

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only. Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. "Visiting" media may make their requests through their respective "home" SIDs. When time permits, credentials will be mailed.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. NCAA rules limit shooting to outside the restraining line enclosing the field and the team areas and these rules, as modified due to the inadequate space behind benches at Santa Ana Stadium, will be strictly enforced.

PARKING: Free, ample and close to western grandstand with press box.

PRESS BOX: Is limited to working members of the press, radio, television and others whose duties require use of the press area. No one will be admitted without proper credentials (spouses included). Light sandwiches and soft drinks will be provided. Play-by-play reports by quarters, halftime and final statistics, scoring summary and post-game quotes will be distributed throughout the press box, which is located on the west side of Santa Ana Stadium.

BROADCAST SPACE: One booth is allocated to each team's designated commercial radio station. Each holds four persons comfortably across the working counter with standing space available to the rear. Additional needs for radio and all television requests will be handled on an individual basis (read: rooftop).

TELEPHONES: One pay telephone and one usually busy Fullerton SID business line are available in the press box. Additional phones must be ordered through Pacific Bell by calling (818) 576-3204. The main press box number is expected to be (714) 550-9321.

SCOUTS: Professional scouts will be sold tickets in the grandstands (top row south of press box) and provided handout materials upon request at the press box entrance. Scouts from opposing schools will be issued press box passes if space permits in accordance with NCAA rules but only if requested at least four days in advance.

Cal State Fullerton Campus



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and five certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances and the Cabaret Repertory Theatre Company, which performs regularly in Brea.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which has spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fulleton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields.

To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necesary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

History of Titan Athletics



Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, a rookie in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold

medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty."

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. And he won the College World Series again in 1984

with players soon to be seen in the majors.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making six trips to the College World Series in seven years. The Titans' most recent trip saw them bring home their first NCAA Championship.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. But football is the name of the game in intercollegiate sports and the Titans have won their share on the gridiron as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Division I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and football is another topflight Div. I program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

Administration



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major

public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 14 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.

Titan Athletic Foundation

The 1986 fund drive was the most productive ever with more than \$300,000 in cash pledged for 1986-87 scholarship aid.

Athletic Department



Ed Carroll, Athletic Director

The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 36, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities is to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, Florida, West Virginia and Tulsa have signed on to host the Titans over the next few years with several other major universities currently in negotiations to play Fullerton.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980 as an assistant athletic director. From October, 1981, to April, 1982, he was acting athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985 for a similar post at San Jose State.

Excitement and competitive balance are the watchwords when it comes to Pacific Coast Athletic Association football. A typical PCAA game will feature wide-open air-minded offenses and aggressive, stunting defenses in a contest likely to be decided in the closing minutes.

Of the eight schools competing for the title, five have won league championships in the past seven years with only Cal State Fullerton and Fresno State winning a pair. Four of the schools

have competed in the California Bowl since its inception in 1981.

Away from league play, PCAA schools have flexed their muscles with such victories as San Jose State at Baylor, San Jose State at California and Stanford and Fresno State at Arizona in recent years as well as Fullerton's WAC sweep with wins at Wyoming, Colorado State and Hawaii. Future schedules continue to feature more and more nationally recognized powers from such leagues as the Southeastern Conference and Big Ten. The growing respect can best be measured by the appearance in the wire service Top 20 polls the last two seasons by Fullerton and Fresno State.

Head Coach Gene Murphy

Despite conference championships the previous two seasons, Gene Murphy was subjected to the occupational hazards of a head football coach when the 1985 Titans opened the season with three consecutive and unpopular losses.

"There were people telling me I should have left for Missouri or Oregon State or Utah or anyplace."


recalls Murphy.

The resourceful Irishman tempered the criticism as Cal State Fullerton captured narrow victories in its first two conference games. But the absence of an offensive touchdown in a Homecoming loss to rival Nevada-Las Vegas and a lopsided defeat at Fresno State had the critics re-sharpening their daggers.

"The vestments and holy water were arriving for last rites and the morticians were digging the hole," Murphy remembers. "But we came back and had a winning season. It's a coaches' cliche about character, but I think everyone saw what it's

all about in our last four games.

Murphy's character sets the tone. A bitter competitor, he nevertheless is able to leave it on the field and the demeanor which has won admiration and respect from his colleagues, University administrators, the media and the football public changes imperceptibly. Murphy carried the same impish grin when he was 2-5 last November as



when the Titans were 10-0 and ranked No. 20 in the nation late in the 1984 season.

