

Well yeah, OK, but we're talking about Greg Ginn the guy who founded SST Records, the guy who formed Black Flag, one of the most influential American punk bands of the late 70's and early 80's. Greg Ginn probably grinds up interviewers & spreads them on his toast for breakfast. 'Hahaha. You'll be right' says Pete, and with that the deal was done. OK. so I'm gonna do an interview with Greg Ginn. That's cool! I sat down & thought up some questions, played my Black Flag records over & over again, played some of my other favourite SST releases (Sonic Youth, Dinosaur Jr, Bad Brains), read some interviews & checked out most of the Black Flag websites I could the way. find (by http://www.ipass.net/jthrush/rollfla g.htm is a really good Black Flag website). Signing Your Life Away

I was in the studio over the weekend, having been asked to play drums for a friend's band. He mentioned that he was hoping to get signed to a major on the strength of this recording.

I'm the kind of guy who likes to shine the harsh light of reality on other people's dreams; I didn't raise the actual probability of this happening (fish in a barrel), I asked him instead why he could possibly want a recording contract. Did he think that it was some kind of gravy train; that the hard work stops as soon as you sign a piece of paper giving a big multinational the rights to your creative output?

Did he really want a glorified bank loan where any money that is given to him or spent is offset against album sales, with him owing the record company the remaining balance? Would he feel comfortable letting someone else decide how his album is going to be produced, recorded and promoted, and spending his money to do it? Did he want to have to ask his label's permission to play live, because they now own the copyright to his songs? Why is there so much ambition to a professional musician be anyway? I mean. 1 masturbating too, but I wouldn't want to have to do it for a living.

(Of course, my girlfriend disagrees with me on this. She says I would jump at the chance, but until someone hands me a towel and a fat wad of cash it remains a purely academic

speculation.)

Where did the idea come from that if you like doing something that you should try to pursue it as a career? Hollywood must have a thousand script writers who have all been responsible for putting the words "Do what you love and the money will take care of itself" in the mouth of a television guidance councillor. Unfortunately none of them really thought it through or they would have realised that no one aspires to being a guidance councillor. Follow "do what you love" through to its logical conclusion and most people would be pursuing careers that allow them to sleep and watch television all day, and there would be no one left to clean Saturday night's vomit off the train seats on a Sunday morning. What people generally mean when they say 1 m a musician" is "I'm on the dole". If they really are a professional musician, then they probably do session work recording advertising jingles or play in a cover band, which is not really the sort of job teenagers

aspire to when they are practicing their "I play guitar in a rock band" poses in their bedroom. If they're lucky enough to play in a popular original band then they might as well be in a cover band because they have to play the same songs every night anyway.

No one seems prepared to say anything nice about record companies or the industry in general. Hunter S. Thompson may have called it "a cruel and shallow money trench, a long plastic hallway where thieves and pimps run free, and good men die like dogs." but that doesn't stop people lining up for their shot at "success".

Success can be pretty narrowly defined. David Lee Roth claims that Van Halen sometimes made no money on a best-selling album after paying for studio time and shooting the video clips. At the other end of the spectrum, Ben from Screeching Weasel (a band arguably near the top of their genre, but with a little less album selling power than Van Halen) said in an interview that he was only making about \$15000 a year at the height of his bands popularity.

Personally, I can't see what is so attractive about pursuing a career where, if you're really lucky, you might make as much money as someone working at McDonalds. Any deal you get is put in the context of an infinite supply of starry-eyed youngsters willing to work for free. My friend summed up the position of so many people when he said, "I'm willing to sell out, but so far no one is interested in buying."

I told my friend everything I've just told you; "Music is just an expensive hobby. Don't sign your life away." I gave him websites to back up my argument and the bass player even joined in on my side "Isn't it supposed to be about the music. maaaan?"

Some of it must have sunk in.



USELESS ID

This interview with Useless ID's guitarist and all round nice guy Ishay was conducted just after their second Adelaide show earlier this year. We covered all the important topics = falafel, Frenzal and what personal hygiene has to do with punk...

PEE: I guess if you believe what you read then you guys owe a lot of thanx to the Ataris for breaking you into the States right?

ISHAY: Oh yea, they were the major thing what happened to us is with the Ataris putting out a split with us on Kung Fu and getting us to sign with the label. That was really fucking helpful y'know. It really helped a lot. All these kids who really loved the Ataris when they got our split together, then y'know, they heard of us and that's fuckin' y'know, the most precious thing. We got a lot of people into us from there...

P: You really haven't looked back since the split either...

I: Yea, we had a song on a Fat Wreck Chords compilation and a lot of people got that, but then the split with the Ataris was really all over y'know, people in Japan and people everywhere would get that y'know...

P: So are you still good friends with the Ataris?

I: Yea we talk to them every now and then, when we recorded the last record Kris and Mike and everyone would show up and hang out for a while, but ah, we're not touring with them a lot anymore, not as much as we use to. I think they're touring with a lot of "rock" bands now...

P: Well they're on a major label now...

I: Yea I they have a lot of different stuff that goes with their show, which I guess is what they wanted so it's good. But we're more like, touring with bands like Frenzal and that y'know. But we're still really good friends with the Ataris anyway, we love 'em.

P: Tell me how the tour and hook up with Frenzal came about...

I: Well we're booked in Europe by the same guy that books Frenzal and he had a Frenzal Rhomb

tour coming up, and so he got us on their tour. So we spent five weeks on the bus with Frenzal touring together, and they were the best fucking times of my life y'know, and coming to Australia and touring with them here it's been really fucking great. The shows are awesome, we get along with them real good and have drank a lot of beers...

P: So do you guys still live in Israel, or are you living and working in the States now?
I: No we all live in Israel. We live in Haifa, it's a town in Israel...

P: Oh ok, so you live there but you'd spend

most of the year touring the US etc right?

I: Usually we tour after Europe... like last year we had two months in Europe but after that we had the Warped Tour in the US then right after that we recorded the

new record, so



that was like half a year full of bad shit...

P: Yea really? You hated that?

I: Oh yea, it's shitty, but really it's the best thing y'know, when you look back at things they were much better than what they were when you were doing them you know.

P: Yea I guess that's the down side of touring...

I: Yea just like missing... I have a girlfriend at home and that's pretty shitty...

P: Yea that must get pretty hard.

I: Yea that's pretty hard, and you get bored a lot, there's only so much fun during the day and the rest is just driving and sitting around and waiting for stuff to happen, but it's cool too. It's better than sitting at home anyway...

P: You must look at it that you've seen a lot more of the world than you probably thought you would have... I: Yea yea, just being here is something that I didn't ever see coming... all the tours that we've to we just started with the main cities and then we'd go to like Slovenia and play in weird places in Nebraska y'know, we've just been everywhere...

P: You're really kinda living the punk rock dream now... y'know I've gotta ask about the progression in your sound from "Bad Story, Happy Ending" to "No Vacation..." your latest album seems to flow thru so much better...

