# Review of CSU Fee Policy and Approved Fees for CSUCI:

Joanne Coville gave a high level review of Executive Order 740, the California State University Student Fee Policy; Executive Order 827, CSU Channel Islands Establishment of Initial Category I, Category II, Category III and Category IV Campus Fees; Executive Order 834 Miscellaneous Course Fees; Executive Order 839 Application Processing/Advising Fee for Teacher Education Credential Programs; Executive Order 861 Extended Education Fees and Special Session Fees; Executive Order 863 Enrollment Confirmation Deposit Fee; Executive Order 892 Student Body Association Fee, Student Body Center Fee, Fingerprinting Fee, Livescan Processing Fee, Campus Police Report Fee, Miscellaneous Course fees, Student Housing Deposit Fee, and Skateboard, Skate or Scooter Release Fee; Executive Order 912 Miscellaneous Course Fees; Executive Order 934 Master of Business Administration Program Evaluation Fee, Housing and Residential Fines, Housing Repair and Replacement Fee, and Housing Meal Plan Card Fee; Executive Order 945 Miscellaneous Course Fees, Executive Order 973 Miscellaneous Course Fees, Dolphin Passport Fees, Recreation and Leisure Services Use Fee, Housing Application Fee, Change of Graduation Date Fee, Replacement or Duplicate Diploma Fee, Dolphin Dollars, and Student Meal Plan Refund Fee; and Executive Order 981 Miscellaneous Course Fees.

# Financial Review of Fees Earned and Spent:

Joanne Coville reviewed the Fall 2005 and Spring 2006 Student Fees Revenue and Expenses Report. Ed Lebioda explained the balances in the Health Services Fee and the Health Facility Fee are due to the low rates we are currently paying for services thru the County of Ventura. Eventually

Health Services will be moved to a new location and employees and services will be provided by the University. The funds in the Parking Fee category will be utilized for a new parking lot. A large portion of the Orientation Fee funds were spent after the date of this report.

### New Fee for Certain Student Insurance:

Executive Order 986, Student Professional Liability Insurance Fee establishes a Category III Student Professional Liability Insurance fee for allied health, nursing or education programs that include a practicum, fieldwork or student teaching experience. The fee is set at \$16 per year/\$8 per semester.

### Dolphin Passport – Approved - 14 -0

The daily rate for the Dolphin Passport will increase from \$5 to \$6. The semester rate is increased by \$5 and the mid-semester rate for University Glen Residents and Sponsored Members and Friends is increased by \$5. The annual rates remain unchanged. A 10% discount will be given to Alumni and Friends.

Student Professional Liability Insurance Fee - Executive Order Number 986

Attached is a copy of Executive Order Number 986, which establishes a Category III Student Professional Liability Insurance fee for allied health, nursing or education programs that include a practicum, fieldwork or student teaching experience. This policy supersedes any other student liability insurance program currently being used by a campus.

CSU Risk Management Authority will bill each campus for their total premium deposit, based on student enrollment numbers provided by Analytic Studies. The fee authorized by this Executive Order *may* be charged to recover that cost, but is not required. The fee can only be charged to students who will be covered by this policy.

In accordance with policy of the California State University, the campus president has responsibility for implementing executive orders where applicable and for maintaining the campus repository and index for all executive orders.

-Student Professional Liability Insurance Fee

Supersedes in part E.O. 956 and E.O. 717

This executive order is issued under the authority granted by Education Code Sections 89035 and 89700, Standing Orders of the Board of Trustees, Chapter II, i, and Board of Trustees' Resolution RFIN 03-04-00, and consonant with Executive Order Number 740.

Effective August 24, 2006, campus presidents, after consultation with the student fee advisory committee, are authorized to establish a Category III Student Professional Liability Insurance Fee. The Student Professional Liability Insurance fee will cover the cost of providing a Systemwide Blanket Student Professional Liability Insurance policy to students enrolled in allied health professions, nursing and teaching or education programs that require fieldwork for course completion. The 2006/07 fee is set at a rate of \$16 per student for coverage over the full college year, an amount equal to the premium cost inclusive of taxes and fees. Risk Management will inform campuses annually of any change in the price of the premium for this policy. Future adjustments to the Student Professional Liability Insurance Fee should be processed consistent with the CSU Student Fee Policy, Executive Order 740 and at no time shall the fee exceed the premium cost inclusive of taxes and fees.

