California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County. Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 43rd year, the university points proudly to its product, more than 136,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and satellites in Mission Viejo, Garden Grove and Santa Ana - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With nearly 30,000 students currently enrolled and about 4,000 faculty and staff members, Cal State Fullerton's economic impact is approximately \$500 million annually.

With a mission of making learning


preeminent, the university's 700 full-time faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by seven colleges: The Arts; Business and Economics: Communications: Engineering and Computer Science: Human Development and Community Service: Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Sciences and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has earned national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, communicative disorders, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, teacher education and theater. In all there are 98 degree programs - with 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and

out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 10th nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through

Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

Cal State Fullerton boasts an active and ever-growing Alumni Association that provides opportunities for continued affiliation with the university community, as well as numerous benefits and services. As alumni donors to the university, former students of Cal State Fullerton are offered a variety of benefits, including library privileges at CSU campuses, travel, professional development programs, financial programs, discounts on athletic and theater events on campus and more. In addition, the Association has social and professional development programs to fit the needs of the university's most recent graduates.



The Titan Tradition...

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 11 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and he currently is in his third season as a referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Miller still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks of the WNBA as Eugenia Rycraw.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards


before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would play 17 major league seasons. They won the College World Series again in 1984 and John Fishel was the MVP of the CWS. They were national runners-up in 1992 with another MVP in third baseman Phil Nevin, who also was the first pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros.

The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, going 57-9 en route to their third national championship. Leading the way was Player of the Year Mark Kotsay, now with the San Diego Padres, and one of 35 former Titans to have played in the majors. Fullerton has made a pair of trips to Omaha under Coach George Horton, finishing as high as third in the nation in 2001.

Five players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Fullerton baseball Olympians.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous Division I coach. The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 20 regional appearances. They brought



home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. Il beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by receiver Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward (and current Titan assistant) Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been four subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. Four former Titans were on 2001 MLS rosters and on the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney games.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds.

Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. The Titans have a rising star in junior Brandon Campbell. He became the first Titan to compete in the Pan-Am Junior Games and won a silver medal in 1999 in the high jump. He holds six school records, was the 2001 Big West Conference male track Athlete of the Year and also plays on the basketball team.

Why the nickname?

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.


"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.



Headed by Christine McCarthy, the Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed as Titan Scholars, provides effective support services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward graduation, assist studentathletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "early warning" system in place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when student-athletes may require additional academic support.

The department's services are available to all past and current student-athletes. "Not all student-athletes are able to graduate in four years, because of professional opportunities or personal commitments," says McCarthy. "We developed a re-entry program for former student-athletes who wish to complete their studies."

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton studentathletes are provided with resources that will assist their development in five primary areas: academics, athletics, personal development, career development and community service.

Cal State Fullerton's Athletic Academic Services department also assists former Titan athletes who return to the university to complete their degrees.

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. A team doctor, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country.

Head Athletic Trainer Julie Max

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 23rd year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Max is in her second year of a two-year term as president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). The first female president in the organization's history, Max served a six-year stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president prior to her election to the top post. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes out-standing service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.

Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gymnasium undoubtedly has a place in Cal State Fullerton lore, having served as the backdrop for such memorable triumphs as the men's basketball team's 1983 upset of No. 1 UNLV. Titan Gym also has an impressive international history — it served as the venue for 1984 Olympic team handball — and political history — former President Ronald Reagan made his last Orange County appearance at Titan Gym while campaigning for his successor, George Bush. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs. Titan Gym is scheduled to undergo an expansion in the near future, which will add significant office space and a practice facility.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field was the host site for Cal State Fullerton's first NCAA Baseball Regional in the spring of 2000 and also played host to a Regional and Super Regional in 2001. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse – which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches – and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top tournament in the nation.

Titan Stadium

Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs.

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have yearround access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of Mike Nagler. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Nagler to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.



Now located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 squarefoot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Mike Nagler was named Cal State Fullerton's first full-time strength and conditioning coach on Jan. 4, 2000. Nagler had spent the previous 17 months as assistant strength coach at the University of Iowa. At Iowa, Nagler was in charge of developing and implementing weight lifting programs for women's basketball, volleyball, women's soccer, men's and women's track, gymnastics, softball and men's and women's golf. He also assisted with the men's basketball program.

He also previously worked as an assistant at Baylor University, the University of Washington, UNLV and Washington State and served as an intern with the NFL's Seattle Seahawks.

Nagler, 30, earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Washington State in 1993 and picked up a master's degree in kinesiology from UNLV in 1996.





John Easterbrook is in his eighth and final year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department, after announcing he will retire this fall.

Under Easterbrook's leadership, the graduation rate of Titans student-athletes has improved, athletics facilities have been enhanced and funding for scholarships has increased for the 17-team Titan intercollegiate athletics program.

During his tenure, five Titan teams have reached NCAA quarterfinals, and the 1995 Titan baseball team captured the national championship.

Among other career highlights, Easterbrook oversaw a multimillion-dollar expansion of the Titan softball and baseball facilities. The seating capacity at Goodwin Field has increased by more than 1,500, which led to the selection of Cal State Fullerton as the host for the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Baseball Regionals and the 2001 NCAA Super Regional.

