

Michael Greenlee, a former All-Big West Conference relief pitcher for the Titans, is in his second season as an assistant athletic media relations director at Cal State Fullerton. In addition to serving as the baseball contact, he also works with the women's volleyball team. A graduate of Cal State Fullerton in 1998 with a degree in graphic design, Greenlee, 32, had spent the previous five years running his private design studio before joining the Fullerton staff in Oct. 2004. Greenlee played two seasons for the Titans' baseball team in 1996-97 and was a medical redshirt for the 1995 national championship season. He posted a career 8-3 record with a 3 94 FRA and collected 7 saves, earning All-Big West honors his senior year. Since he finished playing in 1997 he has been a fixture in the Titan press box as an assistant sports information director and audio coordinator for the baseball team.



The Cal State Fullerton baseball field can be accessed via the 91 Freeway (exit North on State College Blvd.) or the 57 Freeway (exit West on Nutwood Ave. or Yorba Linda Blvd.). Goodwin Field is accessible from both Lots A and G and is free on Friday nights, Saturdays and Sundays. Midweek games will require a \$5 parking permit. # **♦ HIGH-SPEED INTERNET**

The press box is equipped with several high-speed data jacks for on-line browsing and transmission. Media members should bring their own network cables. In the event of over crowding, there are additional lines in the softball press box adjacent to the baseball field and classrooms in the kinesiology building. There are no reserved internet lines, and they will be distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

# **♦ INTERVIEWS**

Coaches and players will be available for postgame interviews on the field after a brief cooling down session and team meeting. Midweek interviews can be conducted before practices, which generally start at 1:45 p.m., or by special arrangement. Coach Horton can also be reached in his office at (714) 278-3780 before noon. Special requests should be made through the athletic media relations office. Interviews with visiting coaches or players should be arranged through the visiting team's SID, when available.

# **GOODWIN FIELD**

All Cal State Fullerton home baseball games are played at Goodwin Field on campus. The field is located at the north end of campus, just east of Titan Stadium. Parking is available by:

- A) Using Lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$5 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday nights and all day on Saturdays and Sundays.
- B) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of a news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

# **♦ MEDIA CREDENTIALS**

Requests should be made by phone (714-278-3081), fax (714-278-3141) or e-mail (mgreenlee@fullerton.edu) as far in advance as possible and no later than 24 hours before game time. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. Otherwise, credentials can be picked up at the press will call.

# **PHOTO CREDENTIALS**

Credentials will be issued on a per-game basis and must be worn in plain sight at all times. All photographers must remain in the camera wells located to the outfield side of each dugout. NCAA regulations regarding photography will be adhered to at all times.

The Big West boasts a sizable number of alumni who have moved on to baseball's highest level and are contributing to the successes of their respective major league clubs.

Some of the Big West's more prominent alumni wearing major league uniforms include 2000 American League Most Valuable Player Jason Giambi (Long Beach State), 2001 National League All-Star Phil Nevin (Cal State Fullerton) and 2004 American League Rookie of the Year Bobby Crosby (LBSU). Other notable major leaguers who honed their skills in the Big West are Lyle Overbay (Nevada), Mark Kotsay (CSF), Steve Trachsel (LBSU), Brady Anderson (UC), Michael Young (UCSB), Barry Zito (UCSB) and Reed Johnson (CSF).

The list goes on and on, and the supply does not appear to be in danger of shortage. The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the Major League Baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In last year's MLB amateur draft alone, an incredible 44 Big West players were selected, including two first round selec-

tions in Cal State Fullerton's Ricky Romero and Long Beach State's Troy Tulowitzki . The Toronto Blue Jays chose Romero sixth overall and Tulowitzki was the very next player off the board, going seventh overall to the Colorado Rockies. The Titans set a new school record with 14 draftees to lead the Big West. LBSU had nine selections overall, including six in the first 10 rounds. UC Irvine had six draftees, followed by Cal Poly with five and UC Santa Barbara with four.

# HEADING TO OMAHA

The Big West has enjoyed a tradition of representation at college baseball's premier event, the NCAA College World Series, a showcase of the nation's best teams battling for the national championship in Omaha, Neb. The Big West has featured a contender for the coveted crown on an almost annual basis. In fact, a Big West school has reached Omaha in 13 of the past 17 seasons. Cal State Fullerton brought home the Big West's first national title in 1995 and then brought home a second last year as the 2004 national champ. Here is a breakdown of Big West participants in the College World Series over the years (baseball was not sponsored in the Big West from 1977-84).

# IMPORTANT DATES IN BIG WEST HISTORY

JULY 1, 1969 - The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

**JUNE 3, 1976** - The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

**JUNE 8, 1979** - SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

MAY 17, 1984 - The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the NCBA.

**JUNE 10, 1984** - SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas 3-1.

**JULY 1, 1988** - The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

**MAY 14, 1995** - Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State 8-4 to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

JUNE 10, 1995 - Cal State Fullerton claims its third College World Series title with an 11-5 win over USC. The Titans become the first No. 1 seed in College World Series history to win the title. In addition, CSF becomes the 14th team in CWS history to advance through the regionals and series undefeated.

JANUARY 8, 1996 - Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge are invited to join the Big West as associate members in softball starting in 1997. Sacramento State's baseball team is invited to join the league as an associate member also in 1997.

**FEBRUARY 9, 2000** - Cal State Northridge and UC Riverside are formally invited to join the Big West beginning with the 2001-2002 season.

**MAY 26, 2003** - For the first time ever, two Big West schools are given regional host-bids by the NCAA. Long Beach State hosts its first regional, while Cal State Fullerton hosts its third. Each advance to the Super Regional.

**JUNE 8, 2003** - With a 7-1 victory over Arizona State, Cal State Fullerton advances to its 12th College World Series and ninth as a Big West member. The Titans come one win shy of reaching the best-of-3 championship series.

**JUNE 27, 2004** - A two-game sweep of Texas in the College World Series clinches Cal State Fullerton's fourth national championship, its second as a member of the Big West. After a 15-16 start to the season, the Titans win 32 of their next 38 games.

**MAY 29, 2005** - Cal State Fullerton and Long Beach State both hosted the NCAA Regionals - making it the second time two Big West schools have hosted the event. The Titans went on to host their fourth Super Regional.



On April 18, 1992, Goodwin Field (then Titan Field) became the new home of Cal State Fullerton baseball. That day the Titans marked the occasion by sweeping a doubleheader against Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3, setting the tone for the next 13-plus seasons.

Goodwin Field is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton. The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House,

located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of the citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979, when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawaii and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

In the past, the Titans have also had to play "home" games at local parks, such as Fullerton's Amerige Park and Anaheim's Boysen Park, as well as borrowed junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana, and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights at Titan Field in 1983.

Since its inauguration, Goodwin Field has been an undeniable home field advantage for the Titans, as they have amassed a stunning 312-97 overall record and a .763 winning percentage. In fact, the Titans rallied their best home season of all time in 2003 at Goodwin Field when they won their first 22 games at home before finishing with a 31-3 (.912) mark.

