With the cooperation of the city of Camarillo we are planning an informational and exercise event for all Emergency Service workers to enable everyone to be aware of their responsibilities and duties in the event of a disaster within the community.

Y.N.C.G. DONATES POWER PLANT TO L.V.

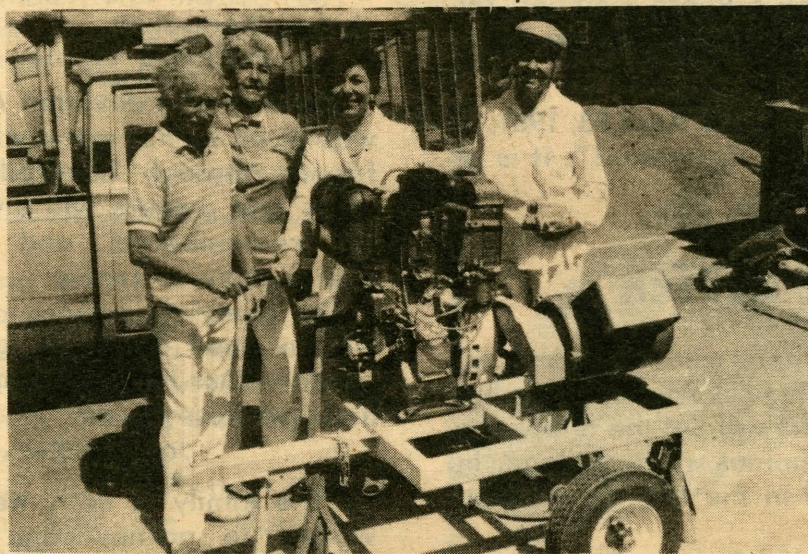

On June 8, Your Neighbors Care Group presented a diesel powered electric generator, to be used in any emergency that would cause a blackout in the Administration or Recreation Buildings, to Leisure Village Association.

The generator, capable of producing 8,000 watts of electricity, or enough to light up all of the Administration Building or one-half of the Recreation Center, is mounted on a trailer so it can be moved to any location. It was made in the Republic of China, and is similar to ones used to electrify remote villages of China.

Approximately \$2800, derived from membership fees and donations received by Y.N.C.G., was used to make the purchase. The unit will be maintained by our Security Department and will be ready in case of a disaster, which we hope will never happen.

Y.N.C.G. wishes to thank all its members. It was your \$1.00 membership payment that helped purchase the generator. Your continued support will enable us to obtain other items needed for L.V.A., and will also help you enjoy healthier and happier lives through the programs sponsored by the Group.

THE MEETING THAT WASN'T

Where were you?

On June 20, there was supposed to be an Annual Meeting of L.V. Association for the purpose of electing two board members for the coming year and to decide whether the C.C. & R.'s should be amended to allow the Association to carry less than total replacement value on our homeowner's insurance.

If you were among those not represented without good reason, you are shirking your responsibility to yourself and to the rest of the Villagers. When the meeting was called at 10 o'clock, it was one hundred twenty short of the quorum which would make it official. Our by-laws require that we hold such a meeting once each year.

There was no official meeting due to lack of enough people registering to make a quorum even though proxies were also included in the count. (A quorum is defined as one owner from one-half the number of residences, plus one.)

Despite urgent appeals on Channel 12 and calls from the security cars with bull horns through the village streets, for people to come to the A.R. immediately, by 10:30 we were still ninety short.

Committee reports were given. There were discussions and a question and answer period, but by 11:30 after more than an hour and a half of waiting, it was obvious that there was not enough response. Many chairs remained empty.

Carmen Read then declared no meeting, and as required by

AN ABOUT FACE

An interesting debate took place at the Board meeting on Monday, June 4, on a motion to change Article 17.01 of the Rules and Regulations, so as to permit residents to work for the Association on a full-time basis.

The incident showed that a single voice of reason, in tune with Villagers present, could persuade the Board to do an about-face on an issue that calls for more deliberation before being brought to a vote.

A not unimportant facet was the re-opening of the discussion to permit residents to express their views before the Board was polled to rescind the previous 3-2 vote in favor of the new rule. Those taking the floor mike to express their views were unanimous in endorsing the position taken by Board member Karl Cannon.

Bowing to "public opinion," the vote to table the previous motion carried 5-0.

Two conclusions may be drawn from this incident, without discussing the substantive issue of the proposed rule change:

1. No rule should be adopted before presenting at least two "readings."
2. In order to insure greater understanding of new business items, they should first be explained by a Board member, followed by discussion from the floor, finally by debate by Board members before taking a vote.

We suggested this procedure as long ago as April 23, 1981, in an editorial entitled, "Point of Order, Mr. Chairman!"; it is as valid today as it was then.

A CHANGE FOR THE BETTER

From its inception, ILV has felt that there were two unnecessary restrictions upon renters in the Village. Very early, we began printing (when we could get that information) the telephone numbers of people who live in rented homes in the Village. In 1981, their names began to be printed in the L.V. Association Telephone Directory. We applauded.