Nationally, Easterbrook served on the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee from 1996-2000, and he is a member of the Big West Conference Council.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State.

Easterbrook, 62, previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1962) in commerce and law and attended the University of Illinois Law School.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, four granddaughters and one grandson.



Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah is in her 10th year as Senior Associate Director of Athletics/Senior Woman Administrator for the Titans.

Dr. Jeremiah is primarily responsible for overseeing athletic department academics, assisting with departmental planning and financial forecasting and supervising volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, women's basketball and softball.

She is chairperson of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee. Additionally, she is a member of the Big West Conference Athletics Council and

serves on Cal State Fullerton's Academic Senate executive committee and university planning committee .

In her seven years as the Titan's women's basketball coach, Jeremiah compiled a 112-93 record and in 1990-91, she guided the team to a 25-9 season (most wins in school history) and the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Following the season, Jeremiah was recognized with both District 8 and Big West coach-of-the-year honors.

She also was the recipient of the Carol Eckman Award, given by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association to the coach who best represents sportsmanship and ethics in the coaching profession. Jeremiah finished her 23-year coaching career with a 375-236 record.

She has a Ph.D. and a master's degree in physical education from The Ohio State University, as well as undergraduate degrees from Cedarville College and Central State University.



Fullerton, a city of more than 123,000 inhabitants, is located in North Orange County, about 30 miles southeast of central Los Angeles. It is part of the Southern California population center and within easy freeway access of all the diverse natural and cultural attractions of this region.

Orange County, with an area of 782 square miles, is the 48th in size of California's 58 counties, but it is the third largest county in population (2.7 million). Orange County has experienced during the last four decades almost unprecedented growth as communities continue to occupy the diminishing expanses of open land.

Today, there co-exists an interesting mixture of the old and new economic and life styles in Orange County. Underneath the soil, archeologists and bulldozers uncover traces of the hunting and gathering Indian bands who flourished at least as early as 4,000 years ago in what was a benign and boun-

More visible traces remain of the Spanish and Mexican periods and cultures: Mission San Juan Capistrano, which began the agricultural tradition in Orange County, and subsequent adobes from the great land grants and ranches that followed. Additionally, both customs and many names persist from this period, and so does some ranching. The architectural and other evidences of the sub-

sequent pioneer period are still quite visible: farmsteads, old buildings from the new towns that were established in the late 1800s, mining operations, and traces of early resort and other types of promotional activities. For about 100 years, farming was the main economic activity with products such as grapes, walnuts, vegetables and oranges replacing the older wheat and cattle ranches. Today, agriculture still is very important. Orange County ranks high among California's counties in mineral production with its oil, natural gas, sand and gravel, and clay mining and processing activities.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and the development of such attractions as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Edison International Field and Convention Center and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer. Both downtown Los Angeles and the Pacific Ocean can be reached by car in half an hour, and mountain and desert recreation areas are as close as an hour's drive from the campus.



Donny Daniels long had a dream to return to his alma mater as head basket-ball coach. On his third formal attempt to get hired at Cal State Fullerton, reality finally stepped forward. But then it also slapped him across the face. A couple of times.

In April of 2000, Daniels got the job he had coveted since launching his coaching career with the Titans as a volunteer assistant under Coach Bobby Dye in 1978. Despite the late appointment, he immediately signed a handful of promising recruits and assembled a young and energetic staff of assistants to begin a major rebuilding process.

And then the season began. Injuries, eligibility problems and misfortune reared their ugly heads and compounded a difficult situation. But Daniels made no excuses and pushed whatever healthy and available bodies he could muster to play harder and continue to compete. The record will show a 5-23 result. The record will not show -- at least for now -- his ability to stay upbeat and stick to his principles.

"Things happen in every program, it just happened in my first year," said Daniels late in the season. "We just have to deal with it. You can't say, 'Woe is me.' You can't feel sorry for yourself. Through all the adversity, you can't give up. As I tell my team, if this is the worst thing that happens in your life, you'll have a good life.

"It's not about winning and losing, it's about competing," he said with added emphasis on the last word. "The NCAA probation and the lack of scholarships were something I anticipated. The new 5/8 rule was something I did not anticipate and it has made it a little bit more difficult to enhance our team. We had some guys who decided to leave and you can't replace them so that has depleted us a little bit on the front line."


The 2000-01 Titans had their moments and even picked up a couple of road victories, something rare in recent seasons. Four of the last five conference games were decided on the final possession. In their last three home games, the Titan seniors logged a pair of victories and a 1-point loss as they managed to qualify for the Big West Conference post-season tournament for only the second time in the past four seasons.

After two years as a Titan player and three stints as an assistant coach at Fullerton, Daniels qualifies as an expert on the CSF basketball program. He remains

confident he can "get the job done" as head coach.

"I was turned down 10 years ago and again seven years ago. If I was turned down a third time, I would have gone after it again. I just figured I would have

to out-live them... There is nothing about this job that discourages me. I know the ins and outs of Fullerton and I know Southern California, and that's where I recruited a lot for Utah."

