There have been orange cones and signs saying NO PARKING where the work is being done, and, worst of all, power outages which lasted most of a day. What is going on, you say?

Southern California Edison is conducting a new process on our power lines to extend their life. As our power grid ages to more than 40 years old, the likelihood is that water intrusion or other factors could cause a major power outage lasting several days. SCE is injecting silicone into our feed lines to resist moisture and extend the life of the cable. While the outages are inconvenient right now, they are much better than a major outage impacting much of the community. Call it a short term sacrifice for a long term gain!

I think you will find this edition most interesting. A lot is happening in Leisure Village and we are fortunate to be able to report the events to you. Enjoy!

LVTV SERIES ASKS, "ARE YOU READY?"

■ Television series produced just for Villagers.

A new video series produced by LV's Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) poses the question, "When Disaster Strikes, Will You Be Ready?" The nine short episodes then provide some answers. It takes viewers through the steps necessary for self-preparedness when a disaster – like a massive earthquake – strikes. According to EPC Co-Chairmen Ron Franz and Paul Wason, "We want to get your attention; your life may depend on it."

The series is the EPC's effort to reach Village residents who, emergency professionals agree, could be

very vulnerable in a disaster. Franz says, "Too many residents are complacent or want to be left alone, and many assume our security force will take care of us. They couldn't be more wrong! We will be on our own for as long as three to five days."

During a major disaster, many LV Security staff may not be available. The Ventura County Sheriff's Department and Fire Department personnel won't get to Leisure Village for days. VC Fire Captain Pat Kelley estimates that "It could be at least 72 hours before we can assist Villagers." That's why the EPC decided to produce the series: to show residents a plan of action for their safety and survival.

Remembering the Vietnam War

As attention grows for the upcoming Ken Burns' TV series "Vietnam," the subject evokes memories for Villagers who experienced the war firsthand.

Patrick Price was 21 years old when he arrived in South Vietnam, assigned to River Patrol Boats, which placed him in rural areas of small towns and small farms in the Mekong Delta. "The first day at my base I said to myself, 'We shouldn't be here. Those poor people did not want a war.' They had nothing to do with the politics of Saigon or the Viet Cong. The U.S. was propping up the South Vietnamese government and we were enforcing it." Patrick served a full year, often witnessing horrors and required to do things he would never have considered before. "We saw young Viet Cong, almost kids, bound with wire being 'interrogated.' Firefights were indescribable. We tried to protect these people. I feel

the spread of so-called Communism had to be stopped before it became too powerful, which ironically, we did. But it's too bad it had to be done this way." Patrick served his year and came home with PTSD. He says healing from his war experiences took a long time and is ongoing.

Brenda Cheatham moved to Saigon in 1967. Her husband Tom was a reporter for United Press International assigned to cover the Vietnam War. He was often away on the front





New "Bowtie in the Sky" Could Save Lives

Look up next time you walk by the Farmers Garden; a new forty-foot tower soars gracefully above you: a unique emergency system that can communicate nearly worldwide in the midst of a disaster. "Now we can transmit and receive critical messages to government agencies, official rescue organizations, and to concerned family and friends across the globe," explains Jonathan Fox, the president of LV's Amateur Radio Club. He's describing that "Bowtie in the Sky" just north of the picnic area. It is a 21st century voice in case of a massive earthquake, a flood, or unforeseen attack. "Right away, we can tell the world how the Village fared in the disaster," he explains.

The tower is one of only three similar emergency devices in the County. When Ventura County officials declare a crisis, this tower manned by skilled LV residents will swing (literally and figuratively) into action. "We will report on local conditions. We can relay disaster information when other agencies can't." The reach of the LV Tower is "virtually anywhere," says Fox. That "bowtie" is a rotating antenna, sending and receiving information and messages in any direction, be it Sacramento or Boston or London.

The tower and antenna belong to the Amateur Radio Club. The cost of \$10,400 came from donations by residents and clubs. It took five years from idea to reality, primarily because the City of Camarillo was slow to appreciate its value and provide a needed permit at a reasonable cost. "At first, the City told us a permit would require their oversight and cost \$7200," Fox recalls. "But the Radio Club didn't give up, and finally this year, we got the permit approved for \$197."

In a disaster, the fifteen members

of the Radio Club will be working from the Ham Shack, communicating vital emergency information to local, state, and national groups. It also plans to create a system by which Villagers can send an "I am OK" message to family or a friend. That "Bowtie" email list will be gathered later in the fall.

