





Bob Burton found himself on the business end of a buzzsaw shortly after obtaining his long-sought goal of being a college Div. I head men's basketball coach last year. The veteran roster he thought he was inheriting at Cal State Fullerton began to disintegrate about the time he signed a four-year contract. A combination of academic problems, discipline, knee surgery, a broken window and a resignation eliminated five potential starters before the season began. And during the course of the campaign, a relative's death, more academic problems and a mental meltdown took away three more regulars.

Through it all, Burton and his staff

remained upbeat and the result was modest improvement -- one more victory (11-17) and one higher rung (tied for fifth place) in the Big West Conference standings.

With a little luck, it could have been major improvement. The Titans lost 13 games by 10 points or less and of those 13, they held second-half leads in 8 of them. They went 0-4 in overtime contests.

Now Burton is counting on the support he received from the community college coaches during the hiring process to carry over to the recruiting process. With only four lettermen returning, he has put together his own team in less than 18 months. "If you guys want to see me succeed," he told the audience when he was inducted into the California Community College Men's Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame last March, "Then you better send me some players and fast."

Burton came to Fullerton after one year as assistant coach at Fresno State and he also was an assistant to Lynn Archibald for one season (1986-87) at Utah. But where he made his many basketball connections was at West Valley Community College in Saratoga in Northern California, where he compiled a 488-158 record in 21 seasons, three times reaching the state championship game. He sent more than 80 players to Div. I programs and more than 100 to other four-year colleges.

"I can't tell you how thrilled I was to receive this opportunity," said Burton, 58. "I've never been one of those guys who's moved around a lot. I've always been happy wherever I've been. I'm looking forward to building a winning program at Cal State Fullerton."

Burton replaced Donny Daniels, who resigned on Apr. 18, 2003, to become the lead assistant at UCLA. The Titans were 10-19 overall in 2002-03 and 8-10 in the Big West.

Burton left West Valley to assist Coach Ray Lopes, a former player and assistant coach for him, in cleaning up the FSU program. The Bulldogs went a surprising 20-8, won the Western Athletic Conference title and saw their team grade-point average improve from 2.31 to 2.68.

Burton won eight conference championships at West Valley and was selected conference coach of the year nine times. He was selected California Community College Coach of the Year four times.

In Burton's one season at Utah, the Utes went 19-10 to earn an NIT berth.

Burton graduated from Fresno State in 1968 with a degree in social sciences. He earned a masters degree a year later at Cal Poly SLO, where he began his coaching career as an assistant in 1968-69. He became a head coach in 1972 at Willow Glen High School in San Jose and compiled a 143-52 record.

Burton's wife, Toni, is a special education teacher at Brea-Olinda High School. They live in Fullerton.

Coach **Andy Newman** 2nd year, Azusa Pacific, 1998

Andy Newman has advanced rapidly through the collegiate coaching ranks as he begins his second season as a full-time assistant to Head Coach Bob Burton at Cal State Fullerton.

Newman, 29, and Burton both


worked under Coach Ray Lopes at Fresno State during the 2002-03 season, Burton as an assistant coach and Newman as basketball operations manager.

Newman handles individual skill development, on-the-floor coaching and offensive play calling, recruiting, game strategy and opponent preparation.

At Fresno State, Newman was involved in game management, film breakdown, housing coordination, fundraising, travel, financial aid, summer camps and was the team's academic advisor. He

also organized team scheduling, assisted in recruiting and even taught a 3-unit theory class for the kinesiology department.

Newman previously assisted Burton for two years at West Valley College in Saratoga. There he was the recruiting coordinator, offensive coach and was in charge of perimeter skill development. He also worked one year at Vanguard



University in Costa Mesa where he performed similar duties.

Newman graduated from Azusa Pacific in 1998 with a degree in business administration after playing one very successful season for the Cougars, who went 34-5 and advanced to the NAIA Final Four. Newman played previously at Southern Utah and West Valley.

At Southern Utah he led the team in minutes played at 36.1 per game. At West Valley his teams went 65-6 with a pair of conference championships and state championship game appearances. He was selected to the all-tournament team at the 1996 state championships.



Coach **Jason Levy** 5th year, CSU Northridge, 1993

Jason Levy is in his fifth season as a Titan assistant coach, his second under the direction of Coach Bob Burton. He relied on his wealth and breadth of basketball experience to hold the team together between

Donny Daniels' Apr. 18, 2003, resignation and the June 6, 2003, hiring of Burton.

The 36-year-old native of New York City has worked on the West Coast, in the Midwest and on the East Coast in a variety of coaching positions. In two of the past four summers he has represented adidas at clinics in Beijing, China, where he worked directly with the national and junior national teams. He also worked with professional coaches there on drills and coaching concepts.

Levy coordinates the recruiting efforts for the Titans, as well as working with the post players at practice, game preparation and coordinating the scheduling. For his efforts, he was recognized by Rivals100Hoops.com with a 2002 selection to the Top 20 of "Top Assistants Not at a High-Major Program." He was one of only two selected from west of the Rockies.