Thanks in part to the extensive renovations and a commitment by the university to transform the field into a state-of-the-art facility, the NCAA named Goodwin Field as a site for the Regionals for the first time in 2000, and again in five of the past six seasons. Likewise, the field has also played host to the Super Regionals in four of the last five

seasons. For the first 21 Regionals appearances in Titan history, the team was on the road, qualifying for more College World Series appearances (10) by winning on the road than any other school in NCAA history. But when Fullerton hosted Mississippi State in its first home Super Regionals in June of 2001, Goodwin Field hosted consecutive (then) sellout crowds of 3,412, as dedicated Titan fans cheered their team on. That year the Titans swept the Bulldogs to clinch a College

World Series berth and, for the first time, it was in front of a home crowd.

The home field has definitely been an advantage in the postseason as the Titans have gone 23-8 (.742) overall and, prior to last season's (2005) loss to Arizona State in the Super Regionals, had won seven consecutive postseason tournaments.

In 2005, Goodwin Field's attendance records toppled the previous record attendance (3,581 set on June 7, 2003) on five separate occasions, setting a new record high of 3,654. During the last few weeks of the 2005 Titan Baseball season, fans flocked to Goodwin Field, selling out (3,654) four times total, three of which were consecutive games, from June 6 to June 11. In fact, Cal State Fullerton saw a record number of fans show up

for a series at Goodwin Field last year. In three games with cross-town rival Long Beach State, Goodwin Field held 10,355, shattering the old record of 8,728 set back in 2003 between the same two teams.

Over the years, the Titans' home field has seen many changes in name, appearance and location. In an effort to provide the best facilities for its players, Cal State Fullerton has recently renovated Goodwin Field by adding a covered batting cage and bullpen area adjacent to right field, located in the area between the coaches' offices and the Arboretum. The structure will enable hitting and pitching at night or during inclement weather. Construction began in November of 2005 and should be completed once the season begins in 2006.

Prior to the hitting facility's construction, the last facelift to the park came in August of 2004, when the playing surface of Goodwin Field was completely renovated. The grass was removed and about 12 inches of topsoil was reworked to provide a smoother, more durable baseball playing field. Irrigation and drainage were also updated at that time

A larger-scale, \$3 million project was completed just before opening day in 2001, when the stadium's seating capacity was expanded from 1,750 to nearly 3,500. Also, for the first time, the stadium included an on-site clubhouse-style building connecting to the adjoining softball stadium. The clubhouse includes locker rooms, coach's offices, umpire quarters and an enclosed VIP viewing and entertainment area.

On April 14, 2000, the stadium's name was officially changed from Titan Field to Goodwin Field, in honor of benefactors Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin. The occasion was marked by a ceremony prior to the Titans' game against Long Beach State.

The Titans' home field has had several other renovations over the years. Its playing surface sported a brand new look for the 1996 season, thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor toward the rebuilding of the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with the planting of new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track and additional landscaping was planted on the outside of the field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.

The beauty and durability of Goodwin Field have also attracted many outside organizations. Numerous high school baseball tournaments, camps, television commercials and, most recently, the Golden Baseball League's Fullerton Flyers have utilized Goodwin Field. The Flyers, an independent minor league baseball organization, began play at Goodwin Field in the summer of 2005.





Going on a decade now, Cal State Fullerton Head Coach George Horton has continued to define Titan Baseball. Just as his predecessors Augie Garrido and Larry Cochell, Horton's brilliant mind for the game and focus on the development of young student-athletes continues to establish Cal State Fullerton as one of the most elite collegiate baseball programs in the country, one that consistently produces a crop of professional talent year in and year out.

Horton, 52, enters his tenth season looking to guide the Titans back to not only the top of the Big West Conference for a third consecutive time, but back to Omaha, for a chance at the school's fifth National Championship. In 2005 Horton's team, just one run shy, narrowly missed a trip to the College World Series for a fifth time in his nine-year tenure, as Arizona State defeated the Titans 9-8 in the final game of the Fullerton Super Regional.

Though his team's ultimate goal was blocked by the ASU Sun Devils, Horton did lead the talented group of young men to the school's 21st Big West Conference Championship (sixth under his watch), going 46-28 overall and 16-5 in league, while earning his fourth Conference Coach of the Year Award (1998, 1999, 2004 and 2005). He also managed the team to a pair of championships both at the KIA Bash (the team's third in six years) and at the Fullerton Regional, his fifth at the helm of the Titans.

In 2005, Horton also molded the largest Major League draft class in Cal State Fullerton history, as 14 players were selected in the first-year amateur draft. The 2005 team beat the 1984 squad by one selection and included the team's tenth No. 1 draft pick in Ricky Romero.

But it was in 2004 that the two-time National Coach of the Year (2003 Baseball America and 2004 Collegiate Baseball and ACBA) was able to add the most impressive credential to his resume since becoming the Titan Head Coach...a national title. In his eighth year of leadership of the Fullerton baseball program, Head Coach George Horton took the Titans to their fourth NCAA National Championship, by defeating the Texas Longhorns and his mentor, former Titan Head Coach Augie Garrido, 3-2, at Rosenblatt Stadium.

Horton himself couldn't even imagine the comeback the Titans would produce that season as the team started out a mediocre 15-16 through the first 31 games, falling out of the Top 25 polls completely for 6 straight weeks (3/8-4/12). In his attempt to right the ship, Horton enlisted Sports Psychologist Dr. Ken Ravizza to clear the heads of the slumping Titans. And clear they were as, in storybook fashion, the Titans went on to finish an all-time best 19-2 in the Big West and win 27 of their next 32 games to reach the Series for the 13th time in their history.

Since taking over for Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after six years as Garrido's associate head coach, Horton has led the Titans to a 402-172-1 overall record, keeping them constantly in the national Top 25 polls. His teams have briefly ascended to the top spot in part(s) of 1999, 2001, 2003, 2004, and for a few weeks in 2005. Horton's .700 winning percentage is sixth-best among active Division I coaches (minimum five years). Of the 29 teams - many of which are nationally prominent - that Horton has faced five or more times, only three (Stanford, USC and Wichita State) have managed winning records against Fullerton.

The four-time Big West Conference Coach of the Year has been at his best in series play. Heading into 2006, Fullerton owns a 103-25 (.805) overall record in three-game regular-season series and the Titans have won 63 of 75 (.840) Big West Conference series. Fullerton has been swept just five times while the Titans have recorded 51 series sweeps. Perhaps an even bigger credit to Coach Horton has been his success on the road: the Titans have won 32 of Horton's 37 conference series away from Goodwin Field (.865).

Horton, who is one of nine men to have appeared in Omaha as a player (1975) and a head coach, has seen 66 Titans selected in the Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft during his tenure, including nine in 2001, 11 in 2003, six in 2004, and last year's record 14. Southpaw Ricky Romero joins Chad Cordero and Adam Johnson as Horton's third first-ound draft pick, when he was selected first by the Toronto Blue Jays in 2005. Other standouts include: Aaron Rowand, who was a "sandwich" pick going between the first and second rounds in 1998. Shane Costa, a second-rounder in 2003 and battery mates Kurt Suzuki and Jason Windsor, who were taken in the second and third rounds, respectively, on the first day of the 2004 draft. Already, ten former Titans who played under the Horton regime have ascended to the Major Leagues, including 2005 Major League saves leader and All-Star Chad Cordero, and most recently, former outfielder Shane Costa, who debuted in 2005 with the Kansas City Royals. Cordero's jump to the show came just two months after leading the Titans at the College World Series in 2003.

