As the new Board settles down to its duties for the coming year, it is faced by serious and varied problems. These problems range from the ever-present financial pressures, negotiations with Leisure Technology, clamor from residents with special problems, tilting with Pardee, the City of Camarillo and others, to the rulemaking authority.

We will comment only on the latter. It is indisputable that as population density increases, more rules are required to preserve the quality of life for all. It is also true that authority to enact rules tends to make writing them a nearly irresistible "solution" to many problems. As a result, the "Rules and Regulations" book is growing too rapidly. Proper and necessary rules (example: fines for late payment of fees) are becoming intermixed with too many questionable behavioral regulations pleasing some residents and offending others.

As a suggestion to ease the difficulty of rule-making responsibility of the board, it is suggested that the Board (or an ad hoc committee appointed by them) prepare, publicize and adopt a rulemaking philosophy or policy. This policy could include criteria which a proposed rule should meet.

For example: Would the proposed rule: (1) Make living here more pleasant for most residents? (2) Have a sufficient impact to make it worth enacting? (3) Be easily and widely obeyed, require extra provisions for enforcement, or be in fact, unenforceable? (4) Have a penalty for violation and if so, what penalty? (5) Fair and equitable? (6) Desired by a preponderance of residents? and most important (7) Increase the attractiveness and value of our property here?

The Board may well have other criteria. It is hoped that a formalization and publication of the criteria could reduce the clamor for special new rules and simultaneously make the Board's evaluation of proposed new rules clearer, more objective, and more effective in achieving our mutual goal of the enhancement of Leisure Village life.

Guest Editorial - Why We Must Support Proposition H, The Maintenance Assessment

Proposition "H" on the November 4th general election ballot, if approved by the voters, would authorize the Ventura County Flood Control District to levy a special assessment on each parcel of property in Zone 3, which includes Simi, Moorpark, Somis, Camarillo, and Thousand Oaks to raise funds needed to finance adequate maintenance of flood control facilities in the zone.

Prior to the passage of Proposition 13, the Flood Control District relied almost entirely on property tax revenues to finance its maintenance activities. Passage of Proposition 13 reduced these revenues by 60 per cent and the purchasing power of the remaining revenues has been eroded by inflation.

The State Legislature in 1979, authorized flood control districts to levy special benefit assessments on each parcel of land to raise needed funds. The Legislature also provided some funds from the State's surplus to assist flood control districts.

The State subvention plus remaining property tax revenues still left the Flood Control District short \$1,813,813 needed for maintenance. The Board of Supervisors therefore approved the levy of special assessments in Zone 3 to raise that sum, subject to approval by the voters at the November General Election.

The assessments are based on proportionate storm water run-off. It would amount to approximately \$17.01 in 1980-81 for an average size lot, and approximately \$8.61 for each unit in Leisure Village due to the smaller area per unit.

Leisure Villagers who have lived in the Village through three 50 year storms in the last three years, are aware of the importance of adequately maintaining flood control facilities, such as Conejo Creek. They can do their part to assure adequate maintenance by voting "Yes" on Proposition H, and urging other voters in Zone 3 to do likewise.

Letter to the Editor

In answer to a request for Comments recently received from Leisure Technology, I have written them as follows:

"Leisure Village is a lovely place to live with one important exception. At time of purchase of our homes everyone was promised bus service. At present, your Los Angeles Times advertisement lists "Private Bus System" as one of the reasons for buying in Leisure Village.

Two years ago, Mr. Michael L. Tenzer of Leisure Technology announced to hundreds of Leisure Villagers that Leisure Technology was giving us a NEW bus. We never received this NEW bus. Some months later, we received a used bus

that has been out of commission about fifty percent of the time. We now have two unreliable buses that at times are out of commission at the same time.

This situation creates a hardship to those who were promised bus service and depend on such service to get them to doctors, dentists, pharmacies, shopping, etc.

We appeal to Leisure Technology Corp. to live up to the promise made by Mr. Tenzer two years ago and provide in the near future a bus that is NEW, SAFE, AND DEPENDABLE."

PROFILE: Sergeant Elaine Bard, Security

I told her on the phone: I am not Ralph (Edwards) but nevertheless: "THIS IS YOUR LIFE, ELAINE BARD," so come on over and tell me all about yourself. -- And come on over she did, flashing that lovely wide smile that makes it such a pleasure for us to pass through the Main Gate when she is on duty. And just to keep the record straight, let me tell you she is on duty Sundays through Thursday 7 am through 3 pm.