During Levy's tenure, the Titans have boasted back-toback first-team All-Big West Conference selections in Ralphy Holmes (2003) and Pape Sow (2004) and had their first freshman of the year (Bobby Brown) in two decades.

Prior to coming to Fullerton, Levy spent three seasons as an assistant at the University of Portland of the West Coast Conference. He had three prior years of experience in the Big West Conference with two seasons (1994-95 and 1995-96) at Long Beach State under Seth



Greenberg and one (1996-97) at UC Irvine under Rod Baker. The 49ers went to the NCAA Tournament in 1994.

At Portland, Levy coordinated recruiting efforts for the Pilots while assisting in practice and game preparation. On the floor he worked primarily with post players and assisted with the strength and conditioning program.

Levy played high school ball for La Salle Academy in Manhattan before venturing west and playing two seasons at Cuesta College in San Luis Obispo. He transferred to Cal State Northridge, where he graduated in 1993. He served one season (1993-94) as an assistant to Rudy Washington at Drake in Des Moines, Iowa, before moving to Long Beach State. He began his coaching career at the Double Pump Camp at Cal State Dominguez Hills in 1992-93.

Levy was married on Oct. 6, 2002, to the former Anna Frost. They have an infant son, Kyle.



Dir. of Basketball Operations Tim Kelly

1st year, Pacific Lutheran, 2000

Tim Kelly begins his Div. I college basketball coaching career as the full-time director of basketball operations at Cal State Fullerton. A Nevada native, Kelly brings a high level of energy and enthusiasm to Head Coach Bob Burton's staff.

Kelly, 26, will handle the video/film exchange and academic development along with Administrative Assistant Allyson Alhadeff. Kelly's main role is to direct the Bob Burton BasketballCamps and Clinics and, for the first part of the season, he will be a volunteer coach and take care of the man-to-man defense.

Last year, Kelly was the head assistant coach at Feather River College in Quincy, California. There he was involved with game management, film breakdown, housing, fundraising, travel, financial aid, summer camps and recruiting. He also ran study hall and taught

intramural basketball classes. His coaching career began four years ago when he was the head varsity boys' coach at North Lake Tahoe High School in Tahoe City, California. He got the Lakers within one win of a regional berth and was later selected AAA Northern Nevada coach of the year. The next season he launched the inaugural freshmen program at NTHS while gaining the first round of the regionals.

Kelly graduated from Pacific Lutheran in Tacoma, Wash., with a degree in communications with an emphasis in TV/Radio broadcasting. He was a three-year starter for Coach Bruce Haroldson and left PLU as the career assist leader. He led the Northwestern Conference three times and in 1998-99 he was the Div. III national leader with 8.6 assists per game.

Tim's older brother, Sean, is an assistant coach for the women's basketball team at the University of Portland.

In his second year as men's basketball coach at Cal State Fullerton, Bob Burton is simultaneously preparing for his second and third "seasons." We're not talking about him looking ahead to 2005-06 and an influx of promising redshirts and new recruits. We're talking the end of Fall final exams (Dec. 18) when his player rotation will be dramatically altered by the eligibility of former All-Big West Conference performer Ralphy Holmes (6-4, Sr.,

Philadelphia, PA) and Western Kentucky transfer Jamaal

Brown (6-7, Jr., Spartanburg, SC).

"It's really exciting going into a season with mostly our own players, kids who have been through our program for a year. That's huge," said Burton. "We will have a really different style. We will emphasize defense and pushing the ball and this should be one of the best running teams they've had here in quite awhile. But it's difficult preparing for a two-part season – one without those guys and a second part with them. Ralphy and Jamaal will make a major impact and it will be interesting to see how we mesh those parts."

Holmes and Brown should miss only five games and then have two contests to get themselves and their adjusting teammates ready for Big West play, which begins on Dec. 28 at Cal State Northridge.

"We are very optimistic about this team. There will be a really different 'team' feel to it," said Burton. "And last year we really had only two proven scorers in Pape Sow and Bobby Brown (6-1, Soph., Los Angeles). This year we have many more offensive weapons - Bobby is a proven scorer, (Virginia transfer) Jermaine Harper (6-3, Jr., Gardena, CA) proved himself in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Ralphy may be the best player in the league and Yaphett King (6-4, Sr., St. Petersburg, FL) showed he could score at times. What we need to find is a way to score inside and Jamaal will give us a great lift in the front court. He can post up, he has a nice outside shooting touch and he can penetrate. He's a good player."

Counting Holmes, who sat out the 2003-04 season for disciplinary reasons after averaging 17.4 points and 6.2 rebounds the year before, the Titans have four returning lettermen. Bobby Brown was the Big West freshman of the year in 2003-04 after averaging 13.2 points and 3.5 assists. Both King (18 starts) and Hardy Asprilla (6-5, Sr., Bucaramanga, Colombia with 14 starts) played in all 28 games and combined for 13.9 points and 10 rebounds per contest.

The big hole lies in the middle where the 6-foot-11 Sow averaged 17.3 points and 9.7 rebounds on his way to a contract with the Toronto Raptors.

