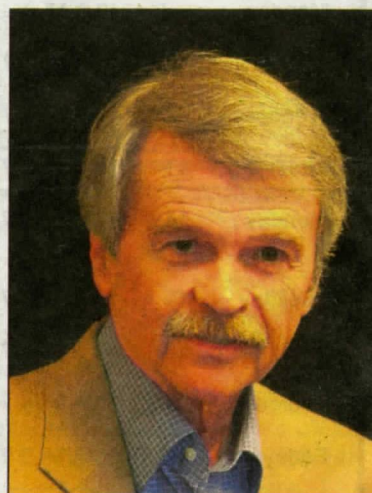

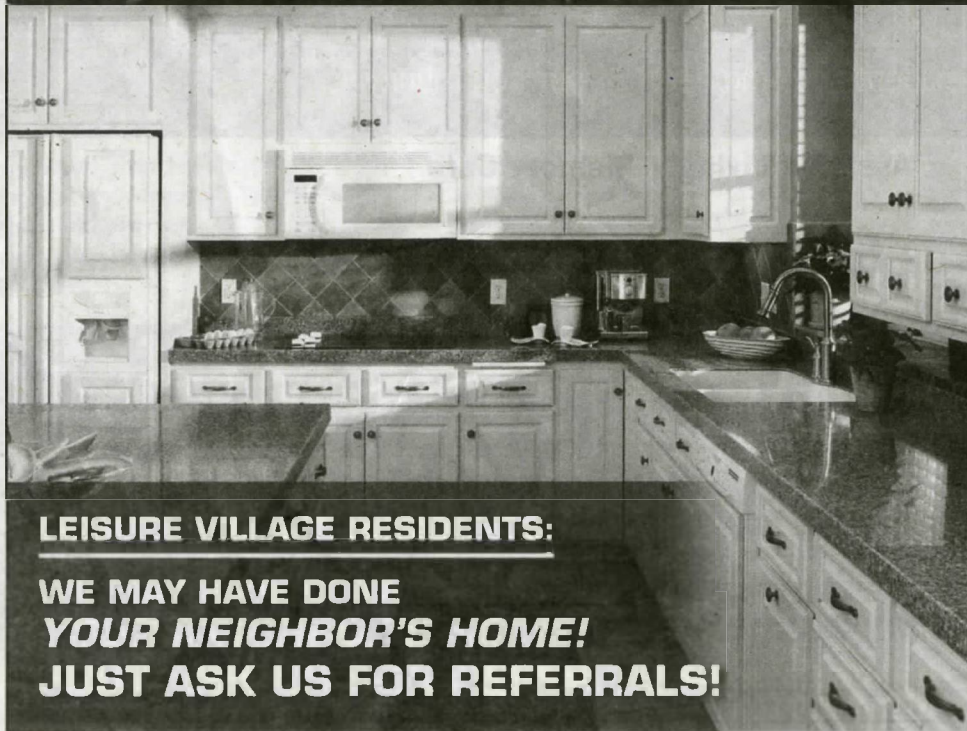

A peek at Oxnard's history

The area surrounding Oxnard was first occupied by Chumash Native Americans. Spanish explorer Juan Rodriquez Cabrillo claimed it for Spain in 1542. This was known as the Mission Period.

Ranching became the main focus among Americans when California became a state in 1850. Most farmers were cultivating barley and lima beans.

Three Oxnard brothers, Benjamin, James and Robert, operated a sugar beet factory in Chino and decided to expand. The three brothers built a \$2 million factory on the plain in 1899, and the operation was in effect until October 1959.

The Oxnard brothers had planned to name the town after the Greek word for "sugar" — "zachari" — but frustrated by bureaucracy and the inability for most people to pronounce it, they named it after themselves. Hence, "Not just another pretty name" got its start.

Oxnard was incorporated as a California city on June 30, 1903, and the public library was opened in 1907, one of only three libraries west of the Mississippi River financed by Andrew Carnegie.

Just prior to World War II, Point Mugu and Port Hueneme naval bases were established to take advantage of the only navigable port on California's coast between Los Angeles and San Francisco Bay, which led to the development of the defense-based aerospace and communication industries.

In the mid-20th century, the town developed the areas outside downtown with homes, industry, retail and a new harbor named Channel Islands. Martin "Bud" Smith became the most influential developer in the history of Oxnard. Of note are the Colonial House Restaurant, the Wagon Wheel Junction, Topa Financial Center, Channel Islands Harbor, Esplanade and Carriage Square Shopping Center and much, much more.