"Last year may have been as satisfying as the two previous championship seasons," says Murphy. "We kept incurring serious injuries yet still went out and won some games. We couldn't

be more proud of that team."

Second only to Fresno State's Jim Sweeney in terms of seniority with six years in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association, Murphy, 46, has established his place among the premier football coaches in the nation by building a Division I program literally from the ground up. Murphy and his staff have provided their own office complex, weight training facility and fall training camp arrangement and the University has responded by providing a full allotment of assistant coaching positions, a football secretary and bringing the scholarship levels closer to the Div. I maximum.

However, the Titans continue to play two-thirds of their games on the road due to the lack of

an on-campus playing facility.

"The stadium is the final piece in the puzzle," says Murphy, who has sent the Titans out to play at four different "home" sites during his tenure including a temporary facility erected and razed annually for three seasons by the players and coaching staff. "We are very pleased with our arrangement at the Santa Ana Bowl, but playing on campus in our own facility would be the ultimate."

Although it took four years for the results to show up on paper — in the won/lost column, Murphy's improvement of the Titan program began that January day in 1980 when he first set foot on the Fullerton campus.

"We had to go back to square one — erecting the stadium, fund-raising, recruiting, building the weight room, creating office space, hosting a true fall camp...everything — to build a broad base.

"And from day one we had to build the self-image of the Titan progam. What we have developed is 'Titan Family.' You win with people. We put up with a lot of adversity but we do it together and I think it has made us stronger. It's something you have to experience to properly appreciate.

"I've said it many times, but I sincerely believe it. No one can match our staff of assistant coaches. We work together, they don't work for me. And it takes a special kind of person to play football at Fullerton." (continued on next page)

Murphy came to Fullerton from the University of North Dakota to "throw the football" and his early Titan teams featured wide-open aerial assaults and more than a bagfull of trick and gadget plays, all known collectively as the "squirrel derby" offense. The 1983 PCAA championship team and California Bowl entrant was built around a stubborn and ball-hawking defense and the 1984 squad put it all together: a strong running game to balance an efficient yet deep-striking passing game and an aggressive defense that was No. 2 in the nation in creating turnovers. Last year the defense carried the load despite numerous injuries until the young offensive unit came together with the aid of a deep reach into the "squirrel derby" bag. The one constant, however, over Murphy's six-year and 34-35 (36-33 with forfeits) slate, has been the play of the special

"We feel the game is divided into three phases - offense, defense and special teams," says Murphy. "If you can win two of the three, you've got a pretty good chance to win the football game. So we spend a lot of time and front-line personnel on special teams and don't just give them lip service."

Murphy's rewards have included the 1983 PCAA Coach of the Year Award and in 1984 he was selected United Press International's West Coast Coach of the Year.

Born Eugene Vincent Murphy on Aug. 6, 1939 in Jersey City, New Jersey, Murphy was an all-sports star at St. Peter's High School in New Brunswick and earned all-state honors in football (quarterback) and baseball (shortstop). His late father also was a coach and matched wits with the likes of Vince Lombardi at the prep level.

Recruited to the University of Minnesota by assistant Ray Malavasi under head coach Murray Warmath, Murphy soon found himself sitting on the bench behind Gopher star Sandy Stephens. He transferred to North Dakota and as a senior was the All-North Central Conference quarterback.

After attaining his bachelor's degree (physical education) in 1962, Murphy served one year as graduate assistant and then coached football, baseball and swimming at North St. Paul High School before returning to UND, where he stayed 16 more years - the first 14 as an assistant and eventually as offensive coordinator and then the 1978 and 1979 seasons as head coach.

While he was offensive coordinator, the Sioux won six conference championships and participated in three post-season bowl games (1966, 1972 and 1975). As head coach, he won the conference title in 1979 and was named conference coach of the year. The Fightin' Sioux went 10-2 and were ranked as high as No. 3 in the Division II national rankings. His 1978 team was 5-5, giving him a two-year mark of 15-7 at UND and a current career mark of 49-42 (51-40 with forfeits).

"I was very comfortable at North Dakota, too comfortable," Murphy recalls. "I needed a challenge and came to California to see the sun. I've had more fun coaching at Fullerton than ever before and I'm a Titan. I do NOT want to leave Fullerton, but I would be committing professional suicide if I didn't listen to the other offers that have come along."

Murphy spent five summers (1967-71) as an assistant "guest" coach with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. During his Fullerton tenure he also has turned

down opportunities to return to the Canadian League.

