#### **Exhibit Curators Statement**

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" represents ongoing research in SJSU Special Collections & Archives identifying documentation of Black experiences throughout SJSU history. This exhibit is the first of several installments.

Much of the information we have comes from the Spartan Daily student newspaper and the La Torre yearbooks. With too few exceptions, Black Spartans' stories are not told in their own words but from the perspectives of their majority white classmates. This is reflected in the language and focus of the articles. We invite you to read critically.

The Black Spartans featured in this exhibit pursued their educational goals while contending with institutionalized racism and other major crises of the 20th century: two World Wars, the influenza pandemic of 1918, and polio. Locally, "the deed to virtually every home in San Jose" included restrictions against Black and Asian residents known as "restrictive covenants" (Spartan Daily, February 16, 1948, page 2). On campus, blackface and minstrel shows were a regular part of student events.

"Black Spartans (1907-1948)" is an invitation to the community to join us in surfacing these stories, ensuring these histories are preserved and presented in a way that honors these students' lives. Contact us at special.collections@sjsu.edu to participate.


#### **Artist Statement**


The "Black Spartans (1907-1948)" exhibition is a homage to Black culture and history at San José State University and the Bay Area at large. Until recently, the significance of Black bodies in Bay Area history (as well as U.S. history) was overlooked. Unless it was associated with the struggles of civil rights leaders, athletes, or celebrity-personas, the story of a graduate from a state school wasn't valued because we weren't part of the mainstream culture. As a Black Spartan myself, I was deeply connected to these individuals that started out just like me. I saw a reflection of myself and my community throughout the process of making these mixed media portraits and came to realize how important it is to know your history because it becomes a catalyst for knowing who you are.

My work explores the intricacy of identity and the role culture, tradition, and history play. These portraits are embodiments of our Black Spartans, they are visual representations of the colorful and captivating lives they led. Through this work, I hope to influence other artists and individuals to take part in researching and finding out the infinite layers of what it means to be Black. Our history is beyond our struggle. We are the blueprint.

Originally from San Diego, Willie Steele attended San Jose State College from 1942-1943, then finished his schooling at San Diego State. While best known for his skills at the broad and high jump, Steele also played multiple other sports including baseball, football, and boxing. In 1942, he set the college's field jump mark record with a 25'7" jump, which stood as the record until 1966, earning him the National Junior Broad Jump title. In 1945, Steele competed in the Allied Track and Field Championships at the Foro D'Italia stadium in Florence, Italy and won both the broad and high jump events. While at school, Steele batted .310, and after graduation from San Diego State he made the 1949 second All-CCAA baseball team as a first baseman. He competed in the 1948 London Olympics and won gold in the long jump. Steele served as an Army Private First Class in the Fifth Army in World War II. He became a director in Oakland's Parks and Rec Department, and retired in 1988. Steele passed away on September 19, 1989.

# SECONDS AND THIRDS MAY DECIDE WINNER OF CLOSE CONTEST; TWO TEAMS EVENLY MATCHED

### SPARTAN RHYNE MAY BE SLOWED BY LEG INJURY

Two of the greatest college track teams in the nation clash when the Fresno State Bulldogs meet the San Jose State Spartans in a dual meet this afternoon on Spartan Field at 4 o'clock.

Both teams have fine recorls. San Jose hasn't lost a dual meet this season, while Fresno has only lost to the University of Southern California Trojans. In the large meets in which both teams have appeared, San Jose has come out on top. The Spartans finished ahead of the Bulldogs in the San Francisco Olympic club indoor meet and again Saturday in the PAA championships where they scored 24 5/6 points to Fresno's 19 5/6.

However, eliminating the hop, step and jump which was won by Willie Steele (and which is not included in an ordinary meet), the two teams would have been tied.

#### RHYNE INJURED

Coach Winter's hopes for a win took a serious slump when Bill Rhyne pulled a leg muscle during practice Thursday. Rhyne didn't run in the PAA and still has quite a limp. Originally he was counted on for quite a few points, competing as he does in the 220 yard dash, 440 yard run, 220 yard low hurdles and the relay. How many of these events he will be able to enter and how well he will do in those he does enter is one of the big question marks of the meet.