I: Yea I think what we had with "Bad Story, Happy Ending" was really much like our first record, coz that's right when Yotam started to write the songs and sing them, rather than me

and Guy writing the songs and he sing them y'know. Really like a new band. And then that was just the first record I guess on that level... I guess it's not really the best thing but we were happy with it at the time and couldn't see that we could've made a much better record than that one. but our new one's still perfect for us y'know. I actually listen to it, and people from bands usually shouldn't listen to their own bands coz it's a dicky stupid thing to do...

P: Well most hate it by the time it comes out...

I: Yea well that's usually the case with us, we've got countless releases that I just have at home and would never play. But the new one I will listen to coz it's quite good.

P: Now about the cover art on "No Vacation From The World"... who's drugs are they?

I: Oh that's Ido's, the drummer, he's a fucking crazy pothead y'know with the onion looking hair [we laugh], he smokes a lot of that shit. And they're his books [pointing to the cd cover art]...
P: Yea I couldn't make out what they were

of...
I: That's coz they're in Israeli, they're
Maximumrocknroll and some LA magazine called
the Ganasta or something.

P: So they're only prescription drugs, they're only for his headaches right...

I: Yea I think they're kind of sissy drugs, they're

nothing cool. In the interview you should write that they're fucking speed, but it isn't. [we laugh] P: I don't think I've ever read an interview with you guys where falafel wasn't mentioned...

I: Oh yea, it always comes up.

P: So you would be the "falafel punk band of the world"!?

I: Probably yea! We're pretty radical about it, I mean we don't really get to the point where we sing about it or talk about it at the show but every Useless ID rehearsal, ended up with falafel. Always. There is this one falafel place in Haifa, I really miss it. We have a band rule actually that we couldn't mention this falafel place while on tour coz we get really y'know...

P: Homesick...

I: Yea we'd kick shit around...

P: Have you tried the falafel in Australia?

I: Oh yea yea...

P: No good?



4. "The Best Time You Never Had" was recently released featuring some great melodic punk with emotional screamo backing vocals, what do you say to those who label pop punk as 'brain dead generic music'?

J: I think that's ridiculous. Good music transcends genre. I don't care if you're talking about pop-punk or some sort of bluegrass/death-metal/polka hybrid ... if the songs are good, then they're GOOD. Seems simple to me. bandphotograpy.com really took the title of the album and ran with it. He kept us updated on what he was doing, and he just nailed it the whole way through. The BEST thing about the booklet, though, has to be the picture of Robert Smith. That

was perfect.

6. I discovered you guys by link surfing and downloading your mp3s. What are your thoughts on "file sharing"? A good promotional tool or a concern for bands and labels being ripped off?

J: We owe a lot to file sharing, really. That's how we've gained what recognition we have. It's really a godsend for bands trying to get their songs out there. We're constantly putting up new songs whenever we can, and I hope the fans we have enjoy them. BUT, I still try to go out and buy the records that I really want. I feel like it's my duty to support the artists I appreciate ... that and the cd player in my car won't play burned discs.

7. Have your tolks ever been to one of your shows?

J: Our parents have been incredibly supportive, but not in the whole taking us out of high school and grooming us for a career in music way, thankfully. That's always seemed really creepy to me. I'm glad we never had to worry about insecure parents living out their dreams of stardom vigorously through us. We've all been doing this a LONG time, and our parents never second guess us. They know this is what we live for, and they accept that. THAT'S the best support you can have. I've been playing in shitty clubs for years, and my Dad has been to some of the most disgusting venues around to see us. Tom's Mom was actually at the last show we had, which was great.

8. Is it normal to vacuum your dog?

J: As long as "dog" isn't a euphemism for penis.

9. What three bands would you most like to share a tour with?

J: I'm not allowed to speak for the whole band on this, but I'll try to make this representative of us all. Green Day, just because they're one of the most consistently great bands around, live or recorded... a HUGE influence on EVERYONE, whether they admit it or not. I think we could learn more from watching the Descendents every night than watching just about any one else. Also, I think touring with Weezer would be awesome. Those are total dream tours ... really, I'd be happy touring with any band as long as we got along. That's all that really matters.

10. Why should kids buy your record and what's next for Nuclear Saturday?



P: Seriously now I guess we'll need the how "in the grey" came to be story... you've been together for two years now right?

A: Yeah about two years we have been kicking it around the hood. We were one of those bands that played at parties and shit like that with our other friends who were in bands. And from there we just kept at it playing shows in the local area which was

Greg Stace and we titled it "Hopelicity". This CD is how we met our manager and we got it released by the merry team at Shock Records who decided to distribute it for us. We were also graced with the winning of Kerrang's "Best Unsigned Band" award which was voted by the readers of the mag which was pretty sick! P: I've been in the red plenty of times, but what's it mean to be "In The Grey"?

A: It means that we are filthy rich and have heaps of sports cars and mansions on the beach! we also host parties where its just us five and about a hundred of the hottest girls you will ever find. So in reality we live in a dream that isn't real. You get that at all? Cause I think I am lost now.

P: What was your worst band name you had before settling on "In The Grey 1.9"?

A: Probably "into the realms of death" but back then we played jazz music and the odd country song to win over the local RSL crowd. Jai from Below Par said we had to change it or at least play Hip Hop which is something that we are looking into for our next release.







P: Can't wait for that now. Any trio will tell you three band members equals more beer rider for each member - ever thought five's too many?

A: Nah we just get more beer in the rider. Simple but then if one or two of us don't drink because of driving commitments then the rest of us get way more messed up than any three piece! Either that or we steal the trios rider and blame it on the other band playing!

P: For a band that hasn't really been around for that long you've already played some shows with some big names! did you ever think you'd be playing shows with bands like Strung Out, Useless ID,

The Juliana Theory in those early days when you guys began jamming together?

A: Yeah we knew from the word go that we were going to take over the world and demolish everything in our way! like we play with bands like Julianna and we also did the Sum41 supports in Sydney and that was cool but we will do shows like that all the time and still smash anyone. We are just waiting for the right time to rise above everyone and rule the world! We are going to be so hot that we could take a shit and wrap it in foil with fishing hooks and sell it to the Queen as ear rings. And then of coarse, I'm joking haha.

P: Thank gawd! So you think sharing the stage with any of these bigger bands positively influence

But we aren't the cocky type we usually hang around and check out their shows and go drinking and stuff with them down the pub.....hahahaha

P: Your new ep "wake the silent day" features some well developed and mature sounding melodic rock for such a young band's second release... what would you put the quality of your ep down to? A: The quality of it has a lot to do with the gear we used. We took in as much cool stuff as we could. We had a sweet bunch of cabs and heads to use with a bunch of different guitars and basses. Brendon has a super epic kit that sounded awesome. The studio we went into was killer. Milkbar Studios is one of the best studios in Australia and the nice people there made it even cooler. Then there was the main man Greg Stace who engineered it and helped with the producing of it as well. This guy is the coolest cat going around. He helped us on the first EP and so it was only fitting that we got him in for this one as he did such a good job with the last one. The other factor in the equation is how we actually played on it which is something that we are happy about. alot of pre production and practise and it just gets you more keen to record some newer songs for the album.

P: Tell me how the hook up with Below Par Records came about... I heard jai can be bought with copious amounts of alcohol, although Lachlan from SWN told me it was porn... so what is it that he

can be bought with?

