


#### Security chief: 'We're friends'

I am still hoping that our present Board of Directors will allow our security guards the privilege to give or not give citations under the circumstances mentioned in the article. The subject was directed to our Board of Directors, not the security officers.)

As your Chief of Safety & Security Services, I was somewhat concerned by the article "Security Guards: friends or foes?" as appeared in the Feb. 15, 2002, issue of Inside Leisure Village.

While we do appreciate the kind words that were stated in the article, I am concerned about the possible misconceptions that it may also provide.

Leisure Village Patrol Officers are here as your employees. Our main duty is to enforce the rules and regulations of Leisure Village. We rules. Our traffic enforcement program mirrors programs of local communities. Many departments have policies that cover when a field officer may or may not excuse a cita-

Leisure Village attempts to keep the policy equal and fair to all, by enacting a zero tolerance policy some time back. The Board of Directors under this program are the sole decision-makers if a Notice of Violation would or would not be forgiven. The current Board of Directors and I have recently spoken about revising this program, and I will be making recommendations to them in the near future.

I happen to live a little over one mile from LVA. When my wife and I go for a walk, we continually see vehicles well over the posted 25 mph speed limit. An intersection about five houses down from my home has had numerous traffic collisions. I consider

#### Voting important at LV

Under the auspices of the Current Issues Forum, a civicminded audience turned out on March 1 to hear representatives of the League of Women Voters.

Nell McCombs and Letha Marshall explained the pros and cons of six propositions and two measures that were on the March 5 ballot.

Lillian Hawthorne was the moderator. Paula Lite, our

Camarillo area director, arranged the evening. The audience felt part of an important process.

On Election Day, 1,223 LV residents voted in our AR. There were about 580 absentee ballots, for a total of approximately 1,800. LV again had the highest percentage of voters in any comparable Ventura County community, with a turnout of more than 55 percent, compared to 30 to 35 percent elsewhere.

The budget was no surther RV Lot. All they had to do prise with the way this was read our CC&Rs: Board has wasted our money. For example: increase in number of lawsuits; amount of unnecessary attorney fees; hike in our insurance premiums; a 3 percent pay raise for staff (union employees got only 25 cents an hour); contribution to a 401(k) Plan for certain employees — the ones already making big bucks; replacing carpet in the AR entry that was attractive with unsightly carpet; authorizing bonuses; and what about the new walkway being put in by the gazabo/swimming pool area?

Social Security increases were 2.6 percent. Did the Board even consider this when it raised our assessments to 6.273 percent? No. Has harmony been restored? No. Can we foresee any change in our money being wasted with this Board? No.

How can we change things? By voting for individuals who care about the homeowners and put their needs and pocketbooks first. Leisure Village is a business. We need Board members with business qualifications who will put common sense before ego.

This is your Village. Vote for change in the June elections. We must stop unnecessary spending and start treating homeowners with respect.

Board members didn't need to run to the city again to enlist its help in allowing employees to park in

Article 3.4(f) states: "To assign parking spaces in the Common Area, if any, to Owners." It doesn't refer to employees.

Article 3.5(f) states: "By a majority vote of the Board, and from time to time, to adopt, amend, enforce and repeal such rules and regulations as the Board shall determine to be necessary or proper for the operation of the Project ('the Association Rules')." It further states, "The Association rules shall govern the use of the Lots and the Common Area by any Owner, by the family of such Owner, or by any invitee, licensee or lessee of such Owner; provided, however, that the Association Rules may not discriminate among Owners and shall not be inconsistent with Declaration, the Articles or By-Laws."

Allowing vehicles other than owner vehicles (or those of family, etc.) to park in the RV Lot can clearly be viewed as discrimination among own-

A contrary interpretation violates the provisions of the CC&Rs and places the Association and Homeowners in legal jeopardy.

Lastly, the Association would be taking away a benefit that the RV Club has enjoyed for 27 years, and it would also be taking away a very attractive enticement to potential buyers. It is unconscionable to take away a ben-

Of course our attorney recommends separate amendments. Each time we vote on a separate amendment, his pocket gets heavier and our pockets get lighter. It's better to pay more money to have things done right the first time than to keep throwing money away to keep doing things over and over and over again.

Why were our assess-ments increased increased 6.273 percent when all we heard last year was the thousands of dollars the General Manager saved us with the new Green Waste Program and the extra money the General Manager recouped because of a swimming pool money adjustment? Also, in Landscape Superintendent's year-end report in the February Village Voice, he states that water use in landscape has dropped 15 percent.

All the fines assessed against homeowners for driving two miles over the speed limit must have generated thousands of dollars more. So that justifies a 6.273 percent increase? No new patrol cars were in the budget this year as in past years; tree removal and the street contracts appear to be uniform. So why such a huge increase for 2002-

I do notice that salaries have gone up considerably, as well as a contribution to a 401(k) Plan for select employees. Wake up, homeowners, and look at the fat we're paying for.

