Camarillo and Leisure Village newspaper readers are about to be involved in two major changes. Sunday, December 26, is the final publication date for the Camarillo Daily News and on December 27, CDN will be replaced by the Camarillo Star-Free Press.

Such a major change in local community newspaper publishing raises countless questions and demands complete answers. A Current Issues Forum on Friday, January 7 at 7:30 p.m. in the Assembly Room will clear the air on this important community development.

The forum features a panel of Ventura County newspaper executives who will explain the transition from the Camarillo Daily News to the Camarillo Star-Free Press. On the panel are these

VCN executives: John P. Wilcox, publisher; Juliann Pratt, PR Manager for Camarillo area; Steve Smith, circulation manager; and David Smith, Editor Camarillo Star-Free Press.

Current Issues Forum, under the leadership of Rube Davis and Sol Robin, has a long, impressive history of bringing vital community issues to LV for explanation and discussion. A high value has always been placed on the cooperative relationship between Leisure Village and the local Camarillo paper. Newspaper officials have been in the Current Issues spotlight previously.

Guidelines For Contributors to ILV

Reporters and publicity people submitting material used in Inside Leisure Village will help the staff (and may enhance the reception of their material) if they will follow basic guidelines. These include:

- 1. Type all material if at all possible. If handwritten copy is absolutely necessary, submit it early, so that we can get it typed.
- 2. Use full size 8" x 11" sheets of paper. Odd size sheets can get lost.
- 3. DO NOT TYPE IN ALL CAPS: stories in all caps must be redone.
- 4. Put writer's name, address, and phone number in upper left corner.
- 5. Leave 2" of space at top of page for our notations.
- 6. Type group's name and writer's byline.
- 7. Double space between lines and indent each paragraph. (If we sound like English teachers, you're right!)
- 8. Put the name of your group into the FIRST sentence of your story. This makes it easier to match with the right logo.
- 9. Be sure your copy can be easily read. Do you need a new typewriter ribbon? Do the keys need cleaning? No red ribbons or Xerox copies, please. Clean copy prevents misunderstandings. We suggest that you keep an accurate copy of your submission.
- 10. Submit your story on time. Deadline is on Monday at 5:00 p.m., usually the first Monday of the month. Deadlines for the next paper are listed on page 2 of each issue.

Please check the exact date and meet it. All material should be placed in the ILV - mailbox in the east hall of the Rec Center

11. If your story must be late, call the coordinator to see if a special arrangement can be made. Coordinator has the option to accept or refuse the copy.

12. Call the coordinator to arrange in advance for a photographer to cover your event. Do not call the photographer directly; he works on assignment from the coordinator only. Planning for each issue, including pictures, starts the first week of each month, so if you want pictures, we need notice.

There are about 70 items submitted to ILV for each issue. If writers use these standard rules, the result might be a better paper.

An Easy, Easy Holiday Feast For Two

By Frances Gold

This time of year there are many suggestions, recipes and menus for holiday feasts for large families who need a twenty-five pound turkey. There is almost nothing to inspire a cook who needs to prepare a festive dinner for only two on a special

Holidays can be depressing for those who, for one reason or another cannot participate in a large celebration. Just psyching the cook up to the point of "going to the trouble" for only two can be a problem therefore, it is essential to think small. That means there must be a minimum of preparation time and labor involved with few or no leftovers with which to contend. An oven meal which needs hardly any watching is ideal. A basic menu that fulfills these requirements can easily be varied to include some of the special touches which mean so much to every family. This one requires about one and a half hours from entering the kitchen to placing the dinner on the

The exception to this time schedule is the gelatin salad, which is made a day ahead.



1½ hrs. ahead prepare Cornish Hen -Melt 1 tb. margarine and add herbs, perhaps thyme, rosemary and marjoram. Rub Cornish hen inside and out with this seasoning. Lay inside two 2" pieces of celery, place on rack in a shallow pan in 350° pre**BASIC MINI-FEAST FOR TWO**

Roast Cornish hen, garnished with greens and spice crab apples (purchased) or perhaps peeled and quartered apples simmered in a sugar syrup flavored with the cinnamon drops (red hots) as our mothers used to

To serve it, place on a warm plate and carry it to the table. Light about two tbs. of previously warmed brandy and holding it close to the "pudding" pour the flame onto it. (If you have not done this before, be extra careful, it can be dangerous). 



Shelter In Place for Toxic Spill **Emergencies**

In considering the possibility of a toxic spill in an urban area the first thought of many residents is evacuation. Actually, there may be instances where an alternative procedure is the preferred response.

Depending upon the nature of the hazardous material (HAZ MAT), the amount of advance warning, the anticipated duration of the emergency, the logistics of evacuating a particular area and other factors "SHELTER-IN-PLACE"

concept is considered by most authorities as the defense of first choice in some circumstances.

As with any emergency plan, it is a good idea to give some advance thought to the details involved and to practice the procedure to bring out any problems in advance of the real event. Here are some points to be considered.

1.SHELTER-IN-PLACE means going to a pre-selected area of your residence, sealing that area off from the outside and the rest of the residence as well as possible, and remaining there until the air contamination has dispersed and it is safe to resume normal activity.

2. The shelter area should be large enough for reasonable comfort but not so large as to be complicated to seal off from out-

side contamination.

3. A bedroom and bath area typically has only one large window, a small bathroom window, and one door --- thus the sealing off process is reasonably manageable. In some houses it may have the added features of cable TV and telephone outlets.

4. Unlike an earthquake, a toxic spill does not typically interrupt utilities. The TV and radio could be important sources of information. Telephones will likely be operable but may be overloaded. If you have, or can move, a portable TV into the shelter area, you have a potential source of information. If a phone is not already in the shelter area. one of the house phones can usually be unplugged and plugged into a phone outlet in the shelter area.

5. For horizontal sliding and two sides of the moveable sash are the places to be sealed. Interior doors are not weather-stripped so need all four edges sealed. One of the wider rolls of masking tape (not less than 1-1/2 inches) Is perhaps the most commonly available material for sealing of air leaks. [A I-1/2 in. by "2160 in. (60 yds) roll of masking tape the most important thing is (about \$1.99) should be

adequate.] Note. Materials this procedure so as to be of this type should not be left on painted surfaces for extended periods of time as they may damage the

bathroom ventilation fan grills are other areas to be sealed. For bathroom ceilcombination heater-ventilation units the switches may be taped in the "Off" position to avoid inadvertent operation.

7. For the remainder of the house, all windows and exterior doors should be closed. Air conditioning and central heating should be turned off so as avoid exchange of air between the shelter area and the rest of the house.

8. Other items to include in the shelter area would be a battery operated radio, a small supply of drinking water if the area does not include a bathroom and any other items for windows the top, bottom, your personal convenience or comfort considering the fact that you may be confined to the shelter area for up to several

The above does not cover all possible circumstances but attempts to delineate the bare essentials of the SHELTER-IN-PLACE concept. Perhaps to have the family practice

prepared for a possible HAZ MAT event which could call for this strategy.

Another extremely important point: as soon as 6. Heater vents and you know the danger is past and you can exit your Shelter-in-place, dampen a towel and place over nose and lower-face to filter the air and go quickly and completely out of your residence. There may be gas trapped in the various rooms. Cautiously open outside doors and windows to let the house air out. Your house fan probably can be used to blow out any gas trapped in the ducts and/or house.


