

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is permitted via the right field stairway. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

PRESS BOX: The press box is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional seating for the media will be made in the rows immediately in front of the press box.

TELEPHONES: The press box number is (714) 449-5327. Additional phones are available in the Sports Media Relations Office, located about 200 yards to the south of Titan Field. A public pay phone is located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

RADIO LINES: Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35 per game or \$100 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Mel Franks well in advance.

PARKING: Parking is available by:

- a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday night and all day Saturday and Sunday.
- b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.



- Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship came as a result of a 57-9 season where the Titans finished 1995 with an 18-game winning streak. The Titans also became the first No. 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only two schools (Arizona State is the other school) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by USA Baseball. The three Titans who won the Golden Spikes Award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd join three other Titans who have been members of Team USA (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- 23 Titans have gone on to play in the major leagues. Dan Naulty became the most recent Titan to make it to "The Show" by pitching for the Minnesota Twins in the 1996 season.
- Cal State Fullerton is 70-36 (.660) in NCAA post-season play and is tied with Texas for the third-highest all-time winning percentage for teams that have played over 100 games in post-season competition.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska, and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won nine regional titles, all on the road.
- The Titans in 22 years at the Division I level have made it to the NCAA Tournament 18 times and have won 15 conference championships.
- Mark Kotsay became the seventh Titan to be selected in the first round of the amateur baseball draft. Kotsay, who was selected ninth overall in the 1996 draft by the Florida Marlins, joins Tim Wallach (Montreal-1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal-1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs-1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City-1988), Phil Nevin (Houston-1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco-1994).
- The Titans are tied for fourth in the nation for most wins in the last three years with 149.
- Cal State Fullerton has had 55 first-team all-conference selections in 14 years. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- The Titans have never had a losing season in the 22-year history of the program at the Division I level.

Coaching Staff



George Horton Head Coach-First Year (Cal State Fullerton, 1978)

On Sept. 4, 1996, George Horton fulfilled a life-long dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted to replace Augie Garrido, who left to take over at the University of Texas. For six years, Horton served as the associate head coach as the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the College World Series, winning the 1995 NCAA championship and placing second in 1992 and third in 1994.

Horton, a 1978 graduate, returned to Cal State Fullerton in 1991 as Garrido returned to CSF himself after a three-year stint at Illinois. During the ensuing six years, Horton had input on almost every aspect of the Fullerton baseball program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provide the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

Before coming back to Cal State Fullerton, Horton was the head coach at Cerritos College where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years.

Horton, 43, compiled a 226-53 record at Cerritos and won the California state championship in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Bret Barberie, Louis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a member of the Cerritos College team in 1972 and 1973. He won the most inspirational award in 1972. In 1973 he was the Falcon team captain, won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with current Long Beach State coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to

Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

During the years that Horton has been responsible for the pitching staff, seven pitchers have received All-America honors. Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors under Horton's coaching.

Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953.

Horton and his wife Francie have three daughters: Michele (17), Heather (13) and Rebecca (6). Horton and his family reside in Yorba Linda.

"Becoming the head coach at Cal State Fullerton is a lifetime dream that has been fulfilled. This represents the best of everything. This is the position that I wanted and it happens to be at the best place for me and my family."

Assistant Coaches



Dave Serrano Assistant Coach/ Recruiting Coordinator

Dave Serrano makes his return to Cal State Fullerton and will assume the duties of pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the program.

Serrano, 32, was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the past two seasons at the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. In 1995, Serrano helped the Volunteers reach the College World Series for the first time since 1951.

"We're excited to have the opportunity to have Dave join our coaching staff," said Head Coach George Horton. "Dave represents, in my opinion and that of many others, one of the finest young pitching coaches in college baseball. He will help take Cal State Fullerton to possibly even greater levels in the national perspective."


Serrano has coached 20 pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. His most recent success story, R.A. Dickey, was drafted in the first round of the 1996 draft by the Texas Rangers.

Serrano has previous experience as an assistant to Horton. He was an assistant coach at Cerritos College for three years (1988-90) under Horton, who moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido. Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season.

During Serrano's seven-year tenure, Cerritos won the state championship in 1989 and won the conference title six times, including 1991 when Serrano was the head coach.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two seasons at Cerritos College. He earned all-conference and JC All-America honors in his final season at Cerritos. He pitched one season at Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting a 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

He currently resides in Brea with his wife, Krista, and son, Kyle.



Rick Vanderhook Assistant Coach

Rick Vanderhook is in his 11th season with the Titans as a coach. "Hook" will coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third base coaching duties this year. Hook's aggressive style can be seen as a reason for the continued river of talent that flows through the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Vanderhook, 35, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. In his 12 years with the Titans as a player and a coach, they have made it to the College World Series five times.

He spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, Northridge was the Division II national runners-up. Vanderhook returned to Fullerton prior to the 1991 season.

Vanderhook has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

He originally came to Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans. He was also a member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team. He also played at Cerritos College for Coach Horton.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood HS under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.

He currently resides in Placentia with his wife, April, and daughter, Noelle.

Mike Kirby Volunteer Assistant Coach

Mike Kirby returns to Cal State Fullerton after serving one year as assistant coach at Los Angeles City College. Kirby was a member of the Titans' coaching staff from 1991 through 1995. His main duties include working with the catchers, bunting, offensive skills and defensive positioning. His knowledge of the game makes him an important key to the Titans' offense as the first base coach.

Kirby played at Cerritos College for Fullerton Head Coach George Horton from 1988 through 1989 and was a member of two state championship teams. He completed his career at Long Beach State in 1990 for Head Coach Dave Snow.

He has also spent numerous summers as an assistant coach for the Brewster Whitecaps of the Cape Cod League.

