


The other members of the Guppy crew are (L to R); ALFIE, CARLYLE, DAVE, and SEADOG.



COCO the Pink Elephant (which made no sense at all! 1959/60), OGG the caveman (who had a wife named Kell, you know. 1967-70), and TUSK the mammonth (who was brown, at least, which made a bit more sense than pink! 1971-81) Tusk was followed by a monkey named COCO, who appears alternately animated and live on boxes and in ads today. LINUS THE LION-HEARTED was the spokestoon for Post's Crispy Critters (1962-68). Whenever he said "Crispy Critters", he was trampled by a stampede. Linus had a Saturday A.M. cartoon show that started in 1964 on CBS, then moved to ABC, where it ran on Saturday until 1966. The show then ran in re-runs on Sundays from 1966 to 1969. Members of Linus' cartoon kingdom included other Post characters, like Sugar Bear, So-Hi, and Lovable Truly. Ah, the good ol' days when a cartoon show was a commercial for cereal, and not just an ad for some toy-line. Linus is © Post.




(panel two) PROFESSOR GOODY hawked Aunt Jemima Frozen Waffles (1968). He was always trying to eat them without the notice of Wallace the Waffle Whiffer. The children are THE COCO-PUFFS KIDS. They appeared on boxes and in ads for the Big G's Coco-Puffs in the days before Sonny the Cuckoo Bird (1961). The kids would say, "Puff-Puff Coco-Puffs," "Chocolate-Flavored Coco-Puffs," and "The Big G stands for GOODNESS!" Now THERE was some good ad-copy! Professor Goody is (C) Quaker Oats. Coco-Puff Kids are (C) General Mills.

(panel five) getting stoned are SMAXEY SEAL (1957-61) and THE SMACKIN BROS (1966-70), who sold us Sugar Smacks before Dig-Em The Frog got everybody all 'hopped-up'. All are (c) Kelloggs.

(panel seven) OFFICER CRUMB spent the early 80s protecting Cookie Crisp cereal from the likes of COOKIE CROOK. Both are () Ralston. SO-HI was a shameless stereotype and a shill for Post's Rice Krinkles (1960-68). You gotta believe the ad-men were smoking something when they pitched this character. So-Hi is () Post.



From left to right in the bottom panel are; GOGGOL The ALIEN (Sugar JETS, 1962/63, @ General Mills), POPPY The PORCUPINE (Sugar CORN POPS, 1980-86, @ Kelloggs), WALLY BEAR (a forgotten spokesman for Sugar SMACKS, 1986, @ Kelloggs), and OATMAN (one of the Energy Three, who were on boxes of Frosty-Os in 1969, @ General Mills). I like drawing Goggol. I'd consider him a proto-QUISP if he wasn't from a different company.




(top panel in distance) That's WALLACE The WAFFLE-WHIFFER (Aunt Jemima Frozen Waffles, 1968, (a) Quaker Oats) about to home in on Professor Goody again.

(bottom panel, L to R) The KOLODNY was one of a whole group of oddball characters used to promote KIX cereal (1964/65. General Mills). Kolodny was fond of diving into a bowl of Kix. Here, he's training Smaxey, and a SAILOR BOY (© Post) who used to appear on packages of Alpha-Bits (1963).




(briefly, top of frame, L to R) WHIPPER-SNAPPER (Sugar Corn Pops, 1969, c Kelloggs), Tusk and Ogg, HONEY-COMB KID (Honey-Comb, 1965-69, c Post), SMEDLEY The ELEPHANT (Cap'n Crunch Peanut Butter Crunch, 1969-mid70s, c Quaker Oats), CORNELIUS (in Smedley's trunk) (Sugar-Coated Corn Flakes, 1958-61, c Post), and Coco.

(middle, L to R) QUAKE (Quake. 1966-68, c Quaker Oats), GORILLA and BOY (Banana Wackies, 1965, c Post), MILTON The TOASTER (Pop-Tarts, 1971-73, c Kelloggs), RORY RACCOON (Sugar-Sparkled Flakes, 1966, c Post), HILLBILLY GOAT (Sugar-STARS, 1965/66, c Kelloggs), AMERICAN GOTHIC WOMAN (Country Corn Flakes, 1966, c General Mills), MR. SCARECROW (Country Corn Flakes, 1963-65, c General Mills), and The CHECKERBOARD SCARECROW (Corn CHEX, 1966-67, c Ralston).



(bottom of frame, L to R) BLUE GIRAFFE (Triple Snack, 1963-65, (Kelloggs), HATTIE The ALLIGATOR and COLONEL CORNBURST (Corn BURSTS, 1966-69, General Mills), MARKY MAYPO (Maypo, 1950s, Maltex), SUGARPOPS PETE (Sugar POPS 1959-61, Go Kelloggs), LAURENCE The DOG (Alpha-Bits, 1964, Go Post), BOOBY (holding bow) (Kix, 1965, General Mills), SHELLY The TURTLE (signing up with his horse) (Corny SNAPS, 1975-79, (Kelloggs).

IACK E. LEONARD (1963) and LOVABLE TRULY (1964-69) were both letter-carriers for Post's Alpha-Bits. By the way, that's a RISK board they're using for a battlemap. I do think it was clever that a company named POST would use mailmen for spokestoons. They thought that one out from A to Z.




On this page we find flying by, JOHNNY JET (JETS, 1960, © General Mills), SIR GRAPEFELLOW (of the eponymous Sir Grapefellow cereal, 1972, © General Mills), and BUFFALO BEE (Rice Honeys, 1954-65, © Nabisco).



Inside the Aerodrome, TWINKLES The ELEPHANT carries SANFORD The PARROT (Twinkles, 1960, © General Mills). Continuing clockwise, we see Oatman and SUGARMAN (Frosty-Os, 1969, © General Mills), Goggol again, BARON VON REDBERRY (Baron Von Redberry, 1972, © General Mills), and finally MILKMAN The third member of the ENERGY THREE (© General Mills).



The Fireman is known as The TWINKLES SPRINKLER. He appeared on boxes of Sugar Sprinkled Twinkles in 1965. By logic I deduce that his hose contains ...SUGAR! In the 60s our parents didn't know what an explosive drug sugar could be.



APPLE JACK (Apple Jacks, 1965, ©Kelloggs) hovers weirdly in the upper left corner, just as he did In the ads. Spiraling clockwise, we find Wallace, BIGG MIXX (Bigg Mixx, 1990, © Kelloggs, Kelloggs Had this habit of making new cereals by combining pieces from existing cereals, see also Triple Snack), GZORPE (Kix, 1964, © General Mills), CHOCKLE The BLOB (Choco-Crunch, 1982, © Quaker Oats), ZILCH (Kix, 1964, © General Mills), The BLUE GNU (who pushed Kombos in 1969, which came in chocolate, strawberry, and orange flavors, none of which were BLUE, © Kelloggs), and everybody's favorite maniac, The CRUNCHBERRY BEAST (Cap'n Crunch with Crunchberries, 1967-70s, © Quaker Oats).













