Beaumont began the Town Hall by



Villager skates to benefit local foster children



While many of us stroll along Leisure Village Drive or walk across the golf course, Villager Barbara Thorne is gliding, waltzing, and nearly flying with grace and beauty across an ice rink in Oxnard. She is ice dancing with her partner or teaching ice skating to youngsters. The joyful expression on her face says it all. "Skating has always been a love of mine," she explains with a smile. Which is why this wife, mother, grandmother, retired flight attendant and competitive paddle tennis player also spends dozens of hours every month practicing, teaching and enjoying time on the ice.

Barbara's passion for skating emerged when she was 5 and slipped into a pair of skates. Her family lived in Norway for a year (her father was a visiting professor there), a good location to learn skills and have fun on ice. However, she's quick to clarify the scene, "Most skaters don't learn on ponds. We learn on rinks." And she did – at home and abroad. Ice skating became her favorite form of exercise. It still is.

It wasn't until she was married and living in Florida that she decided she wanted to learn ice dancing. The sport is over a hundred years old, but it wasn't included in the Olympics until 1976. An easy – and simplistic – definition is that it's what Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers did – only on ice. It's a combination of figure skating and ballroom dancing with rigorous attention to the rhythm of the music. "It's a tough sport. You have to be in very good shape," says Thorne. And you need a partner.

Thorne had (and still has) a life partner, retired Eastern Airlines pilot John Thorne; he prefers golf courses to ice rinks. Her skating partner is Pieter Cutcher, a Ventura resident whom she met on an LA rink over 20 years ago. They skate regularly, they have a coach, and although a modest Barbara won't admit it, they do look like Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers on ice. "There's nothing better than skating," she adds.

Which is what led her into teaching this rigorous and graceful sport to children.

FEMA ups the flood insurance ante

Villagers who have flood insurance are noticing a new wrinkle in their premiums: an annual surcharge has been added to the bill by FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The new fee applies to policies nationwide, the result of legislation passed last year, which went into effect on April 1, 2015.

The law requires that owners and renters of primary residenc-

es who are required to carry flood insurance will pay an annual surcharge of \$25. The new fee applies to single-family and individual condominium units.

A surcharge of \$250 per year has been levied on those who own non-primary residences, either single-family or individual condominiums. More details can be found at www.fema.gov/flood-in-surance-reform-rates-and-refunds

This Kikuyu could drive us krazy

When Villager Rob Sollett, Chair of publicity for the Men's Golf Club, sent ILV graphic evidence of the frustration facing golfers who tangle with deep-rooted Kikuyugrass, he turned to his roots, photojournalism. His proof is an innocent little golf ball on the 8th fairway, delicately resting atop our version of the Saragasso Sea, an entanglement from hell.

It is the hated, unwanted Kikuyugrass, heavy eater into our landscape budget and an on-going threat to the casual golfer unprepared for the possibility his club could be yanked right out of his hands, worse he or she could be tripped by its thatch (growing over itself) which Kikuyu does more than any other grass.

For years, the Village has spent hundreds of thousands of dollars and untold man hours trying to eradicate Kikuyugrass only to learn it might be better named, "Vampire Grass." For the grim truth seems to be that short of driving a stake through the heart of every root, and there are millions, and they go deep (the deepest and most invasive of all the grasses), this "noxious weed" (another name it's given) continues to be an expensive pain in our landscaping budget.

About 8 years ago, we faced the Kikuyugrass truth summed up in a Golf Course Management article (Learning to Love Kikuyugrass, August, 2001) telling of the expensive and disciplined chemical assault that's required, only to conclude: "....but many repeated applications are necessary. And under the right growing conditions the kikuyugrass is never eradicated—only temporarily set back."

Today, many golf courses (i.e., Mesa Verde, Hillcrest and Riviera, etc.) are spending what it takes to manage Kikuyugrass. As with so much, the bottom line that divides them from us is that they have the deeper pockets.

Our Landscape Superintendent Mike Undem knows both sides of the story and realizes that economics dictate that we stick with the eradication program—it is cheaper than any alternative.

The sad truth is, even when Kikuyugrass is down to its last roots, going deadlooking with the seasons, or after the last chemical spray, don't believe it-soon, its ugly tentacles will be reaching out to ensnare yet another unsuspecting golfer's handicap.



Barbara hopes that lots of LV friends come out to the holiday show to support a good cause and to watch her joy on ice.


achieving a consensus on the format to be used (questions from the audience) quickly followed by defusing what was arguably the most explosive subject; the apparent shift of responsibility for roofs and exterior wall maintenance from the association to the homeowner. Mr. Beaumont stated that that was a clerical mistake by his firm. Questions regarding that issue continued to be raised and were addressed by both Mr. Beaumont and Bob Schaeffer.

Other comments and questions centered around quorums and definitions of legal terms. But, unquestionably the remaining hot issue for the homeowners was insurance. A number of owners questioned the addition of insurance requirements required of the owners in addition to that carried by the association. Mr. Beaumont stated that requiring homeowners to insure the interior of their homes and to carry such coverages as Loss Of Use, would lower the Association's premiums by having another insurance carrier available to assume some of the costs. No economic analyses were provided, nor was it promised.

The Board stated that this Town Hall was just the beginning of the process. Comments received and accepted would be incorporated into the documents and recirculated with all changes clearly marked prior to submission for a vote. The question of another Town Hall was not answered pending the receipt of comments. Homeowners were urged to review the documents, watch the replay of the meeting on LVTV and to submit comments, corrections and questions to: townhall@leisurevillage. org.

As of press time, no schedule for further discussion has been set, but it is expected that the comment period will remain open at least into November.

Board President Lin Grant presented a plaque of appreciation to General Manager Bob Scheaffer, recognizing his efforts as project manager that went "above and beyond his duties as a GM." He, in turn, saluted the Leisure Village employees who put aside their usual duties and worked full-time (sometimes on Saturdays) on the Fitness Center and the rebuilt bathrooms. The traditional ribbon cutting ended with a non-traditional dunking in the new pool for Scheaffer, Grant, and Board member Patrick Price.

The project spanned six different Boards of Directors. 