Kirby lives in Los Alamitos with his wife, Juli. The couple is expecting their first child in June.



Rick Stassi Strength and Conditioning Coach

Rick Stassi begins his sixth season as the strength and conditioning advisor for the baseball program. Among his accomplishments, Stassi has trained over 100 professional baseball players, including nine No. 1 draft picks. He is currently the Head Performance Coach at IntenseCity in Irvine and was formerly responsible for minor league player development for the Seattle Mariners.

He also assists the baseball programs at Cypress College, Orange Coast College and Southern California College.

Stassi earned his bachelor's degree in kinesiology and health promotion from Cal State Fullerton in 1993 and will receive his master's degree this spring.

1997 Season Preview

Despite losing most of its offense and top pitchers from last year, the Cal State Fullerton baseball team should see its share of success in 1997. Not only will the Titans have some new faces in the field, but changes will also be seen in the dugout. **George Horton** begins his first year as head coach after serving six years as an associate head coach with the Titans.

There will be comparisons between Horton and former head coach Augie Garrido, but Horton contends things should remain relatively the same.

"We've had success with this system and there's no reason to change," said Horton.

The leader of the offensive charge for the Titans in 1997 should come from first baseman **C.J. Ankrum** (.312, 5 HR, 60 RBI in 1996). Ankrum, a 1997 preseason third-team All-America selection by *Baseball America*, is expected to improve on his power numbers.

Letterman **Jerome Alviso** (.338, 2 HR, 21 RBI) moves from second base to shortstop and **Mike Lamb** (.324, 5 HR, 30 RBI) becomes the Titans' starting third baseman.

Another key returner will be outfielder **Scott Seal** (.326, 2 HR, 21 RBI), who will see more playing time in 1997.

Depth will help a loaded offensive lineup in 1997.

"We will be able to field a lineup with nine guys who will be tough outs," said Horton. "We will get tested early in the season by some of the top pitchers in the nation, but the offense represents the most experience we have on this team."

One of Horton's first moves as head coach was to bring in **Dave Serrano** as the new pitching coach and recruiting coordinator from Tennessee. Serrano will have to work with a young staff, one that will need to step up if the Titans are to be successful in 1997.

The Titans lost five pitchers from last year and their only returning starter is **Scott Hild** (9-4, 4.66 ERA, 72 SO).

"Our strength is that we have six guys who will be able to compete in the weekend or weekday games," said Serrano. "Besides Hild, most of these guys have not pitched here at Fullerton and do not have Division I experience, but being here early has given me a chance to work with this group and help them to improve.

"For us to get to where we want to, which is to play for the national championship, pitching will have to play the biggest role."

If the Titans are to participate in the 1997 College World Series, they will need to focus on a good work ethic and hope the intangibles can push the team to the post-season.

"Our goal is to do things the best we can," said Horton.
"We need to maximize our individual and team abilities. We have the talent to get to Omaha, but we will have our work cut out for us to get there."

POSITION OUTLOOK

First Base—Ankrum returns as the starting first baseman for the Titans. As the only remaining starter from the Titans' 1995 national championship squad, his leadership will be depended upon this season. Backing up Ankrum will be **Jojo Hernandez**

(Mt. San Antonio College) and **Bobby Sanchez** (St. Ambrose University).

Second Base—This will be one of the most competitive positions with three players vying for the spot. **Nakia Hill** (.250, 0 HR, 1 RBI) is in his third year with the program and has shown offensive improvement. **Ryan Owens** (La Habra—Sonora HS) is a highly-touted freshman who will battle with junior transfer **Gaby Halcovich** (College of the Canyons) to get playing time.

Shortstop—Alviso moves from second base to shortstop to fill the void created by the departure of Jack Jones (.276, 5 HR, 23 RBI). His defensive play will be a factor and his switch hitting ability (like Lamb) will help the offense.

Third Base—Utilityman Lamb finds a permanent home at third. He will surprise opponents with his bat this season. **Danny Phillips** (Northridge—Chatsworth HS) will get some time to adapt to Division I play.

Catcher—This will be another position where there is not a clear starter. **Mike Wright** redshirted last year and will battle with highly-touted freshman **Craig Patterson** (Fullerton—El Dorado HS) to make up some of the numbers caused by the loss of Olympian Brian Loyd (.317, 8 HR, 64 RBI).

Outfield—The Titans lost a lot of offense when Mark Kotsay (.402, 20 HR, 91 RBI) and Jeremy Giambi (.396, 6 HR, 58 RBI) signed professional contracts, but will have a number of talented players fighting for a starting spot. Redshirt freshman Chris Beck (Placentia—El Dorado HS) has a good opportunity to play, along with junior transfers Pete Fukuhara (Canada College) and Ryan Fullerton (Rancho Santiago College). Look for a rotation among these players for the outfield and the designated hitter.

Pitchers—Hild is the lone returning starter from last year. Senior **Matt Wise** (3-0, 5.61 ERA) and junior transfer **John Alkire** (University of Tennessee) have good opportunities to fill starting roles. Redshirt freshman **Steve Lawson** has a shot to be the midweek starter and could improve the pitching staff if he works himself into the rotation.

Returner **Michael Greenlee** (3-2, 4.97 ERA), redshirts **Brian Tokarse** and **Tim Baron**, junior transfer **Tim Palmer** (Fresno City College) and freshman **Mike Garner** (Fullerton—Fullerton HS) will carry the middle relief duties.

The two closers in 1997 will be returner **Dustin Spencer** (1-0, 3.75 ERA) and junior transfer **Brandon Duckworth** (College of Southern Idaho). Spencer has changed his delivery which will help him as a closer, while Duckworth also has an opportunity to sneak into the starting rotation.

Remaining injury-free as a staff will be a key for the Titans if they are to be successful in 1997.

