The new Chief's interest in security/law enforcement was first evident at the age of 16 when he was an Explorer Cadet with the Camarillo Sheriff. Since then his training and experience includes graduation from the Ventura County Police and Sheriffs Reserve Academy and service with the Oxnard Police Department as a reserve officer. He has also received extensive first aid training, including the Village's newly acquired defibrillators. Academically, he has received a Bachelor's degree in Sociology with specialization in Criminology/Correction from California State Uni-

versity at Northridge.
Chief Madison stresses that his department's function is "to protect and serve" (borrowing from the LAPD Motto). He also emphasizes his department's interest is primarily in problem solving rather than in strict enforcement. In this context he would greatly welcome the cooperation of all residents.

One of the most comforting aspects of living in Leisure Village is the feeling of personal safety that our Security forces have provided to us.

Under the leadership and organizing ability of Chief Max Moses we were provided with a security system which is highly professional and very responsive to our needs.

In any emergency situation - be it being locked out of our condos, or dire and dangerous physical catastrophes, their response has been swift and kind and caring.

How many lives in the Village have been saved by these disciplined and professionally responsive and well led Security Officers under the unusually competent leadership of Chief

The value to our Villagers has been incalculable. It has been by far one of the most valuable selling points for our condos. It has helped to keep the value of our property safe.

Why, then, has the Board decided to terminate the employment of Chief Moses?

Chief Moses has been the man responsible for the outstanding caliber of our security system. His service and contributions to our outstanding security and safety needs has earned him much popular-

ity and respect. His 15 years of service to this Village earned him that popularity and respect.

The Board's action of termination has not been warranted.

The Board should rescind this unwarranted action.

This termination decision has been procedurally questionable and frivolous factually.

Their statements were read aloud by the authors at the Open Board Meeting of April 5, and then submitted to ILV.

May Cost Us We, LV homeowners, have a tradition of involvement in Village affairs and Village operations. This has been productive, beneficial and healthy. However, we must be careful to make sure that such involvement does not mean that we become some 3500 Board Presidents. We can and should make suggestions, but we must trust and let the decisions be those of the Board which we elected just for this purpose.

This is especially true in matters involving staff personnel, where there is always the potential of a claim against our Village. The legal profession has made this a fact of life. Actions and activities by homeowners, no matter how few --- especially from a position of misinformation, or lack of information --- can be very damaging to all of us. Such actions, especially

public statements, expose us all to exploitation by a clever attorney. In short, think twice before you act: your action may cost us all a bundle (of money)

Women And The Village

As the only woman on the Board I think that we need more women to become involved in Village affairs. The ratio of women to men in the Village is approximately 2-1 with women the majority. Despite this ratio there have been only eight women villagers, including this writer, serving on the Board of Directors in 25 years.

Of 11 Association committees (two special committees) 10 committee chairs are men and one is a woman. Of six Sub-committee chairs, three are men and three are women. In committee leadership positions we have 13 men and 4 women. This is not to depreciate men's participation. After speaking with several men now on committees, I feel they view more participation by women as good for the Village. Now is the time to volunteer for committee work for next year. Forms are available at the Recreation Office or the Association Office.

We need more women on the Board of Directors. At this time there is only one woman presented by the Nominating Committee for one of the three Board vacancies that will occur in June. I hope that additional qualified women run by petition, and that we have the opportunity to see more women elected.

Two current Board members, Max Heller and I, continue until June, 2000. Three new members will be elected at the Annual Meeting June 17. It is my hope that at least two of these new Board members will be women.

When the Recreation at a limited cost. Annex renovation is completed, Villagers will have a bright, functional addition to their activity resources. This 4,800 square foot area, developed within the east half of the original shuffleboard structure, makes very efficient use of the space.

The area was previously devoted to storage and provided the Players' Guild with work space for stage sets and rooms for the golf starters.

In the new arrangement, a large somewhat isolated space will accommodate two units for table tennis with plenty of room for players to pursue "kills" and other far-ranging shots. This space will also be available for construction of sets by the Players' Guild

Then come three very important rooms to complement the facilities in our Recreation Center. For those who want simply to sit, chat, and relax, the Hospitality Room with a garden window and door to the picnic area, will be equipped with a sink, "fridge," and hand-me- down comfortable furniture donated by residents will be just the answer. 

We were treated to demonstrations by two deputies and two dogs, Corporal Cory Rubright and Canto, and Harold Orr with Bär (pronounced Bear). The dogs are bought from breeders in Germany and Czechoslovakia for \$5000 each and are purebred German Shepherds. Bär is an unusual long- haired Shepherd. Another \$5000 is spent on basic training before the dogs are brought here. Their first month here is spent learning commands and bonding with their handler. The second month they are trained in tracking narcotics and suspects. They are

happy occasions, too, not also used to track missing

hand signals.

They only bite on command, usually to disarm a suspect. Part of the dogs' training is to protect their handlers. Should the handler be attacked while out of the car there is also a remote control that opens the rear door and lowers the front window to allow the dog to go to the aid of the handler.

The dogs live at home with their handlers. Both Cory and Harold have children and the dogs play with them. They do not play with each other - only train together. Their favorite toy is the padded sleeve used to train therm and they really don't like to give it up!


