#### **Good News!**

Reports by Manager Skip Roberts and various committee heads at the Board of Directors meeting on May 7, revealed several items which can justly be called good news.

ITEM: The Recreation Center building has a new, larger air conditioning system, with adequate ducting, and a timing device to turn it off at night after evening affairs are finished, thereby saving energy. The roof was replaced completely at the same time.

ITEM: Plans have been approved for a pilot project to start within a month, to replace blacktop sidewalks in the Village with concrete. If the cost is feasible, a five year project will replace about one mile of sidewalk each year. Our own crews will do the work, starting near the recreation center.

ITEM: An ad hoc "Reserve Analysis" Committee to work with the Finance Committee was appointed. They will develop a proper technical/engineering basis for funding our reserves, in continuing compliance with state regulations. Don Holmes is chairman, Ed Donahue, Karl Joehnck, an Ed Salzer comprise the membership. They are expected to report to the Board

ITEM: The Association has received a rebate of over \$40,-000 on last year's Workmen's Compensation Insurance premium, because of reduced employee accident claims.

ITEM: According to John Lauten, V.20, funding has been received (about \$785,000, 3/4 from Federal Emergency Management Funds and 1/4 from

# **A Suggestion**

Does Leisure Village need an Ombudsman?

An Ombudsman is an appointed official, usually found in Scandinavian countries, whose duty it is to investigate complaints by private citizens against government officials.

For a long time, ILV has been stressing the importance of improving communications in the Village. Complaints by residents aired at the monthly LVA Board meetings have included such

--Board actions taken on management of the swimming pool without consulting the swimmers.

-- Negligence of the Association manager in returning phone calls of residents.

--Innumerable problems in connection with obtaining resident services (landscaping and appliance repairs.)

--Maintenance of the Recreation Center facilities, which sometimes give the appearance of being run-down.

We are not suggesting that the Association officers and employees are not doing a good job. On the contrary; LVA is probably one of the better-managed homeowner associations in the country.

What we are pointing to are instances where individual residents and groups have been frustrated by their inability to have grievances handled with dispatch and understanding.

When problems arise, it is usually a case of misunderstanding

of lack of proper communication.

Nonetheless, the Village could enjoy the services of an Ombudsman. In trade union parlance he would be known as a shop steward; in business circles, a middle-management expediter.

At the Association's annual meeting in June, the residents might well consider authorizing the Board to appoint an Ombudsman--perhaps rotating the job between the two unsuccessful Board candidates, thus enabling all aspirants an opportunity to serve in leadership roles.

## **Another Pool Policy Change**

Last week the decision was made to have no lifeguard on duty at the swimming pool, only an "attendant", a person not necessarily qualified as a lifeguard, or a teacher, or a skilled pool maintenance mechanic.

Most residents who use the pool advocate a "middle-of-theroad" schedule, having a trained guard on duty during some daylight hours to safeguard handicapped or insecure swimmers, to guard during the children's period, to teach, etc.

The L.V. Board has spent many hours consulting specialists in swimming pool management and insurance liability, and weighing all of the considerations. It is our hope that they will be able to present clearly their "thinking" at tonight's Town Hall Meeting so that people can understand the merit of their decision.

Communication, to me, is the art of one person letting another know what he/she is thinking or doing, but as chairman of the Board of Directors it is a problem of the Board communicating with 3900 residents. I know it is the Board's responsibility to keep residents informed. But, how much communication is logistically possible?

The Board of Directors is five people who have two major roles to fulfill to keep our three million dollar corporation financially sound and environmentally enjoyable:

(1) The Board of Directors is a policy-making body, just as the Board of Directors is in any private organization.

(2) The members of the Board are officers of the Homeowners' Association. They have authority and responsibility to direct, plan, control, monitor and coordinate the activities of the staff and all operations. The obligation takes hours. It takes knowledge. It takes intelligence and it takes prudence. There is never enough time for total communication.

Some concerned homeowners and committee members use formal meetings and minutes of formal meetings as a way to bring up their doubts and fears by "remote control".: Why not freely telephone a Board member when there is a burning question, or a doubt based on hearsay? We can communicate as neighbor to neighbor, for that is what we all are in the last analysis. Each of us can contribute, and all opinions have value.

The Board does not have a communications system at its disposal whereby it can inform evey committee or homeowner concerned of every intended Board action. Events come too fast and making a decision becomes imperative. Administration by committee is a slow process created by the Boards of Directors in past and present administrations, to advise the Board on possible alternatives to be weighed in the decisionmaking process.

The committees have also been assigned monitoring tasks to help gather information on the on-going performannce of the administration staff

and the execution of contracts. This monitoring involves accounting, purchasing, landscaping, buildings and common grounds maintenance, security, recreation services, etc. The residents of Leisure Village should bring their concerns and observations to our committees. They give valuable help and know the best way to get action for you, as quickly as possible.

You and your readers surely are aware that Measure "E" is worthy of a "Yes" vote from everyone who votes June 5!

Measure "E" is opposed by nobody! Yet, a very similar Measure was defeated in 1980--a victim of the controversy swirling then on Growth vs No Growth.