The Cal State Fullerton baseball tradition had a most humble beginning, starting out as a club team and playing on a field literally scratched out of an orange grove. Only the wildest dreamer would have foreseen a program that now features three national championships, nine regional titles, 15 conference crowns and 23 alumni with major league playing experience.

It's been a memorable three decades since Beryl Kempton and Warren Beck brought the program into the world. Bill Fulton nursed it into adolescence and Augie Garrido guided it into maturity as Titan baseball developed into a national power. Larry Cochell kept the tradition alive with two College World Series appearances in his three-year tenure at Fullerton and Garrido did not miss a beat since when he returned in 1991 after three seasons at Illinois.

Kempton was the university employee who graded the field out of the orange trees. Home plate sat near the old orchard residence, a brick structure now known as "Titan House." It's reportedly the second oldest existing structure in the city and is currently being renovated to host athletic offices.

The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west, paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive. A split rail and wire mesh screen served as the outfield barrier.

Beck, a member of the faculty, was the inaugural coach. He fielded a "club" team which played local junior colleges and "pickup" teams from neighboring universities in its maiden season.

In 1965, the program became a full fledged intercollegiate sport with Fulton serving as the head coach. He led them into play in the California Collegiate Athletic Association and set the groundwork for the success of the 1970s as he battled Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona.

The catalyst to greatness was Garrido, who arrived from rival Cal Poly SLO and began developing a second field farther to the north. A new backstop, batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools.

After a rebuilding year in 1973, the Titans began establishing their successful tradition in 1974 by winning the CCAA championship.

The 1975 season saw a move up to Division I status and entry in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. But the surging Titans did not miss a beat. They won the PCAA championship by one game over Pacific and then strolled onto Dedeaux Field on the campus of the University of Southern California and won the NCAA Western Regional, depriving the Trojans of a shot at a sixth consecutive NCAA championship.

Fullerton's first trip to Omaha for the College World Series was brief, to say the least. They lost their first two games, to Arizona State and Oklahoma, and were sent flying back to Los Angeles. But the experience would pay benefits.

Fullerton repeated as PCAA champions in 1976, this time by a comfortable four games over San Diego State. But then came realignment of the league. The seven-team Southern California Baseball Association was formed by Fullerton, Cal State Los Angeles, San Diego State, Pepperdine, Loyola Marymount, UC Santa Barbara and Long Beach State. Pacific, Fresno State and San Jose State became part of the Northern California Baseball Association.

The new schedule failed to disrupt the Titans' champion-


ship rhythm, although they had to share the inaugural SCBA title in 1977 with Cal State Los Angeles. Fullerton lost a one-game playoff with the Diablos but gained an at-large NCAA bid where they lost in the regional title game to Washington State in Pullman.

There was another SCBA title in 1978 and regional elimination at USC before the Titans struck paydirt in 1979. They parlayed another SCBA crown into a national championship, but they did it the hard way.

Fullerton lost the regional opener at Fresno, but came back through the losers' bracket, finally beating UCLA twice to earn a return trip to Omaha. Again, the Titans lost the opener, this time to Mississippi State. But a confident Garrido still liked his team's chances and they proved him right. They won five games in a row in-

cluding a 2-1 verdict over Arkansas for the NCAA championship, the first title for Fullerton in a men's sport in Division I play.

Pitcher Tony Hudson was the College World Series Most Outstanding Player. Tim Wallach became the first Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award, given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by the United States Baseball Federation.

The fruits of victory did not include a home playing site worthy of a regional tournament, so Fullerton began a frustrating streak of post-season play in 1980. The Titans won the SCBA title again but had to go to Tucson, Arizona, where the host Arizona Wildcats won the regional on their way to the NCAA title. In 1981, the Titans won the SCBA but lost in the regional in Tempe, Arizona, to the hosts, the eventual national champion Arizona State Sun Devils.

Fullerton avenged the defeat, however, knocking off the highly regarded Sun Devils in their own backyard after another SCBA crown in 1982. However, the third trip to Omaha proved less than charming. Fullerton set a dubious record, becoming the first CWS team not to score as the Titans were shut out by Wichita State and Maine and hustled home.

In 1983, the Titans shared the SCBA crown but lost a one-game playoff to UC Santa Barbara for the automatic NCAA tournament bid. No matter, the Titans' 49-19-1 record earned them an at-large berth and another trip to Tempe, where the Sun Devils prevailed.

A slow start in 1984 after a couple of late summer professional signings stripped the pitching staff of its depth left Fullerton's reign in the SCBA teetering. But a realignment of the infielders seemed to work wonders and the team caught fire. A surge that would see the Titans win 37 of their last 42 games carried all the way to Omaha and a second NCAA championship.

Again, the road to Omaha was via Fresno, where the Titans survived a "Murderers' Row" field of USC, San Diego State and

the host Bulldogs of Fresno State and won the regional in 100+ degree heat.


At Omaha, venerable institutions Michigan, Miami, Arizona State, Oklahoma State, and finally, the University of Texas, stood in the way of a second NCAA title. In a World Series dominated by the hitters and their aluminum bats, the Titans showed a national ESPN audience there was quality if not quantity on the pitching mound. Todd Simmons, Jack Reinholtz and recordsetting reliever Scott Wright did yeoman's duty and left it for diminuitive lefty Ed Delzer to turn in the performance of his life and beat Texas, 3-1, in the title game.

There were other heroes, however. John Fishel set a CWS record for hits and won the Most Outstanding Player trophy. Kirk Bates delivered a crucial bases-loaded single to help beat ASU. The Titans outslugged Oklahoma State behind a bases-loaded triple by Tom Thomas and a two-run double by Bob Caffrey to earn the winner-take-all rematch with the Longhorns, where John Bryant stole a base to set up the tying run and tripled for the key hit in a two-run fourth inning.