We need a Board of Directors who can keep our budget in line with Social Security increases. The last two years proved that it can be done. We had major expenses in both prior years, and in 2000 our increase was 2.345 percent, and in 2001 it was 2 percent. It can be done with a committed Board of Directors who knows how to budget and how to prioritize.

#### **ODDS AND ENDS**

#### County supervisor discusses issues

Here are excerpts from Ventura County Supervisor Kathy Long's presentation to the Leisure Village Current Issues Forum:

Ventura County has taken strong steps to ensure we are as safe as possible under the current circumstances. Sheriff Bob Brooks and Fire Chief Bob Roper have deployed emergency services and response teams, have sharpened those response teams, and are ready to respond appropriately. Ventura County is coordinating our efforts through various agencies, including the established mutual aid networks among federal, state and local agencies, to make the best use of all available resources. Our local Public Health Officer, Dr. Bob Levin, is working closely with our medical professionals and experts from around the nation to keep up to date on current issues related to health threats. Our local public safety and health teams have actually been engaged in learning about and preparation for terrorist acts for the past two years.

Redistricting was completed in the summer months and became effective through an ordinance enacted in late August. District 3 boundaries continue to include Camarillo, Santa Clara Valley (Santa Paula, Fillmore, Piru) and the upper north half of the county. The newest area of my district is Port Hueneme, a portion of the Naval Base Ventura County, and the Lewis Road Corridor, including the CSUCI University.

CSUCI — California State University Channel Islands is now included in my district and provides a wonderful campus for Ventura County to expand educational opportunities for students of all ages. The University is a neighbor to the City of Camarillo. Our local businesses will be called upon for a variety of services, and our community will be called upon to welcome the new neighbors and families. As a member of the University's Site Authority, I have been involved in many of the details associated with the University. It has been a pleasure to work with the new President, Dr. Richard Rush, to develop faculty and student housing, discuss the educational curriculum, and partner with our business community and educational community to provide an outstanding opportunity for our residents.

Continuing on the educational theme, we have a need to expand or relocate our Camarillo Library. While located in the City of Camarillo, it is part of the larger Ventura County Library System. As a member of the Library Commission, I am working to assist in the goal to have a new library that meets the needs of all citizens.

Housing continues to be a critical need throughout this county. Providing safe and affordable shelter that includes a variety of housing choices, both for the workforce, families, seniors, and those with special housing needs, continues to be a challenge.

In addition to housing, I hear concerns from constituents regarding transportation. I serve as Vice Chair of Ventura County Transportation Commission, which has oversight of the major transportation projects, including rails and rapid transit connections. There are major improvements planned to improve Highway 101 north of Camarillo towards Oxnard and Ventura. The Lewis Road corridor out to the University

is slated for four-laning, which will be starting next year. Additionally, we have two major interchanges in the City of Camarillo to begin. All that to say, it may be a bit more congested and difficult to get around over the next couple of

One of the issues I worked on with the Transportation Commission was coordination of projects, and better bus service. Through the cooperation of the Camarillo Health Care District, we have improved van services. The City has worked on the internal bus system to improve it. But, we still have work to do to improve the city-to-city connection services.

As a result of a request for volunteers which appeared in the issue of Inside Leisure Village on Aug. 17, 2001, a new group is forming.

These are ladies who delight in knitting or crocheting needed items of clothing for premature babies. The organization requesting the volunteers is called "Stitches from the Heart" and is centered in Los Angeles. They send thousands of items to hospitals around the country and have expressed excitement at the idea of a group forming in Camarillo.

#### What to do if you have a heart attack alone

Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, this article from Rochester General Hospital seems in order.

Without help, the person whose heart stops beating properly and who begins to feel faint has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest. A breath and a cough must be repeated

about every two seconds without let-up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs, and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating.

The squeezing pressure on the heart also helps it retain normal rhythm.

In this way, heart attack victims can get to a phone and, between breaths, call for help.

When the pipes leak, When the bones creak, When the knees go bad, I simply remember my favorite things, And then I don't feel so bad.



Your Neighbors Care Group has a stock of hospital supplies available to LV residents for emergency short-term use free of charge.

This supply includes: wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, canes, commodes, toilet risers, shower benches, traction equipment, vaporizers, etc.

These can be loaned for one month's use through our Recreation Department office, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 11:45 a.m., and from 1 to 4 p.m. In a real emergency, after these hours or on weekends, arrangements can be made to meet a security guard to open our storage room — under the Projection Room in the AR —by calling the Main Gate. You must meet the guard there and sign the log as to the time you removed the item you are borrowing.

Remember: No deliveries by our Security Department, and call only in an emergency.

And streets are much stepper than 10 years ago.


That should explain why my walking is slow.

This program has also benefited family members who lost a loved one and needed help in disposing of furniture and other items.