All residents will be invited to take a closer look at this unusual addition to the Village at an Open House to be held this fall. In the meantime, the club is making the final connections. For a preview, just look up and head for the Bowtie.

Additionally, information will be available regarding classes for both paddle tennis and pickleball. 

lines for days, while Brenda worked for the U.S. Navy and enjoyed the city that had been known as the "Paris of the Orient." "I never felt like we were in danger," she recalls. "We were told that Saigon was safe and secure." But within months, she began to sense a change.

Tom's stories were monitored by the U.S. military, the South Vietnamese, and the Viet Cong. Brenda, who volunteered at a Vietnamese orphanage, saw many parents sending their children there for safety. And then came the Tet Offensive, January 31, 1968.

Tet—marking the lunar New Year—was the biggest holiday of the year, complete with the city decorated with thousands of beautiful plants, strings of lights and firecrackers. Brenda and Tom went to sleep that night to what they thought were fireworks. But the next morning, the city was silent, the streets empty, except for U.S. soldiers ordering people "Go back inside." Saigon had been attacked. The Viet Cong had surrounded Saigon. "We realized then what the war really was," Brenda says. "And the terrible damage being done to the country."

Because Brenda was pregnant, she was able to relocate to Hong Kong. In July, Tom was assigned to New York, and the family returned to the U.S. Brenda says her Vietnam experience "made me a more discerning and skeptical person. Now when I hear

five minutes or less. They cover topics including how to safeguard your home and how to protect yourself during a disaster. Professional videographer and Villager Ken Walker videotaped and edited the series with assistance from EPC leaders Paul Wason and Ron Franz and LVTV Chairman John Mayer. "The series is what self-preparedness

about other wars – like Afghanistan – I react slowly with caution."

Villager Gregg Gillmar served in Vietnam in 1969. He was assigned to "PSYOPS" (Psychological Operations) on the front lines. "We flew in small, single-engine planes over the Vietnamese – soldiers and civilians - with loudspeakers blasting music and messages like "Surrender or die; if you surrender, we'll give you safe passage" to the South Vietnamese below us," he says ruefully. Then he adds quietly, "Many did surrender. But when they didn't, in came the napalm. What we saw was not always what was reported." Gregg remembers how distressing his tour of duty was. "The U.S. didn't seem to be putting up the effort. We had everything to win except the political will to win." He was never wounded. After that grueling year of war, he returned gratefully to his family.

is all about," Franz says.

LVTV will air the EPC series throughout September. A schedule for the broadcasts can be found on page two. The EPC is reaching out to all LV residents in order to make self-preparedness a personal goal, Franz explains. He also hopes the video can underscore the important work of the committee, so that new volunteers will join the EPC in keeping Leisure Village residents as safe as possible.

OH, RATS!

■ Protect your home from these unwelcome visitors

Let's start with a quiz: can we feed wild birds and animals anywhere in the Village, including our patios? NO! (Article 19.20 Rules & Regulations).

Question #2: if you want to keep rats out of your home, let's say with wire mesh over the heat vent from your dryer or a hole in an air vent, what size mesh should you use? Before you answer, here's a big clue: the mesh openings should be smaller, say, than a garage door left open anywhere from two inches to two feet, or more—rats flow in along with the air. FYI, we have two kinds of healthy, well-fed rats: the small, cute roof rats, look like big mice, and the bigger, tougher looking, Norway variety. Both can survive when and

where humans cannot and they can produce up to two dozen offspring a year.

Question #3, what happens when you break the rules and put out birdseed, pet food, leftover pizza, any food, on your patio? Simple: the rats will come, many and often, and they might take up residence in your residence! Like us, they like nice temperate weather and free, plentiful food. By the way, look for snail shells and rat droppings in or around your car's battery, that's another residence rats really like for dessert, they feast on the wire covering of your electrical system.

Our problem begins with our good nature: we are beguiled by birds, rabbits and equally attractive squirrels (cuter than rats and possessed of bushy tails) that are not garbage eaters or disease carriers. That must be why so many residents disregard the rules to feed rabbits,



COOKING WITH LARRY

Looks Like it's Potluck Time Again

So many of us here at Leisure Village get invited or chose to attend a pot luck. We've talked before about easy, tasty and different dishes to take to a pot luck. One thing you want to make sure to attend to is the heat element. If it is an outdoor event and the dishes are not covered from the sun, you want to stay away from mayonnaise preparations. Also, if the dish is better served hot, you don't want it to sit for a while and get cold (unless you have a heating tray, this is a concern). Here is a quick and easy dish that fits the bill. I made it with a relatively healthy lower fat, very flavorful fresh homemade Italian spicy turkey sausage from Whole Foods, but you could also use Trader Joes pre-cooked.

