

PIANO CONCERT **A SUCCESS**

The Benefit Piano Concert, sponsored by YNCG and FOODSHARE and held in the AR on Friday, March 7, was a resounding success.

An audience of about 350 L.V. residents heard Dr. Maura Mitrushina perform a group of 16 compositions. They ranged from Beethoven to Tschaikowski.

Maura, born in Russia, emigrated to the United States in 1979. She was a gifted child who was brought to Leningrad to further her musical talent. After receiving her B.S. degree in Lvov University in 1967, she earned her Master's in 1973 at the Leningrad Conservator of Musicology for piano and organ. Maura taught music in Russia and in the United States, performed as soloist with the Leningrad "Lenconcert" and ballet.

Dr. Mitrushina has a husband and an elevenyear-old daughter in Russia who long to be with her here. Her latest achievement is the acquiring of a Ph.D. in Neuropsychology. She has gotten a fellowship at U.C.L.A., and the ongoing research project, The Aging of the Brain is what initially brought her to Leisure Village and to us.



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
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CHANNEL 12 By Jack Whalen



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

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
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GEM AND MINERAL CLUB By Don Holmes