Horton scripted a brilliant season in 2003, guiding the Titans to one of their best starts in program history (15-1) and leading them to a program-best record of 31-3 at Goodwin Field. After sweeping through the Regional at Goodwin Field, the Titans beat Arizona State - the top offensive team in the country - in a Super Regional to advance to Omaha for the 12th time in their history. Fullerton quickly shot out to



During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, nine pitchers received All-America honors and James Popoff (1992), Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He later earned a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees. Another Horton product, Brent Billingsley, made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season. Eleven more of Horton's former pupils - both pitchers and position players - have ascended to the Major League ranks over the last few years.

Horton also worked with Phil Nevin (San Diego Padres), who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, Baseball America player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP. Nevin has gone on to a successful pro career as have former Horton pupils Mark Kotsay (Oakland A's), Mike Lamb (Houston Astros), Aaron Rowand (Chicago White Sox) Brandon Duckworth (Houston), Matt Wise (Milwaukee) and Reed Johnson (Toronto Blue Jays).

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd and Jason Moler - all tutored in part by Horton - were Olympians and Kotsay was chosen the college player of the decade by Baseball America.

Horton began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Luis Medina, Jeff Hearron, Naulty and Olympian and major leaguer Bret Barberie.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. As the Falcons' team captain in 1973, he won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with former Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson, Roger Clemens and Barry Bonds.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. He was also inducted into the Downey High School Hall of Fame in May of 2003. Horton was honored last year with the Orange County Manager of the Year award given by the Orange Coast Chapter of the Society for Advancement of Management.


Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (26), Heather (22), Loyal (18) and Rebecca (15), and two granddaughters: Angelica (6) and Alyssa (4).

Rick Vanderhook is in his 20th season as an assistant coach for the Titans. His duties include coaching the outfielders and hitters as well as running the offense from his standard post in the third base coaching box. He also remains a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached five first-round draft picks (Mike Harkey in 1987, Phil Nevin in 1992, Dante Powell in 1994, Mark Kotsay in 1996 and Ricky Romero in 2005) and a supplemental pick (Aaron Rowand in 1998), as well as 18 All-Americans since 1991. He also played a key role in the development of 2003-05 Big West Conference Players of the Year Shane Costa, Kurt Suzuki and Sergio Pedroza, each of whom were drafted in the top three rounds by the Royals (2nd), A's (2nd) and Dodgers (3rd), respectively.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of the Titan Baseball Academy, which helps young players (7 to 17-years-old) reach their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camps are former Titans Steve Chatham, Rowand, Darric Merrell, Kyle Boyer, Jason Corapci and current pitcher Dustin Miller.

Vanderhook, 42, first coached at Cal State Fullerton from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and began working with the hitters and defense a year later. In 20 seasons with the Titans as a player and a coach, Vanderhook has been to the College World Series nine times and won it three times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, the Matadors posted a 39-22 record and were the NCAA Division II runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton, along with Head Coach Augie Garrido, prior to the 1991 season.


Vanderhook has coached some of the most explosive Titan offenses in the program's history. The 1999 Titans, who made the school's 10th College World Series appearance, set school records for single-season batting average (.338) and runs per game (9.2). He also helped fine tune the 2003 squad, which was 10th in the nation in hitting (.329), 20th in scoring (7.9 runs per game) and among the top 30 in doubles and triples per game.

Vanderhook has also coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and helped the Goldpanners finish third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program where he played for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans before becoming a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles, and received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Trinity University in 2003.

He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, daughters Noelle (10) and Autumn (8) and son R.J., who will turn 6 in April.

Jason Gill, a former All-Big West Conference infielder for the Titans, is in his second season with the Titan coaching staff and will again handle the first base coaching duties and work with the hitters and infielders. Gill, 32, replaced former Titan assistant coach Dave Serrano prior to the 2005 season.

Gill, who began his coaching career at Cal State Fullerton as a manager on the 1995 National Championship squad, spent the last three seasons as an assistant coach with the Big West Conference rival UC Irvine Anteaters, working with the infielders and being heavily involved with the program's recruiting efforts. UC Irvine's first recruiting class was ranked eighth by Baseball America and the following two classes were among the top 30 according to Collegiate Baseball.

Prior to UCI, Gill was an assistant coach at Loyola Marymount of the West Coast Conference. He helped guide the Lions to WCC titles in 1999 and 2000, earning postseason berths both years. He also served two years as an assistant coach at Nevada (1997-98).

Gill played one season for the Titans in 1994 after spending the first two years of his collegiate career at Cuesta College and his junior season at Cal State Dominguez Hills. He hit .345 with 13 RBI while starting 43 games as a senior third baseman, helping the Titans to a 47-16 overall record and a berth in the College World Series.



Former Cal State Fullerton All-America right-hander Ted Silva, 31, is in his second season of coaching with the Titans as the volunteer assistant coach helping skipper George Horton with the pitchers.

Silva has been an instructor for numerous clinics and summer league teams over the years and spent the 2004 season as an assistant coach in charge of pitching at Villa Park High School.

Silva, a 21st round draft selection in 1995, spent five years in the Texas Rangers organization following his brilliant collegiate career. He spent one season pitching overseas in Taiwan and parts of another pitching in the independent Atlantic League.

Silva played three seasons for the Titans from 1993-95, helping Fullerton to its third National Championship during his junior year. Silva led the nation in victories in 1995, posting an 18-1 overall record with a 2.83 ERA and 142 strikeouts in 152 2/3 innings. The 18 wins are also a school single-season record.

In the College World Series, he pitched the Titans to a pair of wins – over Stanford in the tournament opener and USC in the championship game – and earned a spot on the All-Tournament Team – one of four Titans to earn the honor.

He was named a first-team All-American by the American Baseball Coaches Association, *Collegiate Baseball*, Baseball America, and the Greater Houston Sports Association.




In 1994, Silva represented the Titans on Team USA and was a second-team All-American according to Collegiate Baseball. He finished the year with a 4-4 record for the Titans with a 2.29 ERA and 13 saves – a total which ranks third on the school's single-season charts.

Silva was the 1995 Big West Pitcher of the Year and was a first-team all-conference selection during his sophomore and junior seasons. He finished his Titan career with a 26-7 overall record with a 2.92 ERA and 26 saves, which ranks third in Titan baseball history.

Rogers has also been involved in the restaurant business and previously owned Homer's, the popular Titan "hang-out" located just a mile from



# PRE-SEASON NOTES

SCHEDULE: The Titans again will have a schedule ranking among the toughest in the nation as their 56-game calendar is filled out with the likes of Rice, Arizona, Long Beach State, Pepperdine, USC and Stanford...all teams that are ranked in two of the three top pre-season polls in the country. Fullerton will play a fairly balanced home-to-road schedule with 29 games to be played at Goodwin Field. The Big West Conference match-ups will figure for 21 games, with Fullerton looking to win its third-straight conference title. The Fullerton squad will take on schedule regulars, Stanford, UCLA, Pepperdine, San Diego State, Loyola Marymount and USC in their nonconference schedule along with newcomers Rice and East Carolina. Missing from this year's schedule will be the Kia Baseball Bash which had brought some of the nation's top teams to Goodwin Field over the past six seasons. The sponsorship deal expired, leaving the Titans with an open weekend for some fresh blood. In its place, the Titans will play a split-series with UCLA, one game at Jackie Robinson Stadium and two in Fullerton. Also the Titans have added a nonconference series with UC Irvine, something they have done with Long Beach State for a few years now. In a couple of anticipated road trips, the Titans will take on baseball powerhouses Arizona and Rice. The Titans saw plenty of the Wildcats in 2005, facing them six times, going 2-1 in both a nonconference series and a Regional at Goodwin Field

WATCH LIST WATCH 2006: Cal State Fullerton baseball standouts Brett Pill, Blake Davis and Wes Roemer have all been named to the 2006 Wallace Watch List as announced by the College Baseball Foundation. The trio of Titans join a group of 120 athletes, all in the running for the Brooks Wallace Award (formerly the Smith Award), an award presented to the country's top collegiate baseball player. Former Titan Kurt Suzuki was the inaugural recipient in 2004. Additionally, Vinnie Pestano was named to the Roger Clemens Award Watch List, joining 40 other pitchers looking to garner the nation's top pitcher award.