She has been married for 23 years -- and if you don't believe THAT when you look at her, she will tell you that she and Larry married when she was 14 years old; yep, that's right: 14 ---so there's at least ONE teen-age marriage that survived --- They raised a fine family of 2 girls and 2 boys, though Larry must have done some of his fatherly functions by long distance; he was in the Navy for 20 years, and Elaine figures she was alone for a good 15 years out of those 20 service years. At the

ripe old age of 37 she is a grandmother, both girls are married, her youngest son is home, a strapping 6'2" at 16 and on the high school football team. As for 20-year-old Larry Jr., Villager Bill Klee will instruct him to fly and help him to get his pilot's license.

After leaving the Navy, Larry joined Raytheon Services as a Projects engineer and is now busy studying for his B.A. degree. She met Chief Reimer and he hired her in July 1977, first part time, then full time, and about 18 months ago he promoted her to Sergeant.

We have a total of 18 to 22 people on our Security force. Chief Reimer delegates to Lt. Grizzard, and he in turn relies on Elaine and her "troops", some full- and some part-time, to keep our security functioning smoothly. Villagers can be employed on the force, but only part-time and Elaine says they are excellent officers - after all THEIR security is involved too.

Her duties are truly varied and ever changing. As

Sergeant its her function to coordinate the various reports and logs prepared by the officers. Just think of all the time; you phone the gate to tell them Aunt Mary is coming to dinner -

- multiply that by all the villages, -- and that's not even counting emergencies or the dozens of unusual happenings that occur every day.

I asked Elaine about emergencies: When she receives a frantic call for help,

her immediate reaction must be to STAY CALM. The caller may be totally distraught, but she must not get emotionally involved -- not an easy task. In three and a half- years she has made friends of a lot of villagers and knows them personally. -- She automatically assumes that it might be a heart attack and immediately phones

a) The fire brigade

b) Our roving patrolman, there is one on duty cruising the villages 24 hours a day, seven days a week. She dispatches him to the address given and he proceeds there immediately.

In the meantime the fire brigade has called the ambulance (automatically) and the police department has picked up the fire brigade call. Within minutes all three arrive at the scene where our patrol man is already giving first aid assistance. Besides C.P.R. training, all new personnel

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Josh Fallick - His Moods and Moments

The L.V. Multi-purpose Room recently was the scene of an exhibition by Josh Fallick of his paintings, photography and poetry, the three "Ps" illustrating his prolific talents.

The oils and photographic creations are already well-known here in the Village and outside, as well, for Josh is no newcomer to the Salon and Exhibit scene. He has had a number of one-man shows in and around the L.A. area and in Colorado. Many of his works are in private collections in the U.S., Hawaii, Canada and Israel.

His poetry, displayed so effectively on parchment, in elegant calligraphy, reflects a newer talent inspired, Josh says by his sessions at the L.V. Writers' Workshop.

Current Issues Forum

The heavy rains of the past three years which produced three successive so-called 50-year floods in this area caused grave concern among Leisure Villagers and prompted a large group to attend the Current Issues Forum meeting on August 29th to hear Jerry Nowak address the question: "What is Being Done About Flood Control?" Mr. Nowak is County Deputy Public Works Director for Flood Control and Water Resources.

Mr. Nowak urged that Leisure Villagers vote for the Benefit Assessment on the November ballot which will cost each unit \$8.61 yearly. These additional funds are needed to maintain flood control channels in the county, including Conejo Creek which is adjacent to Leisure Village. Flood control funds have been severely cut by Proposition 13,

as a result of which no new equipment has been purchased. If the County is able to spend \$2.5 million, the Federal government will provide an additional \$8 million to aid flood control projects.

John Lauten, Chairman of the Drainage and Flood Control Committee in Leisure Village, initiated discussion from the floor. In reply to one of Mr. Lauten's questions "Should Leisure Villagers Buy Flood Insurance Coverage for Their Homes?" Mr. Novak stated that this was a risk each homeowner must assess for himself. Dick Van Horn, former Leisure Village Association Director, provided excellent background information on initial steps taken by Leisure Technology to safeguard the community against flooding. Many other Villagers expressed their interest and concern by their questions.