Daniels signed a four-year contract and hit the campus and the recruiting trail with his feet flying, his wheels turning and his cell phone buzzing. After 11 seasons as an assistant to Rick Majerus at Utah, he had come home, but for not more than a few hours at a time. In a

whirlwind few weeks he brought in seven new players -- despite lingering NCAA sanctions -- to begin the process of restoring the Titan program to its levels of previous decades.

Daniels, 47, played on Fullerton's first two Div. I teams in 1974-75 and 1975-76 under Coach Dye. In his senior year he was selected the top defender on "Coach Majerus taught me that you have to be very clear about what you expect, let the players now that and then never deviate."

a team that won the school's only conference basketball championship by earning a share of the 1976 Pacific Coast Athletic Association title.

He graduated in 1977 with a degree in criminal justice and returned as a volunteer assistant for the 1978-79 season. He was a paid assistant in Dye's final season (1979-80) before becoming an assistant at his high school alma mater, Verbum Dei, in Los Angeles. Daniels returned again as a part-time assistant coach under George McQuarn for the 1981-82 through 1983-84 seasons before becoming head coach at Los Angeles Harbor College in Wilmington (another alma mater) for two years (32-27 record). His third return to Fullerton came as a full-time assistant to first McQuarn and then successor John Sneed for the 1986-87 through 1988-89 seasons.

During Daniels' tenure in Utah, the Utes reached the NCAA Tournament eight times in 11 seasons and were national runnersup in 1998. The parents of recent Utah star guard Andre Miller made a special trip to attend his Titan hiring press conference and he was the chief recruiter to Salt Lake City of current New Jersey Nets star Keith Van Horn.

"Donny has been an integral part of an established, successful program at the highest level of intercollegiate basketball," said CSF



it was making a commitment to the program with the length of the contract."

The Titans have not had a winning season since they went 15-12 in Coach Brad Holland's initial season in 1992-93. They have not qualified for the NCAA tournament since gaining the Elite Eight in 1978, but made NIT appearances in 1983 and 1987 during Daniels' tenures. His full-time coaching tenures at Fullerton coincide with


the recruitment and/or development of former Titan greats Leon Wood and Cedric Ceballos.

Daniels increases to six the number of head coaches on the current Cal State Fullerton staff who are former Titan student-athletes. He joins wrestling Coach Ardeshir Asgari, cross country and track and field Coach John Elders, softball Coach Michelle Gromacki, baseball Coach George Horton and women's gymnastics Coach Julie Knight.

"It's an honor to be a part of this coaching staff," added Daniels. "As a Titan graduate and former player and assistant coach, there can be no one more motivated than I to see this athletics department enjoy success.

"One thing I really want is for our playes to graduate at Fullerton. I'll do everything I can to help them take advantage of the resources that are available."

Daniels was born on Aug. 3, 1954, in New Orleans, Louisiana. He has three children – Eric (17), Kalynn (15) and Sarah (11).








Rob Orellana brings a diverse basketball background to Donny Daniels' Titan coaching staff.

Orellana, 35, spent the two seasons prior to his Fullerton appointment as an assistant at Fairleigh Dickinson University in Teaneck, New Jersey, where he helped the Knights to a second-place finish in the Northeast Conference. He also worked two seasons as an assistant at St. Francis College in Brooklyn, where he was brought in to help resurrect a struggling program. The Terriers had won only 28 games in the four seasons prior to his arrival and they won 28 more in just two seasons. Counting the next two years, St. Francis had its best-ever four-year record and won more NEC games than any other school during that span.

Orellana also has served as a head coach in Venezuela (Trotamundos Basketball Club in Valencia in 1995-96) and Spain (Gran Canaria Club in the Canary Islands in 1994-95).

Because of his head coaching experience, Orellana plays an integral role in the overall day-to-day operations of the Titan program including recruiting, scouting and game strategies. He also can lean on three years of Big West Conference experience, serving from 1991-92 thru 1993-94 at UC Irvine as an assistant to Coach Rod Baker.

Orellana's coaching career began with two years as an assistant at Pius X High School in Downey, his alma mater. He moved to Westchester High School for two seasons before

launching his collegiate career as a student assistant at UNLV for three years including the 1990 NCAA championship season. He returned to Pius X as head coach for the 1990-91 season and the Warriors won the Camino Real League championship and advanced to the CIF semifinals. The team's 17-8 record earned him Southern California Coach of the Year hon-


Levy played high school ball for La Salle Academy in Manhat-




Coach Mark Maki 2nd year, Wyoming, 1997

The team went 17-11 overall and was 13-5 to gain second place in the Northeast Conference. Maki also has coached at Notre Dame Prep School in Fitchburg, Massachusetts, and Penn State New



Kensington after serving as a student assistant for four years at his alma mater, the University of Wyoming. He has been involved with basketball internationally and in every state of the union with the exception of Alaska.

Young but experienced Tom Gorrell joins the Titans' staff as director of basketball operations this season after nearly a decade of work in high school and junior college basketball in Orange County.

Gorrell, 35, served one year as an assistant coach at Fullerton College and was set to join Cypress College this season before the Titans' position became available.