PRE-SEASON ALL-AMERICANS: Both Cal State Fullerton shortstop Blake Davis and closer Vinnie Pestano were named third-team preseason All-Americans in December. Davis was named to the National Collegiate Baseball Writer's Association of America's (NCBWA) list while Louisville Slugger/Collegiate Baseball tabbed Pestano to theirs.

TOURNEY TALK: The Titans have made 27 NCAA Regional appearances in their 31-year Division I history and have not missed the playoffs since 1991. The 14-year run is the fifth-longest active streak in the nation. Only Miami (33), Florida State (28), Clemson (19), and LSU (17) have longer streaks. Fullerton has advanced to Omaha 13 times, with College World Series titles in 1979, 1984, 1995 and 2004.




A year removed from the lingering pomp and circumstance of a 2004 national title and seven months from being left on the turf of Goodwin Field to watch the Sun Devils of Arizona State celebrate, the Cal State Fullerton Titan baseball team is locked and loaded, ready for a return to Rosenblatt Stadium in 2006.

"Last year was disappointing, we wanted to get back to the College World Series and play in that final game, but we came up one run short. So yes, there is definitely a fire burning there," said tenth-year skipper George Horton. His Titans saw a five-run lead fade away on that Super Regional Sunday afternoon, a 9-8 loss that kept the Titans out of Omaha for the first time in three years.

But they are back to try again. At least a good majority of them are back. In what could have been a major rebuilding year, five of the eight starting position players will return to their regular stomping grounds in 2006. Like apples from a tree, 14 Titans were plucked off the 2005 roster by Major League Baseball in the draft, potentially leaving no returning starters on the field. To add insult to injury, senior utility infielder Mark Carroll signed a free-agent contract, taking the Titan loss to a possible 15 players. But when Horton got word that not only would he get his three redshirt sophomores back, but also a pair of juniors, his outlook for 2006 brightened considerably.

"We understand the system. We embrace our relationship with Major League Baseball. We know that kids come to Cal State Fullerton to get an education and play baseball, but we also know that when the time comes, we have to let them go," Horton explained. "They come to develop their skills and get stronger, and when it is time, we shake their hand and say good luck."

"We are very fortunate to have (John) Curtis, (Brett) Pill, and (Blake) Davis come back to us for their junior seasons," said Horton, "And we were pleasantly surprised by the return of 'Red' (Justin Turner) and Danny (Dorn), both of whom turned down significant amounts of money to come back and play. We are very blessed."



The Titans did part ways with 10 of their players, though, most significantly Big West Conference Co-Player of the Year and All-American Sergio Pedroza, Big West Pitcher of the Year and All-American Ricky Romero, and All-Big West Conference third baseman Ronnie Prettyman. Pedroza provided the sock in 2005, something the '06 Titans will need to replace. Pedroza's 16 home runs gave opposing pitchers an obstacle in the No. 3 spot in the lineup, while Romero, a No. 1 draft pick by the Blue Jays, was just as valuable for the Titans, going 27-9 over his last two seasons. Prettyman, the tough-asnails third baseman that Horton compared to former Titan Tony Martinez as "the best third baseman he has ever seen in college baseball," will surely be missed on the hot corner. Prettyman provided defense and stability at the bottom of the lineup, hitting a team-leading .327 from the seven-hole.

Though a few changes between the lines may happen, Horton, the reigning Big West Coach of the Year, will return to battle with the same three assistant

"This will be our coaching staff's second year together. I expect there will be more cohesiveness between us, which will translate into us becoming a better team. If all goes well, you will see that in our players."

Assistants Jason Gill and Ted Silva will return to their posts for their second year, while long-time third base coach Rick Vanderhook begins his 20th season, second as the head of the offense. Gill will continue to work with infielders and hitters, and hold down the first base coaching duties while Silva will handle the pitching staff. Horton will likely be right there with Silva, with his finger on the

pulse of the staff as well, trying to find arms to fill a void left by the departure of three of the Titan's four starting pitchers.

"Our biggest loss is really the fact that we lost our entire starting rotation from last season," Horton commented. "We will need to replace our weekend starters"... but we've got some guys. (Wes) Roemer will be back in the mix somewhere, as well as Jared Clark and Lauren Gagnier.

Horton, the two-time National Coach of the Year, has a very optimistic, yet realistic expectation for the 2006 Titans, stating, "you may see a better version of the Titans as the season goes along, but we have a positive nucleus coming back from last season, and they have a willingness to work hard. They are a very talented group of young men and they have accepted every challenge we've given them thus far."

# TITAN INFIELD

With the exception of the departed Prettyman, Fullerton sends back out to the dirt Brett Pill, Justin Turner and Blake Davis for another go-round in 2006.

Davis was a first-team All-Big West shortstop and jumped his batting average from the previous year 30 points to .325, while playing magnificently in the six-hole. The speedy left-handed hitter hit a whopping eight triples and stole a team-leading 17 bags from the lead-off position, where you can expect him to be again in 2006. This summer Da-

vis became the Titans' 15th US National team member as he started 16 of 20 games for Team USA at short.

Turner is the prototypical No. 2 hitter with the ability to bunt, hitand-run, hit for average (.324), and run the bases. More than his hitting abilities, his defense has proven invaluable to the middle of the Titan infield. He brings an intangible knowledge of the game that has been the centerpiece of the Titan infield for the past three seasons. Turner's .992 fielding percentage in 2005 was the highest fielding percentage ever by any Cal State Fullerton infielder. He committed just two errors in 263 chances.

Pill might be one of the players the Titans look to fill the role as power hitter, once held by Pedroza in 2005 and Kurt Suzuki in 2004. Pill showed signs of greatness last year, hitting for both power (9 HR) and average (.327), while holding down first base with the best of them. He quietly saved the infielders and the Titan pitching staff with a big frame standing on first. Pill led the team in average, at bats, and runs while trailing Pedroza's team-leading 58 RBI by just one.

Third base has remained the question mark throughout the Fall and into the January workouts. There is a dead-heat between returner Evan McArthur, who was Prettyman's late inning replacement, and newcomer Bryan Harris. Both have played exceptionally well thus far and have very similar skills to offer. Whoever ends up in the starting line up at third, watch for the other as an option at designated hitter.

Look out for redshirt freshman Joe Scott to be the first up as a defensive replacement off the bench. Horton has commented that he offers an advanced level of defensive skill and can likely fill a lot of roles.

