## Student Union

As the 2006-07 school year begins, Associated Students Incorporated continues a campaign to bring a new student union building to the California State University Channel Islands campus. ASI (Associated Students Incorporated) is an organization on campus comprised of faculty, staff, community, and student members who in part, are helping to ensure that the union does indeed come into place on campus.

The organization has enlisted the help of Brailsford and Dunlavy, a facility planning and program management firm, to assist with assessment and planning of the new student union. The firm has conducted personal interviews, online surveys, and held focus groups with CSUCI students to determine best location for the building, along with what amenities should be included in the construction and planning of the building in a campus wide feasibility study. According to this study, the current library site is the most logistical and demanded site for construction. Whether or not this will end up being the final area zoned for construction, is still up for debate.

According to CSUCI student body president, Jessica LaRoe, this site would be ideal for a student union because, "It is truly the center of our campus. It is readily accessible to all of our students."

At least 47 students showed up at a UPACC (University Planning and Coordinating Counsel) meeting earlier this month to gain more insight on the current status of the student union. They donned matching red t-shirts, with the logo "Vote Yes on a Student Union", voicing their collective opinion. They were also in possession of 600 signatures from students in favor of the new student union building.

According to Student Programming Board president, Chelsee Bente, "It would be beneficial from a programming perspective to have a central, large venue to program events for our students." With over 800 new students expected to be living on campus next year, this seems to be increasingly more apparent.

With the best case scenario for students in favor of construction coming into place, the union would be on board within months of the completion of the new library in fall of 2008. The union might include such amenities as a coffee shop, large programming areas, computer labs, and a new bookstore.



The current controversial site for new construction would put the building much closer to classrooms and adjacent to many faculty offices. Thus far, no other areas on campus have been publicly discussed for utilization of construction.

## Proposition 1D to Benefit CSUCI

Prior to being voted into office, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger vowed to improve a California school system that was overcrowded, overused and underfunded. This Fall, he will have his perhaps best chance at fulfilling his promise.

Proposition 1D, the Public Education Facilities Bond Act of 2006, will be on California's November ballot, bringing with it a series of strong local implications. If passed, the proposition will issue a \$10.4 billion bond to provide various public schools with renovations and much needed financial relief. California State University Channel Islands would be a major recipient of the funds and will get \$62 million of the proposed bond to help with a variety of projects.

If Proposition 1D were to pass, CSUCI plans to use the funds to both restore existing structures and establish new programs and developments. Funds will be used on renovations and upgrades to existing facilities to account for university growth and to fund projects for making campus buildings more accessible

to individuals with disabilities. Proposition 1D monies would also go to improve 50-70 year-old infrastructure in campus buildings including water, electrical and waste lines. Also, it is expected that University Drive, the main campus entrance road, will be turned from a two lane to a four lane road.

Aside from improving on the existing campus-used structures, Proposition 1D would help pay for the renovation of unused buildings for classrooms and faculty office space. The additional classrooms are needed for a campus population that has consistently exceeded enrollment expectations, including a 221 student surplus this Fall.

Last of the hopeful renovations is the institution of the University's nursing program, scheduled to open in Fall 2007. Monies will be used to construct simulated lab stations and computer access for a program that has already generated a 200 student waiting list.

According to statistics gathered by Marty de los Cobos, Vice President of Advancement, the proposi-

tion will have a local economic impact aside from the direct impact for the University. "For every dollar the state invests in CSUCI, the local economy is enhanced by \$3.05. This economic multiplier will grow as long as the campus is able to continue to grow as well," writes de los Cobos.

Aside from CSUCI, several local and statewide schools will receive considerable chunks of the \$10,416,000,000 sum for similar improvements and development.

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## Credential Students Awarded Scholarships

The CSUCI Teacher Credential Program was awarded a \$30,000 grant from the CSU Chancellor's Office to recruit math and science teachers into credential programs to address the shortages of teachers in these areas statewide. Additional funding from the Boeing Foundation was also awarded and earmarked for student scholarships. In Fall 2006 Math and Science Teacher (MAST) initiative provided \$8500 in scholarships to seven single subject math and science credential students. The awards were from \$500-\$2,000 each. Announcements and applications for Spring 2007 scholarships will be available in October. Any student enrolled in a credential program at CSUCI who is seeking a math or science single subject credential, add-on credential, or supplemental credential is eligible to apply for this non-need based scholarship.