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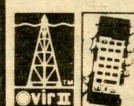
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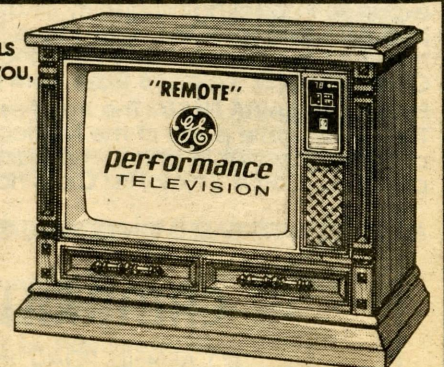


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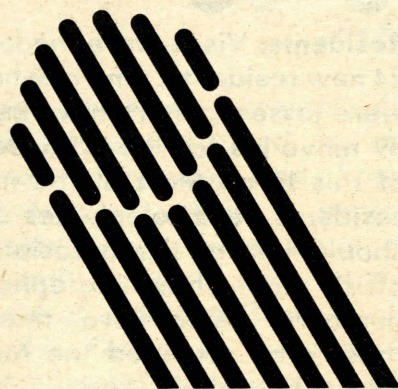
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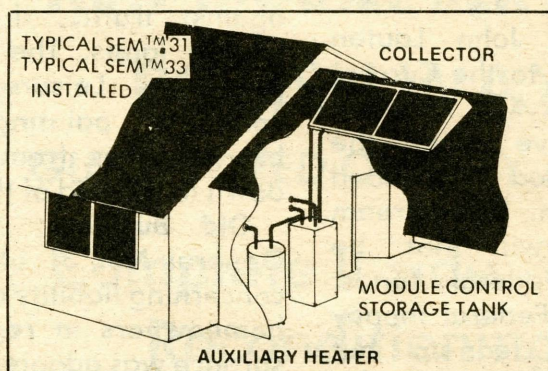


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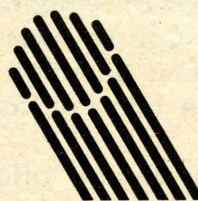
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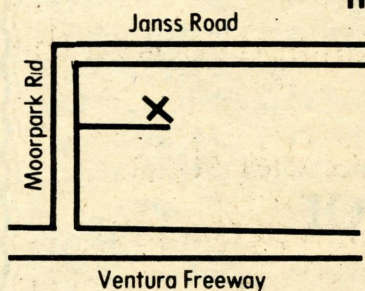
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Board Highlights

President Henry Malkin opened the September meeting by announcing that member Marty Beckel is home from the hospital after surgery and all wish him a speedy recovery. All other members were present.

There were no reports from the Arch. Bldg. & Grds. Committees.

The Educ. & Rec. Comm. presented the following recommendations:

1. Accept an offer from the Camera Club to install a permanent screen in the Men's Club Room at the club's expense;
2. Allow the Ceramic Group to conduct a workshop within their area at no additional expense;
3. Permit a tape dance once a month in the A.R. on any available night to be run by Ed Abdelnour;
4. Continuation of food service at the four main functions (luna, picnic, Thanksgiving and New Year's Eve).

Finance: Sub-committee is reviewing Insurance, with an outside expert. A special committee has audited the special events program and the report will be presented shortly as well as a special audit of the travel committee. There is also a special sub-committee studying a possible data processing system. A villager experienced in this field has offered his services as needed. The committee is also studying tax questions.

Flood Control. John Lauten called attention to the Current Issues Forum on Aug. 29 when a representative from the county explained the flood control situation. Downstream improvement will not be financed by Federal funds. There is some Federal money available for clean-up but additional funds will be necessary for maintenance of Calleguas and Conejo Creeks. It is urgent that the District and Leisure Villagers approve the assessment for flood control at the November election. Assessment for large homes will probably be around \$17 but for L.V. it will be approximately \$8.61. Vote Yes on Prop. H!

Information to New

Residents: Visits were made to 24 new residents, nine of whom were lessees. There have been 39 move-ins for the six weeks of this term. Most of the new residents have telephones and should inform the association office of their telephone numbers. Mrs. Puro thanks those who attended the Meet Your Neighbor session including Dorothy McCashen, registrar of voters.