A holder of two master's degrees (physical education in 1963 and secondary administration in 1977), Murphy served as interim athletic director at Fullerton for much of 1981.

Murphy has two sons. Tim, 20, is beginning his junior year at Fullerton and works in the athletic equipment room around a budding ice hockey and/or baseball career. Michael, 16, is active in several sports at Esperanza High School in Anaheim.

The Original HOGS

The nickname "hogs" for offensive linemen gained national recognition a few years back as John Riggins and a group of mammoth blockers led the Washington Redskins to a Super Bowl victory.

However, the Redskins were more than a decade late with the term. The creator: Larry Manfull. now in his seventh year as the Titans' offensive line coach.

"The story unfolds back in 1969 when I was the head coach at Hollister High School in central California," recalls Larry, affectionately known as "the Hogmaster". "I was hunting wild boar and came across a group of six. Among them was one of the largest boars I had even seen. His tusks seemed to touch the ground. I estimated his weight at 300 to 400 pounds.

"I scoped the group and as I laid the crosshairs on his upper right shoulder and squeezed the trigger, the results were scary.

"The boar jumped straight into the air, landed on the ground, turned three complete circles and charged my pick-up truck. After a few seconds of utter amazement, I put the crosshairs on his chest. My 257 exploded and about 150 yards away, the Hog went down. He appeared to be dead.

"Wrong. The Hog got up and charged the truck again. I leaped into the bed and fired my remaining cartridge. The Hog went down, but he got up again and charged the truck once more. He rammed the side of the truck, quivered and fell dead.

"I stood in the back of the truck in shock. The boar truly was dead this time, but I started to think about that animal and what he was made of.

"I got out of the bed and pulled the Hog by the tusks away from the dent he had put in the rear fender. I saw that my first shot had grazed his back and sent him into a state of fury, charging in the direction of the sound from the gun shot. My second shot was in his right shoulder and the third shot was directly in the middle of his chest. I am sure the Hog was virtually dead when he got up from the last bullet and charged the truck.

"I took the Hog home, skinned and quartered him and he provided many great meals. Now, each time I eat pork, I think of that boar and tip my fork in respect.

"That boar was the ultimate in all the things I think a football player should be on the field. He was the toughest animal or person I had ever seen. He never quit, even after he was hurt or, in my opinion, even dead. He had the killer instinct, he was strong and aggressive and he had character and pride.

"My linemen are charged with the responsibility to uphold the reputation of the "Hogs" that played in 1969 and since then."

In honor of their nickname, every "Hog" has a T-shirt to wear away from the field featuring a ferocious hog in a design created by tight end Jim Thornton.




JOHN MIKLESH **Outside Linebackers** North Dakota (1973)




DAVE TIPTON Defensive Linemen Stanford (1971)

"On an athletic basis, we have a pretty good football team, but in terms of experience, we are very mediocre." The speaker is Gene Murphy and the subject is the 1986 Cal State Fullerton football team, which will try to continue the great successes of the Titan program the past few years. A season-closing four-game win streak in 1985 gained the Titans second place on the heels of back-to-back Pacific Coast Athletic Association championships.

With 24 victories on the field and two more via forfeit over the past three seasons, the Titan program has posted a 26-9 record despite playing only 12 of those games at home. If the loss of 20 lettermen including All-American cornerback Mark Collins and a quartet of gifted wide receivers can be overcome, the Titans could maintain that winning pace.

"We used spring drills to get some 'reps' for a lot of the youngsters," says Murphy, beginning his seventh year at Fullerton. "We have a new defensive coordinator in Homer Hall and a new inside linebacker coach in Kirk Harmon so we had a few new wrinkles to work on, but basically we will operate out of the same 5-man front.

"Offensively, we had three young quarterbacks to work with in Spring and we have a junior college QB coming in this Fall in Ronnie Barber. We have a lot of untested running backs to break in . And, of course, we have to find some wide receivers. 'The Corpsmen' left guite a wake."

Fullerton returns five offensive starters in sophomore quarterback Tony Dill, fullback Mark Hood, guard

Mark Stephenson, tackle Ed Gillies and tight end Jim Thornton as well as leading rusher Rick Calhoun, who split time behind Mark Hood at fullback and Burness Scott at running back. On defense the picture is brighter, particularly up front where the Titans have talent, depth and experience.

"That's the strength of this team right now," says Murphy. "We have good depth at nose guard and tackle. We have quality players at linebacker and in the secondary but we lack game experience there."

