Though I mentioned only two ceilings in my cable the fact of the matter is I am rounding up a half-dozen, some large and important, others of medium size and simple what might be termed bed-room ceilings.

As indicated in the cable however I am anxiously awaiting a decision in the case of the SAHAGUN ceiling. This, as you will recall, is the enormous example, 104 x 35 feet long, with painted panels Gothic in character but dating from the early sixteenth century. In your cable of January 11th you asked for color sketches of this ceiling and I responded by sending you by mail two fragments of the actual, painted panels. Although these were sent well over two months ago there has been no reply. In the meanwhile the abbess of the convent keeps after me for a reply.

The second ceiling referred to in my cable is an imposing example of the open rafter type with great double tie-beams featured with cross bracing. This ceiling is identical in type to that covering the Church of El Transito in Toledo, photographs of which I sent you when I proposed doing for Mr. Hearst a great Mudejar salon.

So far as the grille is concerned we are now awaiting a decision from the Pope in Rome as to whether the Cathedral in question may dispose of the grille (for anything over 50,000 pesetas in value the church is obliged to appeal to Rome for permission to sell), and, while Rome rarely refuses the tredstapea involved takes an age. Also, as a result of my talks with Mr. Joy, I hope to prepare shortly for Mr. Hearst photographs of fine Gothic ironwork I have, also some fine furniture. Even more important, I am neassembling an extraordinary room complete which comes from the Upper Aragon; but all this work has been much interfered with this winterbecause of my participation in the preparation of the Seville and Barcelona Expositions. And can we not look forward to seeing you in Spain this spring or summer either? You are entitled to a rest, or, if you prefer not to call it a rest, a change. Hoping to hear from you shortly and with kindest regards from us both, Sincerely, P.S. The Plateresque stone frieze ondered in your cable of January 11th has just been shipped from Valencia. I drew on Mr. Hearst for the amount.

I am surprised that you never received the print of the SAHAGUN ceiling; however I am enclosing another herewith. The size is quite extraordinary - in fact of its type I have never seen an example to equal it. In addition to the painted panels of the soffit (samples of which you have received) the beams also are decorated in part; on the whole it is a very sumptuous ceiling. Particulars of this ceiling were enclosed in my letter of November 5th, 1928, along with many other objects of importance. The ceiling is decorated in the Gothic style but is at present concealed from view by a plaster vault of later date (making photography impossible). Price As you did not receive the ceiling drawing it is quite possible that the other objects sent at the same time were lost. Project No.6 was a remarkable polychrome tile wainscote, dated 1609, beautiful in drawing and color. Length 67 running feet, height 6 feet. \$4,000. 

May I first explain that in determining the price of the Castle I took into consideration the iron grilbe which you thought lacking in interest (once in your possession I am sure you will admire it). Even at my low scale of prices I would have asked \$32,000 for the Castle but in view of your critisim of the grille I deliberately reduced the Castle to \$28,000.

In a letter which has just come from Miss Morgan she says "Mr. Hearst telegraphed he was taking the grille although disappointed in its lack of interest".

I have received no such cable but given the importance of the grille and the reduction made in the price of the Castle I consider the purchase of the grille as definite and therefore included it in my total mentioned for "present obligations"



Neither the imposing size nor the beautiful quality of the detail can be appreciated in the photograph. As indicated the total width is 25feet 8 inches wide and the total height 20 feet 6 inches. The grille is wrought on both sides, has a dedicatory inscription at the top and is in the natural color of the iron. In making a comparison with the great Valladolid grille it will be seen that this though smaller is an equally valuable piece because of its greater antiquity. The present example dates from the early 16th century (quite reminiscent of Gothic in fact) while the Valladolid example dates from the late 17th century; a difference perhaps of 150 years. The price is FIFTEEN THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$15,500.00) I know of nothing so difficult to secure to-day as old church grilles of this sort. To be sure this and the Valladolid example have appeared within a short time of each other but prior to their appearance I have been looking for one for ten years. Dear Miss Morgan : Mr. Hearst instructs me to show you the following letter received from Miss Schrader of his New York office, just to let you know that the castle is arriving: "Mr. Nelson advises that ninety-three additional cases of the castle have arrived from Spain, and the foreign charges on this shipment amount to \$1861, which he has paid. This makes a total of 352 cases that have been received, with foreign charges amounting to \$7390." Mr. Hearst said: "I think there is an awful lot of it." I waited until the last minute hoping to hear from you and then in view of my trip to America, with heavy expenses in the meanwhile, I felt obliged to accept Loewe's very good offer. The ceiling sold was from Mr. Hearst's point of view, I am sure, the least interesting and the most expensive (proportionately speaking). By looking at the photographs I am sure you will agree with me instantly; the sold example is TOLEDO a little ceiling measuring only 9 x 17 feet. I don't mean to say it wasn't a fine piece but it was more in the nature of a sample ceiling for a museum than a practical decorative example. Now my counter-proposition is this. A week before leaving Madrid I acquired a specially interesting ceiling, measuring 16 feet square and entirely carved, dating from the sixteenth century entite was one of the many things I wish to could not have sold under \$7000. Now I propose including this with the other three accepted ones. Under the circumstances as Mr. Hearst is getting greater value for his money now than under the previous combination there is no reason why I should still reduce the price from \$24,000 but to consummate the affair I will call it \$23,000. So as to have no further upset in this combination I have ordered my man in Madrid to prepare these four ceilings for shipment. With the two expositions going on in Spain there are a great many buyers and another ceiling might easily be sold. As to payment, may I ask you to send half the amount involved (\$11,500) and credit my account in the National City (over)

Bank, Public Library Branch, New York City. In addition to this Mr. Hearst owes me a considerable amount but if he gets this amount to my credit promptly we will discuss the rest later. The truth is I have brought over to America many very fine things, mostly for museums, and find myself temporarily very short of funds.

Thanking you for your usual collaboration and looking forward to seeing you in California at the end of January believe me with best wishes from us both,

Dear Miss Morgan;

Though still a long way from California we are now on this side of the Atlantic and deep in the hectic life of New York. We have been here just three weeks but a great deal of the time has been spent in Boston and Philadelphia where I have considerable work in hand at the Museums.

Since our arrival I have tried in vain to see Mr.Hearst - he seems absolutely inaccessible here; I believe he would like to see me and have a talk over things but he is completely submerged with engagements.

There are a number of things I would like to bring to his attention before submitting them to various Museums. Some of these objects I have actually brought over with me and others I have in photograph only.

I am wondering if there was a definite negative on the last iron grille I submitted to you and Mr.Hearst. Though nearly 25 feet wide it was simple in design and rather reminiscent of Gothic. If you are not interested in this piece or cannot see yourway to using it will you, if it is possible, kindly return the photo to this address. I think Mr.Hearst makes a mistake not to take this grille for I doubt if another will ever appear on the market. Several museums have expressed a desire for a large grille and the photo I sent you is the only one I have of the grille in question.

We are looking forward to seeing you in late January or early February. Our work takes us as far west as St.Louis; the trip to the Coast is primarily to see the Hearst Ranch and of course you. With this in mind I regret not being able to have five minutes with our client before he leaves New York but he keeps himself surrounded while here with a barricade of barbed wire!