Gorrell was a high school head coach for seven seasons. He won three Empire League titles during a five-year (86-43) tenure at Cypress High School (1992-97). In 1995-96 he was selected Orange County coach of the year as Cypress went 24-5 and reached the CIF quarterfinals. He launched the varsity program at La Costa Canyon High School in San Diego County in 1997-98 and led the Mavericks to 15-12 and 17-10 records in their first two seasons.

Tom McCluskey at Tustin High School gave Gorrell his first job as an assistant. He was on the staff in 1990-91 when the Tillers went 30-4 and won the CIF Div. II state championship.

Gorrell is a 1993 graduate of Long Beach State with a master's degree from Cal State San Bernardino. He lives in Cypress.

SEASON PREVIEW

From one extreme to the other.

For his first season as head coach at Cal State Fullerton, Donny Daniels inherited a veteran front line but had no Div. I experience in the backcourt. For the 2001-02 season, the second-year coach will welcome back five lettermen from the perimeter but will recognize only two interior players.

Filling the gaps up front will be several "walk-on" newcomers whose presence on the roster wasn't confirmed until they attended their first classes on Aug. 20, the lingering result of NCAA probation which dates to 1993 but continues to impact the current squad.

"Probation does exactly what it's supposed to do to a program and it's done that to Fullerton," Daniels said of restrictions which finally expire on Nov. 30. Compounding the situation this summer is the 5/8 rule which makes it difficult to bring a thin roster up to full strength.

Daniels does have a solid corps of veterans who got more playing time than expected in 2000-01 due to a variety of problems that befell the likes of Ike Harmon, Matt Caldwell and **Brandon Campbell**, three front line veterans.

Campbell, a two-year letterman and a redshirt junior, is back from a knee injury suffered in the 2000-01 season opener that cost him his basketball season but didn't prevent him from winning the conference high jump and long jump championships in track season to earn Male Athlete of the Year honors. Campbell averaged 10.7 points and 4.7 rebounds as a sophomore in 1999-2000.

Starting guards **Kevin Richardson**, **David Castleton** and **Ryan Dillon** return from last season when they each averaged more than 30 minutes per game. Richardson played both the point and shooting guard positions as well as small forward at times and averaged 11.6 points. Castleton, an Orange Coast College product who missed the first seven games of the season due to a shortage of transferable units, averaged 7.8 points and 3.4 assists while playing 32 minutes per game. Both will be seniors.

Dillon started 23 times as a freshman and played more minutes than anyone on the roster. He scored 8.7 points per game, almost exclusively from beyond the 3-point line as he made 67 of 182 attempts (.368) including a school record 10 of 15 in one game. Another sophomore-to-be, **Chris Smith**, averaged more than 16 minutes as a reserve and contributed 3.7 points and 1.7 assists per contest as well as full-court quickness.

Key newcomers to the backcourt are sophomore **Derick Andrew** from Rancho Cucamonga High School and freshman

Chris Alexander from Price High in Los Angeles. Andrew sat out last season under the rules of Prop. 48 but is expected to challenge for the starting point guard role. Alexander is the most highly regarded scholarship recruit, a jump shooter who earned all-city honors at Price High in Los Angeles and was a member of a state championship team as a junior.

Another strong guard candidate with an edge in the system is **Denver Lopez**, a transfer from Cal State Dominguez Hills who practiced last season during his redshirt year. He averaged 5 points for the Div. II Toros in 1999-2000. Another redshirt is **Andrew Maxie**, who made the squad last Fall after a student body tryout session. Walk-ons **Daniel Ryan** from Chaffey College and **Montelle Williams** from Dominguez High School in Compton also are in the picture.

There is little depth up front. Threeyear letterman Josh Fischer (6-foot-9) and sophomore Babacar Camara (6foot-11) are the only healthy veteran big men. Fischer averaged 6 points and 3.4 rebounds as a part-time starter as a jun-Camara, a transfer from Cheickantadiop University in Dakar, Senegal, averaged 7.5 points and 4.4 rebounds in his first year in the United States. He has added 20 pounds and is up to about 245. Reserve forward Daniel Kohn (6-foot-8) suffered a severe knee injury in the final weeks of his junior season (3.9 points and 4.0 rebounds) and his playing career is over after major reconstruction surgery.

Helping to fill the void are two walkon newcomers with limited experience.

The most highly regarded of the pair is 6-10 power forward **Pape Sow** from Chaffey JC, who is expected to have a major impact. He is also from Dakar, Senegal, and is a cousin of Camara. He averaged 15 points and 9 rebounds for Chaffey last season, his first in organized ball, and is expected to compete for a starting job.

The "sleeper" on the roster is a slender 6-foot-9 forward from the Chicago area named **Derrick Franklin**. He has been away from competitive basketball for two years since playing at Hillcrest High School but possesses excellent physical tools.

Also on the roster are 6-foot-8 **Wagner Moreno**, a transfer from nearby Hope University (NAIA) originally from Brazil, and 6-foot-6 **Amir Bar-Netzer**, a transfer from Santa Monica City College, who is not expected to be eligible this season.

Look for CSF in 2001-02 to play "small" and force the tempo with a defense extended beyond half court to take advantage of the quickness and compensate for the lack of size inside.