Returning starters include nose guard Jim Baioa, tackle Ron McLean, end Kelly Gogerty and outside linebackers Sean Foy and Ted Hinton up front in addition to linebackers Bryan Riggs and Bill Bryan and free safety Tom Phillips.

"Redshirt Tyrone Pope and sophomore James Howard are the top candidates at the corners and there's a good fight between Mike Schaffel and Dupree Anderson at roverback (strong safety)," says Murphy. "We also need to get some help from the young linebackers like Jeff Hipp, Bill Jaquish and Stan Bowers. We play 12 weeks in a row so depth, quality depth, is critical, at this position and at all positions."

Special teams are traditionally a Titan strength and there is great competition among the kickers.

"It's Len Strandley's job to lose at placekicker and it should be a good battle at punter between Jim Sirois and Kurt Bloedorn."

OFFENSE

INTERIOR LINE -Three proven players return to a unit that has been a Titan strength over the past few seasons... two-time All-PCAA pick Mark Stephenson (Sr., 6-3, 280) is back at one guard along with starters Ed Gillies (Jr., 6-5, 255) at tackle and Jim Thornton (Jr., 6-3, 245) at tight end... lettermen Joe Florentine (Sr., 6-3, 265) and Greg Hammond (Jr., 5-11, 260) will vie for the second guard spot but there is less experience at center and the other tackle spot vacated by all-PCAA pick Dave Martinez and four-year letterman Hank Goebel... center will be a battle among letterman Phil Benson (Jr., 6-1, 260), JC transfer Don Hamann (Jr., 6-5, 230) and freshman redshirt Marc Hauser (Fr., 6-3, 235)... vying for the tackle job is squad member Matt Fitts (So., 6-4, 270) and 280-pound JC transfer James Good (Jr., 6-6)... guard depth will be made up of freshmen redshirts Steve Rowe (6-4, 225) and Tom Holler (6-2, 260) and Wyoming transfer Jeff Ragan (Sr., 6-1, 253)... backing up Gillies is letterman Mike Oliver (So., 6-6, 250)... behind Thornton at tight end is John Smith (So., 6-4, 225) and lanky Bill Brennan (Fr., 6-6, 220).

Murphy: "We are young but have quality. We've got to stay healthy at tackle and find a way to play John Smith. We have found a place for Matt Fitts... Jim Thornton could be the best tight end we have had here before he is finished... we need to find a long snapper."

QUARTERBACK - Tony Dill (So., 5-11, 180) was thrown into action last year when seniors Kevin Jan and Whit Brown were knocked out with injuries and all he did was go 4-0 as a starter... he was a wide receiver in high school who still is learning how to play quarterback... a pair of red-shirts will press Dill for starting role...Carlos Siragusa (Fr., 6-4, 200) is most "pure" passer in group, has height advantage and had a strong spring game... Rich Sheriff (Jr., 5-10, 178) is transfer from University of Hawaii who earned Offensive Scout Player of the Year honors last year for his work with "enemy" offenses on the practice field... fall-arriving El Camino College transfer Ronnie Barber should become a factor when he learns the system.

Murphy: "Tony has the edge on the basis of his play last year... he did go 4-0... but we want them all competing for No. 1... anything can happen."

RUNNING BACKS -Two returning stalwarts and then a lot of question marks in the offensive backfield... Rick Calhoun (Sr., 5-8, 188) earned second-team All-PCAA honors last year as he led the Titans in rushing with 747 yards while alternating between fullback and running back slots... Mark Hood (Sr., 5-11, 215) was No. 6 on the pre-season depth charts but emerged the starter a month into the season and finished up as No. 3 rusher with 237 yards... Phoenix College transfer Tracey Pierce had a good spring and is listed ahead of untested Eric Franklin (Jr., 5-11, 190) and Keith Bowman (So., 5-9, 170)... freshman redshirt Kevin Harper (6-2, 190), was moved to fullback behind Hood to compete with Dan Josten (Sr., 5-9, 215), who carried the ball twice last year and freshman redshirt Tim Byrnes (6-0, 200).

Murphy: "This is make or break time for Franklin, and Bowman could be a Roy Lewis type...he has the ability to play wide receiver...we also have to find another dependable fullback."

WIDE RECEIVERS - The "Corpsmen" are gone (graduated James Pruitt, Corn Redick, Wade Lockett and Allen Pitts) to professional endeavors leaving only two lightly tested performers in Todd White (Jr., 6-0, 185) and John Gibbs (So., 6-0, 170), who have caught a total of four passes...freshman redshirts Mark Hill (5-11, 170), Carlos Ward (6-2, 175) and Adam McKinney (6-1, 180) will get long looks along with former quarterback Rod Gatlin (Fr., 6-3, 188) and newcomer Chris Young (So., 5-11, 178).

