

Bob McQuivey, with 731 votes, and Marge Lorraine, with 719, votes were elected to the Board of Directors for a term of two years.


Bob is a relative newcomer to the Village, and Marge was re-elected.


The best of luck to the Board, and let all Villagers support the new Board.

hen the LV Board required replumbing before selling an LV unit - a requirement now rescinded I investigated other, less expensive solutions.

By contacting the Camrosa Water District manager, I found one that I decided to install. It is made by Flo-Logic, Inc., whose toll-free telephone number is 1-877-356-5644. I have found it to be a valid substitute, since replumbing could have even more damaging leaks than

the current system because it is in the attic.

Also, it is much less expensive, costing less than \$900 to install compared to \$3,500 for replumbing.

It is like a circuit breaker for plumbing, in that it will stop water flow once preset time limits and drip rates are reached, thus mimizing damage and letting homeowners find the leak and fix it.

It also reduces the risk of leaks, since it can be programmed for different lifestyles and shut off easily everytime you leave home.

Furthermore, it greatly reduces the risk of a leak in a unit from damaging a roofmate's unit, with the high liability risks.

I have no financial interest in FloLogic and am sending this letter so that fellow Villagers will be informed of this solution. While there are other systems on the market. I did not investigate them, since Camrosa told me about this one. I would be willing to show my installation to you or a limited number of Villagers.

FEMA flood plain update

The panel presentation on the FEMA Flood Plain Map held in the AR on Thursday, June 1, made three important points.

First, most of Leisure Village will remain within the proposed FEMA Flood Plain map for 100-year and 500-year floods, after the map is finalized in October 2006 or later.

Secondly, Leisure Village homeowners with mortgages then must have flood insur-

Finally, some attempts then can be made to remove Leisure Village from the Flood Plain Map through development of some mitigating device, such as building a five-foot wall or barrier between the Village and Conejo Creek.

Regarding the formation of an assessment district, Leisure Village will not be involved in that. The formation of a district to collect funds for flood control along Conejo Creek will be made up of those property owners who will be affected by the improvements needed to control floods. We are just one of those - others will be the farmers, commercial property owners south of us, and other residential neighborhoods that border the creek or will be affected by it during a flood.

Regarding funding by the county: It will take years to accumulate the funds,

as there are many other priorities that the watershed district has. The county has little flexibility to funding, as funds collected for one watershed area cannot be used or transferred to other watersheds.

The most logical approach is to form the new assessment district (after voter approval) and float bonds and start getting the wall built as soon as possible. We were told that the wall is already in design and that construction could

begin within two to three years. So it is better to form the district, get the wall built and get us and others out of the 100-year plain. At that point, people could drop flood insurance. If we wait for the county to accumulate funds, you will be paying flood insurance premiums for years to come, rather than just a few years. It is estimated that the cost of funding the district will be cheaper per person, than if each had to get flood insurance.

New law says ballots must be kept secret

Have you ever wondered how secret your vote is? Although it's handled by a double-envelope system, the General Manager has admitted to opening the ballots, checking off voter names, and tabulating the ballots as they come in.

It appears that our Board has used this procedure because no method was specified in the codes as to how to handle the ballots

prior to the date designated for receipt and counting of ballots. However, all of this is changing.

California Senate Bill (SB61) was passed and signed into law by the governor on October 3, 2005, and became effective on July 1, 2006. This delay is typical of legislation since it intentionally allows time for homeowner associations to be able to comply.

This new legislation adds

Civil Code Sections to the Davis Sterling Act regarding voting procedures, and it provides monetary penalties for violations.

Briefly, in addition to double envelopes, no director, candidate for the Board, or relative of these individuals shall be an election inspector. No member or employee of the association shall open or otherwise review the ballots prior to the time and place when the ballots are opened and tabulated at an Open Meeting, duly announced.

The Board has been aware of this new law since October but has been pushing for passage of the revised CC&Rs and Bylaws by using methods which were outlawed on July 1. At that time, the new amendments will also be outdated. So why the rush?

Once-simple task becomes complicated

Why all this fuss? All we are trying to do is get an important housekeeping task completed so the Association has up-to-date governing documents.

The method of counting CC&R votes has been the same for at least six years. This includes the vote for the second CC&Rs amendment in 2000, when I was Board President and Ethel

Ann Pemberton was Board Secretary. It is a procedure for which there was guidance and approval by legal counsel. On completion of the current voting process, new laws will apply for future applicable voting procedures.

There is no secrecy, no illegal actions. The CC&R ballots are being opened and tabulated in the same method used in 2000 when Ethel Ann was a part of the process. Why try now to attach some illegality to this supervised opening and tabulating of the votes? It is not the same as counting votes for Board candidates, which always has and will continue to involve a large number of Homeowners and will all be done immediately after the voting closes. Why is it so important to keep trying to throw roadblocks

in the way of approving the amended CC&Rs?

