Your Proxy As An **Absentee Ballot**

The most important meeting of the year for homeowners in Leisure Village is the Annual Meeting in June when we elect fellow residents to the Board of Directors. The Nominating Committee has concluded its work with the presentation of five able candidates to fill vacancies on the Board. We must choose three of them.

Homeowners should have received in their mail this week the Call to Annual Meeting, set for June 27. Enclosed with this announcement is a proxy ballot. Homeowners have the opportunity to cast votes to elect three new members to the Board of Directors, which is responsible for making Village policy decisions.

At the Annual Meeting last June, not enough ballots were cast, either by proxy or in person, to reach a quorum sufficient to constitute a legal meeting.

Non-voting villagers evidently are not aware of how much money that postponement cost them. The Call to Annual Meeting, ballots and instructions cost the Association over \$1100 to mail, first class postage required, plus the labor of creating that material and having it reproduced, stuffed and mailed. CC&Rs require our LVA attorney to be present at the meeting (at \$150 an hour). He had to come back for the rescheduled meeting, also at \$150 an hour.

In order to pass the clean-up of the CC&Rs last year, a 'yes' vote of 75% of the homeowners was required, more than a quorum. A second partial mailing of proxy ballots was made, followed up by dedicated villagers who personally called on people who had not voted or sent in proxies. The dollar value of that effort is difficult to access.

This year the Board has decided to shut down all acivities and sports at the Recreation center for half a day on June 2, to draw attention to the voting process.

Voter registration in the MPR will be from 8:30 to 10:00 a.m., just prior to the meeting in the AR. Homeowners are encouraged to attend and vote. Those unable to come in person are urged to vote ahead of time by using their proxy as an absentee ballot. There are three ways to mark a proxy:

- 1. Cast your three votes for the candidate or candidates of your choice.
- 2. Designate a friend or neighbor to vote your
 - 3. Designate the Board to vote your ballot.

The number of proxies turned in determines whether a new Board will be elected on June 27, or whether the expensive and laborious process must be repeated for lack of a quorum. If you cannot attend the Annual Meeting in person, ILV recommends you use your proxy as an absentee ballot and turn it in early.



agencies where help can be found. Our committee cannot and will not personally solve problems. We only advise where help is available.

The major problem we have had up to now is lack of personal information about villagers to help them in an emergency-earthquake, sudden illaccidents, ness, dementia, etc.

With the cooperation of Y.N.C.G., the Security Dept. and the Emergency Service Organization, a "Security and Safety Survey Form" was put together to gather the information which will serve better and more quickly in the event of need.

This form was included in last month's "Village Voice" and also reprinted in ILV. The information given will be confidential and held by the Security Dept. Filling out this form could save your life or that of your loved ones.

Don't put it off, or say it couldn't happen to me. If you live long enough, all the above and more could happen. Be prepared for the worst. Another big problem is convincing your children--if we can reach them--that you have developed dementia. Denial--"it can't happen to my parents, only to others." Do it now and keep the information up to date.

A Village Helper/Coordinator will call on you to help fill out the form if necessary. Get to know your Helper. He or she may save your life some-

Strawberries Liked The Rain, But...

Juicier strawberries; greener mountains and hills; healthier lawns, flowers and plants. All were results of the heavenly March rains. BUT THE WATER PICTURE GOT NO ROSIER.

One rainy month can't wash away the adverse effects of the five-year drought throughout California. Population grows, demand increases, but the water supply is finite within the state and from export sources. Water agencies are forced to drastically cut the allocations to all cities, municipalities and communities. Rates are raised to compensate for lost revenue as customers use less

Leisure Village obtains its water from the Camrosa Water District. This year - 1991 - the Village will receive only 80% as much water as was used in 1989 and 1990. Obviously, this means 20% less water for lawns, greenbelts, golf course, planted areas and for internal use in every home. If the 80% allocation is exceeded, LVA pays a severe penalty for the additional water.

Fortunately, the March rains did leave us a valuable by-product. We now have one more opportunity to enroll full-time in a water conservation program. LV homeowners can easily save water in the kitchen, laundry, bathroom and outside the home. Terry Craig and his maintenance and resident

services people are doing all they can to intelligently use water for maximum benefit at lowest cost. We should do no less.