Murphy: "The Corpsmen certainly left a large wake...we have only the two guys as obvious replacements...we need to find some more help here, which we expected...we lost probably the best group of four receivers in the nation."

DEFENSE

LINE -The strongest part of the team... talent, depth and experience across the front five... example: loss to academic problems of two-year lettermen Carlos Adley behind three-year letterman and honorable mention All-PCAA Jim Baioa (Sr., 6-1, 240) was salved by the arrival of transfer Quinton Knight (Sr., 6-1, 255) from Sam Houston State and Pasadena City College... also available is Fullerton College transfer Frank Cozza (Jr., 6-4, 260), who can also play tackle... healthy again and raring to go at one tackle spot is Ron McLean (Sr., 6-4, 255), an All-West Coast pick in 1984 who injured a knee in third game last year... backing him up is Iron Curtain refugee and Fullerton College transfer Dan Unger (Jr., 6-5, 243)... at other spot, now called end in revised terminology, are lettermen Kelly Gogerty (Jr., 6-3, 245) and Jeff Taylor (Jr., 6-3, 235)... the outside linebacker spots (formerly called ends) are even deeper with veterans Sean Foy (Sr., 6-0, 210), Mark Chisom (Sr., 6-1, 200) and Ted Hinton (Jr., 6-2, 205) supported by lettermen George Prtichard (So, 6-0, 185) and Wade Aschbrenner (So., 6-0, 200).

Murphy: "This is the team's strength, with good depth at nose guard and the tackle spots... Aschbrenner has gotten bigger and really come on at the outside backer spot."

INSIDE LINEBACKERS - Last season's injury problems prove beneficial for 1986 with more experience returning than planned... Bryan Riggs (Sr., 6-2, 215) is the ringleader after a strong 1985 finish... he is backed up by Greg Williams (Sr., 5-11, 215) and spring game leading tackler John Lucas (So, 5-11, 223)... opposite him are force-fed youngsters Bill Bryan (So., 6-2, 220), last year's Freshman of the Year, and untested Bill Jaquish (So., 6-0, 205), Jeff Hipp (So., 6-1, 210) and Stan Bowers (Fr., 6-1, 210).

Murphy: "We have good depth here but still are lacking game experience... we look for Riggs to have a big year now that he has been through the system."

SECONDARY - The green link on the defensive side with three starters departed including All-American Mark Collins at cornerback and second-team All-PCAA pick Mike Romero at safety... two red-shirts are projected as regulars at the cornerback spots in Colorado State transfer Tyrone Pope (Jr., 5-10, 168) and Reggie Hill (Sr., 5-11, 180), who is battling sophomore James Howard (5-11, 185) for the starting role... Rolando Jarin (5-10, 195) missed most of spring ball with a shoulder injury... also in the picture are redshirt freshman Mike Wanstreet (6-0, 170) and College of the Desert transfer Tony Williams (Jr., 5-10, 170)... the lone returning starter is at free safety in the person of 4.0 student Tom Phillips (Jr., 6-3, 195), who will be backed up by letterman Trent Baker (Sr., 5-11, 195) and redshirt freshmen Jon Bell (5-11, 175) and Todd Prukop (6-4, 185)... trying to replace Romero at the strong safety spot, now called roverback, are redshirt freshmen Dupree Anderson (6-3, 180) and Mike Schaffel (6-1, 180) as well as letterman Andre Harris (Sr., 6-1, 185).

Murphy: "We have quality depth here but no game experience... Pope will really help us... Prukop has come on strong."

SPECIAL TEAMS

PLACEKICKER - Len Strandley (Sr., 5-11, 190) is the incumbent but his inconsistency last year leaves room for challenge from two candidates in squad member Tim Wharton (So., 5-9, 165) and Northern Arizona University transfer Sean Blankenship (So., 5-10, 170).

PUNTER - Jim Sirois (So., 6-3, 190) had an admirable freshman season in 1985 averaging 40.9 yards and having only one kick blocked, but it's a testimony to the potential of Kurt Bloedorn (Fr., 6-5, 200) that Sirois will have to battle to keep his job.

KICK-OFF RETURN - Fullerton ranked No. 3 in the nation last year with a 25.0 yard average and scored three touchdowns to lead the country... Calhoun is the main return man but The Corpsmen also did their share.