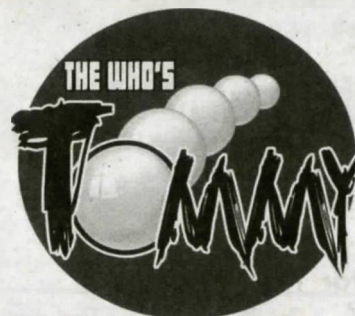

WHAT'S COOKIN' IN THE VILLAGE

Deviled eggs perfect for spring, summer potlucks, barbecues

Deviled eggs and daffodils make a great combination at this time of year, as both signal spring and a time of renewal.

My mother-in-law, Gudi Amerikaner (Village 32), brings her deviled eggs to every family gathering. They are always gobbled up as if we haven't eaten in months!

On the Internet are more than 200,000 deviled egg recipes! Purists, like our family matriarch Gudi, uses a simple, classic recipe infused with mayonnaise, seasoning and mild mustard.

Here is a fool-proof way to hard-boil the eggs to ready them for "easy deviling." Place your eggs in a pot of cold water to cover. Do not cover pot. Bring them to a full boil. Remove them immediately from the heat, cover tightly and let sit for exactly 20 minutes. Rinse with cold water as you easily peel them perfectly! Slice the eggs in half. Remove the yolks, and mash them in a shallow bowl. Now comes the fun.

You can stay simple or "think out of the box." For example, try including flavors of curry with Indian chutney, Italian chopped sun-dried tomatoes, pesto, bacon or Greek feta and chopped olives. If you really like it hot, go for additions of spicy salsa, wasabi or spicy jerk seasoning. The tops can be garnished with paprika, cheese or crabmeat to match the fillings.

If you like Buffalo Chicken Wings, try adding some blue cheese and

bottled Buffalo Chicken Sauce to the yolk/mayo mixture. Garnish tops with shredded cooked chicken.

Fillings can easily be added using a pastry bag with a fancy tip or simply a plastic bag with a slit on the bottom. Always, cover lightly and refrigerate before serving.

If you don't have one of those clever deviled egg plates, make a little slice on the bottom of each white so they won't slip off your serving plate.

Here's a basic recipe that you may use as is or add on some of the ideas suggested above for an egg-citing spring delight. Whether simple or fancy, deviled eggs are always a hit.

DEVILED DELIGHTS

6 hard-cooked eggs, peeled, cut in half and yolks mashed in a bowl
 1/4 cup mayonnaise
 1 1/2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
 1 Tablespoon finely chopped Italian flat parsley
 1/2 teaspoon finely chopped fresh dill
 2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh chives
 Salt & pepper to taste
 Fresh sprigs of parsley leaves for garnish

Combine the mashed yolks with the mayonnaise and lemon juice. Stir in the finely chopped herbs. Taste and then season with the salt and pepper. Fill the whites evenly with the mixture and garnish each with a whole parsley leaf. Makes 12.

Supportive friends can be like our family

There are millions of people who feel lonely every day, many for good reason. They may be separated from their loved ones, or their family may have moved away. A few, by choice, isolate themselves in order to find some inner peace.

Some opt out of their families due to abuse or neglect. It is an act of self-preservation, but it's still hard and lonely. If life has forced you to walk away from your family, take heart. You are not alone.

By asking nonthreatening questions, you can show an interest in someone you are trying to get to know. You can share your thoughts and opinions on movies, books and newspaper columns, or experience a new restaurant together. When you create a family of friends, know these are the people you have chosen to be in your circle. Do everything you can to honor their participation, and you will find solace in their presence. Remember, you have to be a friend to make a friend.

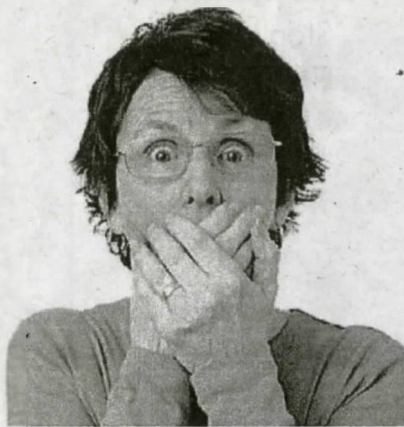

back off and wait until irate residents realize, "I'm just doing my job."

Karen and Paul's importance to all of us is greater than any title may suggest. After the individual homeowner, Snethen and Dumas are Leisure Village's last and most critical line of defense in maintaining the Architectural and Landscape controls required by the Association's Rules & Regulations and, in turn, overall property value.