# **TITAN OUTFIELD**

The Titans lost Pedroza and Bobby Andrews to the draft, but don't let that deceive you. There is plenty of depth remaining in the Fullerton outfield.

The smooth-swinging lefty Dorn will be back for his senior season to patrol left field like he has the past three seasons. His average was down in 2005, but his power numbers were up, as he hit 10 bombs while driving in 49 RBI. He has been a model of consistency for the Titans, with Coach Horton comparing him to major leaguer Garret Anderson. Dorn, with 162 career RBI, is the leader among all returning collegiate players in the country. Look for Dorn's power numbers to improve as he fills out the middle of the Titan lineup.

In center field, the coaching staff couldn't be happier to have 2004 Freshman All-American Clark Hardman make his return after missing most of 2005 with a shoulder injury that required surgery on his throwing arm. Hardman, who hit .341 in 2004 and .500 in 12 at bats in 2005, will complete the Titans' defensive strong-hold up the middle. Though his arm may not be at its strongest early on, look

for Hardman to be a welcome addition back to the Titan lineup.

Utility outfielder Brandon Tripp and senior Joe Turgeon will be fighting for the Titans' right field job. Tripp who may have an edge having played in 54 games last season, hitting .343 and pounding four home runs in 99 at bats last season. But don't count out the speedy Turgeon, the eldest Titan senior, who has amassed a career .306 average over three seasons in the pinstripes. He has the needed tools to compete for the right field position and might just get some playing time.

J.D. McCauley will likely fill the role of the Titans' fifth outfielder. Also, look for McCauley to step into the DH role on occasion.

# THE CATCHING

The Titans have again optioned to carry a load of catchers, but may only look one to two deep. Penciled in at the outset will be starting catcher John Curtis, who hit only .234 in his first full season as catcher, but was a durable and reliable leader for the pitching staff in 2005. Saddled with the expectations former Titan Suzuki left him, Curtis handled the pitching staff with confidence and threw out 27 percent of the runners trying to steal against him.

Waiting in the wings are South Carolina transfer Cory Vanderhook, freshman Dustin Garneu, returner Jon Wilhite, and freshman new-comer Billy Marcoe.

# TITAN HURLERS

Recovering from the loss of three pitchers that won a combined 28 games may not be the easiest thing to do. However, the Titans have enough reliable arms to get them to where they need to go. 2005 Big West Freshman Pitch of the Year Roemer will likely headline the Titan staff as he is the only starter returning from last season's squad. The 2005 Fullerton Regional Most Valuable Player, went 7-3, averaging 7.2 innings per start. Sophomore Clark will likely get his chance to shine after 5 midweek starts last season. The hardthrowing righty went 1-1 in his first collegiate season, striking out 17 hitters in 25 innings. Junior righty Lauren Gagnier may make the transition from the bullpen to the starting rotation, bringing a good location and a change of speed to the staff. Last season, Gagnier was 3-0 with a 3.40 ERA in 21 appearances out of the pen. Transfer Ryan Paul (L.A. Pierce College) and returner Adam Jorgenson may make a run at the starting rotation as well. Again the Titans will rely on bull pen ace Vinnie Pestano as their closer. Pestano tallied 13 saves in 34 appearances, striking out 49 in 50.1 innings. The middle relief looks much like it did at the end of last season with lefties John Estes, and Dave Pherrin, and right handers Jorgenson, Brian Stevens, and Jeff Soulage ready to contribute. Look for newcomers Justin Klipp and Harris to possibly break into the staff. Harris, a third baseman, has shown that his arm may benefit them on the hill as well. The Titans are also cautiously anticipating the return of 2003 Freshman All-American Dustin Miller, who is continually building arm strength and endurance throughout January.

THE COMMISH GETS 400: "The Commissioner," head coach George Horton picked up his 400th career victory, June 5, 2005, with the 7-2 victory over Arizona in the Fullerton Regional. Horton's Titans have averaged over 44 wins and just 19 losses a year in his time as skipper.

BEST OF THE BIG WEST: Head coach George Horton has earned his fourth Big West Coach of the Year honor (1998, 1999, 2004 and 2005) as he has guided the Titans to their sixth Big West Conference championship (21st overall) under his watch ... Left-handed ace Ricky Romero was named Big West Pitcher of the Year, marking the first time in three seasons that a lone player has been bestowed the honor ... Sergio Pedroza was named Co-Big West Player of the Year after leading the Titan offense from the three-hole in the line-up, sharing this year's honor with Cal Poly's Kyle Blumenthal ... Wes Roemer earned the conference Freshman Pitcher of the Year honors as he made his presence felt when pressed into action by an injury to teammate Ryan Schreppel in March. The Titans took four of the five highest honors leaving only the Freshman of the Year award untouched.

STARS AND STRIPES: Shortstop Blake Davis became the 15th Titan to play for the U.S. National Team in the Summer of 2005. Davis played in all 20 games for the U.S., hitting .275 (14-for-51) in 16 starts at short. The National team completed a sweep of visiting Nicaragua to finish the tour with a 16-4 record, and an 11-game winning streak.











PITCHING IN: Freshman All-American (Collegiate Baseball) Wes Roemer pitched two of the finest games of his young career going a combined 2-0 in 15 innings of work at the Fullerton Regional in June. The righty struck out 10 without allowing a free pass en route to picking up the tournament's Most Outstanding Player honor. In his second win of the tournament, Roemer tossed eight innings while fanning five against a good-hitting Arizona club, to lift the Titans to their third-straight Regional Championship.

RECORD SETTING DRAFT CLASS: The 2005 Titans had 14 players drafted in the 2005 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft in June breaking the old draft class record by one, set by the 1984 squad. The Clas of '05 was highlighted with the first-round selection of Ricky Romero by the Toronto Blue Jays, just six players into the draft. PROUD TO BE ALL-AMERICANS: Three Titans were bestowed the honor of All-American status in 2005, bringing the all-time number of Titan All-Americans to 64. Ricky Romero, followed up a 14-4 record in 2004 with a 13-5 performance in 2005 earning second-team recognition from Baseball America, Luisville Slugger/Collegiate Baseball and the NCBWA. Sergio Pedroza earned third-team regognition from the same three teams after leading the Titan offense all season long, blasting 16 home runs while driving in a team-leading 58 RBI. # THE HISTORY OF TITAN BASEBALL

### **HISTORY of TITAN BASEBALL**

### **IN THE BEGINNING 1964-74**

Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in 1964. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 30,000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and now houses athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a history professor, who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in 1965. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.

A new backstop and batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools. His first season's record was 19-33-1 and it would be the Titans' last losing season. The Titans won the CCAA championship with a 39-11-1 season in 1974 and the stage was set for Division I play.

### **NEW BULLY IN TOWN 1965-84**

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in 1975 as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone. catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They won the

PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the post-season they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.

In 1976 they took Washington State to a final game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Arizona, Arkansas, Pepperdine and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by Fresno State. But the Bulldogs had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the 1984 regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After beating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the headlines in Sports Illustrated with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his

### **SOME BLIPS ON THE RADAR 1985-87**

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for 1985 and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the Major Leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The 1986 team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The 1987 team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning

### **COCHELL DOES EVEN BETTER 1988-90**

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots - Mississippi State and Texas - to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The 1988 team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-6 start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bulldogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by

Mike Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck. But the Cardinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Division I record ever. They finished in the second division of the standings at 10-11.