PUNT RETURN - Fullerton ranked No. 7 in the nation with an 11.4 yard average but both Redick and Collins have departed so new return men must be found... Pope is the leading candidate after averaging 6 yards perreturn as the No. 2 man at Colorado State for two seasons but Todd White has experience there as well.

KICK BLOCK - Ruben Lizarraga (Special Teams Player of the Year) and Collins each blocked several kicks in his now completed Titan career so new individuals must be found.

KICK-OFF - The Corpsmen were key factors covering kicks and will be missed... new NCAA rules put the ball at the 35-yard line, making this team more important than ever before... both Strandley and Wharton kicked under game conditions last year.

Murphy: "The place-kicking job is Strandley's to lose and it's a real battle for the punting job... Special teams always have been very, very important to us."

On the Road Again

Willie Nelson's hit recording of the early 1980s became the Titan football theme song as coach Gene Murphy took his team to most of the airports in the western United States. In his first six seasons, Murphy is 13-9 (14-8) at a combination of four home sites and 21-25 (22-24 with forfeit) on the road and 0-1 on a neutral site (California Bowl). The 22 home games represent only 32 per cent of his 69 total games, which included one streak of 10 consecutive road contests (last six of 1980 and first four of 1981).

But, it has been worse. In Fullerton's first five years of Division I play, the Titans played only 17 home games including just two each in 1978 and 1979. The home record was 8-9 in that period while the road mark was 9-29 (11-27 with forfeits).

The totals: 39 home games and 85 away from home in the past 11 seasons.





In boxing the expression "tale of the tape" is used to indicate the physical comparison of two boxers with the measurements of their biceps, thighs and reach among others. In Titan football, the "tale of the tape" has best been applied to gauging the team's success.

In 1984, when the Titans went 11-1 on the field (12-0 with forfeit) and gained a UPI No. 20 national ranking, serious injuries were virtually absent. Not one player had to undergo surgery during the course of the year and no regular missed more than two games in a row.

In 1985, the scales more than tipped in balance. It was the knee of the week club out of the chute as key starters went down each week beginning with tight end Robert Kent before the Montana game; quarterback Whit Brown in the Nevada, Reno contest; defensive tackle Ron McLean at Wyoming and linebacker Russ Maybury at San Jose State.

After a healthy week at Utah State, the Titans lost Rick Calhoun in the opening minutes against UNLV and then saw a host of walking wounded limp out of Bulldog Stadium in Fresno. But there was a silver lining in the cloud. Talented youngsters forced into action came through under the pressure and not only gained valuable experience for 1986 but helped rally the Titans to a 4-game winning streak that closed the season and produced a winning record at 6-5 and second place in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

In relation to the brilliant championship seasons of 1983 and 1984 it was a disappointment. But in the overall picture it was the third most successful Titan seasons ever at the Division I level.

The brightest lights shined where veterans had fallen as three freshmen right out of high school not only earned varsity letters but contributed to the winning stretch drive.

Tony Dill took over at quarterback after Kevin Jan joined Brown on the sidelines and directed all four victories, throwing 9 TD passes. Bill Bryan stepped in for Maybury at linebacker and was one of the team's top tacklers and John Smith displayed his blocking prowess as he split duty with Jim Thornton at tight end in relief of Kent.

The re-appearance of the "squirrel derby" offense brought smiles and excitement to fans in the stands and across the nation. On an FSPN national telecast at San Jose State. coach Gene Murphy opened up the bag. Wide receiver Todd White threw a bomb to fellow wide-out Corn Redick for the game's first touchdown and Redick scored minutes later on a screen pass thrown to the opposite side of the field from where he originally had lined up. An attempted pass to placekicker Len Strandley was foiled by an alert defensive lineman who tackled Strandley as he was trying to sneak through the line of scrimmage.

Plain old-fashioned hard-hitting and blazing speed produced one of the nation's top kick return games. Rick Calhoun set school and PCAA records as he twice ran back kickoffs for touchdowns and Wade Lockett did the same with the opening boot of the game at Fresno State. Opponents did their best to punt away from Redick but then paid for their lack of caution with Mark Collins. The Titans' All-American cornerback stepped in when Redick broke his collarbone at Fresno and averaged 22 yards on seven returns including an 81-varder for a touchdown vs. Pacific.

Among the other season highlights were:

-school record of 43 points vs. a Division I opponent (Pacific).