Community Relations: The Committee supported the Board on recommendation regarding Adolfo Road crossing and with the aid of the Moped Club distributed notices announcing the P.U.C. meeting on this subject. There will be a Meet Your Candidate night and announcement will be made later. Assistance is offered to the Flood Control Comm. The Community Relations is investigating the villagers' complaints and also investigating the proposed Camarillo Grove Park expansion, which seems undesirable as far as the village is concerned.

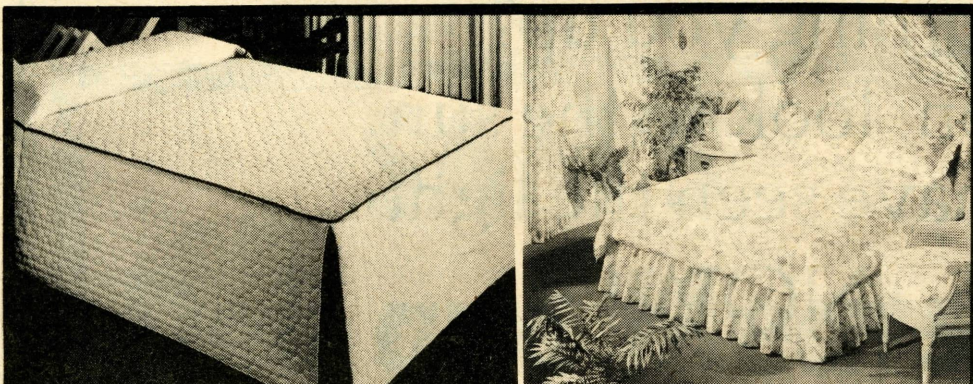
Sec. & Safety: Announced that all who have not received their decals for vehicles should get them at the Main Gate after 5:00 p.m. and before dark. Speeding on Leisure Village and Mountain View drives has been reported. The limit is 25 miles per hour. Bicycles have the right of way in the bicycle lanes and must go with the traffic. Pedestrians should walk against traffic, if using the bicycle lanes. The Board has requested Leisure Tech to complete painting of the bicycle lanes from V. 34 on down to the end of the Village.

Old Business: Article 17, General No. 31 of the Rules concerning liability of negligent homeowners in regard to insurance was adopted.

Extension of temporary rules for Golf Course was recommended and adopted. Ad hoc committee has not completed its study.

On advice of attorney a statement was read regarding illegal gambling in the common areas which is subject to prosecution.

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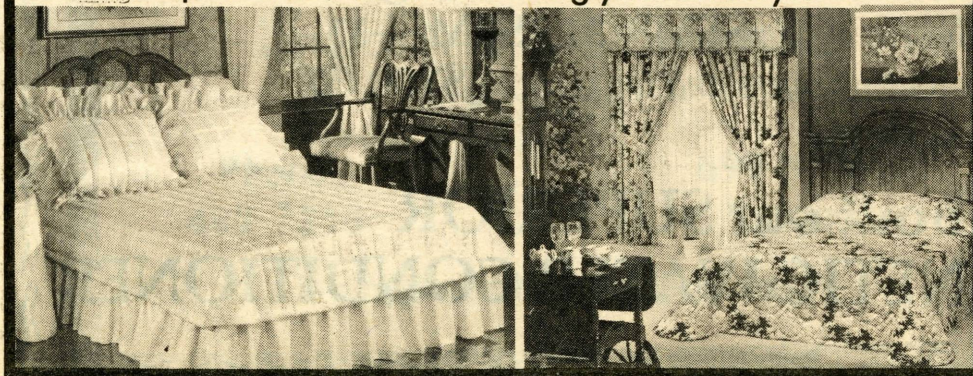
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Choking Victim Saved at Party

An incident dramatically illustrating the need to observe, diagnose, and know what to do about a person choking on food occurred recently during a party at the home of Jack and Grace Back, V. 16. The guest, unable to catch his breath, tried to walk outside, but blacked out before he reached the front door. Among the guests, Dr. George Bien, V. 41, had observed him clutching his throat as he made his way through the room, and suspected a choking problem. Almost as soon as the man fell, Dr. Bien had rushed to him, and gave him a sharp blow just below the sternum in an upward direction. This forced air out through the larynx and pushed the meat out of the throat. The choking victim regained consciousness almost instantly, and was soon gratefully participating in party activities again.

This is not the first time George Bien has been on the

scene to help a victim of choking. The important thing is to give aid immediately! A person will die of asphyxiation within three to four minutes of having the air passage blocked, or suffer such brain damage as to make his life worthless.