The 1990 team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of

then NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan | Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

### IF YOU BUILD IT. **HE WILL COME ... BACK 1991-96**

Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with construction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. Baseball America would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The 1991 team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an atlarge NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's late return the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An at-large berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the 1992 opposition.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened their longawaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge – they outscored the opposition 35-3 – earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS television audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitching of Patrick Ahearne, a home run by light-hitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college Player of the Year. His also was the first name selected in the pro draft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.

The 1993 team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19. It would turn out to be the only year Fullerton High School product D. C. Olsen would miss a trip to Omaha in four years in a Titan uniform

In 1994, Fullerton staged an early season Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic and it would be a preview of that season's College World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to beat Memphis in op-

rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninth-inning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth

Georgia Tech, with a quartet of future major leaguers - Brad Rigby, Nomar Garciaparra, Jason Varitek and Jay Payton - beat the weary Titans and Mike Parisi in the CWS opener, 2-0. Fullerton then pounded LSU for 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory and freshman Mark Kotsay drove in seven runs in a 10-3 win that eliminated Florida State and set up a rematch with the Yellowiackets. This one went extra innings with Garciaparra's home run the difference when the Titans couldn't score Dante Powell from third base with no outs in the bottom of the 12th and had to settle for third place

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future major leaguer Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach - the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award after batting a then school-record .422 with 21 homers and 90 RBI. To this day, Kotsay holds College World Series career records for batting average and slugging percentage.

The momentum continued into 1996. The Titans opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. Fullerton tumbled to fourth place in the Big West and was eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in a rout of Delaware and a victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. Wichita State got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsay and Loyd's collegiate careers with a come-from-behind 13-10 decision. As part of its millenium edition, Baseball America selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

### **THE BEAT GOES ON 1997-2005**

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas. His former first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton, took over. Again, the program marched forward.

The 1997 team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and then bounced back from an opening game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-inning rally knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The 1998 squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever - .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game - carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in 1999. Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the Regional at Notre Dame and capturing the Super Regional at Ohio State. But the bats went quiet in Fullerton's 10th trip to Omaha, where they shared in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans sandwiched a win over Texas A&M between losses to Stanford and Florida State en route to a fifth-place finish.

pressive afternoon heat and humidity and then come back at night and beat a | The Titans' 38 wins in 2000 marked their fewest since the 1993 campaign, but they still captured a share of the BWC championship. The season also marked the start of a \$3 million renovation to the Titans' facility, which saw its official name changed to Goodwin Field. With the complex's increased seating capacity, Fullerton finally was named to host an NCAA Regional after 22 on the road, but the second-seeded Titans couldn't get by red-hot USC. Adam Johnson was named BWC Pitcher of the Year after leading the nation in strikeouts and he was selected second overall in the MLB Draft.

> After a sluggish start, the 2001 Titans traveled to Miami and became the first team ever to sweep the eventual national champion Hurricanes on their home turf at Mark Light Stadium. The sweep was the highlight in a stretch that saw the Titans go 24-1 and claim the No. 1 spot in the nation in one poll. Fullerton, seeded first in the nation for postseason play, won a Regional and Super Regional at Goodwin Field to clinch a CWS berth in front of a home crowd for the first time. After beating sentimental favorite Nebraska in the CWS opener, Fullerton ran into Stanford, which beat the Titans twice, though Fullerton was able to sandwich in a win over Tulane. Senior Kirk Saarloos. who pitched the third no-hitter in Titan history, led a quartet of All-American

> The 2002 Titans thrived on pitching as usual, but Fullerton's offense was anemic more often than not. No Titan hit more than five home runs and the team total of 40 was the fewest since 1976. Despite fading down the stretch to finish tied for fourth in the conference, Fullerton earned its 11th consecutive NCAA berth. The Titans lost to Stanford and All-American Jeremy Guthrie - who earned a 13-inning complete-game win - in the Regional opener, came back to beat San Jose State, but were ousted by Long Beach State, whom they met for the first time in NCAA postseason play. Wes Littleton was the only Titan to earn All-American honors, though Chad Cordero was again brilliant in the closer role, pacing the conference with 12 saves

Perhaps the deepest pitching staff in the country led the Titans to a stellar showing in 2003. Fullerton won 15 of its first 16 games and went on to win 50 games for the second time under Coach Horton. The Titans, who went 31-3 at Goodwin Field, hovered in the top five in the country for nearly the entire season and reached Omaha for the 12th time with a Super Regional win over Arizona State. The Titans shot out to a 2-0 record at the CWS before Stanford came out of the loser's bracket to beat the Titans twice and keep them out of the inaugural championship series. Fullerton had a record 12 players named all-conference and seven earned All-American honors. Shane Costa was named Big West Player of the Year

and was selected in the second round of the draft. Chad Cordero was again an All-American and was pitching for the Montreal Expos just two months after the College World Series.

Completing one of the greatest turnarounds in the history of the program, the 2004 Titans closed out the season with a bang to capture Cal State Fullerton's fourth NCAA baseball championship. Sitting at 15-16 on April 3, the Titans ran off 32 victories in their final 38 games, including a 2-0 Championship Series sweep of Texas and former skipper Augie Garrido. The Titans played catch-up in the Regionals, battling out of the losers' bracket to win the tournament, and then punched their ticket to Omaha for the 13th time after a two-game sweep of Tulane in the Super Regionals. After jumping out to a 2-0 start in Omaha, including a win over top-ranked Miami, the Titans were on the brink of elimination again after a loss to South Carolina. But a brilliant pitching performance by Scott Sarver sent the Gamecocks packing and Cal State Fullerton into the Championship Series against the Longhorns

where Ricky Romero and Jason Windsor tossed gems to give the Titans the title. Fullerton had 11 players named to the All-Big West squads, including Player and Co-Pitcher of the Year honors for Kurt Suzuki and Jason Windsor, respectively. Windsor was named the College World Series' Most Outstanding Player and earned All-College World Series nods along with teammates Romero and Felipe Garcia. Romero spent the summer traveling with Team USA while Coach Horton was named Collegiate Baseball's National Coach of the Year and Big West Coach of the Year. Suzuki (2nd Round) and Windsor (3rd Round) were both selections of the Oakland A's in the Major League Baseball Draft, joining teammates Mike Martinez (8th Round - Yankees), P.J. Pilittere (13th Round - Yankees), Ronnie Prettyman

(28th Round - Brewers), and Felipe Garcia (48th Round - Red Sox) In its most recent chapter, Fullerton was, for a fourth time, unable to return to

Omaha following a championship season as it came within a run of returning, dropping an 9-8 contest to Arizona State in the final game of the 2005 Fullerton Super Regional. The Sun Devils battled back from a 7-2 deficit, then held off a ninth-inning Titan rally to advance to the College World Series. Despite a disappointing finish, (a 7-6 record over the final 13 games) the Titans had a memorable season, statrting 16-4 and ascending to the No. 1 spot in the national polls. Fullerton strung together a pair of nine-game winning streaks

and never lost more than two consecutive games. Cal State Fullerton proved to be a big draw in 2005, not only at home, but on the road. On its trip to New Orleans to visit Tulane, Cal State Fullerton helped set a Green Wave series attendance record, drawing 17,181 at both Turchin Stadium and Zephyr Field. Fullerton again saw attendances reach new levels at Baggett Stadium, as Cal Poly and the Titans drew a record 8,585 in a series in San Luis Obispo. Cal State Fullerton's Goodwin Field also broke single-game attendance records (3,654, four times) and a series record (10,355 vs. Long Beach State). The 2005 Titan draft class also set a record for becoming the largest group of players ever selected by the Major Leagues. 14 Titans, including No. 1 draft pick Ricky Romero, beat out the 1984 draft class whose 13 players were the standard for 20 years. 10 Titans earned All-Big West Conference honors, with a Titan winning every major

conference award except Freshman of the Year. Along with winning his sixth conference title, head coach George Horton also garnered his fourth Big West Conference Coach of the Year award, while Sergio Pedroza (Co-Player of the Year), Ricky Romero (Pitcher of the Year) and Wes Roemer (Freshman Pitcher of the Year) took home the other top conference honors.

