"You've cut off your hair?" asked Jim, laboriously, as if he had not arrived at that patent fact yet even after the hardest mental


"Cut it off and sold it," said Della. "Don't you like me just as well, anyhow? I'm me without my hair ain't I?"

Christmas Fire Safety Warning

Nothing can ruin the spirit of Christmas faster than a Christmas-time fire which may cause suffering, loss of life and property, according to Ernest Kraule, president of the Santa Clara County Fire Chiefs' Association. He is the chief of the Saratoga Fire District.

County Fire Marshal Alan B. Carder warns, "Last Christmas season was an especially tragic one in the Bay Area. A dozen persons were killed and several others were seriously injured by fires."

The fire chiefs' association offers the following safety rules to help insure that your Christmas will be a safe one:

- 1. In selecting a live tree, be sure it is a deep green and has a strong scent indicating freshness. Live trees should be placed away from fireplaces, furnaces and other heat sources and should not block exits. Use only fire-resistant decorations. Live trees should be placed in a container with water and removed from the building when needles start to fall. Artificial trees should bear the U.L. label.
- 2. Use only safety tested lights and check for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires and loose connections. Discard unsafe equipment. Also be sure inside and outside lights are used appropriately. Always turn off lights at bedtime or when you leave your home. Finally, never use electric lights on metallic trees and keep children away from light sets to avoid electrical shock.
- 3. Never burn candles near evergreens and avoid burning evergreens and gift wrappings in a fireplace since their flames can flare out of control, sending sparks flying about a room.
- 4. Avoid smoking near combustible decorations.
- 5. Keep matches, lighters and candles out of reach of children.
- 6. Fireplaces are a source of warmth and heat and all paper decorations and boughs should be removed from the immediate area before any fires are started. Be sure the flue is open and use as screen to enclose the front of the fireplace to confine live

embers and sparks.

- 7. Avoid wearing loose flowing clothes near open flames such as fireplaces.
- 8. Install approved smoke detection device(s) or system and provide a multi-purpose fire extinguisher in your house or apartment
- 9. Establish and practice an emergency plan to use if a fire does break out in your home and see that each family member knows at least two escape routes.

Chicano History Began In 1846

On February 16, 1609, a group of Spanish colonists arrived to settle Santa Fe. Eleven years later, the Mayflower arrived at Pilgrim's Rock. The recorded history for the following two-and-a-half centuries narrates the wave of colonization that swept the North American continent—the repeated clashes among these forces, and their culmination in 1846 with the U.S. war against Mexico.

Thus began the history of the Chicano in the United States. Although the Chicano presence could not be erased, it was ignored and at times evaded.

That history was also ignored and evaded until recently that Chicanos began to conduct research in dust-filled archives, among yellowing newspapers and old library collections.

That history is captured in El Calendario—a unique art and history calendar that relates Chicano life in this country. The calendar features more than 400 events that provide a daily dosage of Chicano history—a one-year lesson that reflects countless years of research. One event is singled out and highlighted each month through additional narration. Each calendar month is embellished with original graphics by noted Chicano artists from throughhout the Southwest.

El Calendario Chicano is but one of the many projects of the Southwest Network, an independent non-profit Chicano center. Based in a small office in downtown Hayward, the Network has emerged as a focal point in a growing movement of Chicano alternative media.

In 21/2 years, the Network has produced eight publications, among them El Directorio Chicano—a comprehensive resource directory of Chicano print media throughout the nation. In addition, the Network has just released Vayan Volando, a one-half hour color documentary film on the land-grant issue in Northern New Mexico.

The Network is exploring ways to utilize and change the present systems of mass communications while at the same time developing and strengthening means of alternative communication that serve Chicanos throughout the nation.

Operating largely as a small network of Chicanos throughout the Southwest, committed to political action and social change, the Center is steadily making its presence felt. Activists of the 60's now combine sophisticated communication skills and political strategies to mobilze around issues of significance to Chicano communities. The key to the Network's advocacy role is locally-based community efforts directed by persons who are directly affected by these issues.

