HOW TO SURVIVE A HEART ATTACK

LIFE SAVING TECHNIQUE FOR HEART ATTACK VICTIMS:

Let's say it's 6:15 p.m. and you're driving home (alone of course), after an unusually hard day on the job. You're really tired, upset and frustrated. Suddenly you start experiencing severe pain in your chest that starts to radiate out into your arm and up into your jaw. You are only about five miles from the hospital nearest your home; unfortunately you don't know if you'll be able to make it that far. What can you do? You've been trained in CPR but the guy that taught the course neglected to tell you how to perform it on yourself.

(Since many people are alone when they suffer a heart attack, this article seemed in order.)

Without help, the person whose heart stops beating properly and who begins to feel faint,

has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these actions-can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and very vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before each cough, and the cough must be deep and prolonged, as when producing sputum from deep inside the chest.

CIMIS Weather Station in Leisure Village Now Official

All of our active golfers are aware of the structure looking like a lunar landing gear beside the fourth tee on the Leisure Village golf course. Further back, hidden by the trees, is the moisture collector which loads, measures and dumps the water collected. CIMIS, (Pronounced simis) is an acronym for, California Irrigation Management Information System.
The recently dedicated CIMIS Station gathers and stores up to four months of information on: wind speed and direction, solar radiation, air and soil temperature and humidity, and, precipitation. It has its own lightning rod and a solar panel to charge its self contained batteries. Control and collection of the information gathered at the station, is accomplished with a single dedicated telephone line. The station, now in operation, furnishes data for both state and government agencies and can be used for the Water Management Project for Leisure Village.Computer buffs cannot directly access the newly dedicated station 152 but, can see the information gathered by it, when looking at the weather from their Network. For example, AOL users registered as Camarillo residents will see the most recent readings recorded by the State, for this location when requesting a weather report. You may also go to the state by entering in your browser, http://wwwdla.water.ca.gov/cgi-bin/cimis/cimis/data/_data. After access, Select Ventura County.

elected to give a broker of record letter to one agency, eliminating the open bid process. Our Committee convinced the Board to rescind this broker of record letter and to create an open-bid policy to allow the village to obtain the best possible insurance for the best possible cost. By opening up competition, we were able to save the Village considerable money.

Several months ago, the Board Chair and certain members have changed the way the Insurance Committee functions. We no longer have free access to speak to brokers or bidders to check out our insurance coverage or to negotiate better deals. We now must ask permission of the, Board, or go through the General Manager, for every single insurance incurs. This is wrong

issue. This is wrong. We have committees because nobody can be an expert in all areas. LVA committees were set up to provide assistance and expertise to make sure that the best possible information is available to management and the Board so that informed decisions can be made. We have also learned that the rescission of broker of record letter was not provided to the insurance carriers, but only to the broker of record, who may or may not have forwarded it. Once again, we are back in a restraint





Wood Shop Committee Aids Villagers

Thanks to the Wood Shop Committee, Inside Leisure Village has acquired a new larger box for residents to deposit their articles, stories, pictures, and ads. The old box was small and it was difficult for contributors to cram in their articles. Now stories and photographs can safely be put in the box.

Sid Alweiss, Chair, and other committee members aid villagers who need help with small repair jobs without any cost except for materials. Besides the box for Inside Leisure Village, the committee made and installed breaker racks for the Billiard Room. The committee is available to help other Leisure Village organizations any way they can.

Persons wishing to use the wood shop must meet with a committee member to show their proficiency with the machinery. Safety awareness is an important consideration. Approximately two hundred men have demonstrated this ability and have received a key to the wood shop. Sid urges women to learn to use the equipment.

Wood shop users consists of those who make their projects from start to finish in the shop, those who come in for small jobs, i.e., use the saws to cut boards to length, and

Trips and Tours

A look at local history

For old-timers as well as newcomers in the Village, ILV is running a couple of articles on nearby places to visit for a better understanding of Ventura County's history and development. As Yogi Berra is reputed to have said in response to a question about his opinion of a particular restaurant, "Oh no one ever goes there any-more." It's too crowded." The following places in the City of Ventura are popular but not over crowded!