"We hope the combination of Lloyd Walls (6-9, Sr., Anaheim, CA) and Derek Quinet (6-9, So., San Jose, CA) can approach the numbers Pape posted," said Burton. "They both are great defenders. They will set screens and we will find ways to get them involved in the offense. Quinet can shoot it and Walls rebounds well.

"And Hardy should benefit from us changing to more of a running team. He won't be as restricted with his lanes. He's an

inspiration to all of us - he's one of the most competitive kids I've been around."

Joining the four lettermen are five players who were in the program last season. Harper and Wright State transfer Walls practiced all season after transferring a year ago and Irvine Valley College transfer Danny Lambert (6-6, Jr., Irvine, CA) practiced some of the time around a knee injury which may still affect him this season. Jamaal Brown and El Camino College transfer John Clemmons (6-0, Jr., Los Angeles) arrived at the semester break in December.

"That gives us good experience now, too," said Burton.

Competition for playing time will be intense with several newcomers


given a chance at considerable minutes. Clemmons will challenge Bobby Brown at point guard and probably play some in tandem with him since Brown's 3-point shooting ability pays off equally well from the off-guard slot. Ohlone transfer Vershan Cottrell (6-2, Jr., Renton, WA) is another perimeter shooter.

"I recruited John Clemmons when I was an assistant at Fresno State," said Burton. "He's a true point guard who has shown good leadership. He had some grade problems and fell off the radar and we were thrilled to pick him up last year. He's really good."


Cypress College transfer Justin Burns (6-6, Soph., Birmingham, AL) will be a factor at either the small or power forward slots. Lambert carries a deadly outside shot if the knee problem which sidelined him last year can be alleviated. The team's inspirational leader is Fresno City College transfer **Drew Awad** (6-3, Sr., Fresno, CA) who is a leukemia survivor. There's also a pair of eager freshmen in Mike Harrington (6-7, Chicago) from Rich Central High School and Damien Massey (5-11, Long Beach, CA) from Jordan High School, who are anxious to get an opportunity.

The 2004-05 Titans also will get the benefits of formidable practice competition. Coach Burton has three redshirts in his program who could make an impact the following season. Off guard Frank Robinson from East Carolina and power forward Adam Tancredi from Quinnipiac are four-year transfers and center Curtis Battles (6-10, 350+ pounds) is from West Hills Community College.

"Our scoring and athleticism on the perimeter will make us fun to watch," concluded Burton. "We're excited now and we think we will really get excited in December."

BIG WEST CONFERENCE

In Its 36th Season - 1969-2005

The Big West Conference enters its 36th season of sponsoring the sport of men's basketball. In addition, the Big West will celebrate the 30th anniversary of its post-season tournament in 2004-05. For the fifth straight year, the conference tournament will be held at the Anaheim Convention Center Arena. It will be the 10th time overall that the city of Anaheim has hosted the event.

During the past 35 years, six of the 10 current members have claimed or shared a regular season title. Five current members have won the tournament title led by Utah State's five titles. Pacific won its third Big West Tournament title last season.

The Big West has been home to one NCAA National Championship (UNLV in 1990) and one NIT crown (Fresno State in 1983). The conference also has had a team represented in the NCAA Tournament every year of its 35-year existence. Eight times the conference has had multiple representatives. Last year, the Big West sent two teams to postseason play, including the representative to the NCAA Tournament, Pacific. The Tigers came in as the No. 12 seed and upset fifth-seeded Providence in the first round to give the Big West its second NCAA Tournament victory in the last four years. Pacific also gave No. 4 seed Kansas a tussle in the second round before enduring defeat.

On eight occasions, the Big West has sent two teams to the National Invitation Tournament. The 2001-02 season saw UC Irvine and Utah State advance to the NIT.

While Big West programs have excelled on a national level, several individual alumni also have gone on to enjoy successful NBA careers. In 1998, the number one pick in the NBA Draft came out of the Big West in Michael Olowokandi (Los Angeles Clippers) from Pacific. Other NBA stars that have hailed from the Big West are Larry Johnson, Bryon Russell, Brian Shaw, Lucious Harris, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen.

Leon Wood, a first round pick in 1984 for Philadelphia, also has NBA affiliation as he is working as a referee.

Coming off a season in which two teams – Pacific and Utah State – won 25 games, the Big West looks to continue to excel. Seven of the top 15 scorers and eight of the top 15 rebounders from last year are returning. The conference also returns two First Team All-Big West members in Utah State's Nate Harris and Pacific's Christian Maraker. Two of the five All-Big West Second Team honorees also return to the floor this season. A Big West player received All-American accolades for the second straight year when Pacific senior Miah Davis was named Honorable Mention All-American by the Associated Press last season.

2003-04 SEASON REVIEW

After losing five potential starters within weeks of signing his contract, new Cal State Fullerton basketball Coach Bob Burton should have exhausted all of his bad luck for the 2003-04 season, right? Wrong.

Mishaps and misfortune dogged the Titans all year, but a dominant performance by center Pape Sow and a surprise freshman of the year arrival in Bobby Brown enabled Coach Burton to actually log some minor improvements over the previous CSF season. The Titans won one more game to finish 11-17 despite an 0-4 record in overtime games and they moved up a notch in the Big West Conference standings from a tie for sixth to a tie for fifth place.