Richard Rubi Heads San Jose Forum

SAN JOSE -- Charles Lostaunau has resigned as Chairman of San Jose Chapter, American GI Forum.

His election in May 1975 was questioned as a possible conflict-of-interest situation by the San Jose SER Board of Directors because Lostaunau is employed as Director of Educational Talent Search, a SER/San Jose component.

Tendering his resignation on Thursday evening, Dec. 11, 1975 he cited personal problems as the reason for his abdication. In the recent past he had been heavily questioned at chapter meetings regarding his administration of California's largest GI Forum Chapter.

Vice Chairman Richard Rubi was immediately sworn in as Chairman by Past State Vice Chairman Gilbert Rodriguez, with members of the San Jose Board of Directors and other interested Forumeers present.

Mr. Rubi is employed by the Social Security Administration of the U.S. government. He has been with S.S.A. since July 1965 and has worked in Phoenix, San Diego, El Centro, Bakersfield, Gilroy and here. He is presently Manager of the East San Jose office of Social Security.

"Having grown up in a Chicano barrio, I am fully aware of the problems which the American GI Forum seeks to alleviate," he said. "I am committed to the goals for which the organization was founded in 1948 and believe that an active, involved and dedicated membership is the heart of any organization. I believe that the "average" Forumeer is willing to accept responsibility if he/she is given the authority to do a particular job."

Mr. Rubi is also a member of the New Mexico Club of Northern California, and is Vice Chairman of the Board of Directors, Operation SER/San Jose.

major threat: Alcoholism

Alcolohism ranks high among the major national health threats, right up next to cancer, mental illness and heart disease, according to the National Council on Alcoholism (NCA).

In their recent survey taken by NCA said that at least 130 million Americans are affected by alcoholism.

According to this 12 year study of U.S. alcohol use, "the youngest group surveyed, people between 21 and 24, do the most drinking and have the highest levels of drinking problems."

One in ten of the estimated 95 million Americans who drink is either a problem drinker or an alcoholic. Thousands of these people are under 21, according to the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA).

According to a Newsweek article, Los Angeles County officials point out that one teenager in 20 has a "drinking problem."

According to handouts given by the NCA, the definition of an alcoholic is "one who is unable consistently to choose whether he shall drink or not, and who, if he drinks, is unable consistently to choose whether he shall stop or not."

This definition must be distinguished from a social drinker.

According to Dale Foster, volunteer from NCA, "a social drinker is one who can leave it alone."

"An alcoholic will get up in the morning and will have a need for a drink. The alcoholic will have a hangover, and the only way he will relieve it is to have another drink."

A social drinker will just have a hangover and leave alcohol alone for a period of time.

"A 'skid row' alcoholic represents less than 5 per cent of the total number of alcoholics. More than 95 per cent of all alcoholics are found in homes, factories, offices and communities," explained Foster.

According to the National Hifhway Traffic Safety Administration, "one-fourth of the youths they surveyed said they have driven once or twice when they knew themselves to be too drunk to drive."

"Another one-fourth have driven three times when drunk."

Alcohol has been attributed to the deaths of many young and old people.

There is an estimated 50,000 alcoholics in Santa Clara County and another 200,000 people who are close to the alcoholic.

"Alcoholism develops at different rates in different people. Many have been alcoholics from the minute they took their first drink," Foster said.

"It doesn't matter how much or how little they drink. The important question is: What is drinking doing to them? How is it affecting their lives?"

"Blackouts are rarely a standard reaction to normal social drinking. Blackouts are generally viewed as a symptom of alcoholism."

"Alcoholism is a progressive illness. As long as an alcoholic keeps on drinking, the illness will grow progressivey worse.

Former lowa Sen. Harold Hughes, a recovered alcoholic himself, commented in Time magazine, "I'm not optimistic that we're gaining on the problems. Instead, it's gaining on us."

Carlos Chavez in Lively S.J. Concert

A Latin flavor dominated the performance of the San Jose Symphony Orchestra at the Center for the Performing Arts on Dec. 8.

Guest composer and conductor Carlos Chavez directed the entire program which featured many of his own works.