As of this writing, we need another 300 "Yes" votes to pass the CC&Rs. It is an important document that serves for the betterment of the Association. If you have not yet voted, we need your "Yes" vote now!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Strawberry, rhubarb salad molds

Strawberry and rhubarb salad molds

3 packages strawberry-flavored gelatin

3 cups hot water

2 10-ounce packages frozen rhubarb

2 quarts sliced fresh strawberries

Watercress to garnish

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Drop in frozen rhubarb. Stir to separate the rhubarb. When the gel begins to set, add strawberries. Pour into individual wet molds and chill until set.

Unmold on watercress and garnish each with a fresh whole strawberry.

I had never seen a movie before and did not entirely understand the process. When the forest fire started to chase cute little animals all over the place, I became very upset and my father had to take me out of the theater. He explained that it was only a story, the characters were not real, and nobody was hurt. That didn't help much for a 3year-old, and I stayed away from movies for awhile after that. Oh sure, I visited Dad on the set while he was making movies, and all the actors and actresses always came over to be nice to the director's cute little boy, but I don't think I entered another movie theater for quite a few months after

Disney had a tremendous effect on audiences, on the cinematic art, and especially on the movie industry in general. He holds the record for having been awarded the greatest number of Oscars, 32. His movies had a great hold on the American

public, at least until Warner Brothers came up with Bugs Bunny and his merry crew.

Disney, early TV double feature

Walt himself won a technical Academy Award for inventing the multiplane camera, with which animation is photographed. Various planes at different distances from the camera can be moved relative to the lens, so that, for instance when someone walks through the woods, the bushes closest to him appear to move the fastest, and the trees farthest away move the slowest, exactly as in real life.

Walt didn't have it easy starting out. After serving as an ambulance driver in World War I, he went to the Art Institute of Kansas City. There he honed his already formidable cartooning skills. He also met Ub Iwerks there, another promising animator.

The two left school to produce a series of animated comedies called "Newman's Laugh-O-Grams." They soon were bankrupt. They caught the next train to Hollywood, however, and there began producing a series of films about a funny little girl, Alice, who walked through a world of animated characters. This was the "Alice" series, and it thrived from

about 1923 to about 1927.

Just before folks lost interest in Alice, Walt and Ub began work on a new character called "Oswald, the Lucky Rabbit." This became immensely popular and remained so until 1928. Then Walt discovered that his backers had stolen the rights to Oswald from him. Broke again, he, Ub, his brother, Roy Disney, and Roy's wife, Edna, turned out three quick cartoons based on a doodle Walt had made on the train home after his last financial disaster. This was a mouse he named "Mickey."

The first two cartoons were somewhat pedestrian, and Walt and Ub realized that they were not going to become millionaires based on that. However, Walt decided to gamble and spent their last few dollars adding a soundtrack to the third cartoon, "Steamboat Willie." Walt himself did the voice of Willie, who later became Mickey. Walt's sister-in-law did the inking and painting.

The rest, as they say, is





Distinctive Properties

The one element that marked Disney cartoons from first to last was a cheerful optimism and limitless humor. The characters always seemed to have a good time doing whatever they were doing, and the good guys always vanquished the bad guys in the end.

We will spend an evening with Walt on July 9. We will see some of his earliest films from the 'Alice" series, some early Oswalds, and go up into the '40s and '50s when his musical short subjects were even then breaking new ground in their combination of classical and popular music, and brilliant visuals to complement. This natural talent for music manifested itself in a series

of short cartoons which Disney called the "Silly Symphonies." They delighted audiences the world over for many years.

We'll wander through this treasure trove of animated and semi-animated films, and for an evening appreciate the real art of Walter Elias Disney.

It all starts at 7 p.m. Sunday, July 9, in the AR. See you at the movies!

Also on July 9, we will have another blast from the past of early television.

Television, as you all know, was invented in the mid-1920s by several people, including Vladimir Zworykin and Ernest F. W. Alexanderson in America, and John L. Baird in England. The first public demonstrations of TV were made in 1925, but the equipment was far too cumbersome and the broadcasts were far too jittery and unreliable to allow for home use at that time.

One of the first public broadcasts occurred in 1927, when AT&T broadcast to TV experimenters in New York a picture of the soonto-be Republican presidential contender Herbert Hoover. On September 11, 1928, more broadcast tests included a science-fiction drama showing a guided missile attack on New York

City. The sound was broadeast by WGY, Schenectady, N.Y., and the picture by W2XAD.

In those days, the best TV screens were 3-by-4inches, about the size of a postcard. But the picture moved, and that made it exciting!