The 5-foot-7, 133-pound Delzer allowed a couple of infield hits in the first inning for a Texas run, but that was to be all. He pitched a near-perfect game until leg cramps forced him from the mound to open the eighth inning. Enter Wright, the NCAA's most prolific reliever ever. He slammed the door for his 22nd save.

Defending the title proved too much for the 1985 Titans to

handle. Competing in the Southern Division of a reconstituted PCAA, the Titans finished in first place in their division but the pitching came up too thin in a playoff series at Fresno State that decided the league championship and the NCAA Tournament's automatic berth. And, with the nation's most difficult schedule taking its toll on an overall 36-32-1 record, the Titans did not get an at-large bid and were left out of the playoffs for the first time in 11 years.




Longo Garcia was a member of the 1988 team that reached the College World Series.

By standards of most schools, the 1986 season was a successful one. The Titans posted a 36-21 record and won the Best of the West Tournament in Fresno as part of another challenging schedule. But, for the second year in a row, there was no league title nor NCAA playoffs as the season turned on one inning. Fullerton blew a 6-2

lead in the ninth inning at home against UNLV and Matt Williams on April 5 and could never recover from the loss, finishing in third place behind UC Santa Barbara and UNLV.

When Fullerton opened up the 1987 season losing five of its first six games, PCAA rivals thought Fullerton's dominance had ended. But despite a schedule that saw them play all the contenders on the road, Fullerton roared through the league schedule, winning 12 of its next 13 games on its way to a 18-3 PCAA mark and a five-game margin over surprise runners-up UC Irvine.

The Titans' regular season record of 42-15 earned them a national ranking as high as No. 3 and sent them to the NCAA

playoffs with a berth in the South II Regional in New Orleans. The Titans were the top seed against five Louisiana schools and drew the No. 6 seed, Southern University from Baton Rouge. Representing a conference that never had won an NCAA playoff game, the Jaguars nevertheless got a brilliant pitching performance from converted reliever Allan Ratliff, who beat CSF, 1-0, in a bizarre game that saw no infield chances for Southern. Ratliff handled a bunt and a comebacker

and all the other outs were via fly balls or strikeouts.

Thrust into the losers' bracket, the Titans resorted to their deep pitching staff to outlast all but Louisiana State. Mike Harkey shut out Tulane and Larry Casian did likewise to Louisiana Tech. But Longo Garcia, the hard-luck loser to Southern, could not handle the Tigers as the Titans had to settle for a 44-17 season.

The 1988 season brought a changing of the guard, but no deviation in the Titans' success story. Garrido resigned and headed for the University of Illinois where a lucrative financial offer and the challenge to build a winner in a cold weather location proved irresistible. Cochell left the cold of Evanston at Northwestern University and headed west.

After an inconsistent start, the new combination clicked and the Titans won 30 out of 35 games before losing a home series and the conference championship to Fresno State. But an atlarge bid was tendered and Fullerton parlayed it into a return trip to Omaha by winning the South Regional in Starkville, Mississippi. Mike Ross hit a three-run homer with two outs in the bottom of the ninth for a 6-3 win over Texas A&M after the Titans had beaten the host Bulldogs twice in their own stadium.

Fullerton continued its winning ways in a revised CWS format in Omaha with well-pitched victories over Stanford and Miami. But Longo Garcia and Mark Beck could not repeat their feat and Stanford came back through the losers' bracket to drop the Titans to third place with a pair of Cardinal victories.

Despite the presence of All-Americans Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans endured Fullerton's worst season since 1973. The Titans finished in the second division of the Big West at 10-11 and the overall record was 30-27.

The end of a dynasty? Rival coaches thought so and picked the Titans to finish fifth in the Big West in 1990. Instead, the team romped to its first conference title since 1987 and rode that momentum to an impressive sweep of the Central Regional in Austin, Texas. Twice the Titans beat the host Longhorns on their own turf to earn a sixth trip to Omaha.

They crashed at the CWS, literally. Outfielder Rich Gonzales collided with the left field wall and concern for his health distracted the Titans in losses to Oklahoma State and The Citadel.

Cochell accepted a lucrative offer to coach at Oklahoma which created an opening for Garrido's return in 1991, a year the Titans would use Amerige Park in downtown Fullerton for games and practice with construction underway on a new stadium.

Fullerton started slowly, but ended the season on a high note winning 10 of its final 12 games and clinching a share of the conference championship, the second title in as many years.

By virtue of head-to-head competition, Fresno State gained the automatic berth to post-season play. The NCAA Selection Committee did not look upon Fullerton's strong finish as being good enough to earn an at-large bid to tournament play. The snub left the Titans at home, but provided motivation for the 1992 squad.

The Titans had a dream season in 1992, one that seemed destined to result in a third national title. They opened the long awaited and revamped Titan Field in April, saw Fullerton alumnus Kevin Costner throw out the first pitch at the dedication game in May and blew through an NCAA Regional tournament at defending national champion LSU. But they came up one run short to longtime rival Pepperdine in the national title game televised by CBS.

Phil Nevin, who was an outstanding kicker and punter for the football team for three years, was selected *Baseball America's* Player of the Year, the College World Series Most Outstanding Player (the first player from a non-championship team to win


the award since Dave Winfield did so in 1973), Big West Conference Player of the Year, was the first player picked in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros, started at third base in the 1992 Olympics for Team USA and became the second Titan to win the Golden Spikes Award.

For 1993, the Titans had beaten USC twice during the regular season for the first time since 1987, but the Trojans would get their revenge by beating Cal State Fullerton both times in the Central II Regional in Austin, Texas.