Chavez is from Mexico City and is one Mexico's most highly esteemed contemporary composers. He has penned more than 100 published compositions which include every music form from chamber to opera, concerto to the avantgarde.

The concert opened with Ravel's dramatic composition "Alborado del Gracioso." The 96-piece orchestra handled the difficult Spanish aubade, a morning song, excellently.
"Largo" Cancelled

Blas Galindo's "Largo from Symphony No. 2" was scheduled but due to a lack of sheet music the piece was cancelled.

"Three Dances from Three Cornered Hat" by Manuel De Fallo followed in three movements. The fast-paced piece by contemporary Spanish composer Falla was the liveliest and possibly the best performed composition that evening.

Chavez's work "Suite from Horsepower" began the second half of the concert. The ballet composed in 1926 consisted of three movements, "Dance of the Man," "Boat to the Tropics," and "The Tropics: Huapango and Sandungo."

Using the effects of a full orchestra and the addition of castinettes, the suite had an obvious Spanish flair. Chavez was able to conduct his own piece with little difficulty and the audience showed their respect with a burst of applause and cheers at the end of the composition.

SJSU Joins In

The San Jose State University Chorale joined the orchestra under Chavez's direction for the remainder of the program.

Together they performed Heito Villa-Lobos' "Choros No. 10 (Rasga o Coracao)." The result was a beautiful combination of musicians and voices.

The Mexican ballad "El Sol" written by Chavez, concluded the concert. The chorale was featured in the piece composed for mixed orchestra and chorus.

The unique combination was a success Saturday evening and the performance appeared flawless. Problems often accompanying a mixture choir and orchestra were virtually absent at the concert.

The center was only trhee-quarters filled during the Chavez concert, the third concert in the group's nine concert season.

The next concert is scheduled Jan. 23 and 24 and will feature guest composer and conductor Aaron Copland.



Y lo que permita usted que vea su familia le dirá el futuro de su misma familia.







Mexico's Big Question: More Children

Tepoztlan, Mevico

Rebecca Martinez, 35 years old, her bare feet caked with mud and fatigue on her face, sat on a chair in her small front yard and cradled Emilio, 3 months old, her seventh child in 12 years.

Her husband, Miguel, a watchman at the Datsun factory who makes \$47 a week, sat next to her and spoke for both of them, as she evidently wished him to. Martinez, 45, looked younger, healthier and more vigorous than his wife.

A former neighbor asked if the Martinezes wanted more children. It is a question the government is trying to get all adult Mexicans to ask themselves, a question whose very asking, the government hopes, will lead to smaller families and a slowdown in population growth.

"Life is very expensive and we already have seven," Martinez said, as if apologizing for a bad thought.

The former neighbor suggested that the local free health clinic could be helpful. "I'm sure the doctors know all about that," Martinez replied with thinly veiled hostility.

Mrs. Martinez has never been to the clinic in this village of 8000 persons 50 miles south of Mexico City. Her seven babies were born at home. Her husband explained that that she didn't want to be delivered at the clinic because "the next morning they would make her get up and walk around."

Other interviews in Tepoztlan also indicated a desire to limit family size but also a reluctance to seek professional advice or admit to contraceptive practices. The conflict partly explains why Mexico's population growth rate accelerated in 1960-70 to 3.43 per cent a year, one of the highest in the world, while elsewhere in Latin America rates slowed.

The government thinks that a population growth rate of 3.5 per cent jeopardizes further rises in living standards and threatens to create huge, unmanageable cities. Already Greater Mexico City's population approaches 10 million, the subway is overtaxed, and the traffic situation in the city is a nightmare.

Mexico's population of 58 million is expected to pass 100 million before 1990.

Such figures imply a tremendous burden on health care, schooling and other public services, and the economy.

The government began two years ago to suggest voluntary limitations on family size, It was a radical change for this heavily Roman Catholic country.

The theme has been expressed in stages. In Phase One, the slogan was "Let's make ourselves fewer to live better." Now the Phase Two slogan on posters, radio and television is "The small family lives better."

In Phase Three, to start in January, the government will tell Mexicans to visit clinics or consult doctors for advice on family planning, according to Ramon Ojeda Mastre, the general coordinatro of the National Population Council.