The more usual, or preferred method, is to stand behind a victim of choking, grasp him firmly around the waist just below the ribs, and with hands clasped forcefully press upward to dislodge the object from the throat. If he is already on the floor, the blow directly to the rib-diaphragm area is used.

Thank you, George Bien. The saving of a life anytime is news, and when a friend is saved, there is cause for celebration.

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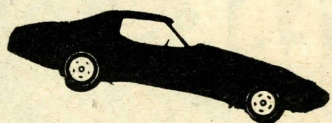
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Roses, and Roses, And Roie

Many varieties thrive for her: geraniums in several styles, begonias, ferns, Creeping Charleys regular and royal, alyssum in

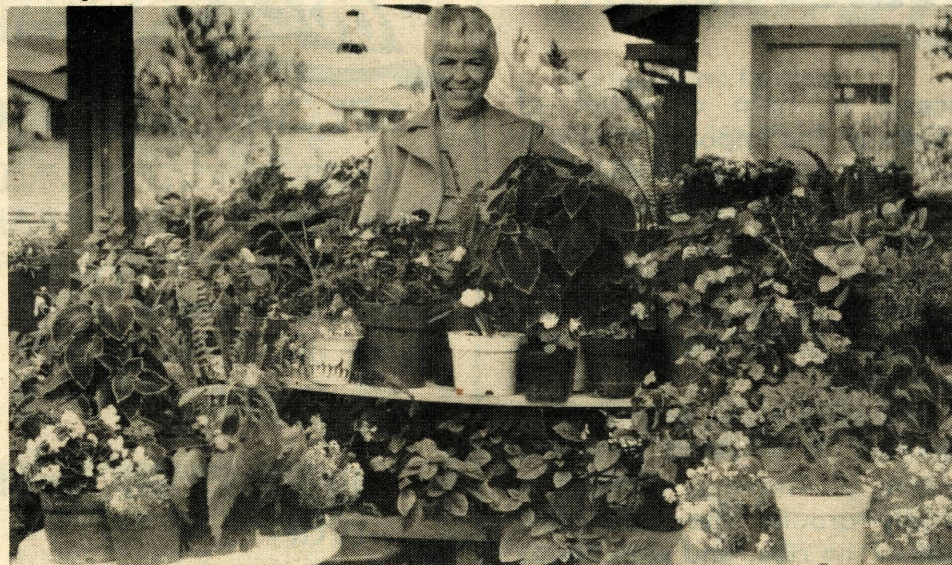

If you bird watchers are still not convinced, please be sure to read the label on the product you buy to be certain that the dye used is approved.

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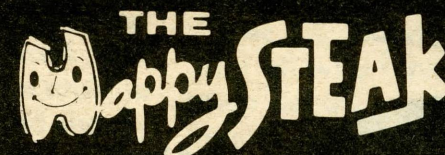
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Security Officer Speaks