### **HISTORICAL TITAN TIDBITS**

- ◆ Cal State Fullerton has won national championships in 1979, 1984, 1995 and again in 2004. The Titans started off a dismal 15-16 before rolling off 32 wins in their last 38 contests including a two-game sweep of Texas in the CWS Championship Series. The 2004 title was the first for Head Coach George Horton
- Cal State Fullerton has never returned to Omaha following a National Championship season.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the others) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given annually by USA Baseball to the top amateur player in the nation, with Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995) each earning it as a Titan.
- Cal State Fullerton is among the top five collegiate suppliers to Team USA. Blake Davis became the Titans' 15th representative on Team USA when he played shortstop for them in the summer of 2005. Ricky Romero represented Cal State Fullerton in 2004 while Wes Littleton, Shane Costa and Chad Cordero were all members of the National Team in 2002. Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd joined three other Titans who have been members of Olympic teams (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992)
- Forty Titans have gone on to play Major League Baseball with the latest edition to the fraternity being Shane Costa, who made his Major League debut for the Kansas City Royals in 2005.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska, and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 Regional titles and one Super Regional title on the road. The Titans' last three CWS berths (2001, 2003, 2004), however, have been clinched at Goodwin Field.
- ♦ In 31 years at the Division I level, the Titans have made it to the NCAA Tournament 27 times. Their current streak of 14 consecutive NCAA appearances is the fifth longest active streak in the nation. Only Miami (33), Florida St. (28), Clemson (19), and LSU (17) currently have more consecutive trips in the tournament.
- ♦ Ricky Romero made it an even 10 No. 1 draft picks for the Titans in 2005 as he was Toronto's top pick in the Major League Amateur Draft. Other Titans selected in the first round: Tim Wallach (Montreal, 1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal, 1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs, 1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City, 1988), Phil Nevin (Houston, 1992), Dante Powell (San Francisco, 1994), Mark Kotsav (Florida, 1996), Adam Johnson (Minnesota, 2000) and Chad Cordero (Montreal, 2003).
- ◆ Cal State Fullerton has had 64 All-Americans and 138 first-team allconference selections in its 31-year Division I history. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- ♦ The Titans have never had a losing season in the 31-year history of the program at the Division I level and have never gone winless in 27 NCAA postseason tournament appearances.





### NOTES ON TITANS IN THE BIGS

- Chad Cordero became the first Titan to ever get a Cy Young Award vote. He finished 5th in NL Cy Young voting in 2005, after leading the majors in saves with 47. He also became the first Titan to ever reach the 20-, 30- and 40-save plateau and led the big leagues in a major statistical category (saves).
- Mike Lamb became the first Titan and Houston Astro to ever hit a home run in a World Series game with a second-inning blast off of Chicago White Sox Starter Jose Contreras in Game One the 2005 Fall Classic
- 1996 Titan teammates Aaron Rowand and Mike Lamb faced off in the 2005 World Series, marking the first time two former Titans have met in the big series. Both were the second and third Titans to ever play in the series
- Dann Howitt got the last hit allowed by Nolan Ryan a grand slam
- · Andre David hit a home run in his first major league at bat.
- Greg Mathews started game four of the 1987 World Series (10/21/87) for the St. Louis Cardinals. He went 3.2 innings against the Twins before giving way to reliever Bob Forsch who eventually got the win. Mathews became the first Titan to ever play in a World Series game.
- Dan Boone is a distant relative of the fabled frontiersman.
- Tim Wallach made the National League All-Star team five times in his 17-year career. The third baseman was also the first former Titan to receive votes for an MLB MVP race. He finished fourth in the NL MVP race in 1987, 10th in 1990 and 18th in 1994. Also was the first former Fullerton player to win a major award (NL Comeback Player of the Year 1994)
- Chad Cordero was the last Expo to pitch in Montreal's Olympic Stadium before the team was moved to Washington D.C. He pitched the top of the ninth inning against the Florida Marlins on Sept. 29, 2004, striking out 2 of the four batters he faced. The Expos lost 9-1.
- Pitcher Mike Harkey is the first former Titan to receive MLB Rookie of the Year votes. He finished 5th in NL ROY voting in 1990.
- Three Titans have earned Major League World Series rings with Mark Kotsay grabbing the first in 1997 with the Marlins. Pitcher Dan Naulty earned another in 1999 with the Yankees. Aaron Rowand was the first Titan to earn his hardware by being on the World Series roster as the White Sox defeated the Astros in the 2005 series.
- Andy and Jose Mota are sons of former Major League outfielder and Los Angeles Dodgers Coach Manny Mota.
- Mike Harkey, Mike Schooler, Shane Turner, John Fishel, Kevin Reimer, Larry Casian and Jose Mota were all on the 1985 Titan team which failed to win the PCAA championship and snapped Fullerton's string of 10 consecutive trips to the NCAA playoffs.
- Brent Billingsley, Jeremy Giambi, Mark Kotsay, Mike Lamb, Aaron Rowand, Matt Wise and a then-redshirt Reed Johnson were all products of the 1996 Titan team that saw the Titans start the season 31-2 following the 57-9 finish in 1995, only to struggle down the stretch, going 14-14, just sneaking into the Wichita State Regional.
- Catcher Brent Mayne became the first Major League position player in 32 years to post a pitching win when he worked a scoreless 12th inning in Colorado's 7-6 win over Atlanta on Aug. 22, 2000.
- Frank Charles played for nine years in the minor leagues before finally making his Major League debut for Houston on Sept. 5, 2000.
- Phil Nevin was one of just five players in the National League in 2001 to hit .300 or better with at least 40 homers and 100 RBI. The others were Barry Bonds, Sammy Sosa, Todd Helton and Luis Gonzalez.
- Adam Johnson, the second pick in the 2000 draft, was also the second player from that draft class to appear in the Majors. He struck out Mark McGwire in his debut against St. Louis on July 16, 2001.
- Kirk Saarloos, the 2002 SportsTicker Minor League Pitcher of the Year, was named the National League Rookie of the Month in July, 2002, when he went 3-0 with a 1.77 ERA for Houston. He also became the first former Titan to pitch a no-hitter. In fact, he was one of a Major League record six Astros to pitch June 11, 2003, against the New York Yankees.







Over the course of the last three years, the Titans have outperformed the rest of the Big West College.

Quinn, 64, was the athletic director at Loyola Marymount University from 1985 through 1998. He then dedicated his time towards completing the Burns Recreation Center and Aquatica Center at LMU. He also directed the athletic fundraising efforts as executive director of athletic development.

