Let's Talk About Security

Most people upon moving to Leisure Village consider its security system to be one of the prime reasons for choosing to live here. This system features a perimeter with guarded gates to control access to outsiders, officers in patrol cars frequently passing through the streets, officers available at the doorstep within minutes if an emergency or illness arises and officers familiar with each Village who recognize many villagers on sight. Having our own security system is great com-

Villagers feel free to walk alone any time of the day or night and to leave their homes when traveling, know-

ing that all will be safe upon their return.

The officers are devoted to their duties and to their Chief and have, upon occasions, risked their own safety to assist a villager or to defuse situations with trespass-

The Board recently hired three new department heads for the Association. Security, however, is the only department with longevity and experience in the Village.

The LVA Board of Directors has asked the Chief of Security to prepare a 5-year plan for improving security for the Village. Specific objectives for this plan have not been disclosed but it is hoped that the results of the effort will be to enhance the performance of a system that has already served us well.

Let All Homeowners Participate

A significant number of owners of properties here in Leisure Village do not reside in the Village. Candidates' statements regarding their objectives and reasons for running for office appear in Inside Leisure Village and are not likely to be seen by those who do not live here.

Non-resident homeowners also have the right to full information regarding all candidates' positions and is-

sues affecting the Village.

Since a well-informed electorate is essential to the democratic process, it would seem appropriate that for future elections the Association should make the names and addresses of non-resident homeowners available to ALL candidates for offices and to proponents and opponents to propositions that appear on our ballots.

At the June Board meeting I spoke about security in Leisure Village. I know that many residents were unable to attend the meeting or to watch it on Channel 12, and I think the subject and my concerns are important enough to repeat for the "Letters to the Editor" section of our pa-

My wife Dorothy and I have lived in Leisure Village since 1979, a period of 16 years. We've enjoyed those years among the many new friends we've made. Above all we thank our lucky stars every day for the unmatched peace and security we've had these many years.

Pick up the local paper any day of the week and you'll read of robberies, assaults, and crimes of all sorts going on within the city. We here in the Village lead charmed lives, free of the fears and concerns that trouble other areas and communities.

Our Chief of Security, Max Moses, deserves our everlasting thanks for the safe and peaceful life we enjoy and so often take for granted. In his many years of service to our community Max has dedicated himself to developing and maintaining the finest in-house security system of any similar condominium development. In addition to keeping us crime free, Max has led a security force that has been responsible for the saving of many lives with its quick response to life threatening emergencies.

Our security people who protect us are not strang-

ers. When we enter our gates we are greeted with familiar faces, and often a friendly wave of the arm. Our security people patrol our streets 24 hours a day. moving in and out of our Villages quietly, making sure all is in order. It's a good feeling to know that protection is only seconds

But in recent days I have been hearing things that I don't like. I'm disturbed because I've heard an undercurrent of talk about actions that threatens to change and possibly destroy the foundations that Chief Moses has laid down and administered so successfully these many years. I hear of attempts being made to change the structure of our security system. I deeply hope that the proven safety and security of our community will not be made the scapegoats of some ill-advised attempts toward change.

The dictionary defines security as "freedom from danger or risk. Safety; freedom from apprehension." I want to know that my wife can walk down our streets any day or evening of the week and never have to wonder who is walking behind her. That's the kind of secure life we have here in the Village. And I'm sure that's what we all want as a continuing thing. I'm not ready to gamble on change for the sake of change. Reduce our security and we reduce our property values as well.

To put it into proper context. We don't need change, we need continuity. You've heard the expression many times "If it ain't broke don't fix it." Well, our security system ain't broke and it don't need fixing





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Computer System In LVA Office

The Leisure Village Association staff continued to express their enthusiasm over the newly-installed computer system during a recent interview.

The system, assembled and installed by Computer Products Incorporated of Westlake Village, was built following specifications prepared by an ad-hoc committee consisting of villagers Gil Chuck and Dick Travis and staff members.

The equipment consists of a file server connected to 11 separate computers placed in various locations in the Administration Building. All departments except Security are connected to this system. A separate system for the Security Department is planned for the coming fu-

Each of the 11 computer stations is equipped with a monitor, computer, keyboard and a mouse. The previously installed printers have been retained and are located in the Accounting Room. The entire system is served by a dedicated power line equipped with surge protection to prevent damage to the equipment in event of an Edison malfunction.

The Leisure village **Board of Directors ordered** procurement of the new system to increase accounting and publishing productivity and improve accuracy. This change was also needed because of limitations of the old system; not only was it slow, it was unreliable.

The original Skyline program is still in use and is augmented by the latest versions of Lotus and Word Perfect. Some of the uses for the new system are payroll processing, preparation of financial statements, budgets, de-

preciation schedules and personnel records.