The toll on the roster began with the summer suspension and eventual expulsion of returning first-team all-conference performer Ralphy Holmes for disciplinary reasons. Forward Jamal Forcheney came up short academically. Guard Fedi Holm-Hadulla's knee injury was determined to be a career ender. Prop. 48 forward Ron Allen bolted to a junior college. And forward Bron Groomes was sidelined indefinitely after suffering a serious laceration to his hand when someone vandalized his apartment window.

Aseason-opening road trip produced two quick losses and the home opener was marred by an overtime loss to Sacramento State. True freshman Brown raised eyebrows with a 22-point effort off the bench in a surprising road win at Pepperdine and he tossed in 16 more points as the Titans avenged a loss at NAU with a Titan Gym victory. But he captured the attention of all Southern California when he scored 27 points and led the Titans to a near-victory against USC at the Sports Arena.

The Titans evened their record at 4-4 with a pair of home wins over Eastern Washington and Occidental and had a chance for a winning non-conference record for the first time in five seasons. But despite 33 points and 7 rebounds from Sow, Loyola Marymount spoiled the opportunity.

For the ninth consecutive year, the Titans lost their conference opener as Cal State Northridge hounded Brown into a season-high 8 turnovers and got clutch 3-point field

goals in the final two minutes. Eventual conference co-champion Pacific would lose only one game, but it could easily have been two as the Titans let a 2-point lead in the final minute of regulation and a 4-point lead in overtime slip through their grasps.

The return of Groomes from the injured list against Pacific was nullified by academic problems incurred by Anthony Bolton, the team's third leading scorer and second leading rebounder after 11 games. He would sit out five games beginning with a narrow loss at UC Riverside. In his absence, junior forward Yaphett King stepped forward. He had a breakout 20-point game to spark a win at Long Beach and he stayed in the starting lineup even when Bolton returned.

UC Irvine played a near flawless game to keep the Titans from a 2-0 week on the road and then co-champion Utah State rolled into Titan Gym minus center Spencer Nelson, who had broken his nose in practice. Brown had a strong game, scoring 19 points including a 3-pointer that gave the Titans a 49-48 lead with 3 minutes to play. But Fullerton would not score again and Utah State escaped with a 57-49 win.

Two nights later the Titans scored an improbable win over

Idaho. Sow made only 1 of 8 shots, Brown made only 1 of 6 3-poin tries and the Titans didn't get their second field goal until the 12th minute. David Warsaw was the hero. Injuries had limited him to only 56 minutes all season, but on this night he scored 10 points in less than 3 minutes. It would be his final hurrah, however, as he qui the team two games later.

Aroad trip to the Central Coast proved disastrous. Derick Andrew was injured and didn't suit up against Cal Poly, where Bolton arrived shortly before tipoff upon learning he was certified eligible. Sow and Brown got shut out in the second half of an easy Cal Poly win and the drought continued at UC Santa Barbara, where the Titans trailed at the half, 39-9, in the lowest scoring half in Titans' history. The second

half wasn't much better and the Titans' overall field goa percentage of .231 was a school record for futility. To make matters worse, Andrew got into a shouting match with the coaches after the game and was banished from the program the same weekend Warsaw disappeared.

The most notable occurrence of a home game vs UC Riverside on Feb. 7 was the action – or inaction – or the coaching staff. Frustrated at a 40-26 halftime deficit, the coaches told the players to run their own show. The result A furious Titan rally for a 69-66 win as Sow hit 13 of 15 free throws on his way to 23 points and 12 rebounds.

The coaches returned for a home rematch with UCI and pushed all the right buttons on a live KVMI telecast. UCI shot 57 percent from the floor, held Sow to a season-low 4 points and 6 rebounds and made 17 of 22 free throws. But the Titans hit 13 3-pointers in 20 trie and forced 27 turnovers. It didn't hurt that Brown scored 21 points in the second half for a total of 24.

Fullerton completed a season sweep of Long Beach to build a modest 3-game winning streak. Bolton scored 14 of his team's 15 points during one stretch and King killed the 49ers again with 23 points, but it was Brown scoring 5 points in the final minute to pull out a 1-point win.


The annual road trip to Moscow and Logan produced the seemingly usual results – two L's. Cardell Butle was the star of senior night at Utah State as he hit 8 of 10 3-pointers on his way to a 31-point night.

The Fullerton team that showed up on Feb. 26 vs UCSB bore no resemblance to the unit that scored 9 points in the first half on Jan. 31. The Titans shot it out with the Gauchos only to lose to the visitors from UCSB for the fourth time in a row, all by 3 points of less, with this occasion dragging into double overtime. UCSB rallied dramatically and then took advantage of Sow, Groomes and King all fouling out.

The home season ended on a high note as the Titans completed an 8-6 Titan Gym record by beating Cal Poly. Sow grabbed a career high 18 rebounds and Bolton scored a career-high 26 points.