A: Well our guitarist Glenn has been collecting porn for a long time now and we needed a deal so we snuck into Glenn's house without him knowing and stole every single issue of penthouse he has and went straight to Below Par and said here's the deal I've got every single Penthouse issue since 1990, what can you do for us?" And here we are now, just released an EP and doing an album next year. Glenn was not happy though, he started doing his paper run again so he can start his collection again. 

A record I can't wait to hear! I got in touch with Rachel Warburton - Bass/Vocals to get the whole

Edison Music story...

PEE: Hey Rach, thanx for taking the time to do a pee interview! so we'd better start with a Edison Music history lesson I suppose...

RACH: Matt & myself were in a band called Hone that was around for about 4 years and put out an EP. We want to change direction musically and start over, running things a little more professionally, drawing from the experiences we had in Hone - so formed Edison at the end of 2000. We've had a few line up changes - but it's been solid since Josh & Suresh joined half way through last year.

P: Things have been pretty busy for you guys lately with the recording of your debut album "Last Year's Journal". How's that all fallen into place?

R: We were going to record another EP and then decided to go the whole way and do an album. Most of it was written in a 6 month period with the view of doing a full length. We recorded it at Soundhouse in Adelaide with Ani & Darren Thompson (who also did Blueline Medic's latest there).

P: Anything to be read into the album's title?

R: This album is quite personal and reflecting a pretty full on year that we've all had... I guess it's an expression of our thoughts & stuff we've been through in that year.

P: The last time I saw you guys play a few weeks ago at the Thinktank album launch, you teased us with a few new songs off the album. I've gotta say they seemed to have progressed nicely to be a little more intense and technically structured, is that how you see your new material on the album?

P: How far would you like to see Edison Music go? what do you hope for Edison's future etc?

R: The important thing for us is that the band is a positive thing in our lives with regards to our relationships to each other and our loved ones. We hope to keep writing music that we enjoy and that people can get into. We'll take it as far as we can, but wherever that is will be cool.

If taking these steps were the only thing a band had to do to get that "deal" then what is it that so many bands are doing wrong??? Well, I can tell you that there is no procedure to getting a deal. As long as you write good music, tour your arse off, publicise the fuck out of your band and demo demo demo... then hope that you just have to be in the right place at the right time.. Common knowledge as far as I knew, until this fucker decided that he could make a quick buck out of some poor bands.. Anyways, the cd retails for about \$100 and if you want my advice, don't purchase it...send me the money instead, you might as well as you will be wasting your money anyway.

So now I have stopped doing favours for a lot of people. I am sick of doing shit loads of favours and not getting anything in return. Almost 100% of the time it comes from cunty industry people that think their shit smells like roses.. Not to mention the so called "band friends" that only seem to call you when they need something.. Funny how the music industry is like that. I can however say that majority of these band people come from none other than Adelaide. (Sorry to the 98% of Adelaide bands that are not like this). Advice

Did you know that most record labels won't even listen to your demo unless it has been previously requested (otherwise known as solicitated). So before sending out your demo, check with the label A&R guy first or you can check on label's website. (They usually have a demo policy listed) Moe!

MEOHINE

Japanese punk quartet NICOTINE have always been a favourite here at Pee. A new album was just the excuse I needed for an interview...

. PEE: Can you tell me about the formation of Nicotine back in '93... how did the four of you hook up etc?

YASU: Hi! My name is Yasu, guitarist of Nicotine. I met my band singer, Howie when I was in college 1993. I went to his house almost everyday after school and started writing original songs. We really wanted to play those songs as the real band. And then Lasked Naoki to start playing the drums (he never played the drums before) and also asked my old friend, Full (I've known him since the kindergarten) to join our new band, Nicotine as a bass player. Our first gig was in the US in 1994. We were influenced by US punk rock at that time. Especially, NOFX, ALL, Bad Religion.

P: Did you ever think in those early "basement days" that Nicotine would be touring the world? Y: We have been working very hard since 1993. Because we really wanted to go back to the US to play the shows there. Always think about the possibility of touring all over the world!!! But we 've never been to Australia. We definitely love to come over there to play punk rock shows in your country!!

P: What did you guys originally want to get out of playing in Nicotine? By that I mean did you plan to become hugely popular and tour the world, or did you just wanna play to your local crowd and maybe release a few records?

Y: Our dream is meeting many punk people in the world and playing shows in many places and eating sushi and drinking beer together. That's what we want.

P: So in the 10 years that have passed have you constantly set new goals for the band?

Y: We've released several albums and toured a lot here in Japan. So it's kinda difficult for us to think about setting the new goal. But we, Nicotine always have a great desire to visit overseas countries, like North America, Australia, Europe, etc.

P: What was the worst band name you had before settling on Nicotine?

Y: Asshole (my high school days very brutal thrash metal band)

P: You've shifted towards a lot of chantable melodic anthem kinda punk songs on the new album. How's it working out live? How have the fans been receiving the new songs?

Y: Oh yeah! Kids really like our new songs. Nicotine has been playing about 10 years. So every time





P: You guys get tagged as Japan's NOFX a lot, that's gotta be a huge compliment right?

Y: When we started Nicotine, we listened to NOFX a lot. Also we really love their sound production. So many people said that Nicotine is like Japanese NOFX. But our current style of music is not only NOFX type. We have a great respect about NOFX, especially Mike's DIY spirit.

P: Do you read or take much notice of reviews and what's being said about the band in music media?

Y: I try to read the CD reviews on the web site about our album as much as possible. Usually, it's fun to read but some people have very critical opinion about my band. When I see those articles, I go to my favorite sushi restaurant to eat a lot of food!! Ha Ha!!

P: What about zines, do you ever read fanzines?

Y: I don't read fanzines. It's very difficult to get them in Japan from English speaking countries.

P: Tell me about the photos of the live show inside the cover of "School Of Liberty"... it looks like it was a crazy gig...

Y: Some Japanese kids are also very aggressive especially at the small club, like 200-300 people venue. My singer, Howie always does a stage dive during the show and sing in the crowds together with kids. The picture was taken at the club called, "Kitami Onion Studio" in Hokkaido which is a big North island.

P: A lot of bands I've interviewed all say they love touring Japan, how do you think a show there differs from say, the USA?

Y: I think that Japanese kids are very good boys and girls. They usually try to remember all the words even if the songs are written in English. When the band speak between songs at the show, they are very quiet. Also most Japanese clubs are very clean and usually have the good sound system. So I think that many foreign bands love playing shows in Japan!! For us, Nicotine, touring in oversea countries is very very fun because we can have different experience from Japan tour. USA is very very big country. So we have to drive a long long time everyday. But if the band is pretty popular in Japan, they can also take a train to tour here in Japan. That's very very easy!!

P: Any plans to ever bring your rock Down Under to Australia?

Y: We would love to come over to Australia if there is a chance. Unfortunately, there is no plan now.

P: What can we expect from a Nicotine show when you do tour down here?

Y: Our show is a lot of fun and I am sure you can enjoy so much. We are moving and jumping a lot during the show and singing along with kids!!!

P: Thanx heaps for your time! Any last words or people you wanna thank?