Brandon Campbell is one of the most gifted athletes to ever have worn a Titan jersey... He had made great strides in two seasons as a Titan basketball player and was poised on the threshold of stardom before suffering a knee injury in last year's season opener at Oregon State... Surgery was not required but his brief attempt to come back proved discouraging and he sat out the remainder of the year and successfully obtained a medical hardship to repeat his third year of eligibility... The knee was healthy by track and field season and he won Big West Male Athlete of the Year honors after winning the conference championships in both the high jump (7-4 1/2) and long jump (25-10) ... He also ran on the Titans' victorious 4x400 meter relay team... Currently holds six school track and field records: 25-10 long jump, 7-4.5 high jump, 46.98 400 meters, 6,637 points in the decathlon and a spot on the 4x100 (40.41) and 4x400 (3:10.81) relay teams... On the basketball court he is a versatile swing man who has been asked on more than one occasion to help the Titans along the front line where his outstanding leaping ability allows him to compete... Meanwhile, his outside shot has developed nicely and he led the 1999-2000 Titans in field goal percentage at .538 and was an outstanding .481 (13-for-27) from 3-point range.



CSF IN 2000-01: Went down in a heap after tripping over a teammate midway through the first half of the season opener at Gill Coliseum in Corvallis, Oregon, on Nov. 17, 2000... BIG WEST CONFERENCE

In Its 33rd Season - 1969-2002

This season will be the thirty-third year in which the Big West Conference sponsors the sport of men's basketball. Also this season, the Big West will celebrate the 27th anniversary of its postseason tournament. During the past thirty-two years, six of the ten current members have claimed or shared a regular season title. Four current members have won the tournament title led by Utah State's four titles. The Aggies are the two-time defending Big West Tournament champions.

The Big West has been home to one NCAA National Championship (UNLV in 1990) and one NIT crown (Fresno State in 1983). The conference has also had a team represented in the NCAA Tournament every year of its 32-year existence. Nine times the conference has had multiple representatives. Last year, the Big West representative to the NCAA Tournament, Utah State, advanced past the first round with an overtime victory over Ohio State.

UC Irvine represented the conference in the NIT a season ago and lost a close game at the hands of eventual runner-up Tulsa.

While Big West programs have had team success on a national level, some marquee players have played in the conference. In 1998, the number one pick in the NBA Draft came out of the Big West in Michael Olowokandi (Clippers) from Pacific. Other current NBA stars that hailed from the Big West are Larry Johnson (Knicks), Cedric Ceballos (Heat), Bryon Russell (Jazz), Brian Shaw (Lakers), Lucious Harris (Nets), and Bruce Bowen (Spurs). Leon Wood, a first round pick in 1984 for Philadelphia, has been working as an NBA referee.

BIG WEST AMONG TOP TEN MOST SUCCESSFUL CONFERENCES

The Big West Conference finished among the top ten most successful conferences in NCAA Division I championship competition during the 2000-2001 academic year, according to a study by the Big 12 Conference, it was announced by Big West Commissioner Dennis Farrell.

This study, conducted since 1986-87 by the Big 12 and the Southwest Conferences, ranked the NCAA's Division I conferences on the basis of their teams' placement in 21 championships (10 men and 11 women). Points were tallied on the basis of 20 points for a first-place NCAA finish, 19 points for a second-place and continuing through the 20th spot. This study is similar to the Sear Trophy ranking conducted by the NCAA.

NCAA member universities compete annually for the Sears Trophy, which is awarded to the respective institutions in Divisions I, II, and III that have had the most success in NCAA championship competition. Since the 1986-87 academic year, the Southwest Conference and later the Big Twelve Conference has been conducting a similar ranking of Division I conferences.

For the Big Twelve study, the NCAA's 30 Division I conferences were ranked on the basis of their teams' placement in 21 championships (10 men and 11 women). Points were tallied on the basis of 20 points for a first-place NCAA finish, 19 points for a second-place and continuing through the 20th spot.

The Big West Conference parlayed strong showings in volleyball and softball to rank ninth in the women's sports standings with 53.125 points. On the men's side, the conference rode strong showings in baseball and golf to accumulate 30.5 points, which was good for the tenth spot. The conference's 83.625 combined points were good for ninth place among the 30 conferences.

In women's volleyball, the Big West had five teams participate in the NCAA Championships with Long Beach State, Pacific, and UC Santa Barbara advancing to the round of 16 for the third straight season. UC Santa Barbara reached the "Elite Eight" for the third time in the last four years.

Cal State Fullerton's top-seeded baseball team led the men's sports with a semifinal finish in the College World Series. Pacific and UC Irvine's golf teams were two of the 30 teams to reach the NCAA Championships with the Tigers finishing 11th overall.

"This is a tremendous accomplishment for our institutions," said Farrell. "It illustrates the total program commitment for success that Big West athletic programs have made. By placing within the top third of Division I conferences, we are ranked among the nation's elite athletic leagues.

"I'm tremendously proud of our student-athletes and coaches for this accomplishment."

By placing ninth in the all-sports rankings, the Big West Conference finished ahead of all conferences but the Division I-A major football conferences in the standings.