Bob McQuivey, president of the Board of Directors, says, "(Snethen and Dumas) have the toughest jobs in the Village, especially Paul."

That's because Paul is our "enforcer." He tells a homeowner when a residence is in violation of an architectural or landscaping regulation and must be brought into compliance. It is news nobody welcomes. But, since the messenger is usually blamed for the message and, usually, the message means the homeowner is going to pay a little or a lot to fix the problem or face Village enforcement, Paul becomes the bad guy.

Equally concerned with compliance, Karen focuses more on property being bought and sold, seeing that repairs are made and changing architectural and landscaping guidelines are enforced. She is especially vigilant with rental property. That's because some absentee landlords have to be reminded that just because they don't live here, their responsibility is as important as if they did. That means Karen knows more about the condition, before and after, of each of our 2,136 separate residences than just anybody else — well, maybe Paul runs a close second.

"We're not looking to cause trouble for any resident," the two agree, "But our job is to protect the aesthetic beauty and overall property values, and that often calls for enforcing the rules."

Almost daily, Snethen and Dumas traverse this or that Village, clipboards and tape measures in hand, checking everything from a lowly bush to dry-rot, or termite infested wood fences or roof beams. Much of what they deal with is directed to them by Building & Grounds volunteers.

The volunteers visually inspect assigned Villages, turning over problems they find to Snethen and Dumas, who then take it to the homeowner.

Since Paul is often the most visible sign of the Village's inherent right to control the exteriors of all the residences, he gets the heat. Many plead ignorance of the rules, which are clearly spelled out in the phone book and in the CC&Rs, that massive packet of paper we acknowledged but may not have read thoroughly when we signed off on our escrows

or renters were told about when they signed their leases.

Karen and Paul wish all the residents understood more about the way condominiums work, which is really what our association is. Embedded in its laws are strict rules controlling what we can plant where and what we can and cannot do to the exteriors of our residences.

If all 3,000 or so Villagers knew that, Karen Snethen and Paul Dumas would probably have more to smile about.

is seeking reelection.

Bob McQuivey, chair of the Nominating Committee, explained the format and introduced the candidates along with Joseph Benti, the evening's moderator.

The format called for the candidates to speak to the questions

and whatever issues they may raise, but they were not allowed to engage in personal attacks, either to one another or others in the Village.

Some 43 written questions were directed to a specific candidate or to all the candidates from the homeowners. However, each question could be answered by all the candidates.

Lasting approximately 90 minutes,

the meeting, which at times provided some lively exchanges, required all the skills of the moderator to maintain an orderly session. The entire program was televised live and will air several times in June on LTV for those who missed the meeting.

Ballots are already in the mail. They require a return of at least 50 percent plus one of the 2,136 homeowners to have a valid result, so

it is imperative that all homeowners return their ballots by mail or to the Recreation Center or Administration Office. Any ballots that do not follow the specific directions will be declared invalid.

Results will be announced at the association's annual meeting June 24, which will be followed immediately by a brief, first meeting of the new Board of Directors to elect its officers.