In accordance with Education Code Sections 89721(I) for state supported programs revenue should be deposited in a local trust, and Education Code Section 89704 and 89721(i) revenue collected from Extended Education and Special Session fees may be deposited either in the State University Continuing Education Revenue Fund in the State Treasury or in a local trust account.

# REVISED Proposed Fees for 2007/2008 and 2008/2009 Housing and Residential Education

Student housing is required to be a self sustaining operation. This requires Housing and Residential Education (HRE) to collect enough revenue to cover all expenses including all staffing, maintenance, repairs, programs, utilities, bonds, etc. that are related to the operation, as well as funds to be placed in a mandated reserve for major maintenance and repairs. One goal of Housing and Residential Education is to provide a safe, efficient, learning environment for students. This can only be achieved with the proper resources in place. The following fees have been derived based on the strategic plan for HRE and the required expenses for Anacapa Village and Santa Cruz Village.

**Proposal:** Create feasible and reasonable student fees to recover the operating expenses and mandated reserve funds for student housing.

The following questions and answers have been compiled to assist you as you consider this proposal. If you have any further questions, please feel free to contact the Housing and Residential Education office at ext. 2733 or inquire at the Fee Committee meeting.

### Why the increase in room rates for Anacapa Village?

With the second phase of student housing opening in August 2007, the office of Housing and Residential Education will need to hire both administrative and support staff in support of both an increase in beds and student life needs. In the first three years of student housing, Anacapa Village rates were used for the hiring of residence hall staff. In future years, Anacapa Village residents will have to contribute to the cost of HRE staff.

In addition to contributing to the cost of added staff, residents of Anacapa Village are receiving access to additional amenities. All residents will have access to the common spaces and services in Santa Cruz Village. This includes a new fine arts studio, arcade, collaboratory computer rooms, large lounge, study rooms, fitness room, yoga studio, gaming rooms, and music practice rooms. These new amenities will greatly contribute to the on-campus experience for residents of both villages.

### Why is the meal plan decreasing in Anacapa Village?

With two years of mandated meal plans, feedback from residents remains consistent in the desire to have a reduction in the required meal plan. Most campuses that house non-freshmen in apartments do not require a full meal plan. For 2007, we will reduce the meal plan almost by half. This will be both in response to student feedback and also to keep student housing costs lower to retain economic feasibility for students.

### /hy are the Santa Cruz suites more expensive than the Anacapa Village Apartments?

Although the overall required fees are greater in Santa Cruz Village, the room rate is much less. Residents of Santa Cruz Village will have a higher required meal plan which will contribute to a greater overall required cost. This is due in large part to Santa Cruz Village being designed as a suite style complex without kitchens and the required meal plan contract with our food service provider.

### I hat are the responsibilities to the University for usage fees?

Student housing is a self support entity on campus. This means that housing should not receive any services that are financed through general fund monies. If it does, student housing has an obligation to reimburse the University for services rendered.

With the continued growth of prospective residents and current residents on-campus, the demand for student housing support from other University offices increases. Currently, a significant impact is experienced in the office of Cash Services. This office needs to receive and process all billing and payments to student housing. They also manage collection efforts on delinquent accounts. As we were developing over the past three years, HRE benefited from services from this and other departments at no charge. This does need to change in the future as it will be Housing and Residential Education's responsibility to reimburse general fund departments for services rendered.

### What are the rates from other CSUs

Many of the other CSU housing offices may have less expensive rates, however, they generally do not have large bond payments or in some cases, any bond payments at all. This is one significant effect on our costs versus other campuses. In addition, the large resident population of other campuses assist in distributing administrative costs, therefore the shared cost decreases the individual cost as the residential population increases.