#### FRESNO MILERS TOPS

Fresno is conceded first and second in the mile and two mile, where Art Cazares and Bobby Madrid rank among the top runners in the country; while San Jose has a monopoly in the broad jump, formed by Bill Smith, Willie Steele and Chitoshi Akizuki.

The rest of the events are pretty well open, with the exception of the sprints in which Fresno has one man, Al Jackson, who should grab a place in both the century and furlough.

#### COACHES' JUGGLING

It will be interesting to see the results of the second-guessing of Coaches Winter and Flint Hanner. Hanner will run quartermiler Joe Shropshire in the 440 and 880, and will enter Madrid in the half mile as well as the mile and two mile.

Winter plans to hold Guido Teresi out of the mile so that he can save everything for the two-mile grind and perhaps give Madrid a battle. Winter will run miler Bob Ingram in the 880; quarter-miler Thelmo Knowles in the 440, sprinter Ralph Kaufman in the shot put, and entering Elwood Clark who has been out with a bad shoulder in the javelin.

On the policy of the coaches juggling their entries, Coach Winter remarked, "We're both guessing and if either of us don't guess right, it may be just too bad."

### From the Sidelines

#### Track Chatter

San Jose State college track records are still not definite this year as the three leading record-breakers on this year's varsity track team will make one more attempt to better the old marks now on the records tomorrow afternoon in the interfraternity track meet.

The three who will attempt these new records are Thelno Knowles, Willie Steele and Bill Smith.

Knowles, already holder of the 880 mark at 1:53.9, will attempt to make it three when he runs the 440 yard sprint and the mile run. As anchor man on the relay team, Knowles turned in an unofficial time of 48.9 in the quarter mile but has yet to run the mile this year.

Smith, currently the possessor of the 100 yard dash, high jump and broad jump records, will attempt his fourth mark when he enters the 220 yard dash.

Steele, who set a new record at 24 feet 8¼ inches just one jump before Smith established the new record, will try to better it tomorrow. On a foul jump, Steele also has hit the 25 foot mark.

Omar Cowles, Spartan hurdler, will also be among those seeking records tomorrow although he is competing for the Delta Theta Omega fraternity. Cowles unofficially established a new high hurdle record when he turned in a 14.6 mark in the Fresno Relays. However, because he placed only third, the mark did not count.

Cowles will also attempt the 220 yard low hurdles tomorrow. He has not as yet attempted the low barriers to any extent this year because of his bad leg early in the season.

### Smith, Knowles And Steele Will Attempt To Break School Records In Annual Meet; DTO's Are Favored

Willie Steele, Bill Smith and Thelno Knowles, record breaking colored track men this year, will attempt to better their marks tomorrow afternoon on the local cinderpath at 3:45 o'clock in the annual later-fraternity track meet.

All three will compete unattached. Steele and Smith will make one more try at the broadjump mark, which is now at the

25 foot mark. Smith will also enter the 220 to try and better the school mark. He will not attempt the century as no one would be capable of pushing him to any fast time. Knowles will attempt to set new records in the 440 and mile, thus passing up his favorite event, the half mile.

Smith is exceedingly fast in the 220, but has not been timed since in high school as he has been concentrating on the 100, broad jump and high jump.

Knowles, although never officially timed in a 440 this year, posted better times than any other quarter milers while anchoring the relay team this year. He has not been timed in the mile this year either.

Smith has the best broad jump mark in the nation this year at 25 feet, and Steele has a mark of 24 feet 8¼ inches.

Delta Theta Omega, already possessor of the trophy for two straight years, will be attempting to win it for the third straight year so as to keep it permanently. From all reports they should have little difficulty in retaining their crown.

Their main hope lies with Omar Cowles, ace hurdler, who should have no trouble in taking both the 120 yard high hurdles and the 220 yard low hurdles.

