A free documentary movie on urban development in Ventura County, titled "Home Grow'n," will be shown Thursday, Oct. 21, from 2:30 – 4 p.m. in the Science Auditorium. The 45-minute film, sponsored by the Environment Science and Resource Management Program, addresses the contemporary dilemma of how to preserve our valuable farmland through conservation easements and Smart Growth urban development. The film's producer, Dulanie Ellis, has received four awards for her documentaries, including "Mighty Times," the story of Rosa Parks, which was also nominated for an Academy Award. She will be present to answer questions after the showing of the film.

Maria K. Denney, assistant professor of special education, was invited to present to the Marce Society International Biennial Scientific Meeting at St. Catherine's College, Oxford University, United Kingdom, in late September. Denney's presentation was titled "Comprehensive Postpartum Depression Services for Mono-Lingual Spanish Speaking Mothers and Infants: Cross-Cultural Pathways to Care." The presentation focused on an early intervention service delivery model for families with young children (birth to five years of age) that decreases vulnerabilities and enhances protective factors in the mother, child, and family. According to Denney, this unique approach combines culturally and linguistically competent psychiatric evaluation, home visitation, individual therapy, and group support for an underserved population of immigrant families from Mexico and Central America with depressive symptomatology and numerous barriers to accessing mental health services.