During his years as director of athletics at LMU the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times and once to the NIT. The basketball team advanced to the Final Eight and led the nation in scoring. The baseball team advanced to the College World Series where it defeated the No. 1seed, LSU. Women's volleyball won numerous conference championships as well and the women's crew team won the national championship.

Quinn graduated from Loyola (1963) with a degree in business administration and received his masters degree from Long Beach State. He was a long-time coach and athletic administrator at the high school level in the Irvine Unified School District and taught volleyball classes for Irvine Valley College for six years.

He was the chair of the athletic directors for many years in the West Coast Conference ard was the chair of the NCAA men's volleyball committee, as well as serving on the board of directors for USA volleyball. He recently began a four-year term on the NCAA Division I baseball committee.

Quinn was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame both at his high school (Serra HS) and university (LMU). He was the captain of the basketball team and MVP and three-year starter on the baseball team. The basketball team was the WCC champion and defeated USC in the NCAA tournament. He also was a member of the Balboa Bay Club national champion volleyball team. He continues to be an avid beach volleyball player.

Quinn and his wife of 42 years, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, a teacher in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, NY; Suzanne, a teacher in Inglewood; and Maureen, who recently married. The Quinn's have six grandchildren, Brendan, Ryan, Owen Kiernan, Dylan, Colin Brian, and Mary Frances. Quinn is a member of the Ancient Order o Hibernians.

The "Titan House," formerly known as the Hettebrink House, was built in 1886 and is reportedly the oldest brick home and third oldest overall in the city of Fullerton. Currently serving as the home of the administrative offices for the Cal State Fullerton department of athletics, the house was built by Henry T. Hettebrink for his family and underwent major renovations and earthquake retrofitting in the late 1990s.

al State Fullerton is a major regional university in a vital, flourishing area that includes Orange County, metropolitan Los Angeles and the expanding Inland Empire. The beautiful, 236-acre campus is set in a quiet urban

community in north Orange County, about 25 miles from downtown Los Angeles and about 21 miles from nearby beaches.

The university offers an affordable, high quality education with an exceptional learning environment. Students flourish a close mentoring relationships with outstanding professors and have numerous opportunities for undergraduate esearch, professional internships, and prestigious competitions. Students experience the dynamic environment of a metropolitan university, but can enjoy a comfortable throughter that feels like a small college campus. With full accreditation for its overall program, many of all State Fullerton's academic programs have achieved ational prominence because of a distinguished faculty and ne achievements of alumni. Students can choose from 05 degree programs, including 50 at the graduate level, ffered by eight colleges: the Arts, Business and Economics, communications, Education, Engineering and Computer cience, Health and Human Development, Humanities and ocial Sciences, and Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

A vibrant university community, which includes more nan 33,000 students and nearly 2,000 full- and part-time aculty members, reflects the rich multicultural diversity of outhern California. In fact, Cal State Fullerton is ranked ixth in the nation in terms of bachelor's degrees awarded or minority students, and more than half of the students are eople of color.

According to Black Issues in Higher Education, Cal State Fullerton is sixth in the nation for the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students and is the highest ranked among the California State University campuses in this category (June 2005).

In addition to the overall standing, the university was recognized as fifth in the nation and first in California for awarding undergraduate degrees in all categories to Hispanics, and 11th for undergraduate degrees awarded to Asian-Americans. Arboretum and student residence halls. In January 2006, a new Performing Arts Center will open. The \$48 million complex will provide state-of-the-art facilities for audiences and performers alike, as well as instructional facilities for students. Opening of the \$87.5

million Steven G. Mihaylo Hall, new home to the College of Business and Economics, is anticipated in fall 2008. Construction is currently underway on a new parking structure, which is scheduled for completion before the fall 2006 semester.

The university's El Toro Campus offers upper-division and graduate-level courses and provides a convenient location for students who live and work in south Orange County. Other campus satellites include the Grand Centra Art Center in Santa Ana, CSUF Garden Grove Center and facilities at the Irvine Spectrum.

An extended education program, which includes open enrollment, expands the university's resources to the surrounding communities. These include academic credit courses, certificate programs for professional developme it, English classes for non-native speakers of English, a learning-in-retirement program, classes for children and teens, summer camps, international programs and distance education classes.

One of 23 campuses in the California State University System, Cal State Fullerton has shaped a vital role in the growth and prosperity of Southern California. In less than 50 years, the university has awarded degrees to more than 153,000 graduates. Many are leaders in business, government, education and the arts. In addition, the university has an enormous economic impact on the Los Angeles region. As noted in the CSU 2004 study "Working for California: The Impact of the California State University," Cal State Fullerton generates \$851 million in economic activity annually, which sustains more than 12,500 jobs in

the region and generates more than \$45 million per year in state tax revenue.

rom modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country. "Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 12 national team championships in cans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous

seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Amerinational coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller-Rycraw in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career

and is now a veteran NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Ced ic Ceballos and Bruce Bowen (a starting forward on the 2003 and 2005 NBA champion San Antonio Spurs) were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballo gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfie d, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Kcko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Rycraw still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks before returning () Fullerton as an assistant coach.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. For mer men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in Fullerton's first Div. I season in 1975. The Titans have gone on to win four national championships and establish a remarkable winning tradition over four decades. The Titans captured their first NCAA title in 1979 behind Tim

### What about the nickname?

hat exactly is a Titan?

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.



To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

# **ATHLETIC TRAINING**

SULER TO VIOLE

he athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes.

Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours.

Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



### **TITAN GYMNASIUM**

Titan Gym continues to undergo major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Recently completed was an expansion that features numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories, a new upstairs practice facility, as well as additional seating. A new "drop down" scoreboard over center court was installed in the spring of 2003. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

### **GOODWIN FIELD**

Goodwin Field has played host to five NCAA Regionals and four Super Regionals in the past six years. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse — which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches — and the Doubek VIP Room. In 2005, Goodwin Field also became home of the Fullerton Flyers of the independent Golden Baseball League.

### TITAN SOFTBALL COMPLEX

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition (it was the site of an eight-team NCAA Regional in 2003) in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-seaso tournament in the nation.

### TITAN STADIUM

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs. UCLA also utilized the facility in 2003 for its fall football camp. The playing surface was totally renovated in July of 2005.







ANDY WILLIAMS was named Cal State Fullerton's second full-time strength and conditioning coach on Oct. 11, 2004. Williams came to Fullerton after spending the previous 20 months as the director of human performance at Somerset Sports and Rehabilitation in New Jersey.

Armed with a wide range of experience, Williams spent two years as the head strength & conditioning coach at Tennessee State, working with football and women's basketball, and a year each at Middle Tennessee State (assistant strength and conditioning coach) and Connecticut (grad asst.).

In 1999, Williams was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe during their World Bowl Championship season and also served as the assistant special teams coach. He also served a two-year internship with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs from 1996-98 and was an intern with Major League Baseball's Kansas City Royals during spring training in 1997.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Missouri Western State College in 1997, where he also played three seasons at outside linebacker, and completed his coursework for a master's degree in education at Middle Tennessee State in 2002.

al State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusemen parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students car reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach ir

less than a half hour. Los Angeles, with its never-ending cultura and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Angel Stadium and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.


