BAEZ BLASTS 'WAR TAX;' WILL QUIT 'FOLK BAG'

Joan Baez, darling of the woolen stocking set, took a few hot licks at the income tax yesterday and intimated she'd soon give up folk songs and concerts to devote more

time to being a school teacher.

Miss Baez, who runs the School of Non-violence in Carmel, visited SF State with the school's headmaster Ira Sand-

perl to pose the question, "Why Pay for War?"

During the noon-time program sponsored by the Associated Students, the raven-haired ex-folk singer said she

refuses to pay 60 per cent of her income tax (the amount going for defense expenditures) because she "could not voluntarily support armaments for a pointless war that,

for many, was taking away the greatest freedom — the freedom to be alive."

The velvet-voiced songstress said she decided to stop paying war taxes after realizing "it was hypocritical to go around preaching and singing non-violence when they could build a small rocket with the money I pay in taxes."

"So I said no."

As a result of her refusal to contribute to government coffers, Miss Baez said she was fined and "harassed a bit" by Internal Revenue officials.

Despite pressures from an unhappy citizenry worried about "beatnik" influences, Miss Baez's School of Non-violence is still operating in Carmel.

She said there are only two requirements for enrollment in the school: applicants must be 18 years of age and want to come.

After speaking to an audience of about 500 huddled on the wind-swept Commons green, Miss Baez chatted about her future to a small group of students and friends.

She said she wanted to get out of the "folk bag" and start singing rock and roll. Her next album will be rock, followed by an album of Christmas music.

"Oh, sure, I'll get blasted for selling out," she said, "but I just won't read my mail."

A serious, bespectacled youth with unruly hair asked if her rock and roll songs would have a message.

"To dance," said Miss Baez.

Although she'll continue recording, she said she was through with concerts. "I just don't feel like folk concerts, and when I start playing rock I'm certainly not going to walk out on stage with all that stuff like Bobby does."

Bobby, of course, is Bob Dylan, wire-haired hero of the alienated, who also is making the transition from folk to rock.

About Dylan she said:

"Pete Seegar is really down on Bob because when he started rock he quit living."

Although Miss Baez has sung many of composer-poet Dylan's lyrics, she's not a music writer herself. "Music writing is a big fat drag," she said, "I've written a few and I'm just smart enough to know they're crummy."

Gatorville rejects meet

The SF State Ad Hoc Housing Committee, boycotted by its two Gatorville representatives, yesterday heard a resident of the community charge that families there "are being brainwashed."

Mrs. William Hayworth, a Gatorville resident, said leaders of the Gatorville Association had, at the urging of their attorney Melvin Belli, circulated advice to residents to stay away from the committee meeting.

Mrs. Hayworth did not reply directly to a question as to "who was doing the

brainwashing," but did say Noel Myricks, Gatorville Association president, has been leading the effort to prevent the June 30 closing of Gatorville.

"He and Norm Carlin and Paul Smyth have been the ones coming around to the doors," she said.

Acting President Stanley Paulson, who is also acting chairman of the housing committee, said the absence of the Gatorville representatives "certainly makes it difficult to operate."

"The Housing Committee was set up

in response to a plea by Gatorville," he said.

Myricks and Larry Gear were the two missing committee members.

The committee heard AS President Terry McGann suggest the possibility of extending the closing of Gatorville for a month or two so residents wouldn't have to plan their moving during finals.

Paulson suggested a Gallery Lounge question and answer meeting with the residents to discuss city housing and the possibility of setting up student co-operatives.

Committee to pick list of candidates to fill dean's post

The School of Humanities is selecting a committee to pick a slate of candidates for the Dean of Humanities post soon to be vacated by Jordan Churchill.

Churchill is resigning at the end of this year because the State Department of Finance will not grant him a leave for which he is eligible because they do not permit deans to take sabbaticals. Churchill will return from his sabbatical to teach.

The eleven-man committee will come from the eight departments of the School of Humanities.

The English Department, largest in the School of Humanities, will choose three representatives, while the Foreign Language Department

will choose two. The other six departments will have one representative each.

The representatives will most likely be chosen by the end of next week. They will then meet with Acting Vice President Donald Garrity to select candidates for the post. Three candidates are usually chosen for the five-year appointment.