For eight people: Two whole sweet onion, two red pepper, two green peppers, olive oil, four sausages and some chopped Italian parsley for garnish. These are easy numbers to adapt for less or more people... your math lesson for today.

Start by slicing the onion into ¼" slices. De-rib the peppers and slice into 1/8" slices. Dump it all into a sauce pan with about four tablespoons of oil. Add more if required. Sauté over medium heat until the onions are translucent and the peppers slightly brown. Remove from pan.

Add the four whole sausages uncut. Brown over medium heat until firm. Poke with a toothpick to check for doneness. When done, take them out of the pan, cut in half add them back to the pan with the onions and peppers. You don't need salt, pepper or any other seasonings. The reason you prep the dish this way is that the sausages are raw

and should be cooked before they touch the vegetables. If you are using already cooked sausages, you can cook all the ingredients together. Serve on a nice large platter and sprinkle with chopped Italian parsley and serve with a crusty Italian role.

The inventory (number of properties available) of homes for sale is unusually low in Southern California. In many cases, this is creating a buying competition for our 2136 homes in Leisure Village. At the time of this writing, there were only eight houses actively for sale in Leisure Village. That represents less than one-half of one percent. This is not unprecedented, but quite unusual. The extremely low inventory has been that way for some time now, which has driven up selling prices at a rapid pace and days on market to a minimum. The rental market in Leisure Village is also very strained. We receive many calls per week regarding availability of rentals when there are little or none available. This too has increased rental costs significantly.

With these elevated sales prices and interest rates at near record lows, the real estate market continues to be a strong seller's market with no anticipated change in the foreseeable future.

Food Allergies: Detection and Management for Seniors

What Are Food Allergies?

It can be easy to confuse food intolerance for a food allergy. The former primarily involves the digestive system and its inability to properly break down certain foods. Reactions from a food allergy can be much more serious, and contact with even trace amounts of offensive foods can be life-threatening. Food allergies (commonly linked to foods such as peanuts, shellfish, soy, and wheat) are directly involved with the immune system..

Mild Symptoms:

- 1. Hives
- 2. Redness of the skin or eyes
- 3. Nasal congestion or sneezing *Severe Symptoms:*
- 1. Shortness of breath
- 2. Sudden drop in blood pressure
- 3. Swelling of lips, tongue, or throat

A Growing Problem

Food allergies can manifest at any point in life, and while the first appearance is not readily seen in older adults, many are still faced with symptoms due to an allergy's persistence late in life. In fact, food allergies are becoming more prevalent within the rapidly growing senior population.

Detecting a Food Allergy

If a senior is concerned about the possibility of having a food allergy, it's important to receive a diagnostic food allergy test from an allergist. Below are the most common diagnostic tests, all of which should be conducted under the supervision of allergists and other medical professionals.

Skin prick test: An allergist allows a small amount of food allergen to enter the surface of the skin on the forearm or back. If a wheal – small raised bump surrounded

by red, itchy skin – is produced, it generally indicates an allergy exists.

Blood test: This tends to be more costly than the skin prick test and is used to detect the quantity of IgE antibodies to help determine potential triggers. Though this test can yield helpful information regarding the chance of a food allergy's existence, it does not necessarily provide information on the severity of the allergy.

Oral food challenge: Known to be one of the more accurate methods of food allergy detection, this involves an allergist providing small samples of potentially offensive foods to the subject, followed by periods of observation/identification of reaction. If a reaction occurs, no more food is given.

Food elimination diet: Typically used together with skin or blood tests, this involves the elimination of potentially offensive foods from

one's diet to determine the cause of allergy symptoms, over a finite duration.

Management Is Key

If your loved ones are faced with a food allergy, it is important that they treat it seriously and take the proper precautions. Understanding which foods are offensive is naturally the first step, but it must be followed by strict, active avoidance. They should read food labels carefully and avoid any potential cross-contamination when preparing meals. However, even with the most stringent measures in place, there's always a chance that a reaction may occur. That's why, in addition to having a plan in place for such an occurrence, it is vital that your loved ones have their emergency medication with them at all times – even if they do not anticipate being around food of any kind.