Now in the last few months the second injustice to them has been corrected. "This meeting is for home-owners of record, all others are asked to leave" is no longer announced at the beginning of our Association Board Meetings. Like many other unnecessary restrictions, this had to be a carry-over from Leisure Tech's philosophy, but ILV could never see any reason to bar renters from auditing meetings that had to do with the rules under which they were living.

ILV believes that the 1983-84 Board should be commended for this change.

Unfortunately, no truly effective appeals procedure exists whereby the aggrieved resident could obtain a satisfactory resolution of his complaint, with fairness to all concerned.

An independent Ombudsman could help provide such a procedure.

Let's hope the Board (which has been sitting on a similar suggestion for several months without acting on it, due, largely, to the pressure of time), will be wise enough to initiate an effective program now along this line for the benefit of everyone concerned, including themselves.

California suffered a disappointing setback on A.B. 3410 in the Assembly Elections and Reapportionment Committee on May 29. Six votes were needed; we could muster only five "yes" votes.

This Bill, if it had passed, would have appeared on the Fall ballot so that California voters by passing it, could have indicated to the Federal Government that a National Health Care Plan, designed to take care of the health needs of all of our citizens, should become a major priority of our Federal Government. We are the only industrialized nation in the world without such a centralized health plan.

Most major Senior and other Citizen groups are in support of such a resolution. Here is another case where costs have gone completely out of reach. The economic consequences to the population as a whole are not being given consideration by the majority of elected representatives of the people. The battle has just begun! There will be action on a national front, and we will be informed as the organization develops.

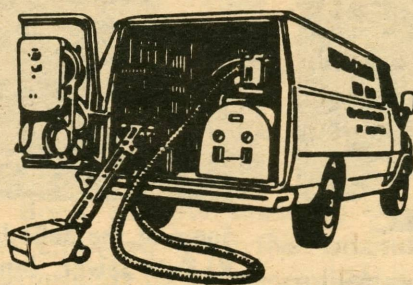
fortunate resignation as a Director and President of the Association. Ed has been a valued member of the Board for more than 20 months and I was sorry to see him go.

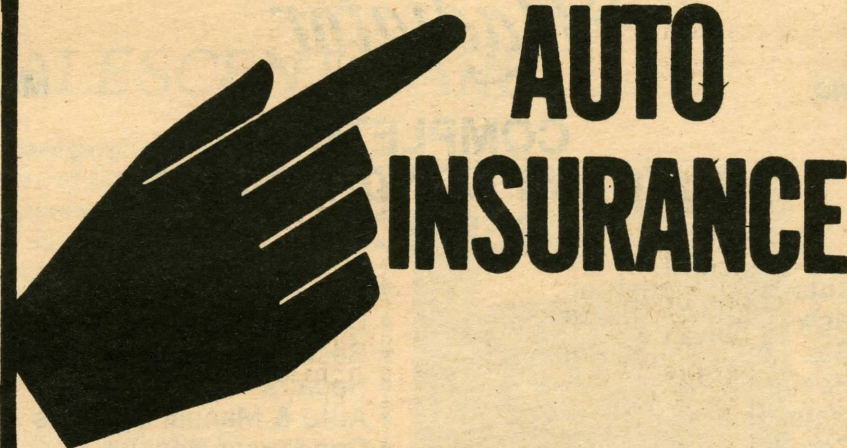

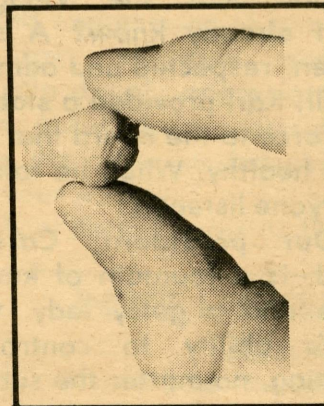

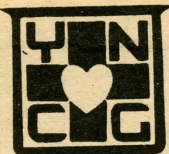

The "Picker-Upper", an invention of Ed Nemeth, who lives in L.V., is a four part tool that can be used by persons

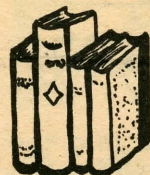

PROFILE: MARTHA & CECIL NUNN

"About ten years ago we started looking for our dream home retirement area. Our travels took us along the coast from Santa Barbara to San Diego. Here we found the concept, climate, location and life style that fills our needs. Leisure Village is truly home to us."

Speaking are Cecil and Martha Nunn, a well known golfing couple whose interests and talents cover a wide range. Both are really close to being called California natives, each arriving here at an early age.

Martha was educated in the Pasadena area, was employed by Pacific Telephone and met the man of her life at a dance in the days before World War II.

Cecil, born in Winnipeg, Canada, came to the Los Angeles area as a youngster, saw military service and graduated from Occidental College with a major in biology. He did graduate work at USC and with his MA taught at high school level for several years.

He then moved into the administrative headquarters at Los Angeles City Schools and became involved with computers in their infancy days. He employed this new tool in data management tabulations, supervised audio visual, employee services and served on the annuity reserve board. As chief administrator of retirement service he provided sage advice and counsel to many nearing their final working days. During his tenure, more than 80,000 teachers were employed in the Los Angeles City School System.

