On Our Way!

A new inter-city bus stop on Alta Colina Road, near the West Gate, was unanimously approved by the Camarillo City Council at its October 10th meet-

After approval is received from the City of Thousand Oaks and the County of Ventura, which, together with Camarillo, jointly sponsor the Ventura-to-Thousand Oaks bus route, Leisure Villagers and other residents of Eastern Camarillo will be able to board the bus at 10:32 a.m. and return from T.O. at 2:26 p.m.

The schedule, developed by Deputy Director Al F. Knuth of the Ventura County Public Works Agency, includes the elimination of two stops on Central Avenue, where the passenger pickup at the Del Norte mobilehome park averages less than one person a day. Del Norte will continue to be serviced by four stops

Y.N.C.G. Announces Annual Health Fair

This year Y.N.C.G. HEALTH FAIR will be held the night before election day, Monday, Nov. 5, from 7 p.m. in the A.R.

Two new tests will be available — a Pulmonary Function Test and a Colo-Rectal Cancer Screening Kit will be sold to detect blood in the stool. This important test will be analyzed free of charge by a local doctor. The kit is to be taken home and in the next few days a smear of three stools are to be taken and then delivered to the physician. This is a very important test and should be considered by everyone. The kit will be

sold at cost - about \$2.00.

The only other cost item is our annual multi 24 blood panel, which will include cholesterol, glucose, triglycerides and uric acid. The Pleasant Valley Hospital staff will draw the blood and charge at their cost of \$10.00. Also present with the P.V.H. group will be a speech therapist, a urologist, their Lifeline program and a Medicare problem solver.

As in previous years, Y.N.C.G. will have the following tests: 1. Glaucoma, 2. Hearing, 3. Foot Exam, 4. Dental Exam, 5.

Water Treatment Change May Affect You

ter District and the Metropolitan Water District will change the disinfectant used to purify water. The new purification additive will impact most tropical fish dealers and hobbyists, kidney dialysis patients and some industrial and manufacturing processes.

After November 1, you will be receiving water disinfected with chloramines. rather than chlorine which is being used now. This change is being made in response to a federal water quality regulation that limits the amount of trihalomethanes (THMs) in municipal water supplies.

Because chloramines are toxic to fish, hobbyists are advised to contact their pet supply dealers

On November 1, 1984, for information about rethe Camrosa County Wa- moving the disinfectant from water before it is placed into aquariums or fish ponds. Kidney dialysis patients should contact their doctors about the effects of chloramines on the dialysis treatment process. Similarly, some industries may need to make modifications in their manufacturing processes or water pretreatment system.

A REFERENDUM

Is C-Span reception in Leisure Village an idea whose time has come?

If so, why is the LVA Board sitting on the proposal, which President Lou Okun first described at the September meeting?

To recapitulate our editorial of last month:

C-Span is the Congressional broadcasting channel operating 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. When the U.S. House of Representatives is in session, C-Span televises those sessions. In addition, it covers important house and Senate Committee meetings.

At other times the cameras focus on speakers addressing the National Press Club. The major party conventions are covered gavel-to-gavel. And twice daily there are live call-in shows, where citizens from all parts of the country can air their views on important topics.

It would seem that such an educational television offering would be a "natural" for the residents of Leisure Village, a significant number of whom are more or less homebound at one time or another. After all, not everyone plays golf or tennis or cards or frequents the swimming pool.

As explained before, the Association has to make a one-time investment of \$2,903 to purchase certain equipment to receive the C-Span signal. Thenceforth, the broadcasts would be on Channel 8. THERE WOULD BE NO CHARGE TO THE INDIVIDUAL HOUSEHOLD.

Leisure Village satellite television subscribers originally received C-Span, but lost it when Western Cable brought in the popular cable movie channel, Home Box Office. In order to make Channel 8 available for C-Span, it becomes necessary to drop ON-TV, which currently has a very limited number of subscribers in the Village.

We understand that the Board would welcome letters from Villagers on this matter. If it is more convenient, simply check one of the following options, sign your name(s), clip and deposit in the ILV box in the hallway. Your vote will be forwarded to the Board.



Approximately 200 Villagers heard the policies of the Republican and Democratic parties presented at the Current Issues Forum on September 13th. A vocal number of them lambasted President Reagan's administration during the question period.

Representing the Republican viewpoint was Marlee Means, Administrative Assistant to Assemblyman Tom McClintock who outlined the philosophy of the Republican party quoting from President Lincoln and current Republican philosophy. Bob Borrego, Administrative Assistant to State Senator Gary Hart, discussed the Democratic platform.