Michigan quartet Small Brown Bike have just released their first album on their new label Lookout! I got in touch with vocalist and guitarist Mike Reed to ask about the new record and their label switch PEE: Why the switch from No Idea to Lookout! Records? Was it simply a case of your deal with No Idea was finished and you felt the need to move onto another label - or was there more to the move?

MIKE: Well, we never really had a contract with No Idea, but we have always felt comfortable working with them. I think that it just came to the point, after five years with No Idea, when we wanted to see what else was out there. Lookout were really into our new songs and we all just felt really comfortable working with them. They are a label who we have always respected and it is flattering to be a part of it now.

P: Your old label mates Against Me! have also moved from No Idea to a larger indie label [in their case Fat Wreck]. Do you still see the role of smaller labels, such as No Idea, being just as important in the future for giving independent rock bands the opportunity to get their records out to help start their career?

M: Absolutely. Most of the bands out there get there start on small, independent labels. We never really looked at it like we were on No Idea to start our career and then jump to another label. It just happened to work out that things picked up for us with the help of No Idea and now here we are.

P: What made you guys choose Lookout!?

M: There was a bunch of stuff that made Lookout really appealing to us. First of all, they were really excited when they heard our new songs. That is the bottom line. We didn't want to work with someone who was into our band for other reasons. Secondly, they have experienced so much success with bands, yet they still have a very ethical and down-to-earth way of approaching music. They still see the art of music and that was really comforting. It wasn't just about marketing and promo photos. They have also really progressed in the last few years with what they were releasing. When you buy a record from Lookout, you are less likely to really know what it is going to sound like. That was a cool thing to have going for us. We didn't want to be pigeon-holed into a certain genre. And finally, just the history that they have created, you have to respect that. If you would have told me 10 years ago that I would eventually be in a band on Lookout, I would have flipped.

P: You guys have played some shows with Pretty Girls Make Graves who have just moved from Lookout! to Matador so it seems as if the label merry-go-round is in high gear over there at the moment...

M: Yeah, I think that it's just a natural thing to happen for any band or label. It is rare that bands stay with one label for their entire career. It is a weird thing to go through, but I think that if you are honest with how you handle things, it will all be OK.

P: With the independent music scene becoming more recognized by the mainstream, a lot of independent bands are signing to majors with some heart ache sure to follow. How does the lure of mainstream popularity that comes with the promotional budget of a major sit with Small Brown Bike?

M: I can't say that I would never consider moving to a major label. I currently have a dollar in my bank account, so that makes it tough to not be curious. At the same time, I'm smart enough to know that a major label deal definitely doesn't mean fame and fortune. A lot of bands just fade away after they release a few albums and the hype disappears. I think that the greatest bands have success regardless of what label they are on.

P: Over the years you guys have grown from perhaps the support Small Brown Who? band to headlining your own tours now, have you noticed a change in the crowds who attend a SBB show as your popularity grows?

M: We basically did a year of support tours and I think that it helped. It was a lot of fun to play with the bands that we were with, but its good to do our own shows now. I haven't really noticed a huge jump in our attendance, but I'm sure that it helped out. We get a lot of emails from people who saw us on other tours and liked what they heard.

P: Two releases in a matter of months sees a flood of new SBB recordings out there. Was that always the plan to release the album soon after the "Nail Yourself To The Ground" ep?

M: We pretty much had no clue what we were doing up until February 2003. Trav was out of commission for a few months with a broken back, so we had all of these songs on hold. We didn't want to release a double album, so the EP definitely made sense.

P: For me a lot of the songs on "The River Bed" are perfect for a long interstate drive, "Sincerely Yours" has an rolling almost 'soundtrack' theme sound to it, there's an almost more mature songwriting difference between the two recent releases. Is that how you hear the album now? How far apart were the recordings?

M: Yeah, I definitely feel like the second half of the record starts to turn off the normal path for us. It was fun to work on some different songs that no one was used to doing. The recordings between the EP and LP were only a few months apart. I think that doing the split with The Casket Lottery kind of helped us feel like we could do new things in the studio.

P: Tell me about "Scream In The Silence" - to me it comes across as a call for help, almost a song about someone thinking of suicide. Am I way off the mark there?

M: I think the song utimately deals with frustration. It came from some frustrations that I was having in my life. P: How did Travis injure his back last November? Coz that put him out of action for a few months right? M: We had a surprise birthday party for my brother and

M: We had a surprise birthday party for my brother and everything was going great, until Trav went backwards over the balcony. He fell about 10 feet down onto his back and fractured a vertebrae. He was just having a good time and slipped, he wasn't wasted or anything. It could have been way worse though.

P: What did the band do with "down time"?

M: We all have other stuff going on...jobs, houses, girlfriends. Luckily it was in the winter and there wasn't much to do anyway.

P: So how is his back now? Has it affected his stage presence?

M: He gets sore sometimes, but he's pretty much OK now. They told him not to skate for a year, but I don't think he really paid attention to that.

P: Who is your own personal hero Mike?

M: I would have to say that my parents are my heroes. It



may sound cheesy, but they really have made me who I am. They were always very understanding and just wanted me to be happy with whatever I did with my life. It made things less stressful than they could have been. They were always there for me when I was going through bad times, so that really helped.

P: What advantages or disadvantages do you see from having your brother Ben in the band with you? Surely you guys have the occasional typical brotherly dust ups whilst on tour??

M: We have never really gotten into any big fights. Even while we were growing up, we were pretty peaceful. There is the occasional disagreement, but it's always good. I love having him in the band.

P: In years to come when you're an old man sitting on the porch, how would you like to look back on SBB?

M: I want to look back on it as one of the luckiest things that I have ever been a part of. We have met so many amazing people and seen a lot of great places. It's given me so many experiences that I wouldn't have had otherwise.

P: Thanx for your time Mike! Any last words or people you wanna thank?

M: Thanks to all of the great people at Lookout Records, No Idea Records, Smallman Records, Fata Booking and YOU!



When I decided to feature interviews with the people behind independent punk record labels, the first person I wanted to feature was Mike Park, the founder of California's Asian Man Records. Mike has given some of the biggest names in punk today the opportunity to get their careers started, and inspired me to begin my own label and distro the same way AMR was born.

PEE: Hey Mike, let's begin with your nickname, I've heard it's "Bruce Lee" - so are you any good at karate mate?? Or is that just a tag from your time as "The Bruce Lee Band"?

MIKE: I practiced Martial Arts when I was younger, but I forgot everything. Bruce Lee was a nickname that I used years ago. Basically, I'm a big fan of Mr. Lee and just wanted to pay homage to my hero

P: Tell me about the birth of Asian Man Records - you use to host a show on college radio right? Was that the initial inspiration behind wanting to start your own record label?


M: I wanted to start Asian Man Records as an outlet for my own music and to also help musicians that I met and liked to release their music.

P: The label began with your first release in '96 right?

M: Correct. We officially started in May of 1996, but I started putting out records in 1991 with the first release by Skankin' Pickle.

P: And after all these years you're still running AMR out of your folks garage! You must have a great relationship with your folks...

M: Oh yeah! My mom is very cool. She's a totally supportive mom in the business. She gets a little bit too excited at times, but for the most part she's great.



P: Don't they ever say "Mike can you move your records, I wanna park the car in out of the rain"?? M: Fortunately we have a dual garage so we have tons of room.