Delta Sigma Gamma, runners-up last year, rest their hopes on Dick Knox, who last year took the mile and should be favored to repeat.

The remaining four teams have no outstanding contestants and can only hope for the unexpected to bring up their point total. All contestants have had little workouts and are not expected to post fast

The P. E. majors will be in charge of the meet and will handle the officiating duties.



## Three San Jose Track Stars Go East This Week

San Jose State's great trio of track stars — Bill Smith, Thelno Knowles and Willie Steele — will leave late this week for the National AAU meet in New York, where they will compete for the Southern California Athletic association team.

All of these men will be eligible to enter the junior and senior championships as none of them have ever won an AAU title.

Collectively they are capable of scoring about 20 points. Smith and Steele both have marks better than anyone else in the broadjump and stand a good chance of finishing one-two. Steele is Pacific Coast champion in the hop, step and jump and should finish high in that event.

Smith has two 9.5's in the 100 yard dash, and Knowles has the coast's best time of 1:53.9 for the half mile, which makes him a pre-meet favorite.

# Three SJS Track Stars Compete In AAU This Weekend

Bill Smith, Willie Steele and Thelno Knowles, three of the outstanding performers of Coach Bud Winter's Spartan track team, will compete in the AAU championships in New York tomorrow and Saturday.

Running for the Southern California Athletic association, these men are expected to gain points in at least four events, with the possibility of placing first in at least two of them.

Steele and Smith form the most formidable broadjumping combination in the country, both having done 25 feet or better. They hold the best jumps in the country and stand an excellent chance of finishing one-two. Steele is also Pacific Coast champion in the hop, step and jump and should place among the leaders.

Smith's second event is the 100 yard dash in which he has been running a constant close second to California's Hal Davis. Smith has recorded two 9.5's for the century and followed Davis to the tape by less than a foot in a 9.4 second race at the West Coast Relays. On the basis of these performances, Smith rates one of the favorites in this race.

Thelno Knowles, the third member of the trio, although only a freshman, has the best time on the Pacific Coast in the half-mile. Knowles ripped off a 1:53.9 880 in Los Angeles to defeat the cream of the west's middle-distance men and earn his trip east. However, it is hard to predict what he will do as he has not been pressed hard and is probably capable of even better time when the competition is tough.

#### WILLIE STEELE RAMBLES 70 YARDS TO SCORE AS SPARTANS DEFEAT COAST GUARD SEA LIONS 9 TO 0

Willie Steele., San Jose's living example of a Horatio Alger "rags to riches" character, wrote another chapter in his "rise to fame" story yesterday in Spartan Stadium when he got his

hands on a short pass, midway in the second quarter, and scooted 70 yards to a touchdown, highlighting State's 9 to 0 win over the Coast

It was exactly the same play that he scored on against U. S. F. last Sunday—a screen pass with Charlie Cook, sub fullback, doing the heaving.

But if that run last week was sensational, yesterday's was a Hollywood press agent's dream. Willie snared the football on San Jose's 30, and wriggling his hips like a hula-hula queen, slipped through the Sea Lion defense behind perfect blocking to race the last 40 or 50 yards absolutely out in the

This play was the bright spot of an otherwise pretty unexciting game which was more or less of a "tit-tat-toe" affair from start to finish, except for those thrilling 30 odd seconds described above.

Coach Joe Verducci's Coast Guard team didn't have much to offer in an offensive way, and neither did State for that matter. But the Spartans have an alibi, and a darned good one-George Foote and Bill Parton, the touchdown twins, Bert Robinson, fullback and key man on attack, and Gray McConnell, rugged tackle, were all out of the game because of injuries.

The first three mentioned make up, along with Bill Perry, quarterback, State's first string backfield. Perry was in the game, but didn't see much action himself.

So it was a reserve backfield and a first string line that accomplished the victory—and did it convincingly, even if the score doesn't

In scoring a total of nine points, six were accounted for by Steele on that run, one was tallied by Bill Perry, making good on the conversion attempt—and the other two were a gift from the Sea Lions due to freak that isn't seen very often on the gridiron.