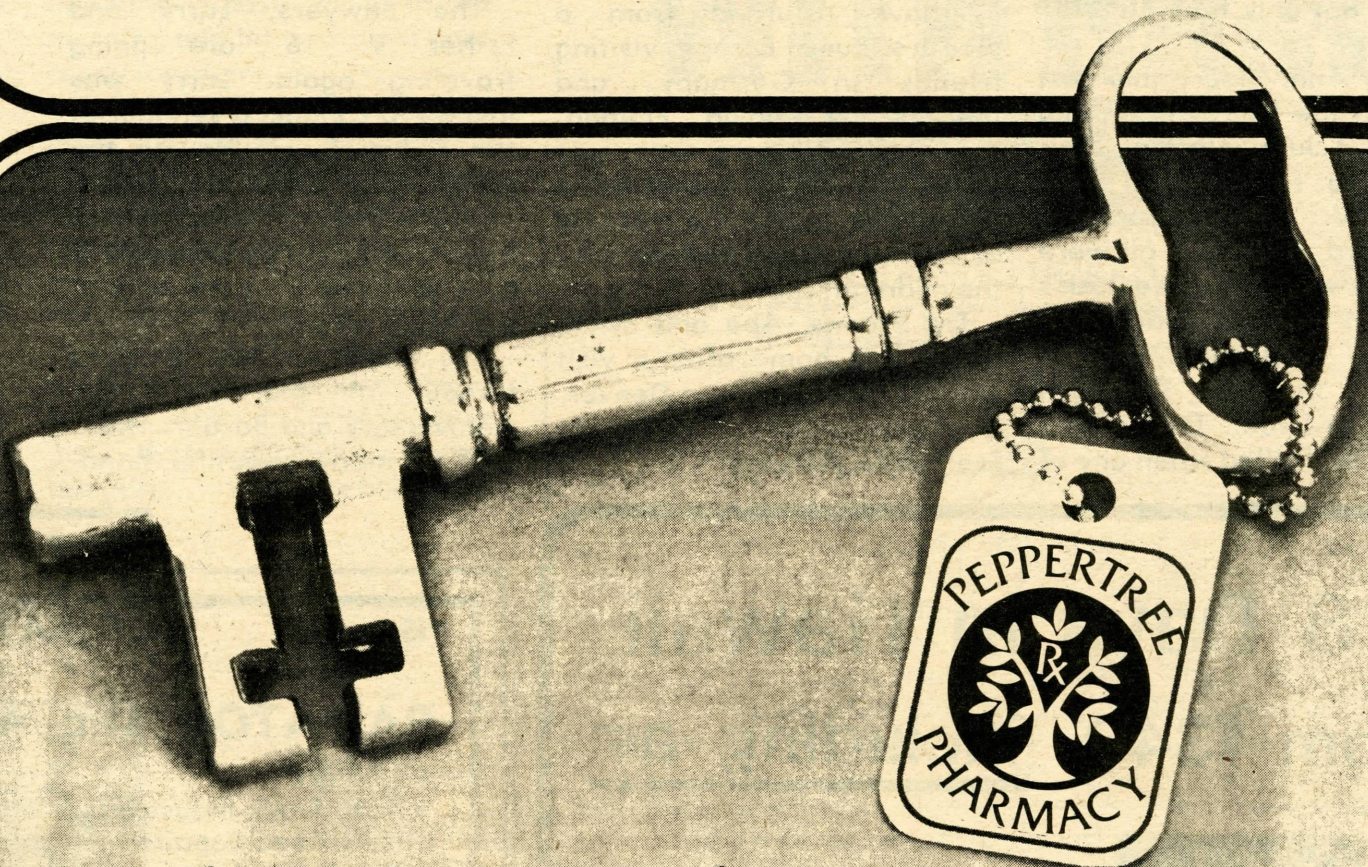

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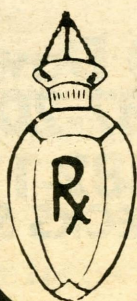
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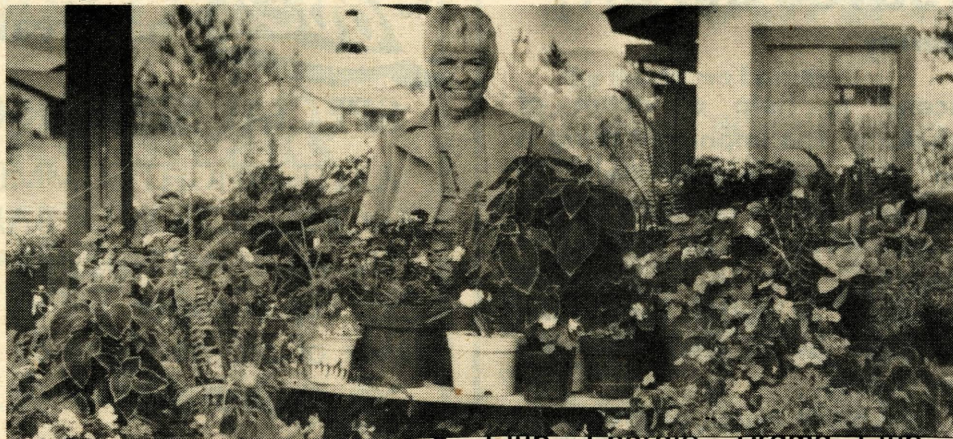
Roses, and Roses, And Roie

I don't like to talk about problems, but there are a couple that cause a lot of unnecessary delay at the Main Gate. The most common problem is that many of you do not remember to call the gate when you are expecting guests or deliveries. This means that the gate officers must call you to get clearance for your guest, and meanwhile, traffic is backing up at an alarming rate. If you are expecting visitors of any kind, please call us in the morning and let us have a pass ready for them.