In 1994, the Titans fought their way through the Midwest I Regional at Oklahoma State and beat the host Cowboys in extra innings to make their eighth appearance at the College World Series.

A highlight of the 1994 CWS came against LSU when Fullerton tied a tournament record, scoring 11 runs in the first inning of a 20-6 victory over the Tigers. Georgia Tech, which was shut out for the first time in several seasons in a February game in the Anaheim Hilton & Towers Classic by the Titans in Fullerton, had returned the favor in the opening game of the CWS. The Titans fought back through the losers' bracket, routing LSU and overpowering Florida State behind Mark Kotsay's seven-RBI performance and

the gutty relief pitching of Dan Ricabal, who shut out the Seminoles over the final 8.1 innings. That earned Fullerton another shot at Georgia Tech and another pitching duel developed between the Yellowjackets' Brad Rigby and Fullerton's Mike Parisi. The game was decided in the 12th inning when Nomar Garciaparra homered for Georgia Tech in the top of the inning




Ted Silva set a school record with 18 victories in 1995, including a win in the national title game against USC.

and the Titans stranded Dante Powell at third base with no outs in the bottom of the frame, ending the Titans' season.

Teamwork played a major role in the 1995 season. Thanks to an unselfish work ethic, the Titans put together the best season in Fullerton history in absorbing only nine losses. Led by Kotsay, who won the Golden Spikes Award, Smith Award and was named Collegiate Baseball's Co-Player of the Year; All-Americans

pitcher Ted Silva and catcher Brian Loyd, Cal State Fullerton earned its third national championship. Fullerton had to play with the pressure of being the No. 1 ranked team in the nation through most of the season, but used a blue-collar attitude to accomplish its goal to win it all. The Titans put together an 18-

game win streak to finish the season as they steamrolled through the postseason, scoring 39 runs in four games at the College World Series.

Through the start of the 1996 season, it looked as if the Titans had not skipped a beat from their domination of opposing teams through the end of the 1995 season. The Titans opened up with a 38-4 mark, but hit an inexplicable stretch where they lost 12 of their last 19 games. Cal State Fullerton finished fourth in the Big West Conference, but still made it to the NCAA Midwest Regional in Wichita, Kansas.

Mark Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine RBI in the Titans' opening round win over Delaware and another win against Rice put Fullerton into a key matchup with host Wichita State. Regional MVP Brandon Baird, however, shut down the Titans with a magnificent pitching performance as the Shockers won, 6-1. The Titans battled in a rematch against Rice as Kotsay hit two home runs, including one in the top of the eighth inning to put Fullerton ahead. But Rice got the last laugh with six runs in the bottom of the inning and a 13-10 decision to end the Titans' season in disappointing fashion.

The season was not a total loss and Kotsay and Brian Loyd both represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia, as Team USA won the bronze medal.

George Horton becomes the Titans' third Division I head coach and as the program heads into the 21st century, the many qualities that have made baseball successful at Cal State Fullerton appear to be intact.

1996 Season Review

A tale of two seasons.

A baseball machine reduced to human frailties.

A near-perfect 11 weeks before an inexplicable five-week slump.

The law of averages?

Take your pick, any of these phrases captures the bizarre 1996 Cal State Fullerton baseball season. The stark contrast demands attention over the No. 1 national rankings, the continued exploits of Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, the successfully rebuilt pitching staff and the pursuit of back-to-back national titles.

The Titans went 38-4 before posting a 7-12 record in the final part of the season. A team that averaged better than 10 runs over the first 40 games could only muster a 5.95 runs per game average in the last 21 contests. A starting rotation with a collective 27-2 record on April 20 went 6-7 in the last 19 games. The right-left short-relief tandem of Mark Chavez and Mark Kotsay was 2-1 with 10 saves in 11 opportunities with a combined earned run average of 2.65 through 42 games. In the last 15 they were 0-3 with 3 saves and a 8.46 ERA.

The mystery begins with high expectations. The 1995 NCAA champion Titans were arguably the best college baseball team ever. They posted a 57-9 record against a nationally competitive schedule and went through post-season play undefeated to cap a season-ending 18-game winning streak. The roll continued on a .961 winning pace (18-0 to finish 1995 and 31-2 to begin 1996) at 49-2 through April 2. The first 17 games of the 1996 schedule were against ranked opponents and they were 15-2.

Opening Night of the season came on February 2 at Stanford, where the Cardinal were dedicating lights at Sunken Diamond. Kyle Peterson rose to the occasion and took a no-hitter into the eighth inning as Stanford beat the Titans, 5-0. It would be Fullerton's final loss of the month.

The Titans bounced back to shut out Stanford, 7-0, (the third game of the series was rained out) and then came home to sweep three-game series with Arizona and Fresno State around road victories at Pepperdine and UCLA. The winning streak went to 12 as the Titans rolled through their own Anaheim Hilton and Towers Tournament, beating fellow 1995 College World Series participants Florida State, Oklahoma and USC, the latter in a 17-4 rout.

A seemingly annual road trip to Austin, Texas, proved equally fruitful with another three-game sweep of the Longhorns to raise the winning streak to 15 games. Randy Wolf pitched seven shutout innings and Pepperdine snapped the victory streak in Fullerton, 1-0. It would be Fullerton's only loss of March.

The Titans opened Big West play with a three-game sweep at Pacific to trigger what became a 16-game winning streak. Additional three-game sweeps of BYU, Hawaii-Hilo and Big West foe UNLV were fueled by a remarkable offensive surge. Fullerton scored in double digits in 12 of the 16 games with five games of 16 or more runs. The team batting average rose as high as .360, which dwarfed the .336 of 1995 and the school record of .337 in 1980.