2000-01 SEASON REVIEW

A telling review of Cal State Fullerton's 2000-01 men's basket-ball season can be found simply by trying to identify the "returning starters" for the 2001-02 campaign, a rite of every pre-season prospectus.

You start with guard/forward Kevin Richardson, who played in all 28 games and started 26 times. Of course, half of those starts came at point guard in the early portion of the season before David Castleton was certified academically eligible to take over the spot beginning on Dec. 30. Castleton would start a total of 19 times.


Meanwhile, true freshman guard Ryan Dillon was thrown into the fire and not only started 23 times but averaged more than 31 minutes per game because of the lack of depth in the backcourt. That problem was magnified when Brandon Campbell went down in the season opener with a knee injury that would idle him for all but a few minutes. So Campbell's a returning starter, but from the 1999-2000 campaign.

Up front was where the injuries further mounted. Returning all-conference performer Ike Harmon (below) was in and out of the lineup with assorted foot ailments and personal problems yet

still led the team in scoring at 12.9 points per game. But he played in only 19 games and in only 11 as a starter -- so he cannot be called a "starter lost" even though he was the team's top statistical performer for the previous three seasons.

Another veteran of the front line, Matt Caldwell (right), also was limited in duty due to a mysterious blood ailment. He played in 20 games but started only 10 times, so he's not a lost starter, either.

By default, Senegal native Babacar Camara be-



came a starter despite his lack of collegiate experience. He averaged 7.5 points and 4.4 rebounds while getting an education in Div. I play.


Josh Fischer endured numerous ailments in his junior season yet managed to play in all 28 games, 18 as a starter. But he averaged only 21 minutes per game, or just five minutes more than guard Chris Smith, who was a reserve in 24 of his 27 appearances.

Letterman Daniel Kohn doesn't fit into a neat category, either. He appeared in 22 games in his junior season, starting six times, but cannot be called a returning letterman since he will miss the entire 2001-02 season rehabilitating a knee that underwent major reconstruction last March.

Into such instability stepped Donny Daniels (left) in his first Div. I head coaching role. Despite a roster constantly in flux,

he stuck to his principles and the Titans eventually picked up on his defensive-oriented, deliberate offense style of play. Fullerton won a couple of early road conference games, at Idaho and Cal Poly, before falling out of contention after a pair of back-to-back losses to Utah State and Boise State, a pair at home and two more on the road.

Fullerton regrouped to finish strong. Four of its final five Big West games were decided on the final possession. The Titans won on "Seniors Night," 70-59, over UC Riverside, before a 1-game



venture into the Big West Tournament at Anaheim. where Utah State's smothering defense left them with a 5-23 overall record to go with a 3-13 mark in conference play.

The Donny Daniels Era began in football-crazed Corvallis, Oregon, where the host Beavers broke out tuxedoes for their game management staff to celebrate the debut of new coach Ritchie McKay.

It was all Beavers, all weekend,in basketball and in football vs. rival Oregon. They beat the Titans indoors, 68-35, on Friday and then beat the Ducks outdoors on national television on Saturday, leading to a Fiesta Bowl berth.

Already minus Ike Harmon due to a stress fracture in his foot and David Castleton due to academic ineligibility, the Titans lost Brandon Campbell midway through the first half to a knee injury that would sideline him for all but 32 minutes of the season. Despite falling behind 20-6 after 12 minutes, the Titans got a buzzer-beating 3-pointer from Kevin Richardson to pull within 33-23 at the half.

But Oregon State's suffocating zone defense held Fullerton scoreless for the first 5:32 after intermission, by which time the Beavers had built a 42-25 lead, and the Titans would manage only 12 points in the half, the lowest output in school history.

Richardson, a transfer from Treasure Valley JC in eastern Oregon, scored 9 points in the first half but did not play after intermission, leaving true freshmen Ryan Dillon and Chris Smith to play the entire second half.

Future Big West Conference member UC Riverside showed that it will be an immediate factor in the 2001-02 conference race by playing almost half of a "Big West" schedule in 2000-01 and it began with a home victory over the Titans.

What was expected to be Ike Harmon's debut after recovering from a stress fracture in his foot was delayed another week due to a suspension for a violation of team policy.

The Highlanders were able to survive a one-man offensive show by Kevin Richardson, a product of nearby San Bernardino, who scored almost half the Titan points with 24, or 18 more than anyone else in blue and

After a slow, see-saw first half with 6 ties and 5 lead changes, UCR took the lead for good at 41-39 on a layup by Aaron Hands with 12:18 remaining. Fullerton made a couple of runs, cutting an 8-point lead to 53-49 on a Richardson 3-pointer with 2:35 to go and a 6-point bulge to 55-52 on a 3point play by Chris Smith with 0:24 remaining, but UCR made the critical decisive plays and free throws to hold off the Titans down the stretch.

The Titans made their home debut under less than ideal circumstances. With Brandon Campbell still sidelined and David Castleton not yet eligible and Ike Harmon limited to 6 secondhalf minutes after an afternoon reinstatement, the Titans took the court with only three guards against a Pepperdine team that earned itself an NCAA Tournament berth the year before primarily on the strength of its fullcourt defensive pressure.