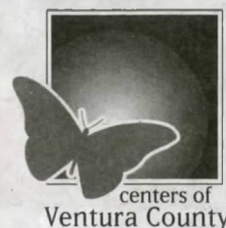

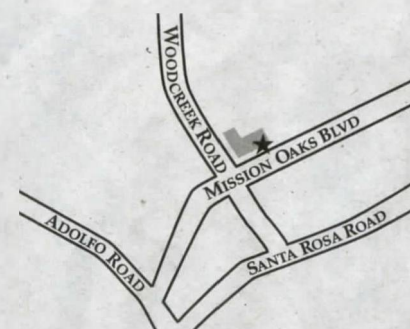

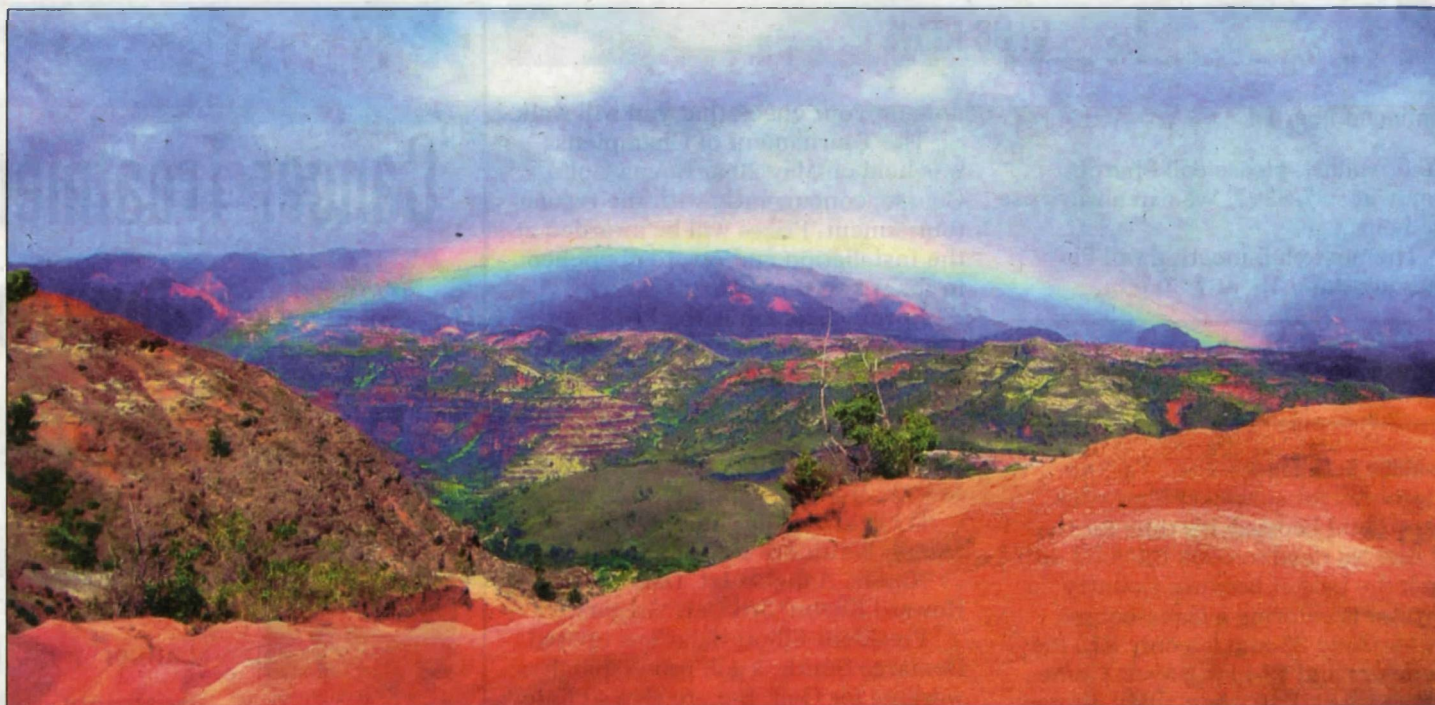
The Camera Club was fortunate to have John Mayer step up as judge during the absence of our professional photographer for our May competition. It was a daunting task to critique 72 pictures.