The big question, according to Churchill, is whether the committee will "go outside" the SF State faculty for nominees.

Churchill said it is possible that this may happen. "The committee will call for nominations, and someone could be nominated who teaches anywhere from San Jose to Albany, New York."

Psych Forum project helps Napa patients

A Psych Forum project which assists in the rehabilitation of Napa State Hospital patients has attracted over 50 student volunteers this semester.

The Psych Forum sponsors the trips to Napa twice each month.

The rewards provided in this work are two fold, according to Bruce Marcus, chairman of the project. Marcus said, "Students get experience in public service, and patients get a chance for rehabilitation through outside contact."

The next trip will be this Saturday, March 5. Sign-ups will be taken until 4 p.m. Friday, outside Psy 104. Transportation to and from the hospital will be arranged.

'Peace soldiers' training program

"A Training Program for Peace Volunteers for Vietnam" will be discussed today at noon at the Speaker's Platform by three members of the Committee for Non-Violent Action.

The three, are Bob Meriwether, Scott McCulagee and Dan Due. Meriwether was on campus last week relating the trio's sit-in at Treasure Island Naval Base in protest of US Vietnam policy.

According to Meriwether the Program "would probably be the rebuilding of a bombed school house" either in the South or in the North and a trip to the war zone

"in which we will share the risks the soldiers face but impose no risks on others."

Speaking in the Gallery Lounge, Meriwether said that their "peace and freedom corps," modeled after Gandhi's non-violent insurrection in India, would be trained in Vietnamese language and culture, and carpentry.

After the speeches, the audience will be invited to ask questions about the Program and planned peace trips to Vietnam.

'Gentlemen' go Army

Test decides deferment

The "gentlemen's C" may very well take on a new interpretation in the light of a new government policy for determining student draft deferments.

The class standing requirements which were used during the Korean conflict will be similar to the new criteria. Freshmen have to be in the upper one half of their class at the end of the school year, sophomores in the upper two

thirds, and juniors in the upper three fourths.

Reactions to the new rulings have been diverse. While a Brandeis University dean calls the policy "totally absurd" and seven other professors say they may stop giving grades because of it, SF State Assistant Professor of Biology Margaret Bradbury feels that such action may have "possible dangerous effects on the student's future."

"There wouldn't be any basis for judging a student's

work," she explained.

Assistant Professor of Geology Raymond Sullivan considers the government policy as "fair criteria if it comes down to that" and adds that B and A students should be given preference for exemption over C students.

Class rankings and a Selective Service college qualification test will be taken into consideration by local draft boards in determining student deferments.

The three-hour test, similar

to a general aptitude test, will consist of 150 items.

Interested students must mail their applications postmarked no later than April 23 to the Science Research Associates of Chicago. The test will be given throughout the nation on May 14, May 21, and June 3.

Psych films on therapy

Three special study films will be shown by the Psych Forum, today, at 12:30 p.m. The films titled "Activity in Group Therapy," "Approach to Understanding Group Dynamics," and "Alcoholism — The Revolving Door" are about patient analyst relationships.

According to Ralph Pollard, President of the Forum, anyone who is interested in seeing the films is welcome. They will be shown in Psy 207.

FWC tourney begins

The Far Western Conference swimming championships begin today with SF State hosting the three-day meet.

Heats and finals will be held each day.

Today's schedule includes heats for the 500 freestyle, 200 individual medley, 50 freestyle, one meter diving, and 400 medley relay, beginning at 3 p.m.

The finals in each of these events begin tonight at 8 p.m.

The schedule for Friday and Saturday shows the heats beginning at 10 a.m. and the finals at 3 p.m.

Friday's events include the 200 butterfly, 200 freestyle, 100 breaststroke, 100 backstroke, 400 individual medley, and 400 freestyle relay. Saturday's finale includes competition in the 1650 freestyle, 100 freestyle, 200 backstroke, 200 breaststroke, 100 butterfly, three meter diving, and 800 freestyle relay.

In discussing his team's chance of winning the title, coach Walt Hanson said:

"Chico State is the defending champion and should be the favorite again this year. UC Davis also will be a strong contender, especially after its dual meet win over Chico last week.

"We should do pretty well, and figure to be the dark horse in the meet. There also should be a close battle between Cal