The Nunns have four children, all married, and four grandchildren. One daughter lives in San Rafael, a son resides outside Tokyo, Japan, another son claims San Luis Obispo his home and one daughter lives in the San Fernando Valley.

Within six months after moving to Leisure Village in 1973, Cecil experienced a mild heart attack, recovered quickly, and the good life continued. Suddenly, just before

Christmas 1982, he was stricken with a massive heart attack and only quick action on the part of Martha and swiftly arriving paramedics enabled him to be sped to Oxnard, where surgeons at St. John's Hospital performed immediate open heart surgery. Recovery was rapid, due largely to his strong will and great sense of humor. As friends watch him strike a golf ball today, all thoughts of his close call just eighteen months ago disappear.

As fine as Cecil's golf game is, his reputation as a "ball

hawk" is even greater. At any given golf tournament on a regulation course, he has the uncanny ability to locate stray golf balls. It's rare indeed for him to come home with less than half a dozen and he has been known to find as many as 30 or 40 in a single day! On shelves, in his garage, neatly catalogued in egg carton boxes, are enough excellent-condition golf balls for every male and female golfer in Leisure Village with dozens left over.

D-Day Anniversary Stirs Memories For LV Resident

By Jack Whalen

Can any among us forget D-Day, June 6, 1944? Hardly. And as the 40th Anniversary was remembered across the nation, LV resident Charles Bellante paused to recall his involvement in the months leading up to that eventful day.

Early in January 1944, as a Chief Petty Officer with Naval photography in Washington, D.C., he was called into headquarters, sworn to secrecy, and sent to Ft. Pierce, Florida, to supervise the production of a training film simulating landings on the coast of France.

Near there, on a small island off the Florida coast, under realistic combat conditions, assault forces hit the shore while Bellante's photo crew filmed the action. Steel rods, such as the German army used off the Normandy coast, were impaled in the water and demolition crews, using Element C explosive devices, had to destroy them before the landing

craft moved in. So intense and so realistic were the maneuvers, five military men lost their lives during the three week exercise.

"Many of the officers and enlisted men who took part in the operation were among the first to land on D-Day," said Charlie.

Chief Bellante took the raw film stock back to Washington, had it processed and edited it into a film titled "DOLO." Top navy brass previewed the film, approved it and in the months ahead used it as a training tool for assault forces.

"No, I didn't get over to cover the actual landing," he states, "they kept me busy making additional training films. We had been told that the actual invasion might be about June 8 or 9, but General Eisenhower, learning of coming bad weather, set June 5, then marginal weather forced him to call a 24-hour delay and the rest is history."

To this day he proudly treasures a letter from the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Committee on New Weapons and Equipment, thanking him for his efforts in helping produce a film that may well have saved thousands of lives during the invasion that started June 6.

Film credits continued to build for Chief Bellante, among them the highly acclaimed "Seabees In Normandy." Upon completion of his military service he returned to New York City to resume his documentary film career. Prior to joining the military, Charles Bellante was editor of the film

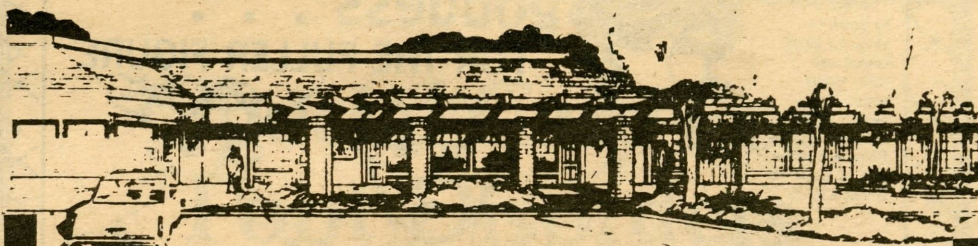
gap of an outmoded policy and is outdated and lethal.

Dr. Jones observed that the East — West rivalry seemed to fade during the 1970's as it gave way to a bi-polar foreign policy which considered the wide range of interests of other countries. However, we are now feeling the conservative reaction which objected to the post-Vietnam isolationism and the down-playing of military power. Conservatives' viewpoint was strengthened by events

— the Iran hostage crisis, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and Russian — Cuba activity in Ethiopia and Angola. Cold war warriors led by President Reagan revised the anti-Soviet rhetoric and demanded more military spending. The conservative plan was to make the Soviets retreat on all fronts and to stay the course on military spending regardless of problems with federal deficits.

Dr. Jones believes that to force polarity on an East - West basis is anachronistic. The result is that the United States isolates itself from the world. Other countries see international institutions as increasingly important, but the administration does not. "We need to go back to diplomacy to settle disputes. Military power will not bring real security", he explained.

Dr. Jones, Oxnard College professor, is well known in Leisure Village for his stimulating courses on current events.

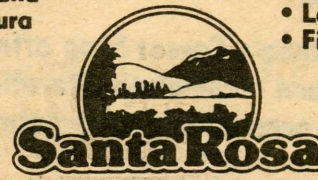