-school record 28-point fourth quarter to rally for win over CSU Long Beach.

-representation at three post-season All-Star Games as Collins played in the East-West Shrine and North-South Senior Bowl and was joined by wide receiver James Pruitt in the Blue-Gray Classic.

-Collins become the first Titan to make the Associated Press All-American squad (second team).

-Four Titans were among the total of eight PCAA players selected in the NFL draft as Collins, Pruitt, Redick and offensive tackle Hank Goebel all went in the first eight rounds.

 Collins became the third consecutive Fullerton player to earn PCAA Defensive Player of the Year honors, following in the footsteps of nose guard Joe Aguilar and linebacker John Nevens.

-The Titans ran their winning streaks to three in a row over CSU Long Beach, Pacific, Utah State and San Jose State. Fullerton never had beaten the latter two schools prior to the recent turnaround.

-Safety Mike Romero finished in the top five in the nation in pass interceptions with 8 including a TD return to clinch the victory over Long Beach and deny 49ers star Doug Gaynor an NCAA pass completion percentage record.

A "Hail Mary" pass was answered and the University of Montana spoiled the 1985 season opener for the Titans with a dramatic 31-30 win in the cold and drizzle of Missoula.

Fullerton had overcome a 10-point third-quarter deficit on a 100-yard kick-off return by Rick Calhoun and Wade Lockett's 13-yard TD run on a reverse but the Titans failed to put away the Grizzlies when a PAT kick was wide and they got only a field goal out of two turnovers deep in Montana territory.

Down 30-24 with about 3 minutes to play, the Grizzlies made two first downs but a fourth down and 23 from their own 42 with only seconds remaining left them desperate. But QB Brent Pease threw a 48yard bomb to Mike Rice and then an 11-yard TD pass to Terry White to tie the game with eight seconds to play. Eby Dobson kicked the PAT for the win.

Burness Scott ran for what would be a career high 133 yards and Calhoun added 82 but it was not enough as the Titans failed to complete a pass in the second half and threw for only 53 yards in the game.

The memories of an unbeaten home season in 1984 disappeared quickly as a strong Nevada-Reno team, which would go on to the Division I-AA semifinals, dominated the Titans, 30-3.

Fullerton had an early opportunity when Mike Romero intercepted Eric Beavers at the UNR 14-yard line but Kevin Jan was intercepted on the next play by Tony Hunter and the Titans were never in the game again.

UNR took a 16-0 halftime lead and scored on its first possession of the second half to decide the issue. Fullerton needed a 52-yard field goal by Len Strandley to get on the board. Whit Brown replaced Jan at quarterback in the second half and had the Titans moving before he went down with a seasonending knee injury.

Ironically, Reno has lost to Fullerton only once in Southern California but never has beaten the Titans in Reno.

Two Doug Allen TD passes put San Jose back in the lead at 15-14 before Kevin Jan hit Wade Lockett with a 19-yard scoring pass for a Titan lead that held up despite a San Jose State field goal. Mike Romero's interception at the Fullerton 41 with 26 seconds to play finally sealed the win, the Titans' third in a row over the Spartans after nine successive losses.

Utah State jumped to a 14-0 lead on two short touchdown drives but Aggies' return man Willie Clark negated that. First, he fumbled Jim Sirois' long punt and Kelly Ross grabbed the ball in mid-air in the end zone for a TD. Clark then fumbled the ensuing kick-off at the Aggies' 19 and the Titans scored in three plays. Botched PAT tries left Fullerton down 14-12 and it became 17-12 before the half as a 6I-yard punt return set up a field goal.

The lead changed hands three times in the third quarter on big offensive plays staged around two fake field goals by the Titans — one worked but the second didn't. Even a field goal that was good produced controversy. The Titans refused a penalty for a first down on the Aggies' 3-yard line to accept 3 points that produced only a 29-23 lead, which proved vulnerable as the Aggies drove 64 yards in 10 plays for a TD and PAT for a 30-29 lead.

But Kevin Jan drove the Titans 54 yards in the closing seconds and Len Strandley kicked a 39-yard field goal for the win, secured only after a 61-yard FG try by Utah State at the gun.

But two sacks and a penalty forced Fullerton to kick a 43-yard field goal. Out of the PCAA championship race for the first time in three years, the Titans set their sights on finishing with a winning record - an accomplishment which would require a four-game winning streak beginning with the hungry New Mexico State

With Kevin Jan out for the year due to injuries, it was left to freshman guarterback Tony Dill to direct the offense, which had failed to score a touchdown in the two previous games. A Bryan Riggs pass interception set up a 31-vard drive to a Rick Calhoun touchdown run and, when the Aggies countered with a touchdown. Calhoun got it right back by returning a kick-off 98 vards.