First, the Ventura County Museum of History and Art (VCMHA) at 100 East Main in Ventura is within short walking distance to City Hall and the famous San Buenaventura Mission, one of California's Padre Serra missions, established in 1782. The Museum presents county history in pictures, equipment, relics, and handicrafts. It also contains a permanent exhibit of George Stuart miniatures.

Stuart, who lives in Ojai, is a popular speaker on historical events and illustrates his presentations with miniature replicas of both famous and infamous people in-

volved. The Museum is open Tuesday to Sunday between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. The senior admission is \$3, and annual family memberships are available covering several special events. Plan on a minimum of one to two hours. It's easy to spend several hours. San Buenaventura Mission, Main Street, is open 10-5 daily and 10-4 Sunday. The romance of early California is clearly evident as you explore the Mission chapel and grounds and attempt to relate its 218 year age to the present. By the way, admission is free; but donations are accepted.

Padre Serra Cross can be seen high atop Mission Hill to the east of the Mission. It can be reached easily on a wellmarked, paved road. And the view of Ventura and Channel Islands might be breathtaking. It's worth the trip.

The fourth and last feature of City of Ventura places to see is Olivas Adobe, a Monterey-style, two-story home for the Olivas family and built in 1847. The grounds are open daily from 10-4, and the home is open only on weekends from 10-4. Guided tours are featured on the hours of 11, 1, 2, 3. Admission is free. Location: 4200 Olivas Park Drive.





A breath and a cough must be repeated about every two seconds without let up until help arrives, or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again.





Architectural Committee

Lillian S. Hawthorne

This is the first in a series of continuing reports about the Leisure Village standing committees, i.e. what they do, how they do it and why their contributions are important to our community. These will appear in alphabetical order, starting with the Architectural Committee, chaired by Dan Davis.

The Architectural Committee is officially mandated by the Leisure Village Covenants,

Conditions and Restrictions (CCandR's). Article VI states that there shall be an Architectural Committee to consist of at least three members, appointed to serve for terms of three years, and meeting as they deem necessary to perform their duties. The duties of the Architectural Committee are to consider and act upon proposals and plans submitted to it; to create standards and guidelines related to home design and structure; and to enforce these. Basically, the Committee operates much as a department of building and safety in any municipality. Its primary goal is to protect safety and secondarily the value of Leisure Village homes through monitoring structure, materials, appearances, aesthetics. The Committee chairperson also serves

as general architectural consultant to the Leisure Village Board of Directors.

To carry out its functions, the Committee works closely with the City of Camarillo zoning and building departments, with other committees—especially Buildings and Grounds as well as with the Board of Directors.

The process of developing architectural standards starts with a request from a homeowner regarding a special situation or need; this is done through an official Leisure Village Architectural Permit Application. All work performed on the exterior of a home, such as additions or alterations, requires such permits applications are reviewed by the Chairman, and then assigned for follow-up to a particular Committee member according to experience and expertise.

These applications must not conflict with city laws, building codes, zoning ordinances or other community rules or requirements. Also an application must receive the unanimous approval of the Committee prior to obtaining a city permit, when one is required.

The Committee then develops standard specifications for these additions or changes. To date, approximately 38 such standards have been completed; these are all incorporated in the Leisure Village Architectural Code Book which is available to homeowners or contractors. Some of these apply to architectural changes such as patio enclosures, patio covers, encroachments, handicapped curb ramps, accessory sidewalks, etc. Chairman Dan Davis observed that requests for changes have increased over the years as the needs of individual homeowners, and of the

Leisure Village community in general, have increased.

At present, the Architectural Committee consists of seven members, all of whom have strong related experience including: architectural design and development, electrical engineering, structural engineering, building contract work, framing and cabinet craftsmanship. The Committee is led by Dan Davis who has been a member for 14 years, and is now serving his second term as chairman. The other members are Sid Alweiss. Frank Bausmith, Lucy Fiore, Bob Powell, Jack Quinn and Slabotsky. Chairman Davis commented that he was particularly appreciative of this strong, committed and qualified group. The Architectural Committee meets at 9:00 a.m. on the third Wednesday of each month in the Sun Room; residents are invited to attend.