Measure "E" is only permissive: "will allow" the City of Camarillo to "develop, construct, or acquire, utilizing any federal, state, or local financial assistance, housing units for low income persons, including the elderly, handicapped, and disabled, not to exceed in number 2% of the dwelling units within the City." All housing units would be built under all normal local construction requirements and reviews.

The Camarillo General Plan already specifies this type of housing will have small number of units in scattered sites.

"E" will not, and cannot increase property taxes or any other local taxes. It in no way restricts or curtails private enterprise.

Your Yes on Measure "E", if adopted, June 5, would bring to Camarillo the citizen-authorization already beneficially at work in Fillmore, Ojai, Oxnard, Port Hueneme, Ventura, Thousand Oaks, Santa Barbara, Beverly Hills, and 240 other California localities.

Your Yes on "E" will help a majority to say to our City Council: the voters support City actions to build more housing units (by City, or approvable non-profit organizations) for persons of low income, elderly, an handicapped.

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#### **MASTERS RUNNER TRIUMPHS**

As did many of us who grew up through the great depression, Hank Dorff had to skip college where practically all Olympic athletes were chosen. But he always wondered how his running speed would have fared if he'd had a chance to compete.

Hank started competitive running last year for the first time in 50 years and won medals in each of the 5 races he ran. Then, suddenly, Home Savings of America announced sponsorship of the first Olympic Legends Track Meet to be held April 28 and 29 at UCLA's famed Drake stadium, featuring many Olympic athletes who still competed in Masters track and field meets. (Masters are over 35).

Hank immediately entered in the 65 to 69 year group since he had already started training for the year with the Camarillo High School track team. But on April 12, came a frantic call from New York to come immediately because his 4 year old granddaughter was very ill.

All training stopped while in New York, but fortunately, little Lizzie made a good recovery so that Hank could return home on Friday night, a day before the start of the races.

While he had no further thought of winning, Hank felt he'd just drive down to UCLA; meet some of the many athletes; and get a work-out by running in his entered races.

Some 19 former Olympian medal winners were among the over 300 entrants from 7 countries and 19 states. Famous names like Hal Connolly, Parry O'Brien, Payton Jordan, Jimmy Hines and Josh Culbreath were all over the place.

Hank's first race was the 400 meters, and while no Olympian was entered in his race, the competition was strong. At the gun, Hank went out into the lead; held it down the back stretch; increased his lead on the final turn and home stretch; and slammed into the tape, winner by about 15 yards in the very good time of 70.5 seconds, winning the Gold Medal.

The 200 meters in which Hank was also entered was not to be run for another 2 hours. But since Payton Jordan, one of

America's greatest collegiate sprinters; then coach of Stanford University and head coach of the Olympic track team in 1968 was entered against him, Hank wanted to run against this great athlete who is still the fastest sprinter for his age in the world.

Jordan of course won the race in his near record time of 27.8. Hank was the only runner who had run a tough previous race that day and his muscles had tightened up. But he still showed enough speed to take the bronze medal for 3rd place in a good 31.3 seconds.

As Hank says, "when I drove down to UCLA I had no thought or hope of winning. I just thought I'd get little exercise and meet some famous runners in return for my entry fee. And when the dust cleared I had 2 medals and some of the nicest memories of my life."

Leisure Technology and Ventura County General Funds) to begin clearing undergrowth and accumulated silt out of Conejo Creek bed, from the 101 Freeway to Upland Grade at the east end of L.V. # CURRENT ISSUES FORUM HONORS HARRY BECKER, FOUNDER

#### FORUM LUNCHEON By Harry Becker

I wish to thank the officers and members of the Current Issues Forum for honoring me in this manner. I would rather think that this affair is a tribute to the continuing viability of the Forum, instead of to my past years as president.

When I resigned the office last October, some members came to me with despair in their voices, warning that the Forum would not function thereafter.

Obviously, they overestimated my role and underestimated the strong support for the Forum as shown by the vigor with which it has continued to function.

#### **CURRENT ISSUES FORUM**

Dr. Desmond Jones, Oxnard College, will give an "Overview of U.S. Foreign Policy" at the Friday, May 25th meeting of the Current Issues Forum in the AR at 7:30 p.m.

Clearly, the Forum answers a need of Leisure Villagers to exercise the muscles of their minds by engaging in pro and con discussion of various issues.

There were times when a few Village residents objected so strenuously to Forum subjects or to certain guest speakers that they petitioned the Leisure Village Association Board to ban the speakers or prevent the scheduled topics from being discussed.

One such manifestation of intolerance occurred last October and another similar exercise took place recently, when the target was the scheduled speaker, Ramona Ripston of the American Civil Liberties Union. Our Board, in its wisdom, rejected both petitions.

I cannot emphasize too strongly that the Current Issues Forum fills a need in Leisure Village; that it will continue to serve its constituency to the extent that its programs focus




The Talent committee was headed by Joan Johnson, sets were by Helen Gold, and stage

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
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#### **LOOKING AT CHANNEL12**