But the Aggies came back again in the third quarter to tie the game and then they took the lead as a Burness Scott fumble led to Andy Weiler's 51-yard field

Dill responded immediately, throwing a perfect 67yard bomb to James Pruitt for what proved to be the final score. The defense had to rise to the occasion in the final two minutes after an ill-advised pass by the freshman was intercepted at mid-field.

Any thoughts Gaynor had of retaliating were smashed immediately when Mike Romero picked off a pass and went 35 yards for a clinching touchdown. Romero intercepted Gaynor again in the final seconds to deny him the NCAA single season pass completion percentage record.

The season finale was played like a championship game as the Titans sought a winning season and the Tigers tried to even their mark at .500.

Fullerton had its best first quarter of the Gene Murphy era, jumping out to a 22-0 lead, but the Tigers clawed back immediately by sandwiching a pair of second-quarter TDs around a Mark Hood fumble. A 59-yard bomb from Tony Dill to Allen Pitts extended the Fullerton lead to 29-14 but a low snap on a Titan punt handed Pacific a field goal and some momentum just before the half.

The Tigers rolled a pair of sixes after intermission to take a 30-29 lead but Dill engineered an 80-yard TD drive culminated by a 5-yard pass to James Pruitt. It took another touchdown, set up by Mark Collins' third pass interception in his final game as a Titan, to secure the win as the Tigers scored with two minutes to play before failing on an attempted on-sides kick.

The Cal State Fullerton football offices are located in "Football House," a rehabilitated structure located on the north side of Gym Drive, northeast of the gymnasium and physical education building.

The brick building is reputedly the second oldest existing residence in the city of Fullerton — built in 1856 on one of the citrus orchards which covered the land now occupied by the campus. The remodeling project was conducted by coach Gene Murphy and his original staff with virtually all volunteer labor and donated materials.

Titans in the Professional Ranks

The growth and development of the Fullerton football program can be seen quite graphically in the output of players into the professional ranks in the past few seasons. As many or more Titans were selected by the NFL in each of the past two drafts (3 in 1985 and 4 in 1986) as were picked in all the previous years combined.

The zenith was reached in May with four Titans going in the first eight rounds. Cornerback Mark Collins went to the New York Giants on the 2nd round; wide receivers James Pruitt (Miami) and Corn Redick (Philadelphia) on the 4th and 7th rounds, respectively; and offensive tackle Hank Goebel to the Rams on the 8th round.

Actually, the 1985 crop might have been larger had the USFL not signed linebacker John Nevens and fullback Todd Gerhart prior to the NFL draft.

Santa Ana Stadium



Cal State Fullerton football returns for a third consecutive season to Santa Ana Stadium — commonly known in its glorious history as Santa Ana Bowl.

Officially named "Eddie West Field - Santa Ana Stadium," the 12,000-seat facility served as the Titans' home during portions of the 1971 through 1975 seasons while Fullerton was alternating home dates with Anaheim Stadium. In 1984 the Titans returned on a "temporary permanent" basis and won all four home dates. After the 1985 season the Stadium's future was in doubt with approval of plans to raze it to make room for The Westdome, an NBA-size multi-purpose arena. But city fathers changed their minds and are looking elsewhere in the city for a construction site.

Located at 602 N. Flower St. between Sixth and Civic Center Drive in central Santa Ana, the "Bowl" is only nine miles south of the Cal State Fullerton campus and it boasts tradition as one of the finest stadium sites in Orange County. It was dedicated on Apr. 27, 1932 and has played host to a wide variety of athletic and entertainment events while undergoing numerous facelifts and remodelings. It is the home field for Santa Ana (Rancho Santiago) College and all Santa Ana High Schools.

The current structure was built in 1963. It was re-dedicated in 1981 in memory of Eddie West, long-time sports editor of the Santa Ana (now Orange County) Register.

The two-tiered, enclosed press box can handle two radio play-by-play crews in separate booths, numerous film crews on the roof and approximately 30 writers and statisticians on the lower level. The expected press box phone number is **(714)** 550-9321.

Home Field History

The need for a permanent on-campus facility was never more obvious than in 1983 when the Titans were forced to move the playing site of two of their three home games on 24 and 4 hours' notice, respectively, due to "rain clauses" in their Anaheim Stadium contract.
