January 30th 1879.

Dear Boy-

Yours of the 19th and 22nd
were received all right - and Mother
was very much delighted with her
letter and money. she is very thin and
white - but I give her lots of Quinine
and iron and her ear is doing
nicely and she is very lively. Next
Sunday I hope to bring Emma home.
Dr Johnson said today he'd not come
again until I sent for him.
I ought to have written to you before
but I could not get time I work
all day and night until after ten
I could write then but if I turn up
the light - Mary wakes up - since
Zouisa left. I've not been able to
get a girl and as I expect Zouisa

will come back next week - 'tis
as well to get on as we are - Mary
won't go to a stranger neither will
Emma. Mother's nurse helps me a
little and Sarah (the cook) sleeps with
Emma - who feels her all over with
her feet and kicks her all night.
Mother's nurse won't sleep in the room
with mother at night - so she'll have
to get another. Pam is the same as
ever - Cwey is fat, but has a cold in his
head. The weather is very pleasant
just now. Julia's baby is looking
much better. Julia and Tom feel
more depressed about the loss of
Deanie each day. Religion has no
consolations for them and I doubt if
it would have for me - under the
circumstances - We all send you lots
of love - Hope you have the new clothes
on and that they fit well - How are
your shoes? - I've nothing but rags
to put on myself -

I must not write any more now
as I have to take Avery out
in his carriage - there is no one
else to do it - I have a very bad
cold. Hoping you are well and
making your fortune I am