Here's a picture of the situation. Late in the final period, Jack Porter, Spartan reserve fullback, punted a coffin-corner kick that went out on the Coast Guard onefoot line. Joe Haynes, a Sea Lion back, stepped out of the end zone while trying to throw a pass on a fake punt play, thereby giving San Jose two points on a safety.





However, storm clouds loomed on the horizon in the person of a powerful U. S. F. eleven that was reputed to be one of the best in the Bay region. The payoff came when Bert Robinson was severely injured in practice the day before the game. Hartranft, with his fingers crossed, pressed center Charley Cook into service as a fullback and banked on freshman Danny Conforti to bolster the spot.

Packed with action from start to finish, the game started in the usual way with Billy Parton romping 60 yards to pay dirt. But the heavier, more experienced Dons were not to be denied and quickly punched over 20 points by half time. With Cook and Willie Steele in the backfield in the second half the Spartans began going to town in big way. In the shadow of his own goalposts Cook rifled a pass to Steele who dodged and twisted his way 70 yards down the field for the second State score. Late in the third quarter with Cook carrying the ball on nearly every play the big Gold machine marched from their own 10 to the Don 9 yard stripe, only to be robbed of another score when the over-anxious Cook fumbled and U.S.F. recovered.

Bruised and battered the Spartans barely nosed out the Alameda Coast Guard Sea Lions 9 to 0 the following week on another pass from Cook to Steele. But the State gridders

picked up speed again and walloped San Diego 26 to 0 and McClellan Field 27 to 7 on successive Saturdays. Tackle Gray McConnell, Foote, Parton and Robinson returned to action in the latter game. The first three men had all been on the sick list as a result of the U. S. F. fracas. The season's finale featured the annual big game with a once beaten Fresno State Bulldog.

U. S. F. had been the only team to down the highly touted Fresno squad and the Bulldogs boasted the services of the ace passer, Jackie Fellow, booming fullback Mickey Masini, and fleet halfbacks Jack Kelley and Louie Futrell.

Closely fought all the way through, the game resembled a clash between two titans with Fresno finally eking out a 6 to 0 win. The Spartan line, led by Captain Wilbur Wool, held Fellows down all afternoon but the backs relaxed just once on defense and that was enough for the "Rabbit" to toss a pass to end Jim Molich for the only tally of the day.

Robinson and Cook were both injured early in the game and reserve fullback Jack Porter came into his own after a season of comparative obscurity. Porter passed and ran the Spartans up and down the field with a brilliant performance but each time the San Jose gridders got within striking distance of the Fresno goal line the Bulldog defense stiffened and held.

The defeat by Fresno was a bitter pill to swallow but with a season record of seven wins and two losses Coach Hartranft was well pleased. Starting out with a green, inexperienced squad he molded it into a powerful grid aggregation that lost by no more than a seven point margin in both defeats. The Spartans wound up the season with a scoring total of 150 points, as against 40 tallied by their opponents.





### INTERCLASS MEET OURS, SAYJUNIORS

"The Juniors will win the interclass meet next Thursday and Friday afternoon, no other class will even come close to matching the potential talents of the third year men."

These are the words of Juniors Fred Lindsey and Bill Perry, who are making public their challenge in the forthcoming interclass track and field meet the latter part of next week.

Track Coach Bud Winter urges all class entries to sign up with him in the P.E. department as soon as possible. Everyone is invited to enter. "You don't have to flash or be a potential 'record breaker' to enter the quadrangular meet," states Winter.

#### RECORD PERFORMANCES

The last time the meet was held was in the spring of '42 under Winter's direction. In that meet four school records were broken. Thelmo Knowles, running in the mile event for the first time in his athletic career, was clocked at 4:23 (not bad for a first attempt, huh?).

Willie Steele, that all around athlete, chalked up the best mark in the country that year in the broad jump event, when he went out 25'7."

#### **EVERYONE WELCOME**

But mediocre track and field men should not be discouraged by these marks, for they are definite exceptions to the rule.