Loyola Marymount, another school with a new head coach trying to rebuild a program, got a significant victory by topping the Titans by 13 at the free-throw line and making more critical plays down the stretch. Baylor was another team making its first Titan Gym appearance. The Bears boasted a glossy 4-0 record but there was some question about the strength of their schedule to date, played entirely in Waco. But the Bears left a convicing impression on the Titans, administering Fullerton's largest margin of defeat at home since a 32-point loss to New Mexico State on Feb. 2, 1995.

The Bears got a boost with the eligibility of guard Chad Elsey, a transfer from SMU. He hit all four of his first-half attempts from behind the 3-point line on the way to 16 points, a figure only five shy of the Titans' entire team.

Elsey's first basket tied the game at 7-7 with 14:34 remaining in the first half and it triggered a 7-0 run that put Baylor ahead to stay. After Kevin Richardson's jumper got the Titans back within 3 points at 17-14 with 10:39 to go, the Bears went on a 16-1 run over the next 7 minutes for a 33-15 advantage that grew into a 26-point halftime lead.

Then things really got ugly. Fullerton didn't score until Josh Fischer ended a 3-point shooting slump with a trey at 11:22 that halted a 15-0 Baylor run and made the score 62-24. Fischer would go on to score the next 7 Titan points and not until Richardson hit a pair of free throws at 7:55 did another Titan score.

The return to action of Brandon Campbell was offset by the loss of Matt Caldwell to a mysterious blood disorder. And after Campbell made only 1 of 8 shots and grabbed only one rebound in 23 minutes, the resulting soreness in his injured left knee convinced him to call it a season and petition for a redshirt year.

A prolific 3-point shooting demonstration by Northern Arizona, the defending Big Sky Conference champion and an NCAA tournament-tested club, and the final 90 seconds of the first half proved decisive. Riding the relative "momentum" of three solidly played games, the Titans tried their luck in Cal Poly's Mott Gymnasium, where they hadn't won since the 1997 season.

The Mustangs were playing their first home game for interim head coach Kevin Bromley, who was 1-2 on the road after replacing the deposed Jeff Schneider, and looking for their first conference victory. But the Titans outshot the Mustangs from all angles—the floor, 3-point land and the free-throw line—and held their own on the backboards to have their best offensive showing of the season.

Cal Poly broke on top with a 13-8 lead. But Chris Bjorklund and Brandon Beeson each picked up a pair of early fouls as Josh Fischer crashed the offensive boards. Fullerton made a 10-3 run to end the half capped by Chris Smith's acrobatic two-handed layup to beat the buzzer for a 6-point lead.

Fullerton stretched its advantage to 46-37 3:38 into the half before the Mustangs made a run. They twice got within 2 points but Kevin Richardson responded twice including a shot clockbeating fallaway jumper and the Titans pulled away thanks in part to a couple of 3-point baskets by Ryan Dillon.

Fullerton made its free throws down the stretch to go to 3-0 in games they were leading at the half. Cal Poly fell to 0-9 in games it was trailing at halftime.

For the second year in a row, the Titans fell way behind early at the Thunderdome and after 20 minutes of holding their position they got blown out in the final 10 minutes. Boise State made its final visit as a Big West Conference member to Titan Gym and the Broncos came away with a victory and a front-row seat at a historical shooting performance by Titan freshman Rvan Dillon.

The first 20 minutes gave no indication of what was to come. The Broncos led from the outset and opened up a 38-27 lead. Dillon's 3-pointer with 3:29 to go provided the final Fullerton points of the half.

After intermission he exploded. It was a 43-32 game three minutes into the half when Dillon hit a trev. Another one made it 43-38 and a third of the half brought the gap down to 49-47. The Titans caught Utah State coming off a close loss at UC Irvine, which cost the Aggies a share of first place in the Big West Conference standings. For 16 minutes, the Titans took advantage of the Aggies' inevitable letdown and played Utah State even, forging a 24-24 tie at 3:29 on a Kevin Richardson basket.

Fullerton and Long Beach State renewed their long-running rivalry, meeting for the 80th time, the most games for the Titans against any opponent (Long Beach has played UC Santa Barbara 88 times). For the 18th time, the game was decided by one basket.

Ike Harmon's 3-point field goal at the buzzer made it a 1-point game after both teams squandered several scoring chances in the final two minutes. The Titans turned the ball over twice and the 49ers committed two turnovers and saw Ron Johnson make only one of four free throws. But the one he made with 17 seconds left proved decisive.

Fullerton held its biggest lead of the game at 53-46 with 11:27 remaining even after a Ryan Dillon 3-point field goal attempt rimmed out. But the 49ers scored the game's next 9 points with Michael Darrett's basket putting them ahead to stay at 55-53 with 9:30 remaining. They stretched the lead to as many as 8 points (64-56 and 66-58) but the Titans got it down to 66-63 and had the ball.

Fullerton earlier had rallied from a 39-34 deficit, producing a 19-7 run over five minutes. In the first half they used a 14-0 run over a 7-minute span to turn a 19-10 deficit into a 24-19 lead. But the 49ers scored the next 9 points and cancelled Kevin Richardson's free throws with 2.3 seconds remaining when Travis Reed muscled in a basket at the buzzer after a length-of-the-court pass from Kevin Roberts.