The Titans' one-game winning streak at Spanos Center was snapped by a 17-0 Pacific run late in the first half. Two nights later the Titans had to win at Cal State Northridge to gain the Big Wes Tournament and they did, in a rout. A 16-2 start launched the Titans toward a 25-point victory, their second-best road margin of victory in the last 20 seasons and CSUN's worst home loss in 14 years of Div I play.

The Matadors got a shot at revenge four nights later in the Ana heim Convention Center. With Ian Boylan exploding for 31 points and Sow getting into serious foul trouble, CSUN cruised to an 80-76 win.

After the teams sparred for about 15 minutes, NAU pulled away late in the first half from a 19-19 tie to take a 6-point halftime lead. NAU scored the first 5 points of the second half for a 41-30 lead and the Titans would never get closer than 7 points.

Fullerton's last gasp came at the 7-minute mark when Brian Pruitt scored inside to make it a 62-54 game. But Chris Ferguson hit a 3-pointer and Stephen Garnett and Adrian Hayes scored inside and the outcome was decided at 69-54 with 4 minutes to go.

Fullerton played without reserve center Babacar Camara, who was hospitalized in the middle of the night with a case of food poisoning. Pape Sow had to play 34 minutes and he was the only Titan to score in double figures. He would have had a 30-point game with a better night at the foul line.

For only the third time, Cal State Fullerton played at the Wells Fargo Arena on the Arizona State campus but for the first time in the regular season.

It was a 20-years plus delayed rematch of the 1983 NIT game won by the Sun Devils and Byron Scott, 87-83, over Leon Wood and the Titans. Fullerton's only other appearance in the building came in the first round of the 1978 NCAA Tournament when they upset Michael Cooper and New Mexico to advance to the western regionals in Albuquerque.

The Titans played hard but didn't shoot well. Pape Sow contained All-American candidate Ike Diogu until he got into foul trouble, something that plagued most of the Titans, who were cited for 36 personal fouls to 22 for the host Sun Devils.

Fullerton had its biggest lead at 29-25 with 5 minutes left in the first half but got outscored 16-2 before the buzzer to fall behind, 41-31. ASU built the lead to as many as 16 points at 51-35 before the Titans made an extended run aided by poor foul-shooting by the Sun Devils.

Fullerton got within 7 points with 5 minutes to play but could only exchange buckets until the final minute. The Titans got the deficit down to 4 and had the ball in the waning seconds but couldn't pull off a miracle finish.

Fullerton opened the home portion of its 2003-04 season and the Coach Bob Burton Era on an optimistic note, hosting a Sacramento State team the Titans had beaten a year earlier on the road.

But the visitors from the Big Sky Conference returned the favor, riding a hot hand from the 3-point line to an overtime win to spoil all of the home debuts.

Neither team played well in a 24-24 first half, committing a total of 22 turnovers and shooting a combined 30 percent from the floor with neither team ever leading by more than 4 points.

Things didn't heat up much after intermission until the Hornets started popping from behind the arc. They hit 6 of 12 in the half as they used a 10-0 run to go from 28-24 down to 34-28 up. They would never trail again. They gradually pulled out to a couple of 8-point leads and they still held a 7-point advantage at 57-50 with 5 minutes remaining.

The chances of the Titans picking up their first win of the season at Pepperdine were about as likely as low-cost housing being erected on Malibu beach. The Waves had beaten Colorado and were coming off a last-second loss at Oklahoma State and were playing on a floor where the Titans had not tasted victory since the 1990-91 season when Joe Small and Bruce Bowen led them to an overtime win. And the Titans had no momentum or confidence after stumbling in their home opener to an unheralded Sacramento State team.

The Titans had their second best shooting night in a decade as Pape Sow dominated inside and Bobby Brown came off the bench to score from downtown and lead Fullerton to its inaugural win under Coach Bob Burton.

But Sow hit a free throw, Anthony Bolton made two and Brown sank one around a couple of defensive stops and the Titans were able to celebrate for the first time in the 2003-04 season.

The momentum of the victory at Pepperdine and a revenge motive for a 17-point loss on opening night carried Cal State Fullerton into its rematch with Northern Arizona and a cold shooting night by the visitors heped facilitate a relatively easy Titan win.

With Yaphett King (4 of 5 for 9 points) and Brian Pruitt (4 of 7 for 8 points) providing surprising offensive firepower, the Titans jumped out to a 50-33 halftime lead and never let the Lumberjacks cut the deficit to single digits. NAU, which came in shooting 44 percent as a team from 3-point range, made only 35 percent and compounded the problem with a 48 percent effort from the foul line.

The Lumberjacks fell behind 4-0 at the outset and never led. Fullerton broke a 6-6 tie with a 21-6 run triggered by two 3-pointers from Bobby Brown and capped by another one from King. The lead grew to as many as 20 points before Kelly Golob dropped in one of his six 3-pointers for NAU just before halftime.

With many in town because of the Wooden Classic earlier in the day in Anaheim, more than a dozen NBA scouts saw Pape Sow have a strong game. His game-opening fall-away baseline jumper was impressive and he led all rebounders with nine.

But it was Brown who earned Big West player of the week honors.

The Titans tackled their second Pac 10 opponent of the season and not only put up a strong fight but had a victory in their grasps.