The start of the Titans' eventual slide emerged on April 4 in Las Cruces, New Mexico. The Titans fell behind to New Mexico State, 6-0, and their three-run rally in the ninth inning came up short, 6-5. The next day in the first half of a doubleheader, the Aggies used a two-out, two-run home run in the bottom of the ninth for a 7-6 victory and back-to-back losses for Fullerton.

Fullerton rebounded to win the nightcap over the Aggies and six more games in a row. Included was a three-game sweep over Nevada and a second win of the year over USC to indicate that the losses in Las Cruces were flukes.

Rain forced another doubleheader on April 20 in San Jose. The Titans won the opener, 3-1, behind Brent Billingsley to go to 38-4 overall and 11-2 in the Big West Conference. But the Spartans won the nightcap, 6-4, and then won the next day with a run in the bottom of the ninth inning. The Titans would go on to lose their final two Big West series -- 2-1 at Long Beach State and 2-1 at home to UC Santa Barbara, to finish with a 13-8 record and a fourth-place finish, two games behind Long Beach State.

The staggering pace continued. After beating Long Beach State in the opening round of the Big West Conference Tournament at Titan Field on May 10, Fullerton was beaten by UNLV and Long Beach State. The Titans completed the regular season by losing two out of three at Miami in a playoff-like series in which all three games were decided late and by one run. Fullerton had lost two out of three games in the final five weekends of the season.

Despite the late swoon, the Titans garnered a No. 2 seed at the NCAA Midwest Regional in Wichita, Kansas. Fullerton opened up the Regional against the University of Delaware and, once again, Kotsay showed his baseball prowess. He went 5-for-5 with two doubles, a home run and an NCAA post-season, record-tying 9 RBI to lead CSF to the 19-8 rout.

The second game matched the Titans against a familiar opponent in Rice. During the 1995 NCAA South I Regional in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, the Titans beat Rice twice, including the championship game, to advance to Omaha. Not to be outdone by his teammate, catcher Brian Loyd smacked two home runs in a 6-RBI performance as Fullerton beat Rice again, 7-3, to set up a very important game against host Wichita State.

A circus-like atmosphere ensued on May 25 between the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds of the Regional. Titan alum and actor Kevin Costner was just one of a crowd of 5,530 to watch the battle which featured two left-handers in Billingsley and Wichita State's Brandon Baird.

Baird's offspeed pitches set the tone when he struck out Steve Chatham, Jeremy Giambi and Kotsay in the top of the first. The Titans quickly lost their composure in front of the hostile crowd as attested when second baseman Jerome Alviso was ejected from the game in the second inning.

The Shockers provided the adequate offense for Baird, who threw six and one third innings of shutout ball, as the host team beat Fullerton, 6-1, and put a serious dent into the Titans' chances of repeating as national champions.

Rain hampered the start of the Titans' next game against Rice. The delays, however, only added to the tempo of the game which proved to be just as wild as the weather systems.

Fullerton scored once in the first and added three more in the second for the early 4-0 lead. Rice came back with five runs to take the 5-4 lead into the sixth. The lead switched back and forth as both teams scored twice in the sixth.

Down 7-6 in the eighth, Kotsay hit his second home run of the game as the Titans scored four times to take the 10-7 lead. Rice, however, got its runs when it counted and burst the Titans' balloon with six runs in the bottom of the eighth. The 13-10 win by Rice ended Cal State Fullerton's season, one that had started with such promise

It was a tale of two halves for the Titans in 1996 and, unfortunately, the disappointing half came at the end of the season.

Big West Conference

Founded in 1969, the Big West Conference consists of universities in California, Nevada, Idaho, Texas, Utah and New Mexico.

Members include Boise State (no baseball), Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Cal State Fullerton, Idaho State (no baseball), Long Beach State, UC Irvine (no baseball), New Mexico State, North Texas (no baseball), UC Santa Barbara, Utah State (no baseball). Nevada and Pacific.

With Cal Poly San Luis Obispo being the only new member to have baseball, the Big West Conference brought in Sacramento State to make two four-team divisions: Cal State Fullerton, Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, Long Beach State and UC Santa Barbara in the Western Division; Nevada, New Mexico State, Pacific and Sacramento State in the Eastern Division.

Each team will play six games (three home, three away) against the other three teams in each division and three games against the teams in the other division with the sites alternating each year for a schedule of 30 conference games for each team.

If birth certificates were give to conferences, the one issued to the then Pacific Coast Athletic Association would be dated July 1, 1969. However, the unofficial history of the conference pre-dates that point of time, extending back to 1967.

Cal State Los Angeles, Fresno State, Long Beach State and San Diego State were members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, long recognized as the nation's premier college circuit.

That conference was classified college division and therein lay a major source of dissatisfaction. Beginning in 1963, the four institutions had captured 16 national titles. The number swelled to 21 if the mythical football championships were included.

With no more territory to conquer at the college division, a step up to university ranks had to be considered.

At the time, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara and Pacific were members of the West Coast Athletic Conference but were enduring a strained relationship due to the limit of conference sports sponsored. That, plus the fact that national football figures UOP and SJSU were already competing as independents, led the schools to pursue a more broad-based conference alignment.

Therefore, officials of the seven colleges and universites assembled as a body in May of 1969, tied up loose ends and less than two months later the PCAA was born.

Direction in the early days of the conference came from such men as Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, vice-chancellor at UC Santa Barbara, the first president and chairman of the founders committee. J. Kenneth Fagans provided guidance as the league's first commissioner. Jesse T. Hill, one of the nation's most successful directors of athletics at USC, followed Fagans as the conferences's first full-time commissioner.

SJSU was already labeled a university division school in all sports when the PCAA emerged. San Diego State and UOP were granted university division status in the summer of 1970 and the remaining conference members shed the college division by 1972.