One of the biggest, if not the biggest, changes to take place this year will be the absence of campus fixture Christopher "Hoffy" Hoffmann, who leaves at the end of the month for a scholastic year abroad in Bristol, England as part of the CSU International Programs. A Political Science major, Hoffy has been an integral part of CSUCI's brief history, helping lay the foundation for such clubs and organizations as the Gay/Straight Alliance, Student Programming Board, the short lived Alpha Pi Zeta fraternity, as well as being a member of the distinguished Gamma Beta Phi Honors Society. Whether splitting time between classes, working in the library or making friends with majority of the student body, Chris has made his presence felt here at CSUCI with his distinctive blend of bona fide kindness and goofy antics. As one of Ventura County's brightest minds prepares to bestow his knowledge of politics at the international level, the CI View met up with Hoffy to get his thoughts about the trip.

### First off, what do you think will be the biggest difference between CSUCI and Bristol?

One of the biggest differences between Channel Islands and Bristol would definitely have to be the on-campus housing rules. Compared to our school, which has very strict policy (i.e steps for alcohol), Bristol's orientation for incoming students, called "Freshers Week" consists of pub crawls, many having themes: pirate pub crawl, three-legged pub crawl, and "let's make that American kid do something he will regret in the morning" pub crawl. I will also have to adapt to a very different climate. I certainly will not be able to bust out my crucial camo shorts. Instead it'll have to be scarves, pea coats, and long underwear for this guy. I hope to also work with international affairs and recruitment to promote the study abroad program. Only four students got accepted from Channel Islands this year and I hope to change that.

### What advice might you have for any students who want to study abroad?

decided to apply at the last minute and I am still getting stuff together in preparation of moving. For students interested in studying in the United Kingdom, be financial prepared. Due to the weak U.S economy, the British Pound is worth twice as much as our dollar, and although you will be paying the same amount on tuition as you currently pay at Channel Islands, housing, food, entertainment, and travel costs are insanely expensive. The CSU International Programs are very competitive - you will be going up against hundreds of students from 22 other Cal State schools. Make sure you keep your grades high and that you have completed all your lower division requirements in your major. Also, make your personal statement interesting! Mine was about British foods and wanting to take my dating life to the international level. Just make sure you stand out from the hundreds of other students who are also applying.

## Summer Sailing Creates Team Interest at CI

This summer I spent almost every Wednesday and some weekends racing aboard the 42ft boat "Lucky Dog" in the San Diego Bay. The "Summer Beer Can Series" consists of around 150 boats racing on Wednesday afternoons. All 150 don't start at once however, there are 10 different classes. We raced in the top class, A, against seven other boats. Staghound, a Tripp 50, was our toughest competition. Staghound is a very expensive race boat that even has some of America's Cup crew aboard. All summer we battled against the fleet and Staghound, coming up short, taking second every week.

The final race of the summer things went a little different. We began the race with our best start of the summer hitting the starting line with perfect position and speed. Staghound was to our lee (to the left of us.) Racing into the wind to the mark we tacked back and forth. The boats parted ways to the mark and we actually picked up some time by picking a better side of the course. At the mark, we were right with them. In sailing boats have different ratings, sort of like a handicap. That means that Staghound actually owes us time and they had still beat the whole fleet all summer. We don't even have to beat them boat for boat, just be close enough to make up for the handicap for a win.

Around the mark and then we head down wind with the wind coming from behind us. The spinnaker goes up since it is our biggest sail and we are hauling down the bay. Battling down wind with Staghound we made sure to block their wind as much as we could. At the last mark in front of the Convention Center we dropped our Spinnaker and put our jib back up (a smaller sail used for going into the wind.) Tacking back and forth

to the finish line against Staghound, who were stunned that we were still with them. At one point we called out starboard against them since we had the right of way. The other boats in our fleet, who were still on the down wind leg, actually started to cheer for us since we were putting up such a good fight. After that, Staghound received a favorable wind shift that lifted them in front of the aircraft carrier and they gained considerable amount of ground on us. Even though we didn't end up beating them boat for boat, we finished close enough to take the win. We pushed on sailing solid to the finish and a sweet victory after a summer of struggle.

Racing through the water at 15 knots (around 20 miles per hour) doesn't seem very impressive unless you are on a sailboat. Speed is relative in sailing terms. When you are doing 15 knots, you feel like you are doing a 90 in your car. This as well as many other attributes has brought a few students at CI together to work to start a sports club. When you read this article, hopefully the club will be official.

The sports club hopes to form and then begin racing other colleges around the country. The governing body for college sailing is the ICSA and their website is [www.collegesailing.org](http://www.collegesailing.org). No surprises in sailing either, Stanford and USC are the top dogs in the division that the team would race in.

7. JR Goleno and Emily Gregg pose in front of a work they produced together.

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