Riding a remarkable 45-minute performance by Bobby Brown and a school record 14 3-point field goals, Fullerton led by as many as 11 points in the second half and by 5 points with less than 3 minutes to play. But the Trojans caught up with 56 seconds to play, each side missed a game-winning shot in regulation and USC broke an 83-83 tie in overtime with a 3-pointer by Derrick Craven and then nailed down the win at the foul line.

Fullerton used a 14-2 run to open the second half for a 47-37 lead. USC caught up at 56-56 at the 11:40 mark but Brown hit a trey. USC caught up at 59-59 and Brown hit another trey. Back-to-back 3-pointers by Yaphett King and Brian Pruitt made it a 70-63 CSF lead with 7:22 to play and it was 78-73 at 2:53 after Pruitt hit a jumper. But Fullerton had a turnover and two missed shots on its last three possessions and USC got a layup from Jeff McMillan and then a 3-pointer by Desmon Farmer.

Pape Sow played only 21 minutes and had no rebounds before fouling out with 5:17 left. Babacar Camara fouled out at 2:50 of overtime. Zakee Smith didn't make the trip for disciplinary reasons and the Titans committed a season-high 21 turnovers. With a chance to post a winning non-conference record for the first time in five years, the Titans wrapped up the 2003 calendar at home against a 6-4 LMU team that had won only 1 of 5 games after a 5-0 start.

Pape Sow had one of his best games ever with 33 points (his second-best total) and 7 rebounds, but he was outshone by LMU guard Charles Brown. The Big West Conference schedule began with Cal State Northridge visiting Titan Gym. The Matadors were 4-4 -- unbeaten at home and winless on the road. The latter condition changed in the final two minutes of this game.

Actually, Fullerton's problems began early. On its first 10 possessions, Fullerton had 7 turnovers and only 3 shots. Northridge wasn't playing much better but edged out to an 11-5 lead.

The Titans finally got their act together and went on a 12-0 run to take their biggest lead of the game at 17-11 with 6:12 remaining in the half. But Joseph Frazier hit a 3-pointer just before the halftime buzzer and CSUN went to the locker rom with a 26-24 lead. Fullerton had committed 15 turnovers and would end up with 24 to 22 for CSUN.

Northridge stretched the lead to as many as 8 points, the last at 41-33 with 10:06 to play. Fullerton later used a 7-0 run capped by two Bobby Brown free throws for a 52-51 lead with 2:18 to play.

CSUN got a 3-pointer and a 54-52 lead from Davin White and Eto Onyenegecha applied the crusher with another 3-pointer to make it 57-52 with 0:57 to go. White would add a dunk and two free throws to offset Brown's 3-pointer and the Titans had lost their conference opener for the ninth year in a row. Their last opening win came at UNLV of all places, on Dec. 17, 1994.

Pardon us if this storyline sounds familiar. Fullerton falls behind, rallies in the closing minutes to take a slim lead only to be beaten by a 3-pointer. For the third game in a row, that was the script the Titans followed with even greater frustration, going into overtime.

Pacific, which had shot 65 percent from the floor in a win two nights earlier at UC Riverside, came out cold and the Titans eased out to a 13-5 lead in less than 6 minutes. But UoP dominated the next 12 minutes, outscoring Fullerton, 32-7, to take a 37-20 advantage. The Titans got 5 points in the final 7 seconds of the half, the last three on Zakee Smith's half-court shot, to pull within 10 points at 38-28.

The momentum did not carry over. Pacific regained control and was cruising at 56-45 with 6:51 to go. But eight minutes without a field goal and 5 minutes without a point allowed Fullerton to catch up at 56 at 2:18 on back-to-back jumpers by Bobby Brown. The run was 13-0 on Pape Sow's basket for a 58-56 lead at 1:26 but Christian Maraker's free throws tied the game at 1:11. Each team missed its last shot.

In OT, Sow fouled out at 2:59 but Brown's layup at 1:49 gave Fullerton a 64-60 lead. Maraker scored inside and David Doubley drilled his fifth 3-pointer for a 65-64 UoP lead. Maraker made a free throw and the Tigers had their fifth consecutive Titan Gym win when Yaphett King's 3-pointer missed at the buzzer.

A year earlier, Cal State Fullerton went into UC Riverside having just lost the services of Derick Andrew for the season due to an eye problem yet came away with a victory.

This year, No. 3 scorer and No. 2 rebounder Anthony Bolton was left behind due to academic problems and the Titans found a way to build a 13-point lead in the opening minute of the second half. Unfortunately, they also allowed a 15-2 Highlanders' run to even up the score and for the fourth game in a row, they let a late, small lead get away.

After UCR tied the game at 41-41 with 13:24 to play, there were 7 more ties and 5 more lead changes. Fullerton's biggest advantage down the stretch was 54-51 at 6:42 and UCR led by no more than 3 points until Rickey Porter made one of two free throws with 3 seconds left for the final score.