P: Those who are familiar with AMR know that you have strong ethics that you run the label by, two being unity and erasing racist hate. Was there ever a time in your life where you've been a victim of racism?

M: Sure!! All the time. I've been called a chink to my face and even while performing on stage I've been seig heiled by someone in the audience. It's sad and scary.


P: Your relationships with the bands you sign to AMR seem more like a "family" kind of affair, where trust and respect are as important as the band's music. Is that the case?

M: I'd like to believe that's the case. I try my best to believe in the trust of humanity. The music business is one of the most corrupt businesses to be involved in. Capitalism is the heartbeat to 99% of this industry.

P: Even today do you still not actually get your bands to 'sign' a paper contract?

M: No contracts!! Still to this day.

P: You've given some big names a chance to get their records out in their bands infancy, Alkaline Trio, The Lawrence Arms, Less Than Jake to name a few. Do you feel a sense of pride like a father figure when AMR bands are able to gain deals with big labels?
M: Sure. That's the goal. I don't have any intention of



competing with bigger labels. And I have no intention of becoming a bigger label. I do what I do and the bands are aware of this. They enjoy the kick start I give them and everybody is happy.

P: So is it still just the three of you, Miya, Tony + yourself, working at AMR?

M: Yes, that is correct.

P: Describe a "typical" working day for Mike Park...

M: I get up at around 8 AM and basically start working. It can be anything from doing interviews like this, to listening to demos. I basically do a lot of delegating. There's a lot to be done and a lot of organization is needed. I spend a lot of time on the phone just making sure everything is running smoothly.

P: Let's talk about "file sharing", the downloading of mp3s. What are your personal thoughts on kids downloading a bands music? A good promotional tool, or another way the artist and label are being ripped off?

M: I like it. I don't care if a kid downloads the music. My whole purpose behind Asian Man is to promote music. I don't care about capitalist gain. I just want enough to survive and to share music.

P: Outside of AMR you're also responsible for the birth of the huge Plea For Peace Tour and Foundation which has been running now since '99 right? For those Aussie readers who maybe haven't heard of either, explain what

the Foundation and Tour is all about....

M: The foundation was started to help promote peace through musical avenues. So far we've only been able to put on benefit tours, but the long term goal is to start a functioning center that works with the youth here in Northern California year round. Giving kids a place to go and work with music and art.

P: After all the long hours, what inspires you most to continue doing all the great work you do Mike?

M: It's fun! I wouldn't do this if I didn't enjoy it. I like to be busy and to work hard, so it's all a blessing.

P: Any words of advice or inspiration to a punk reading this thinking "I wanna start my own punk label"...

M: Do it. There's nothing holding you back. I believe in action. Dreams remain dreams unless you act upon them,

P: Thanx a shit load for your time Mike, any last words or people you wanna thank?

M: PEACE ALWAYS, MIKE PARK

P: Tell us about the recording of, 'Sic Semper', there seems to be a lot of work gone into the preproduction of the ep with some great intros to the title track etc...

L: We did spend a lot of time pre recording the songs and recording different parts at different recording studios. We all feel that it is important to demo the songs in order to make changes to the songs and really iron out any bits we are unsure about. We decided to do some recording (intro before Sic Semper) with Dan our sound guy at Jets Studio in Bundoora just to add another element to the recording. The majority of the recording was done at Hothouse Studio in St Kilda over four days.

P: You're about to embark on a tour to promote the new ep starting with a Hope Conspiracy support in Melbourne, you guys must be looking forward to getting out and airing the new songs...

L: Personally, I can't wait to start playing our new set which consists of the new songs plus songs from 'shadows' and 'Beau monde'. We really feel as though the new and older songs really blend super well and will ensure that the sets are really lively and in your face, not that they weren't before but the new songs I think will really allow us to unleash when playing. As for the tour, it does start with The Hope Conspiracy show at The Arthouse. We will play along side, Threshold who are an awesome hardcore band from Melbourne and Day of Contempt. We owe Graham at Resist Records in Sydney a lot of thanks for giving us all the International supports that we have received. After the 'Conspiracy' show we are really excited and ready to hit W.A and S.A in September and October before our Melbourne launch at the Arthouse on the 25th of October.

P: There's no mention of a return visit to Sydney at the moment, any chance of our Sydney and Brisbane readers getting a chance to experience AFN up their way any time soon?

L: We are hoping to head to N.S.W and QLD in the early part of next year and are even looking to go to New Zealand and Japan later next year. The only reason we haven't been to these places this year is because of time, so next year you can be

assured of seeing us.
P: You enjoy getting down off the stage and mixing it with the crowd during your set, how is that received

with different crowds and venues?
L: The reason why I get down off the stage is because they are generally pretty small places, especially when you add instruments and people. Stages are generally not a conducive environment for one to let loose. As for how people receive me leaving the stage, I think that people who are at the venue to see us play or have a good time can appreciate it. Most of the time I will be up and down like a yo-yo so if people aren't enjoying themselves they can at least count how many times I leave the stage or vice versa.

P: Thanx Luke! any last words or people you wanna thank?

L: Be sure to check us and our new cd out, you should be able to get it at most good music stores. We would like to thank the people at ELECTRIC for helping us out, Pete at PEE RECORDS for all his awesome help and support, Mike at FUTURE ARTISTS for booking us over the last year and all the people and bands that support AFN, it does mean a lot!!!



STRIKEANYWHERE EXITENGLISH COM

Richmond Virginia pumps out some awesome bands, none more so than Strike Anywhere. They recently tore apart Aussie stages and Stu from 3RRR's Melbourne punk radio program "Mondo Bizarro" caught up with vocalist Thomas Barnett. Huge thanx to Stu for the interview. Check out Mondo Bizarro Monday nights in Melbourne on 102.7fm, or via real player at their website www.rrr.org.au

PEE: What's going on today Thomas?

Thomas: I'm hanging out at Resist records in Newtown in Sydney where we've been for at least 20 days and we are only 6 days into our tour, so we've had quite a vacation in Australia.

P: So what actually happened, cause I understand that you tried to go to Japan. What actually happened there?

T: Well, four of the five us, I guess we got rejected – pulled out of line at Immigration and questioned for hours and hours along with the other unfortunate souls who were also in the holding room. Then they separated us, put us back together, realised we were telling the truth and we were there for 40 hours, under guard with no way of communicating with the outside and then we were expelled. Luckily a few of the immigration officers that came on the later shift had some English and they realised that we were relatively innocent of any crime or forgery or any pretence. Instead of sending us back to Los Angeles or Canada, as they would have done they actually helped us get over here because they knew we had shows in Australia to play. We don't really know the reason why, there's allot of burocratic eracy and red tape in the Japanese immigration institution as there is in many countries in the world. We were instructed by the promoter over there to put certain things on our immigration cards which we did, and those were the particular things that red flagged the immigration officers, then our other guitarist got in putting the exact same things on his card. So to make it shorter we have no idea and we'll perhaps never know why we were rejected from Japan.

P: Wow...what did the promoter have to say about all that?