The conference's first 20 years were characterized by expansion and change.

The original PCAA lineup changed in the early years and by

1975, charter members UCSB and CSLA had dropped football and SDSU bolted the conference in football only. In 1974, Cal State Fullerton moved into the conference. By 1977, UC Irvine joined the Big West and UCSB was back in -- both as nonfootball playing institutions -- while Utah State became the first non-California member of the circuit, transforming the PCAA into a regional conference.

Nevada-Las Vegas (1981) and New Mexico State (1984) soon followed suit, bringing the league's membership to 10 universities.

In the fall of 1983, the PCAA became the first western conference to incorporate women's athletic programs into the conference. Charter women's members UC Irvine, UC Santa Barbara and UNLV competed in five championships.

By the end of 1985, Pacific, Hawaii, Cal State Fullerton, Long Beach State, San Diego State, Fresno State and San Jose State had joined the women's conference. The PCAA upped its women's sponsorship to eight championships.

The PCAA began its 20th year of existence by changing its name to the Big West Conference in 1988. With the inclusion of the states of Utah, Nevada, and New Mexico into the loop, the term "Big West" more accurately represented the conference. In addition, Fresno State left the conference and was replaced by the University of Nevada, Reno, in the fall of 1992.

The Big West Conference has had baseball teams advance to the College World Series in eight of the last nine years and two Big West teams appeared in the 1988 and 1991 tournaments. In addition, college baseball's Player of the Year has come from the Big West in three of the past six seasons.

Numerous major league players have come out of the PCAA and Big West. The most notable are: Cal State Fullerton - Tim Wallach, Brent Mayne and Mike Schooler; UNLV - Matt Williams, Cecil Fielder and Todd Stottlemyre; San Jose State -Mark Langston and Ken Caminiti; Long Beach State - Steve Trachsel and Randy Moffitt; Pacific - Joe Ferguson; UC Santa Barbara - Chris Speier; and UC Irvine - Brady Anderson.

The 1997 season marks the third year of the Big West postseason tournament. The top two teams in each division during the regular season meet in a double-elimination format to determine the conference's automatic berth into the NCAA tournament. The 1997 event will be hosted by Cal State Fullerton and Long Beach State on May 15-18.





Titans in the Major Leagues

Twenty-three products of the Cal State Fullerton baseball program have worked their way into major league box scores with several more stars of recent Titan teams waiting in the wings for their opportunity.

The first Titan to play in the major leagues was left-handed pitcher **Dan Boone**, who broke in with the Angels and Padres after helping Fullerton into the 1975 College World Series and then made a dramatic comeback with Baltimore in 1990. He was followed by **Dan Whitmer** at Toronto (1976) and California.

The biggest name came next as **Tim Wallach**, the 1979 College Player of the Year, broke in with the Montreal Expos. He has played in several All-Star Games for the National League including the 1989 Classic in Anaheim. He finished the 1996 season with the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Arriving at the 'Show' in the mid-80s were right-handed pitcher **Jeff Robinson** with the San Francisco Giants, Pittsburgh Pirates, New York Yankees, California Angels and Chicago Cubs; outfielder **Andre David**, who hit a home run in his first at bat for the Minnesota Twins; and outfielder **John Christensen** with the New York Mets, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners and the Twins.

Left-handed pitcher **Greg Mathews** burst upon the scene in St. Louis in 1986 to become a valued member of the Cardinals' starting rotation. He started in the Championship Series for the Cardinals. Recurring arm problems have plagued his career and he is now playing in triple A.

Getting his debut in 1987 was **Bill Moore** with Montreal before the Titan Alumni Club exploded in 1988 with five additions. The most heralded was pitcher **Mike Harkey**, who was starting at Wrigley Field for the Chicago Cubs 16 months after his last Titan appearance. He was selected *USA Today's* Minor League Player of the Year in 1988 but suffered a knee injury during spring training and missed the Cubs' 1989 divisional title team. In 1990, he was the Cubs' No. 2 winner and placed fifth in Rookie of the Year balloting. He spent the 1991 season rehabilitating a shoulder injury and returned to the Chicago rotation in 1992. The Cubs released him before the 1994 season and he was signed by the Colorado Rockies before having success with the Angels.

Earlier in the 1988 season, former Titan reliever **Mike** Schooler surfaced with the Mariners and was their top stopper and one of the best in baseball before being released and signing on with the Texas Rangers. In Philadelphia, **Shane Turner** was one of the players who tried to fill the shoes of Hall of Famer Mike Schmidt at third base. In Houston, **John Fishel**, the MVP of the 1984 College World Series, was part of the Astros' futile run at the NL West before being traded to the Yankees. **Kevin Reimer** started in more than 100 games in right field for the Texas Rangers in 1991, DH in 1992 and signed with the Milwaukee Brewers in 1993.

Arrivals in 1990 were outfielder **Dann Howitt** with the Oakland A's, catcher **Brent Mayne**, who was Kansas City's first-round draft choice in 1988, and lefthander **Larry Casian**, a 1987 draft by Minnesota. All three made starting appearances in nearby Anaheim Stadium. Howitt will be remembered as being the last player to get a hit (a home run) off of future Hall-of-Famer Nolan Ryan. Mayne became a member of the New York Mets in the winter of 1995.

Two other familiar names made their first appearances in 1991. **Andy Mota** was called up by the Astros and his brother **Jose** played in more than 30 games at second base for the Padres.

Among former Titans jumping to the majors in 1993 were third baseman **David Staton**, a triple crown winner in the Padres' system in 1990, and left-handed pitcher **Huck Flener**, who helped the Toronto Blue Jays pitching staff during the season-ending stretch drive to the 1993 World Series.