The time is now to stop taking the water supply for granted and to learn new ways of using water. Here's a check list to help

In the KITCHEN and LAUNDRY:

- * Use the automatic dishwasher and washing machine only for full
- * When hand washing dishes, collect cold water in bucket as water gets
- Check faucets and pipes for leaks.

In the BATHROOM:

- Check toilet for leaks and flush toilet less often.
- Install low-flow shower heads.
- * Turn off water when brushing teeth or shaving.
- Check faucets and pipes for leaks.
- Take ship-board showers. Wet down - shut off shower to soap up turn shower on to rinse.

OUTSIDE the home:

- Don't use hose to clean sidewalks and driveway - USE A BROOM.
- Water plants sparingly - never during the sunny heat of the day.
- * When car needs washing, take it to a car wash outside the village.

Look at it this way. If we cut water usage in our homes by more than 20%, there's more water available to preserve the natural beauty of the Village. It's a win/win situation -we all conserve water and maintain the curb appeal of village homes at the same time.







Additional House Numbers To Aid Workers

To assist various members of Buildings and **Grounds and Architectural** Committees who must monitor green belt areas behind homes, the Board has approved a project to place the last three digits of each address on the rear of each residence. House numbers on the rear of the homes may also be helpful to operation of the L.V. Emergency Services Organization, maintenance workers, and fire and ambulance services.

The numbers used will be small metal figures, similar to those used on mail boxes, that may be securely mounted in an upper or lower corner of a rear window in such a way that they will not be obvious from inside the home. They also will not interfere with normal window washing.

The project will be completed sometime this summer by volunteers and the Buildings and grounds Committee. Hopefully, the time will be announced in the Village Voice.







All teams received prizes for points won and all seemed happy. Door prizes were plentiful and the plants on each table were beautiful and were added to the prizes.



When any Association employee promises to "look into" or "check out" a situation, they should do so and reply to the resident.



Pleasant Valley Elementary School District Fact Sheet

On Tuesday, June 4, 1991, the Pleasant Valley Elementary School District will ask every voter in the community to consider Measure "G". Measure "G" allows a bond issue of up to \$75 million over a 25year period which will rehabilitate Camarillo's schools and build new classrooms in the district.

OUR CLASSROOMS ARE OLD.

One-third of the schools in the district are over 30 years old. If they are to continue to serve the students of our community, they need major repairs

ENROLLMENT IS INCREASING IN OUR SCHOOL DISTRICT.

Our student population is growing. The district must find room for an additional 3,600 students in the next eighteen years.

BOND MONIES WILL NOT BE USED FOR SALARIES.

All of the money raised from Measure "G" will go directly to local school facilities. The money cannot be used for administrator salaries or normal operating expenses.

PLEASANT VALLEY'S SCHOOLS NEED IMPROVEMENTS.







WHAT IS MACULAR DEGENERATION?

As the eye looks straight ahead, the macula is the point of the retina upon which the light rays meet as they are focused by the cornea and the lens of the eye. Similar to the film in a camera, the retina receives the images that come through the camera-like lens. If the macula is damaged, the central part of the images are blocked as if a blurred area had been placed in the center of the picture. The images around the blurred area may be clearly visible.

Macular degeneration is damage or breakdown of the macula. The eye still sees objects to the side, since side, or "peripheral" vision is usually not affected. For this reason, macular degeneration alone does not result in total blindness. However, it can make reading or close work difficult or impossible without the use of special low vision optical aids.

The retina is the delicate layer of tissue that lines the inside wall of the back of the eye. The macula is a very small area in the center of the retina. In size, the macula is about the same as a capital "O" in the type of this article. This small area is responsible for our central "straight ahead" sight used for reading and other fine tasks.

Macular degeneration can cause different symptoms in different people. Sometimes only one eye loses vision while the

Macular degeneration can cause different symptoms in different people. Sometimes only one eye loses vision while the other eye continues to see well for many years. If both eyes are affected, however, reading and close-up work may become extremely difficult. Macular degeneration alone does not cause total blindness. Since side vision is usually unaffected, most people can take care of themselves quite well.


Macular degeneration can be detected and diagnosed early by an ophthalmologist if periodic eye examinations are part of health care. Early detection is important since people may not realize their vision is impaired. Having your eyes checked is especially appropriate if other family members have a history of retinal problems. For patients with macular degeneration, early diagnosis by an ophthalmologist may prevent further damage or help the individual in making a visual adjustment with low vision aids.