The second, and potentially more dangerous, problem is caused by residents driving vehicles that are ineligible for decals. If you don't have a 1981 decal on your vehicle, please don't attempt to enter through the Decal Vehicle Gate. The gate officer must walk across a traffic lane to check your pass, then walk back to open the gate. This creates backup in

both traffic lanes, with a great potential for rear-end collisions and backup of traffic on Santa Rosa Road.

I would like to remind everyone that rules are made by you, and if one is unpopular with you, please don't take it out on the Security Officer who is attempting to enforce it. He is doing what you pay him to do.

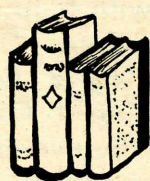
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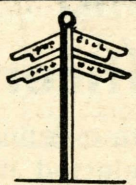
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TRAVEL COMMITTEE

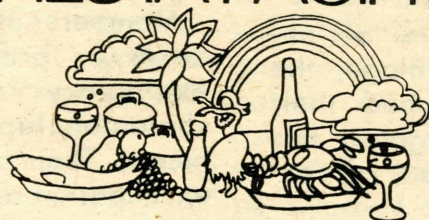

Your Neighbors Care Group continues to offer a unique service to L.V. It is not all things to all people, to be sure, but it's often the answer to where to turn in those small emergencies and for help in day-to-day problems.

Its services are varied. For instance, the Blood Pressure Screening Clinic took 189 pressures in August and 285 the previous month. The clinic was cancelled in September because of Labor Day. Sandy Okum, President, has been successful in bringing many noted lectures to the village monthly who keep us informed

on health care. Through Y.N.C.G. we have been able to offer free notary service, as well as membership in a supplemental Medicare Insurance Plan.

Leonie Zylar of V. 7 and Freddi Popkin of V. 33, faithful telephone volunteers, are kept busy answering many and varied questions. In August, for instance, there were calls for transportation, crutches, a house-sitter and a dishwasher. There are many requests for information about doctors, practical nurses and dog-sitters. In our files, we have names of villagers who are willing to offer companionship and prepare meals in an

emergency. We even receive calls from people who wish to donate items to us -- the most recent article and one often needed -- a bath bench.

Another volunteer who is available is Marian Gordon who is knowledgeable about nursing homes and is experienced in counseling.

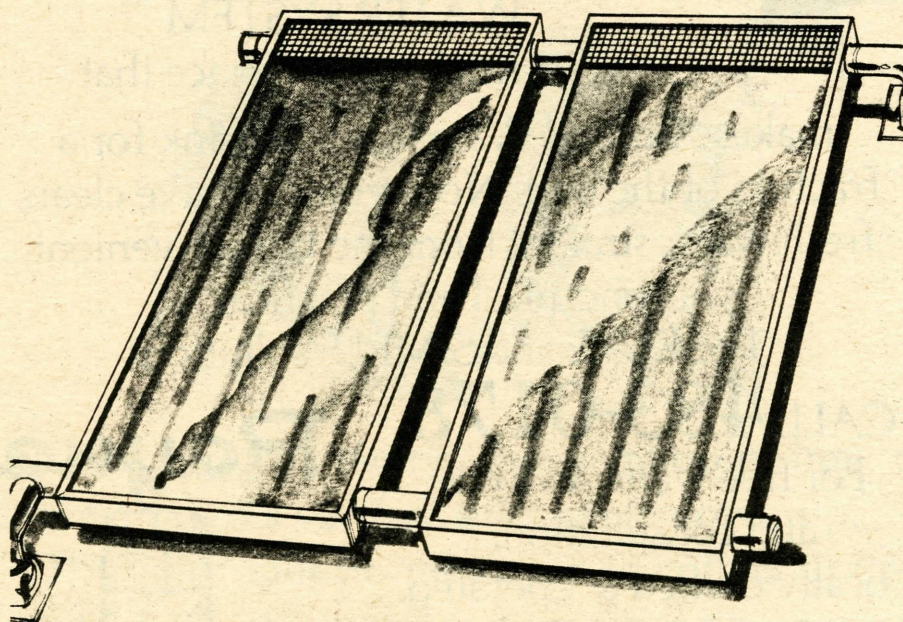

We have many committees working for us, donating their time and much effort to protect our interests. They watch our money, they watch our buildings and grounds, they oversee our recreational and