Righthander **Gary Buckels** resurrected his professional career at a tryout camp and made his way to the St. Louis Cardinals' pitching staff during the middle part of the abbreviated 1994 season.

Phil Nevin, the 1992 College Player of the Year and No. 1 pick in the '92 amateur baseball draft played for Houston during the 1995 season before being traded to the Detroit Tigers.

Pitcher **Dan Naulty** became the most recent Titan pro when he joined the Minnesota Twins at the start of the 1996 season.

The University



California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents — and future — of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 38th year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 115,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university — with its main campus in Fullerton and a branch in Mission Viejo — is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 22,000 students currently enrolled and more than 2,200 faculty and staff employees, Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by approximately \$600 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven schools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and

Natural Science and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has gained national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. In all there are 94 degree programs — with 44 of them at the graduate level — plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities, and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton its the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 16th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduate, with a ranking of 12th for

both Asians and Hispanics (No. 3 for both in Communications and No. 4 for Asians in both Education and Business). In California, the university is No. 1 for awarding undergraduate degrees in business and management to Hispanics and Native Americans, and communications degrees to Hispanics, Asians and Native Americans. A No. 2 ranking is held in California for undergraduate education degrees to Hispanic Americans.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as 31 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on-and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program is aimed chiefly at students, but is open to the public.


Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fund-raising campaign. The center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In less than four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of southern California.

Graduation ceremonies are among the many events that take place in the Titan Sports Complex. The complex features a 10,000-seat multi-purpose stadium, 1,750-seat baseball stadium, two lighted softball fields, an all-weather eight-lane track and 12 tennis courts.



Administration



Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on August 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of

the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.



John Easterbrook, Athletics Director

John Easterbrook is in his third year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department, riding the momentum of a most noteworthy inaugural 24 months. Under his leadership, the Titans have come out in the black budgetarily and had three teams to the NCAA quarterfinals led by the 1995 championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on September 1, 1994, by President Milton

Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 57, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1961) in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

Athletic Department

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim 11 national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Star major league third baseman, baseball players and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, a Miss America candidate, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league draft?

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and Coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a firstround NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which seemingly specialized in last-second wins in 1988-89 behind 1995 NBA All-Star forward Cedric Ceballos of the Los Angeles Lakers, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding. In 1993-94, Autumn Hollyfield was the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter and in 1994-95, Koko Lahanas led the nation in scoring.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

With the arrival of Coach Augie Garrido, baseball exploded on the national scene. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, most recently of the Los Angeles Dodgers. He won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. Garrido

directed a national second-place finish in the 1992 College World Series and a key member of that team, third baseman Phil Nevin, was selected as the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros. The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, posting a 57-9 mark en route to their third national championship, led by player of the year Mark Kotsay.

Five baseball players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd joining the elite group by playing last summer for Team USA in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Olympians who have gone through the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making eight trips to the College World Series and 17 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country. Garman and the Titans made their first appearance since 1987 at the Women's College World Series in 1995 and placed fifth.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994 and then won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships. She was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Division II beginnings. Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnerup finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by single-season receiving record holder Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen, the younger brother of the Kansas City Chiefs' Marcus Allen.

With the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's team was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto and compete at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina. In 1996, the team made it to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the third time in four years while the women's team finished with a 13-6-2 record.

The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletics.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide academic and effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Cal State Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Counselor Pam Vazquez and Administrative Assistant Barbara Kempton and four half-time graduate assistants -- Heather Killeen, Dona Bruner, Kim Bradley and Dan Michael, who serve as academic counselors and peer mentors. Kempton has been at CSUF for over 30 years, and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable to student-athletes who may need help with adminstrative paperwork.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system --periodic grade checks -- in place which encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with coursework and may require academic support.

What is a Titan?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the student's decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories where named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became know that spring afternoon in 1962.

Student-athletes at CSUF take an average of 4 1/2 to 5 years to graduate, and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist with selecting and registering for classes, referring student to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

"Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," said McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies, offering them the same services which were available to them when they competed for us."

The office of Athletic Academic Services helps student-athletes feel comfortable in the CSUF environment and McCarthy's experience before coming to the department in July, 1992, helps the orientation process.

McCarthy received her masters degree in social science from Cal State Fullerton in 1987 and has been working in education since 1984. Previous to her appointment in athletics, McCarthy worked for three years as the Assistant Director of the Learning Assistance Resource Center at CSUF before budget cuts eliminated the department. At the LARC, she supervised 80 student employees who were responsible for the various tutorial, strategies classes, computer skills and study skill programs which were available for the university students.

Before coming to Cal State Fullerton, McCarthy was the director of student services at Western State University, College of Law, and before that was the director of student services at the University of Phoenix.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropiate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was inititated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, furthered by former athletic director Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

Finally, there is the matter of the school's name. The name originally for CSUF was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard.

To out-of-staters, the school's name causes confusion because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state - the University of California and the State University system. So, the school has been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, with no hyphens or commas, which is what most of the more than 100,000 graduates recognize. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"



The current Titan Field became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on Apr. 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which also has played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Rancho Santiago and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979 when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The current stadium boasts 1,540 permanent chairback seats with another 200 spots available on the concrete steps above each dugout. There is ample standing room around the concourse.

The first stage of the press box pavilion has been completed with the addition of permanent restrooms. The second stage involves the concession stands located in the pavilion with the final stage involving the building of the press box on top of the restrooms and concession stands.

No timetable has been set for the completion of the pavilion, along with additional seating to fit with plans for Cal State Fullerton to eventually host a regional.

Last year, Titan Field sported a brand-new look for the 1996 season thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface has been added to the warning track.

Grass was also planted on the berms where future seating is to be located. Bushes were planted that will spell out "CSF" on the first base side and "Titans" on the third base side. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Titan Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.