T: We haven't communicated with him, we're actually going to speak with him when we get to California after we leave Australia and get back to the states. I think he feels really bad, he's a sweet guy who does allot of real hard work for Japanese punk rock and he was really generous to try to bring us over there. I think in general they never pay for work visas for bands to come and play and it usually works out, but I think we just got the wrong guard at the wrong time, who wanted to play by the book. It wasn't really the promoter's fault, we're finding out more and more – we thought that the immigration officials talked to him and nothing happened and we thought that was really irresponsible but in the end we found that in the end all they did was call him and tell him that it was a secret regarding Strike Anywhere – so he didn't have anything to go on, didn't know what to do with us and we didn't know what to do while we were watching the BBC news program from this wing of a hotel floor that they had for house arrest. We saw all these scribbles on the walls from people from all over the world in rage and anger that they didn't get into Japan.

P: That's amazing, so you had no idea what was happening.

T: Yeah, when we came to Australia we declared everything, items for sale and things like that an the Australians were just like, get out of that line and go straight through we don't wanna tax you – it was so different, so friendly.

P: How have the Australian shows been so far?

T: Oh, they have been great, fantastic without exception. We had no idea what to expect, weren't sure if people had heard our music and especially like Sydney, Newcastle, Brisbane and Penrith were all just like stellar show, they have just been explosive – people singing along and everyone loosing their voices and the sound has



been wonderful and we're really happy and have to send out special thanks to After The Fall who are our tour mates and we're using all their backline and their drumkit and they have made it possible fo us to play these shows, so we thank them very much.

P: They are a great bunch of guys.

T: Yeah they're awesome and a great band to see every night, you don't often tour with a band that eventually you don't tire of just after seeing them, no matter how good they are. We haven't tired of them yet

P: So there could be some reciprocation going on – they'll come over your way?

T: I hope so, I mean their music will bring them over before anything we could do. They're definitely on their way. They'll be pretty big I think.

P: Its been about 2 years since CHANGE IS A SOUND, are you just dying to get the new album out, I mean you've been touring on it for a long time.

T: Yeah that's very astute, yeah this is our 10th tour on Change Is A Sound and we are desperate and happy to have a new record come out very soon.

P: Who did you record it with? Did you work with Brian again?

T: Yes, Brian Ternan at this point it work be hard to work with anyone else, he the perfect midwife for our music and

it was longer, we had an extra week – thanks to Jade Tree to further fine tune things and bring all the songs together and try to give it as much passion and energy as possible and even get the sound better than they were on Change. It was great we lived in his basement, he took a break to get married, came back and finished recording the vocals and mixing the music.

P: Are you playing some of the new stuff live in these shows we are going to see?

T: Yeah we play one new song a night, we rotate it depending on what we feel like. We know people don't know these songs and it kind of slows the room down a bit if its been especially enthusiastic.. and we don't want people's heart rates going too low. We'll come back and play all the songs from the new record and hopefully people will come then too.

P: Did you approach the recording any differently this time around?

T: Yeah, we had a little more time and did allot of demo work. Smith our guitar player, he's got a studio now in his basement that he didn't have 2 ½ years ago. We also did allot of demoing in Richmond and went up to his place in Maryland. He's about 30 minutes from Salad Days Studios and we took allot of the demos and did allot of re-writing and I had allot more time to look at the lyrics and put together the right words in the right spot to maybe make the the songs have more individual character – it was really cool, each of us wrote a great deal of many of the songs, especially Eric our drummer wrote a number of songs that we all like allot. Also there's songs in different tunings, songs in D, that are a little more dramatic and exciting for us to play. Not every song is blazing fast, but there is still allot of fast parts and there are actually heavier part on the record, theres also a bit of mid tempo, older punk feel to some of the songs we are writing, especially me and Sherwood – the older guys in the band!

P: The old guys?

T: Yeah, we're 30. We turn 30 this year.

P: Respect for the old guys!

T: [Laughs] Thanks Stu.

P: For a band like Strike Anywhere — where do you see yourselves fitting in, for want of a better term the punk scene? Do they even offer you something like the Warped Tour?

T: It's a good word punk, we've gotta reclaim that word from those bands that are perpetrating it as a fashion to infiltrate the mainstream. But I guess that happens every 5 years in the states, someone tries to discover punk as if it wasn't already there and market it, maybe worse than it was last time someone tried to market it! But we probably wouldn't play the Warped tour, we have been offered local dates on it, but its just not really appealing to us. We are like the punkest band that allot of hardcore kids like, and the most hardcore band that allot of punk kids like, and that because the five of us are all part of the different sub sub genres I guess and that just a part of Richmond Virginia being such a friendly town,



where its pretty easy to be creative and easy to change up a punk rock subculture where you cant in allot of towns where its more rigid and its like, these people have their bar, and these people have their bar, and the straight edge people hate all of you etc etc. And we have like the membership of our band is formed by all these different traditions that have come out of punk and hardcore, so I guess that explains why we don't really know our spot. We play shows with AntiFlag, and now some of those kids come to our shows... I don't know, it's good times, its definitely being something new consistently for us.

P: I guess you're in a similar situation to where AVAIL are, obviously another band from Richmond, but I am referring to the fact that they're on the punk/hardcore edge as well. T: Yeah yeah definitely. They've been good friends and like family for us, helping us out and giving us good advice. We've only played a handful of shows together ironically, and did one tour with them very early on. They're great. I guess we are sort of like the locals in Richmond and they came down from the suburbs of DC about 12 years ago and we were the handful of punk kids who welcomed them to our scene and they have been incredibly generous and faithful to Richmond in particular, I know some of my younger band mates that AVAIL shows were some of their first shows ever and some of the best memories for them. I don't know...maybe we are in the same spot. Its real hard to tell, I mean American punk is so big and complicated and easy to misunderstand, even for American punk bands. So we're just happy with whatever happens and being



able to change with the scenes whatever happens – and maybe try to bring things together if we can.

P: And maybe not have to worry about 'scenes'

T: Yeah especially that part!

P: Good luck with the new album Thomas, we're already looking forward to the second Australian Strike Anywhere tour whenever that may be.





CORY: A reformed MYC, Slayer and Tragedy

Independent record labels are born in the bedrooms of punks all over the world, so when I decided to feature established indie labels in Pee I also wanted to chat with lesser known, brand new labels. One of the first new labels to spring to mind was ECP Records from NSW Central Coast. I got in touch with Steve ECP to learn more about his label...



PEE: So tell me the origins of ECP Records... like Pee you started the label as purely an importer and distro right?

STEVE: Yep, right on pee man...Just a bit over a year ago I started importing some Nice Guy Records titles such as The Fonzarellies and Bottom Line. As both these bands were signed to Big Mouth Japan, this lead me on to form a relationship with Moto and start importing BMJ titles such as Autopilot Off and Brodie to name a few...Emails were sent off left right and centre until ECP was distributing titles from over 5 labels including Fueled By Ramen, The Militia Group and Lobster Records. Some titles included Jimmy Eat World, Rufio, Yellowcard, Slick Shoes splits and many more.

P: Do you still work from home, your bedroom or garage? S: Actually, I work from a spare room in the house...nice and cosy, close to the pantry for quick snacks and a 2 second walk to the local Post Office (my second home) making mailouts nice and easy!