The system is also used for inventory control and all a depreciation account other accounting activities. The new programs also permit preparation of charts and graphs and bet-

ter quality printed materials, such as reports and procedures.

This new system cost \$46,000, which came from maintained for this purpose. Thus it did not represent an expenditure of current funds.

Profile: Herb Arnold, Electronic Wizard

Many times we villagers rub elbows with our nearby residents really not being aware of what had been contributed to our well being by these individuals.

One such contributor is Herb Arnold of V. 15. One would never know of his background unless one twisted his arm and saw a smile come to his face. Just mention Ham Radio and the light goes on. He'll tell you that he's from Brooklyn, N.Y, and a darn good place to be away from.

Herb enlisted in the Army Air Force in 1941. As Flight Intelligence Specialist, which constituted briefing and interrogating combat crews prior to and subsequent to combat missions, he was with the 57th Fighter Group, the only Americans assigned to the British Royal Air Force of the 8th Army under the command of Gen. Montgomery in Egypt. To the dismay of British High Command officers, the American soldiers were receiving higher pay than they themselves, and consequently the Americans weren't very popular. Herb remained with the British command until the end of the Italian Campaign, Before leaving the Italian campaigne. he received the Bronze Star Medal for his superb service.

In 1945 Herb was assigned to a B-29 Bomber group, again as the Intelligence Specialist. He was destined for the Pacific Theater but before he was scheduled to leave, the first atomic bomb was dropped. As there was no longer a need for his services, Herb got his discharge in September.

After his service with the Army, Herb completed his education by spending two vears at the University of Alabama and 2 years at

He did a lot more than make sure that the toilet seat was placed in the right spot. Quality assurance was his specialty, testing all electronic components of all space vehicles and familiarizing the astronauts with the operation of the electronic systems. In 1973 he was assigned to the Space Shuttle program until his retirement in 1976. As we all know, that program is still active.

On the lighter side, Dr. Wernher Von Braun came to Herb for advice. Herb convinced him that a Chevy Corvette had too much power for him and advised him to stick to a regular car. Neil Armstrong visited the Huntington Beach Douglas plant and was impressed with the Sky Lab which Herb was Top Man. Rather than shake hands with Armstrong, Herb preferred to shake the foot of the first

Herb Arnold's career, upon reflection, is very impressive: Army Air Force Intelligence Specialist, NASA, Nike Guided Missile System, Apollo-Saturn Lunar Landing Program. Skylab-U.S., First Space Station and the Space Shuttle.

Coming down to earth, Herb moved into Leisure Village in 1976. With his interest in Amateur radio revived, together with Bob Guhl, Bob Kumler, the late Myron Travis, Ellis King and perhaps a few others, Herb convinced the L.V. Board of the importance of having an Amateur Radio Club associated with an Emergency Service in L.V. The board eventually agreed. Today the Club boasts of 25 ham operators as well as the radio shack belonging to villagers, ready to serve in the event of an emergency. Even the City of Camarillo depends on the L.V. Amateur Radio Club should a situation arise.


LV PARKIN'SON's SUPPORT GROUP

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Taxes For Domestic Workers

By Paul Kelwin

I'm writing on a subject that I hope will save villagers a lot of trouble. Please do not let happen to you what has happened to so many. It was brought out by those cases 2 or 3 years ago, where two appointees to the U.S. Attorney General office had to bow out. I'm not speaking of hiring illegal entrants to the U.S. but of the avoidance of taxes on domestics. like care-takers. I know. I lived and worked it as a Social Security Administration Field Representative for over 30 years.

For instance, a person had to file for disability or survivor(s) benefits with the Social Security Administration. We'd request the earnings record from our central record keeping office. In too many cases there was practically no earnings on which to base and compute benefits. Questioning then brought out that the disabled or deceased had worked as a maid, household help or in similar employment for several different employers or maybe just one employer. We'd get the employers name and address. I then had to go and reconstruct the earnings record. The employer was devastated to learn he had to pay Internal Revenue taxes for several years back...Plus interest, Plus penalty!


The employer(s) had paid cash to the employee and NOT reported those payments to Soc. Sec. Adm. for those taxes, nor to Internal Revenue Service for income taxes that should have been withheld or reported by the employer.

Many workers, caretakers, will say they are selfemployed and in some cases may be. But it would be wise for anyone in Leisure Village to at least file a Form 1099 with Internal Revenue. Any doubt or questions call Internal Revenue at 1-800-829-1040; Social Security at 1-800-772-1213. Also, California State Employment **Development Department** here in Ventura County (805) 654-4505.

- 7 Create an exercise environment which is pleasant and quiet, with plenty of fresh air. Enjoy it!

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



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