Porter's layup put UCR ahead to stay at 60-58 with 1:46 remaining. Andrew missed a short jumper for Fullerton and Kevin Butler made one of two free throws for UCR. Bobby Brown made a driving layup to make it 61-60 with 48 seconds left but he got beat defensively by Mark Peters, whose layup made it 63-60 with 23 seconds to go. Andrew missed a forced 3-pointer and the Titans had to foul.

Wasted were Pape Sow's third double-double in a row and a solid defensive job on the UCR perimeter shooters, who made only 5 of 24 3-point tries.

The scene was eerily familiar for Coach Bob Burton.

The Titans ventured into the Bren Center for an afternoon Fox-televised contest seeking something they hadn't done since 1987 -- go 2-0 on the road in one week of Big West Conference play. They came in with a winning record in the building -- a 9-8 advantage -- although UCI had won the last three games there.

But the goal remained too elusive.

UC Irvine played what Coach Pat Douglass called its best game of the year. The Anteaters shot 53 percent from the floor including 50 percent from the 3-point line and they led the final 29 minutes of the game.

High-rolling Utah State came into Titan Gym with a 10-game winning streak and national Top 30 rankings. What the Aggies didn't have was starting center Spencer Nelson, who had broken his nose during practice in Logan and would not play on the trip to Southern California.

The sum of the parts didn't jibe with the results of the whole. Pape Sow made only 1 of 8 shots, Bobby Brown made only 1 of 6 three-point attempts and the Titans didn't get their second basket until 8:15 remained in the first half.

Before a live KVMD television audience, the Titans logged their third consecutive home victory, again making clutch plays down the stretch and riding a 21-point second-half explosion by guard Bobby Brown.

UC Irvine shot 57 percent from the floor, held Pape Sow to a season-low 4 points and only 6 rebounds and made 17 of 23 free throws. But the Titans offset that by hitting a near-record 13 3-point field goals and forcing the Anteaters into a season-high 27 turnovers.

It was a game of streaks. Fullerton started strong and jumped out to a 13-6 lead behind the early scoring of Anthony Bolton, who soon had to sit with two fouls. The lead never got larger but was still 7 at 29-22 on Yaphett King's 3-point field goal at 6:50. But Fullerton would not score again in the half and when UCI opened the second half with an 11-2 run for a 41-31 lead at 15:41, the picture was grim.

But with Brown leading the way, the Titans went on their own 18-6 run to retake the lead. UCI responded with an 8-0 surge but a 3-of-3 effort at the foul line by Zakee Smith and one of Brown's season-to-date-high six 3-pointers tied the game at 55 at 4:33.

The last tie was 61-61 and Brown broke it with another trey at 1:33. Successful one-and-one efforts by Bolton at 0:40 and Brown at 0:13 sealed the win, embellished by Brown's late dunk.

What began as a laugher turned into a near nightmare and finally became a heartstopper. The Titans ran their winning streak to a season-high three in a row and won their fourth in a row at home by the thinnest of margins.

Fullerton's first four baskets were 3-pointers as it jumped out to a 21-7 lead less than 7 minutes into the game. The lead grew to 18 points at 31-13 with almost 9 minutes to play. For perspective, Fullerton had scored 31 points or less in the entire first half of 10 previous games.

Two teams on a roll collided in Idaho and the location no doubt weighed heavily on the outcome, a reversal of a Jan. 24 Titans' home win.

After a poor shooting start that saw them hit only 1 of their first 10 shots, the Vandals rallied behind their vocal fans and began playing the kind of defense that had carried them to 5 wins in their last 6 games, holding Fullerton to its second lowest first-half scoring total of the season.

Fullerton committed 24 turnovers to tie its season high and that hurdle, along with a 14-point deficit at the free-throw line, proved too much to overcome. The Titans' 3-game winning streak ended in their fifth loss in six trips to Moscow.

A sellout crowd came to send off the four USU seniors, celebrate the fourth unbeaten home season in school history and exhort their Aggies to continue their winning ways that had them in the national rankings and atop the Big West Conference standings. Some of them probably even knew that Fullerton brought a 19-game losing streak at The Dee Glen Smith Spectrum into the game.

The Titans faced a must-win situation in the season home finale with Cal Poly visiting and trying to move into a tie for eighth place.

On Seniors Night, Pape Sow and Anthony Bolton had huge games and Fullerton led almost wire-to-wire yet needed a 12-for-12 performance at the foul line in the final 90 seconds to hold off the Mustangs.

Sow set a personal rebound high wtih 18, the most by any Big West Conference player this season. And Bolton logged a career-high 26 points with deadly shooting from all spots. A 50-22 advantage on the backboards was the difference, as Cal Poly rallied with a 3-point barrage that got it as close as 3 points in the closing minutes after trailing by as many as 14 points in the first half. Bolton hit three consecutive 3-point field goals in less than a 2-minute span late in the first half to allow Fullerton to hold a 7-point advantage. Bolton hit his first two treys in the second half before finally missing his last two tries. His five makes came in a 6-minute span on the clock.

Yaphett King's backdoor layup with 3:26 to play gave Fullerton a 76-71 lead and Bolton followed with a jumper at 2:40. Cal Poly never got closer than 5 points again as Bolton went 8-for-8 at the line and both Sow and Bobby Brown made a pair.