P: I know I get asked this question all the time, so now it's my turn = what's the story behind your label's name "ECP"?

S: EAST COAST PORN, I mean EAST COAST PUNK...well I grew up on the east coast listening to punk rock! As this is where my inspiration came from, I felt that it justified naming the record label after this lifestyle. Later being shortened to just ECP.

P: So what made you want to take the next step to signing bands and releasing your own records?

S: I decided I wasn't getting enough free tickets into shows distro'ing all this US stuff, so I thought why not sign an Australian band, haha! Seriously but, when I started the label I was always aiming to sign artists and promote ozzy punk rock, ECP just took a different angle to get there! After hit and miss with a few bands, fine tuning my plans, I struck a deal with central coasts very own Best Kept Secret (which was worth the wait), met the good folk at MGM Distribution and yeah, this stepped ECP up a few notches into an established indie label. For a first release I am pretty stoked as

it has hit high priority at MGM, found its new home ranking highly in the AIR charts and the film clip scored Ripe Clip at Channel [V]. The first instalment of exclusive distro is Yellowcard "one for the kids", and this will be out October 20th thru MGM also, a second signing has just been announced with Draw the Line, Newcastle's infamous bunch of rockstars! Their FP is sounding like gold so far and will be released mid November, so be sure to snap one of those puppies up.

P:Although you're only a relatively new indie label, what qualities do you look for in a band before taking them onboard?

S: I look for: 1. Originality in style and tunes. 2. Good live show with an edge seperaterating them

from the rest of the up incoming bands. 3. Willing to do plenty of demoing and open to ideas 4. A sizeable following eg. Mailing list. Fans 5. The most important of all is their attitude. They must be easy to get along with. Big rockstar ego's is a thumbs down...The list could go on for ever, but these are the main qualities I look for.

of advice you think you could give a young upcoming band hoping to gain label interest?

S: Well, rehearse solidly until you guys rock! And talk to heaps of crew in the industry eg. Booking Agents, Managers, Labels, Tour Agents, Promoters, Recording people, Press etc etc...Just ask heaps of Q's and learn the game for ya selves so you become a very independent band. Do heaps of demo'ing and send to the label only your best songs, cause if you send them 4 songs,3 being rad and 1 shite', then it will reflect an image of average band. Take out time to not only perfect your songs but your image and stage show as well...Strong/appealing stage show is a thumbs up.....and get together a sweet promo package with all the gear eg. Bio, Pics, Demo, Presentation is also a winner! Just keep it real!

P: You've also compiled soundtracks for a few surf videos and tv programs right?

S: Hooked up with BMX Press and set up their soundtrack for video 'Burn It' and then moved onto doing their TV program 'BMXCentral' (foxtel)...After






doing this for a while, I approached Waveriderz TV and Kore TV and they were keen on the idea of being supplied with Independent music as well...I figured that indie bands were seeking exposure, and that the indie TV shows were keen on the music, so I set up a kinda exclusive music sourcing hub for the shows, where I take care of all their required soundtrack licensing...Works out good for everyone I think, especially ECP getting to feature our clips and tunes on national TV. We'll have

some pretty cool news about up and coming surf/x-sports DVD releases and TV shows in the next few months SO all you punkers, send your mixed/mastered music to: ECP RECORDS, PO BOX 3268, WAMBERAL NSW 2260. And we will try and hook your asses up!





Boysetsfire are about to tour our shores so Pee interviewer Shayne got in touch with BSF vocalist Nathan Grey to ask about their new record *Tomorrow Comes Today* and the Wind Up / Sony deal.

PEE: I understand you're on Sony now, a lot of old BSF fans will be pretty surprised about that.

NATHAN: We're corporate sell outs now, (laughs loudly) It was weird when we first found out because when we signed to Wind-Up we didn't know that they leased out to Sony in other countries. Like we went to Europe and the Sony representative came out and he was like 'hey, welcome to Sony', and we went 'what, we're on Sony'. So it was a bit of a surprise for us too, but when we decided to sign to Wind-Up, which is an independent label but has huge bands on it we made the decision that we could either sign, and make this our career, or we can quit, and go back to our day jobs. It wasn't a tough decision.

P: I guess you've got that a bit in the past, huh.

N: We've been called sellouts with nearly every album we've put out, once you're not making your own records out of your basement, someone's gonna call you a sellout.

P: Signing to Wind Up has undoubtedly seen the biggest recording budget you've had so far. It's probably the cleanest production you've had too.

N: Yeah, it was weird but it was a great learning experience, the only thing that I felt that was wrong with the new album, and I think we all agree on is that it was a little overdone in the production department; but that was an experiment that we went through and I think that with every album we have to experiment so that we can grow. So we tried the big budget production thing and I think next time we're gonna come up with something not as rough as *After The Eulogy*, but not as slick as the new one. It was nice to know that we had a lot to work with, I think that seeing it

was our first time it was hard to censor ourselves from doing certain things because we didn't know how it would work out, but I'm totally happy with what we did, I think it was a great experiment, which I think all of our albums are.

P: Being as politically active as you guys have been in the past the events of September 11 must've given you a lot to write about, that's obviously reflected on with some tracks on the new album.

N: What happened definitely gave us a lot of writing material, what was weird is that some of it was already being written before September 11th happened and it was about needing to watch our foreign policy, because it's gonna come back on us. Then it happened and it was like 'oh my god', I was just writing about this then with *Release The Dogs* it was more about the after effects of the patriot act and stuff like that. I don't think it's so much people giving up their freedom as much as their critical thinking. We've basically got a nation of non-assertive people right now who don't want to think for themselves because they're scared to. People's fear of death and just fear in general has caused almost every problem we've ever had in the world.

P: The US does appear to be in a very scary place to be at the moment and very right wing politically with all the 'war against terror' bullshit.

N: The thing is not only that, but I don't understand that people aren't out raged at how our military are being treated right now, they're being treated as whores for the oil companies and big corporations. They're being sent out to die for these corporations that don't care about them, they don't care about anything except for the money going into their pockets from all this. The problem is that Bush is an idiot. The bigger problem is that he's not really the problem, the problem is people like Dick Cheney and Donald Rumsfeld, who are very intelligent, and know exactly what they're doing, and that scares me. They're obvious intelligent, but in that sinister evil scientist sort of way. I'm very confused and I'm very upset with how easily this stuff is swallowed. So what about our education? So what about medicine, what about here? They're doin' nothing. George Bush is also talking about how they're going to set up universal health care in Iraq, we don't have it! How are you going to attack a place, bomb the living crap out of them, than give then something your country doesn't have ad demand that it be done. He's talking about

giving them a great education system, how about us? It's all smoke screen and bullshit.

P: Your older stuff, like *Rookie* is immensely popular, do you look back on it fondly?

N: I think there's a certain energy about the older stuff that we did that I can feel that we play the songs, it was like I didn't know whether to laugh or cry kinda thing. With the new album Tomorrow Comes Today I think it's a really good album, but I'm missing a little of that. We've been writing new songs now I feel like we're getting back in touch with that, it's that way of writing through a newer filter. I just keep going off on how much I can't wait to do this next album, because I think it's going to be the best thing we've ever done, just because I think we've finally found what we were looking for. I was talking about the newer album being not guite there vet: I feel the same way about the older albums. It's like OK, we had something there, but it's not quite what I'm looking for.