In an interview in the council's 19th floor duplex site, atop one of Mexico City's new office buildings, Ojeda said that of 13.5 million women of child-bearing age in Mexico, 1.5 million were actively enrolled in family-planning programs.

That represented a rapid rise from 250, 000 participants a year ago, he said, "but it is still nothing in comparison with our problem."


Mexico's population is growing explosively because death rates, especially among infants, have dropped, while the fertility rate has remained high.

A 1964 study found that Mexico City women averaged 3.27 live births more than women in seven other large Latin American cities, and rural fertility rate was higher still, according to a paper by Thomas G. Sanders, a population specialist. The paper, "Mexico 1974: Demographic Patterns and Population Policy," was published last year by the American Universities field staff at Hanover, N. H.

"The factors favoring high fertility, while declining, continue strong," Sanders wrote. Those factors include a high degree of illiteracy, a large rural population and low employment among women, about ten per cent.

Critics say that the program is too mild and too limited in resources. They contend that to reach into the urban slums, the small villeges and farms, the government must be more assertive.

Ojeda, a 31-year-old lawyer with a doctorate in public administration, commented pointedly that the program included a constitutional amendment that, in his words, guaranteed to every person the right "to

decide in a free, responsible and informed way about the number and spacing of children." In other words, Ojeda says, compulsion is prohibited.

A Roman Catholic priest in Tepoztlan suggests that even if compulsion were not constitutionally banned it would not work. The Rev. Onofre Campos, pastor of Santa Maria parish, told the following story to make the point:

"A very enthusiastic young doctor came to our health ministry clinic and decided all the women should have cancer check-ups. He told them that to register their children for school they had to have a checkup. The husbands got very angry and wouldn't let their wives see the doctor. Instead, they registered their kids in another school."

Father Campos personally favors the program, despite the Vatican's official disapproval of contraception by mechanical means. He said he meets with groups of parents to discuss children, education and family planning.

According to Ojeda, there is no significant political opposition. He noted that the man expected to become Mexico's next president a year from now, Jose Lopez Portillo, has repeatedly endorsed the program.

President Luis Echeverria Alvarez campaigned in 1970 in favor of population growth, but reversed himself in office.

Ojeda said the resources devoted to family planning would have to expand by 20 per cent a year until 1980 to make the program available to all women of child-bearing age.

Airline Picks New Chief

Manuel Sosa de la Vega, president and chief executive officer of Mexicana Airlines, has been elected president of the International Air Transport Association (IATA).

Announcement of Sosa's election was made recently in Oslo, Norway, during the 31st annual meeting of IATA.

Sosa has served as president of Mexicana Airlines since 1967 and under his leadership the airline has not only become the leader in number of passengers carried between the United States and Mexico, but has also established an eight-year record of profitable operations.

Sosa noted the IATA has three major goals: one to promote safe, regular and economic air transportation for the benefit of the traveling public as well as propitiate air commerce and resolve the problems affecting it; provide a means of collaboration between air transportation firms; and cooperate with the Civil Aeronautics Board and similar regulatory agencies.

In accepting his election, Sosa noted that some of IATA's greatest advantages to the public are little understood. "For example, IATA established the operation of a compensation board that allows the interchange of airline tickets and the paymetn of same location between 88 countries which has proven extremely effective and is only exceeded in its international capacity by the Universal Postal Union.

"Additionally, committees have been established to allow for the interchange of information between airlines who are members of IATA," Sosa added, "and order has been established in an industry that, due to its aggressiveness and activity, could create a chaotic situation where tariffs and commissions are concerned," he said.

IATA headquarters are located in Montreal, Canada and Geneva, Switzerland.

A native of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, Sosa has been associated with Mexicana since 1939 and since then has worked in the airline's technical, administrative and sales and marketing departments. Before being named airline president, he had several years experience in top financial and administrative posts.

Sosa has served as president of the Special Department of Aviation of the National Board of Transportation and Communication and was also elected president of the Traffic Committee of the Airlines of Mexico City in 1966 and has served as the international delegate for this important travel industry organization.