The Titans closed out the Big West Conference schedule at UC Irvine, hoping to upset the eventual conference champions to nail down a post-season tournament bid on their own. A string of four consecutive wins in the Bren Center and eight in nine years buoyed their confidence.

With a Fox Sports Net West audience watching, the Titans almost pulled it off. Sean Jackson's 3-point field goal to beat the shot clock gave the Anteaters a 58-53 lead with 18.5 seconds remaining. UCI survived two Kevin Richardson free throws at 12.2 and two misses by Stanislav Zuzak by reboundeing his second miss.

Fullerton led only in the early going, holding UCI without a field goal for more than 9 minutes but building only a 6-4 lead after Jerry Green's put back. The Titans were in a 7-plus minute scoreless stretch of their own as they fell behind, 13-6. But they fought back from an 8-point deficit to forge a halftime tie.

UCI opened up margins as large as 9 points after intermission, the last as late as 8:27 to go at 46-37. But with David Castleton matching his season best with 16 points, the Titans got within a point on three occasions.

Seniors Matt Caldwell and Ike Harmon committed turnovers in the final 2:20 and UCI took advantage to sweep the Titans for the first time since the 1990-91 season.

On Seniors Night in Titan Gym, oft-injured Ike Harmon and Matt Caldwell both played solid games and were able to wrap up their home careers with a victory over UC Riverside. And just as the Titans were finishing off a 70-59 victory, they got word of Idaho's home loss in overtime to UC Irvine that qualified the Titans as the No. 7 seed in the Big West Conference post-season tournament.

Harmon posted his second double-double of the season and Caldwell had probably his best overall game of the year with 9 points and 7 rebounds in 25 minutes before fouling out. The Titans took control of the game with an early 22-4 run, turning a 9-6 UCR lead into a 28-13 Fullerton advantage at 6:10 on Harmon's short jumper.

The Highlanders, who were playing without three injured regulars including top scorer Mark Miller, came back within 7 points at 29-22 late in the first half. But a David Castleton layup, a Caldwell free throw and a Harmon reverse dunk built the lead to 11 points at the half and UCR wouldn't cut the margin to a single digit until the final minute.

The win avenged an early-season Fullerton loss at UC Riverside, which posted a 2-10 record against Big West Conference foes in preparation for its addition to the conference next season.

The Titans' 11th hour invitation got them into the Big West Conference Tournament for its return to the Anaheim Convention Center, but it didn't promise them a long stay. Drawing regular season runnerup Utah State, the Titans found themselves on the sharp edge of a buzzsaw that was about to begin a surge that would carry the Aggies through Anaheim and on to a first-round NCAA Tournament victory over Ohio State.

Utah State jumped on the Titans and never let them up for air. They methodically built a 7-0 lead and didn't let the Titans score until a Josh Fischer jump shot at 15:42. Fullerton wouldn't break into double figures until the 8:06 mark and by then was trailing, 20-10, on the way to a 40-17 halftime deficit. The Aggies shot 70 per cent from the floor including 4 of 5 3-pointers and they made 8 of 10 free throws.

Fullerton made only 8 of 29 shots in the first half including only 1 of 11 3-point field goals, a statistic it would match in an anticlimactic second half.

Ike Harmon was the only Titan to reach double figures as he concluded his eventful CSF career as the school's No. 3 career scorer with 1,557 points and No. 3 career rebounder with 662.

TITANS IN THE NBA

Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Seven Titans have been drafted in the past



After starting all of last year for Miami, Bruce Bowen signed a free agent contract for 2001-02 with the Spurs.

19 years and several more players have signed as free agents with the National Basketball Association.

The most prominent Titan of late has been forward Cedric Ceballos. He became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team for 1994-95. but was unable to play due to an injury. He began his career in Phoenix and also has played for the Mavericks, the Pistons and the Heat and he begins his 12th NBA season with Denver.

During his first four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when

Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward Chicago in the 1994 playoffs.

A Fullerton teammate of Ceballos' -- forward Bruce Bowen -- was a pleasant free agent surprise during the 1997-98 season for Coach Rick Pitino and the Boston Celtics, starting nine times in 61 appearances and averaging 5.6 points and 2.9 rebounds while playing several positions. He had played briefly in 1996-97 with the Miami Heat for Coach Pat Riley after two productive and profitable seasons in Europe. In Evreux, France, he averaged more than 29 points per Bowen and all but two other game. In the Fall of 2000 he signed Titans in career scoring.

with the Philadelphia 76ers, appearing in 42 games, before he was traded to Chicago only to end up back with Riley in Miami for 27 games plus 10 playoff contests. He started for much of the 2000-01 season in Miami, playing in 82 games and averaging 7.6 points, and earned a free-agent contract for this season with the San Antonio Spurs.

The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last five seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began

his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during the past few years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana and later played with Golden State. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA in re-

cent seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, has done well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout are playing in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) has become a star in Australia and former center Dirk Rassloff was summoned last summer to join a team in Milan, Italy.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky

Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal (Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams has gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and recently as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters, for whom he gained Guinness Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches off the floor.