It should be noted that the first feature-length movie, "The Jazz Singer," had premiered a year earlier, on October 6, 1927.

Not long after, in 1934, radio was saturated with talent and non-talent of all kinds. TV was still in its infancy, but radio was king. Movie theaters actually shut down their shows so people could listen to "Amos 'n' Andy," so popular were

A new source of talent was needed. This was supplied by Major Bowes, who started the first "Amateur Hour." Many talented folks began their careers under Major Bowes' kindly mentoring, and later also under Ted Mack, who had been a director for Major Bowes and knew the drill very thoroughly. Major Bowes was strictly a radio personality. He passed away in 1946. In 1948, ABC Radio and Dumont Television decided to revive the show with its erstwhile director. Ted Mack, as emcee.

Symptoms of a stroke

My friend sent this to me and encouraged me to spread the word. I agreed. If everyone can remember something this simple, we could save some folks. Seriously, please read:

During a barbecue, a friend stumbled and took a little fall. They offered to call paramedics, but she assured everyone that she was fine, that she had just tripped over a brick because of her new shoes. They got her cleaned up and got her a new plate of food. While she appeared a bit shaken up, she went about enjoying herself the rest of the afternoon.

Her husband called later saying that his wife had been taken to the hospital and passed away. She had suffered a stroke at the barbecue.

Had they known how to identify the signs of a stroke, perhaps the woman would be with us today.

A neurologist says that if he can get to a stroke victim within three hours, he can totally reverse the effects of a stroke — totally. He said the trick was having a stroke recognized, diagnosed and then getting the patient

medically cared for within three hours, which is tough.

Here's how to recognize a stroke. Thank God for the sense to remember the three steps. Read and learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer severe brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

- S: Ask the individual to
- T: Ask the person to talk, to speak in a complete sentence, coherently. For example, "It is sunny out today.'
- R: Ask the person to raise both arms.


Another sign of a stroke is this: Ask the person to stick out their tongue. If the tongue is crooked, if it goes to one side or the other, that is also an indication of a stroke.

If the person has trouble with any one of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

Preparing for a quake? Don't forget aftershocks

Past studies of earthquakes have made it possible to predict a pattern of seismic activities that will inevitably follow the main shock. Unfortunately, the foreshocks, main shock, and aftershocks probably won't be properly sorted out until the series of seismic events have ended.

The California Office of Emergency Services issues an aftershock alert almost immediately after all significant shakers. There's always the possibility that the first tremor felt was a precursor, or pre-shock. Earthquake alerts usually remain in effect for up to 72 hours after the initial shock.

The Landers/Big Bear earthquakes provided an in-

teresting example. On June 28, 1992 at about 5 a.m., the magnitude 7.0 Landers earthquake awakened nearly everyone in Southern California and thousands more in western Arizona and southern Nevada. Tall buildings swayed at places as distant as Boise, Idaho, and Albuquerque, New Mexico. Water splashed out of suburban swimming pools in Denver.

The surface rupture began near Landers and in less than 30 seconds ruptured 42 miles northwestward through the Mojave Desert. Aftershocks began almost immediately, but the strongest one, a magnitude 6.7 temblor near Big Bear Lake, rattled most of Southern California a few minutes

after 8 a.m. In this event, most area residents became believers of the value of earthquake alerts.

California's most devastating seismic event, the 5 a.m. April 18, 1906, earthquake, triggered unusual phenomena on nearly 700 miles of the San Andreas Fault. A strong pre-shock awakened most residents, but less than a minute later. the main magnitude 8.0-plus earthquake ripped more than 250 miles of the fault, with horizontal displacement of more than 27 feet in some areas. About 16 hours later a strong earthquake struck near Brawley in Imperial County. Every building in or near Brawley was severely damaged or destroyed. Seismologists believe that this magnitude 6.7 quake was an aftershock, even though it struck nearly 500 miles from the initial shock.

Five days later the opposite end of the San Andreas Fault still delivered another damaging shock. This quake's epicenter was near Ferndale in Humboldt County, about 200 miles north of San Francisco. This estimated magnitude 6.4 temblor was felt over most of Oregon.

In 1935, Helena, Montana, was hit sharply by earthquakes that tormented the area for 19 days in October. Heavy damage was sustained because the shocks occurred almost directly beneath Helena. The

first foreshock occurred on October 12. Damage included toppled chimneys, broken plaster and cracked windows. A second foreshock struck on October 15, causing cracks in school house walls. Officials wisely closed schools until the nearly constant seismic activity ended.

The first of two main shocks struck on October 19, causing the collapse of school buildings and extensive damage in the business area. Two people were killed and hundreds were injured. The last damaging aftershock, almost as powerful as the main temblors, hit on October 31 and two more people were killed.