The questioners raised sharp objections to President Reagan's economic policies, his anti-abortion and school prayer amendment positions and his perceived failure to obey the First Amendment on separation of Church and State.

The main challenge to the Democratic speaker was over the lack of a plank in the Democratic platform opposing anti-Semitism. A lone spokesman for the Republican point of view countered with a positive summary of the accomplishments of Reagan's first term.

PROFILE: MAX AND HELEN LUSTIG



While he slowed down

somewhat since moving to the Village, there were new challenges here. His contributions to the Theater Committee, the LV Players and the Variety Guild have been many. He's been a long-time dance instructor for the Latin Dance Club, has worked with the Saturday Night Dance Club and gives freely of his time with Your Neighbors Care Group. Several years ago he was honored as "Man of the Year" in Leisure Village, by Women's Club, an award he prizes highly.

Five months ago the day started out like another great, challenging day for Max. It was tennis tournament time, and in their match, Max and his partner were ahead but being pressed, when suddenly he developed

"I must have been seeing a dozen tennis balls. then I had trouble breathing and the next thing I knew half a dozen lovely ladies were wiping my brow and saying comforting things," said Max. Within minutes his playing partners realized that Max had suffered a heart attack and soon after he was under intensive care at Pleasant Valley Hospital. A pacemaker was inserted for a one day period, followed by several days in intensive care. With excellent care and attention, he was released within two weeks.

"Upon arriving home, I almost felt destroyed," he recalls. "I was so weak and sure my days of tennis were over and perhaps even dancing and all physical activity."

But the Hospital's Cardiac Recovery Program, which started in September '83, proved to be the turning point in the recovery of Max's strength and health. Meeting there three times a week for 12-weeks, former cardiac patients undergo a problem utilizing the services of physicians, nurses, physical therapists, dietitians and psychologists.

"Today I feel just great," says Max, "I'm walking briskly three miles a day and am back playing tennis."

The hospital reports that the program costs about \$1,500 — 80% of that paid by the patient's insurance and the remainder by either the patient or secondary insurance. During the first twelve months of the program, 54 have been enrolled, 18 of them from Leisure Village.

The busy-busy hands of Helen Lustig are quickly evident as one enters their warm, attractive home. Paintings of many sizes and forms adorn the walls and her handicraft skills can be seen most

on't mention the word, "retirement" to Dr. Elsie Yarbrough, even though she's a Leisure Village resident, and many of her neighbors are retired. "I'm not retired now, and I doubt if I ever will be ... even when I'm old enough," she says emphatically.

In Dr. Yarbrough's case, "not retired" is the understatement of the year. She's on the staff of Camarillo State Hospital, treating a group of around 100 autistic children. "It's so tragic," she says, "because they're unable to tell you where it hurts. It takes all the patience and experience I acquired in my 30 years of private practice." She's also involved in a research project to test the effects of a new drug in treating autism.




As if that isn't enough to keep her busy, she's also working with her Apple computer to catalog her several thousand volume library...or you might find her buried in one of her 200 cookbooks prior to whipping up a delicacy for a visiting son, daughter, or

grandchild...or she may be off training at Los Alamitos where she's known as Colonel Elsie Yarbrough of the California State Military Reserve...or possibly attending a meeting of Appleholics Anonymous.

If this sounds like a description of Wonder Woman, her family agrees. They recently presented her with a plaque that reads, "Wonder Woman Lives Here."

A Chicagoan by birth, but a Californian most of her life, Dr. Yarbrough received her M.D. from Marquette University in 1940, the only woman in her graduating class. She maintained honor roll status, even though she worked nights and weekends as a medical librarian. Soon after, she married John Yarbrough, also a physician. John was an OB/Gyn and

Elsie a pediatrician, a relationship that allowed them to practice together and serve families on a long-term basis. "It was a beautiful relationship," she reminisces, "and our patients loved the unique care we could offer."



The Yarbroughs, their children and foster children lived in a rambling Encino estate. "We usually had 11 or so at the table," she says. "We kept chickens, grew vegetables, and even raised a steer every year. We also raised and exhibited Tennessee walking horses." Since hunting was John's first love, Elsie became an accomplished deer and bird hunter. They remained in private practice until John's retirement in 1976, at which time Elsie joined the Los Angeles City School system.

In 1978 she accepted her present position at Camarillo State Hospital. And when John passed away, Elsie moved to Leisure Village, where she's delighted by the friendliness of her neighbors and the safety of the community. "I only wish I had the time to participate more in village activities," she sighs.
