"REQUEST ITEM" STATUS - WHAT'S THAT?

All of the circulating materials in the Africana Center and the Chicano Library have "request item" status in the library's online catalog. This enables you to request items and have them paged and held for you at the Main Loan Desk in Clark Library. This enables you to request items in advance and be able to check them out on the weekends and/or times when the Africana Center/ Chicano Library is not open.

To request items click on the "request" button and enter your name, campus id number and library pin number. Items are paged from Monday through Friday at 1 p.m.

CHICANO LIBRARY RESOURCE CENTER ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Planning has begun regarding the SJSU Advisory Structure for the Multicultural Resource Center. There will be a Library Multicultural Resource Center Coordinating Advisory Board. Three Advisory Committees are being established for each of the centers: The Chicano Resource Center, the Africana Resource Center and the Asian American Resource Center.

The Chicano Resource Center Advisory Committee is charged to advise the Multicultural Librarian (Jeff Paul was recently selected to fill this position following a campus search process) on a number of issues including: 1) planning and evaluation issues, 2) collection management policies, 3) service and programming policies and 4) fund raising opportunities.

The committee structure is in place and includes: one representative from the President's Latino Community Advisory Council (Sid Flores, Esq., Attorney-at-Law), one representative from a community organization (Maria Kramer, Librarian – representing Bibliotecas Para La Gente), five representatives from the Chicano Latino Faculty & Staff Association (Elma Arredondo – Academic Services, Deanna Gonzales – Financial Aid Office and Scholarship Office, Henry Gutierrez – Social Science Department, Linda Ortega-Student Outreach and Recruitment and Dr. Alexander Sapiens – Teacher Education) and one representative from the Mexican American Studies Department (Dr. Julia Curry-Rodriguez).