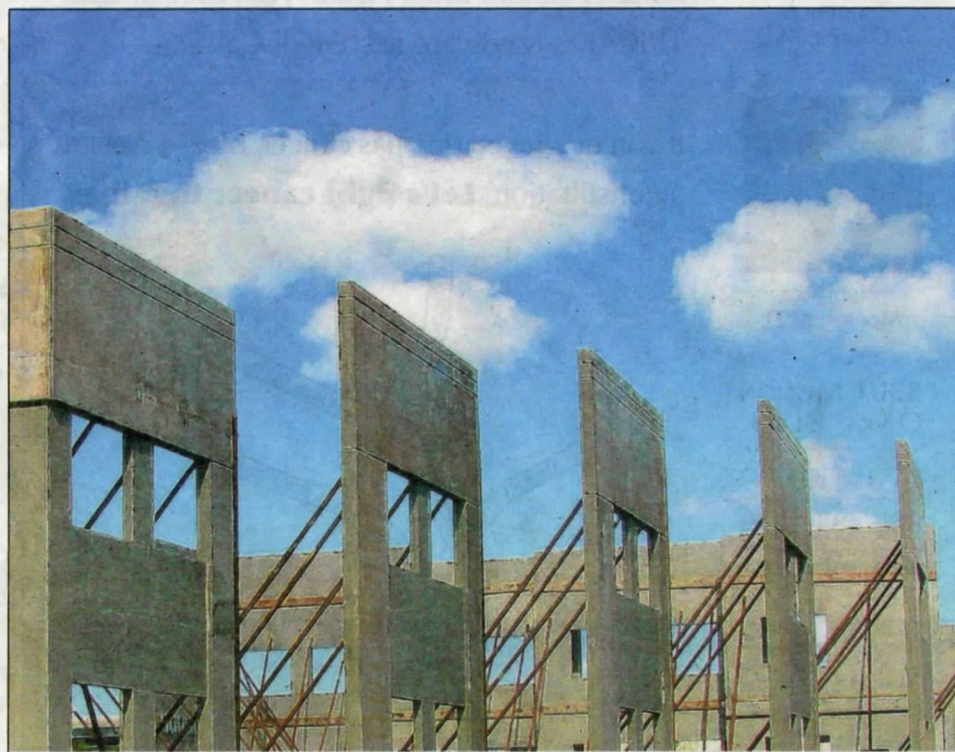

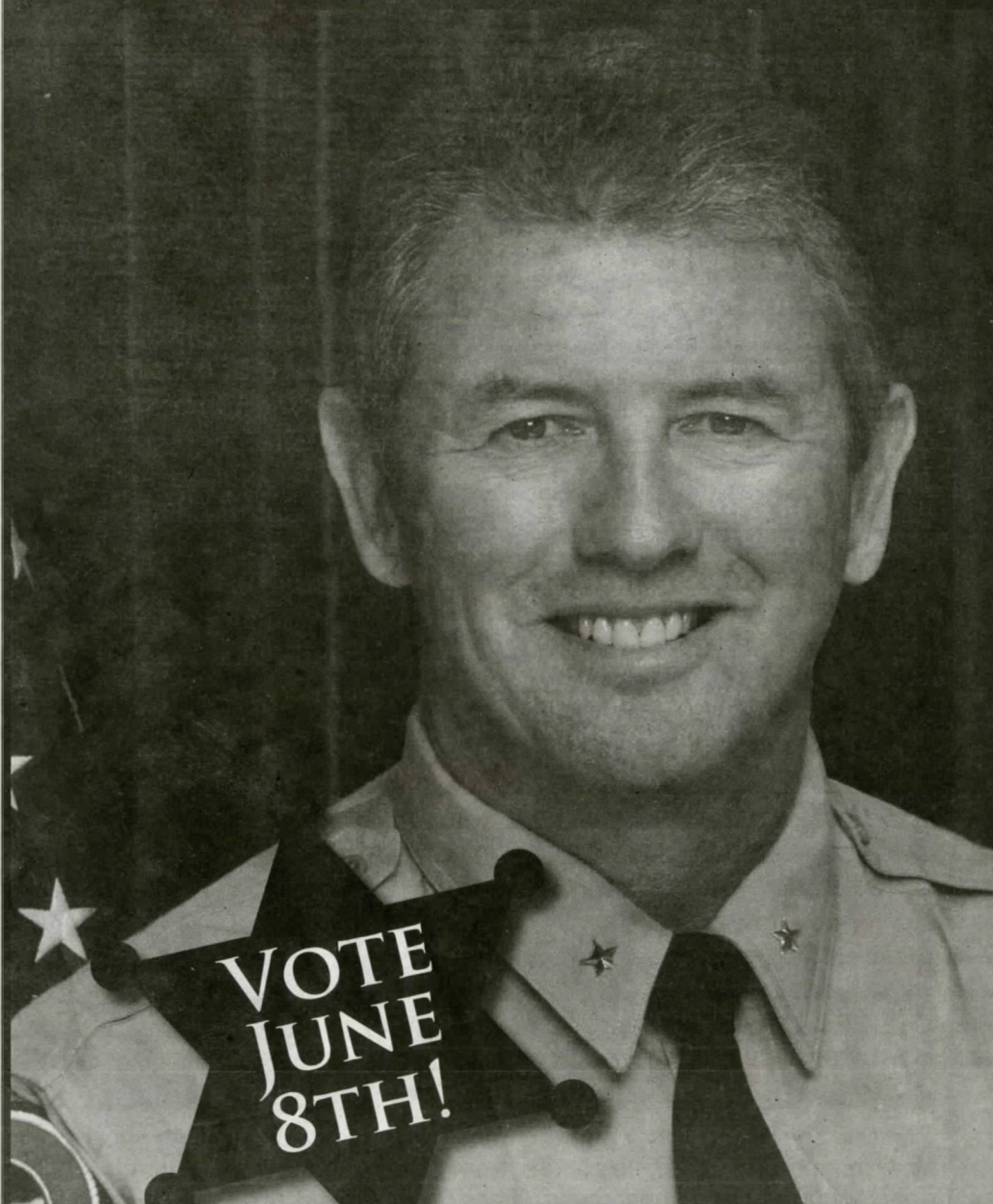
More than 70 autos on display at Car Show

And I didn't see my folks again.

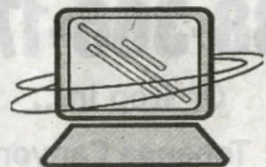