P: Lastly, has being on the major changed anything you do or see things?

N: I think we still do some things the same way that we used to do them; we still don't get hotels because we'd rather sleep in the bus. Instead of having a bus and a hotel we're still pinching pennies. It's like OK, if we don't have hotel we can come back and have more money so we can feed our families. We've always been like that, we'd always rather get some money at the end of the tour because we've all got families and that's our main thing. I definitely don't miss the cramped sweaty van, and it's funny because there are certain things that keep you from getting jaded and sober you up, like the TV's not working on the bus; then you see a van drive by and think what am I complaining about. It's weird, I think that's where honesty comes in, because a lot of people don't know how to fight that, they just go I'm a big rock star; I can do whatever I want. The thing with us we try to keep ourselves as sober as we possibly can, but not with alcohol; maybe sobers a bad word. We just try to keep down to earth. The minute I start complaining I look out and see someone carrying a bunch of shingles onto for their job so that kind of stuff brings me down to earth.



ANTIFREEZE - The Search For Something (Kung Fu Records) CD More

I thought Antifreeze were a melodic pop punk band? This, their new 12 [plus a "hidden" l track album. is far rock pop than more anything else. Gone is the constant pop punk tempo that I thought appeared in their previous album "Four Letter Word", although it



does still appear occasionally in "Hurts To Hurt" and "Dialogue". And that's not necessarily a bad thing at all, especially in Antifreeze's case! ANTISKEPTIC - Aurora (Toupee Records) CD

Where did Antiskeptic go wrong? The last release I purchased from these guys was the "Change My Ways" FP and it's a shame to say that they've gone dramatically downhill since then. After seeing the band antiskeptic live recently, I had high



hopes for this disc but it really lacks the energy and intensity the band possess on stage. This is definitely more brooding and "mature" than previous releases but the change in sound just doesn't seem to work for Antiskeptic. The production is amazing, enhancing the driving rythms of the songs, and helps "Technology Dictates" and "Even/Sacrifice" to standout towards the end of the album. "Nothing to Say" is probably the highlight here and could easily be the lead-off single. The screamed vocals in the chorus add a much-needed extra element to this track but after those three tracks, nothing made me pay much attention. "Clear To Pass" sounds eerily like Stabbing Westward and "More Than Kind" reminded me of Powderfinger and had me reaching for the remote. Seriously, this album sounds perfect for Triple M and my parent's tastes. Pete's mum would love "Goodbye. Goodnight" and she should have reviewed this disc instead of me.

ASTERISK - Dogma (Three One G Records)

'Dogma' is the complete collection of every Asterisk recording to date. Hailing from Sweden, Asterisk has material dating back to 99' to their most recent stuff being included compilation featuring eight other Swedish grind bands released last vear, and



somewhere in between this time, a split 7" with Nasum. Asterisk play chaotic, aggressive and extremely violent grind. At times sounding a little industrial and experimental but all the while maintaining a huge amount of intense chaos. There are 40 tracks on 'Dogma', the shortest lasting an entire 9 seconds and the longest in comparison to the previously mentioned is an epic at 3:23 minutes. From the beginning of track 1 'Dromology' you are subjected to the full barrage of chaotic grindcore that is so extremely punishing to the very end of track 40 'Babylon(e)'. There is a huge range of great vocals, from guttural growls to semi-industrial screams. Combined with blistering blast beats and original, creative guitars, this resulting in a superb complete collection of Asterisk material. It's not the easiest music to describe, but bands that came to mind initially for me were, Drop Dead, Unsane, Quicksand, Nasum and even a touch of early Napalm Death. If you can somehow imagine a mix of the grind bands mentioned with a little bit of Unsane and Quicksand, you'd have to be pretty close to the chaos that Asterisk produce.

IRON ON - The Understudy (Ruth Street)

Iron On are vet another talented indie rock band to come outta Queensland. Like Pollen before them, they play layered indie guitar rock that was hugely popular back in the mid 90's, when pubs were packed with bands like Garageland etc. Perhaps



Iron On are paving the way to a indie rock revival like garage rock has enjoyed the last couple of years?! The Understudy offers up five well produced tracks on the bands' own label, Ruth Street. The vocal duties are shared between the two guitarists Kate and Ross, both of which can hold their own and mixes things up nicely to hold your interest. The pace flows throughout the first four songs without ever getting frantic, until the slower closing track "Sleep In" finishes the ep on a peaceful note. Iceland's Minus are a band impossible to pigeonhole. On their debut album. Minus played a rough brand of thrash metal before slightly refining their sound on Jesus Christ Bobby to a more distortion driven brand of hardcore.



As praised as it was ridiculed, the album was creative and challenging nonetheless. On this, their third full-length release, Minus has turned its hand to melodic rock and produced an album far superior to the majority of similar releases this year. NAKED HEART - Confide In Me (Marlin Records) CD

Central Victoria's Naked Heart has received a little media attention as of late due to the release of their debut single; a cover of Kylie Minogue's 'Confide In Me'. The nu-metal version of this track by Naked Heart sounds pretty bloody good until...vocalist Tim decides to blatantly rip off Jonathon Davis (korn) and h i s trademark undecipherable blabber.



It's one thing being inspired by bands or one band in particular, but recording something that sounds incredibly similar and sounding as though it could very well be the band your inspired by just leaves you open for criticism. This punk quartet from Chiba, Japan often get tagged as the Japanese NOFX which doesn't overly nail there sound. Sure, they do have plenty of cliché

NOFX sounding melodic punk moments, but there's so many other punk similarities that it wouldn't be fair just to call them a NOFX rip off and leave it there. "School Of Liberty" rips out 14 tracks of melodic punk [plus a few spoken word intro tracks



"At The Class Room"] which mixes up the tunes and tempos perfectly to ensure it's not a "every song sounds the same" punk record. Their obvious influences range from Millencolin, Offspring, Strung Out, even Pennywise and of course NOFX. But Nicotine still remind me of the high energy [pop] punk rock that Hi-Standard always served up. Very catchy, paced and the broken English lyrics sung with that cool Japanese accent. Their love of gang backing vocals is used to full effect on this album with no shortage of chantable choruses for all to join in on, and they even throw in a cover of Green Day's "Basket Case". Unusual but solid aggressive hardcore with a sound not unlike American Nightmare mixed with elements of Step Down-era Sick of It All, particularly the urgent yelled/screamed vocals. Endnote is the band's second full length, their first "Code Blue" also recorded for hardcore heavyweights Equal Vision. Music like The Lyndsay Diaries is hard to like. On one hand, the sincerity and emotion prevelant has to be applauded but on the other hand, the mundane aspect of the music can be dead boring. The Lyndsay Diaries, while perfect for a mellow Sunday afternoon,



leans towards Dashboard Confessional territory, minus the hooks. Occasionally, Scott Windsor (with the help of Sean O'Donnell) gets the mix right, with

"Mix Tapes and Memories" being a perfect example. Having said that, the majority of tracks are pretty downbeat and move along at a painfully slow pace.