In the stretch drive to claim a berth in the Big West Conference post-season tournament, four games were played Thursday night and all four of them went the wrong way for the Titans, most importantly their own game at Pacific.

A 17-0 Tigers' run late in the first half doomed Fullerton to its 10th road loss in 12 tries. With UC Riverside winning at Cal State Northridge, Cal Poly staying alive with a home win over Long Beach State and UC Santa Barbara beating UC Irvine to clear the way for a possible third-place finish, the Titans were backed into a corner. Because they came up short in all tie-breakers, their post-season fate would be decided two nights later in Northridge or San Luis Obispo.

"Desperation" is how senior forward Anthony Bolton explained the Titans' 25-point victory at Cal State Northridge in the regular season finale, a win that Fullerton had to have to gain a berth in the Big West Conference post-season tournament since Cal Poly would later beat UC Irvine.

After the Matadors scored on their first possession, the Titans tallied the next 16 points and the hosts never fully recovered. They got as close as 8 points on a couple of occasions, but the last time, at 56-48 with 13:35 to play, was met with a 9-0 Fullerton run. A layup by Chris Davis was then more than countered by a 7-0 Fullerton burst that made it a 72-50 game with 9:20 remaining.

In the last 20 seasons, the Titans had logged only one more lopsided road victory, a 32-point win over a 1-25 UC Irvine team in 1997. The home loss was the worst in Cal State Northridge's 14-year Div. I history. Ironically, it earned the teams a rematch in the opening round of the Big West Tournament.

The victory also was No. 11 for Fullerton, one more than a year ago and its best season's total since the 1998-99 team went 13-14 for Coach Bob Hawking. It was only the third road victory of the season, adding to wins at Pepperdine and Long Beach State.

Pape Sow did not have a double-double for a change, but he still was rewarded as BWC Player of the Week with 43 points and 20 rebounds in two road games. Yaphett King matched his season's best with 23 points and Zakee Smith had a best of 10 assists.



Fullerton and Northridge met in the opening round of the Big West Conference Tournament in a rematch of their game four nights earlier in Northridge. Titans' Coach Bob Burton feared the psychological advantage the vanquished Matadors would have and his worst fears were realized.

Northridge played with the desperation Fullerton had shown in the Matadome. Northridge hit from the perimeter and defended with enthusiasm. And when the Titans' Pape Sow got into foul trouble, picking up No. 3 in the first half and No. 4 three minutes into the second half, the die was cast.

Ian Boylan and Joseph Frazier combined for only 11 points in the first half of the game at Northridge. In the first half of this game, Frazier had 10 and Boylan had 12 on his way to a career high of 31. At Northridge, Yaphett King (8), Anthony Bolton (6) and Bron Groomes (8) combined for 22 first-half points. In this game, they had only 7 among them in the first half.

A lob dunk and a spinning baseline drive and dunk by Sow got the Titans off to a 4-3 lead but that would be the last time Fullerton was ahead. Boylan hit a bucket and Frazier hit back-to-back treys and CSUN was ahead 13-4 and off and running. Bobby Brown's 3-pointer cut the gap to a point at 33-32 with 5:13 remaining, but CSUN moved out to a 5-point halftime lead and quickly stretched it to double digits in the second half, eventually up to 20.



Cal State Fullerton's Titan Gymnasium has served as the home court advantage for the Titans' men's basketball team since the 1964-65 season. Historically one of the most difficult places to play because of the proximity of the bleachers to the playing floor, Titan Gym has been upgraded over the past few years to make it more fan friendly while still intimate.

Chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold-down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the floor has been redesigned and resurfaced.

Last season, the court gained a new look as a "drop-down" scoreboard was installed along with new auxiliary scoreboards behind each basket. This year's addition is balcony seating on the south side. Seating capacity has moved up to around 4,000 and there is a much needed practice floor behind them.

Construction restricted seating on the south side the past few years but now the gymnasium is part of an expanded physical education/kinesiology complex, featuring numerous classrooms and physical testing laboratories. The facility also houses practice rooms for the Titan wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

The record crowd for Titan Gym is 5,015 on Feb. 24, 1983, when the Titans beat unbeaten and No. 1-ranked UNLV with extra chairs behind the baskets and standing room everywhere.

The gym was featured in the recent feature film "Evolution" and was the site of team handball competition in the 1984 Olympic Games.



DIV. I TITANS' HOME-COURT RECORD

The longest home-court winning streak in Titan Gym is 26 games, stretching from Jan. 23, 1982, through Jan. 21, 1984. A streak of 12 in a row was snapped Feb. 10, 1993, by Houston.

The most recent streak of length was an 8-gamer -- the last three contests of the 1996-97 schedule and the first five of the 1997-98 slate. It was ended by Idaho on Jan. 15.

The Titans entered the 1999-2000 season with a streak of 14 consecutive non-conference home victories, lost to USD, but then won the next four to make it 18 out of the last 19.



Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program. Eight Titans have been drafted in the past two decades and several more players have signed as free agents with

the National Basketball Association.

Pape Sow is the newest former Titan to be taking home an NBA paycheck. Drafted in June by Miami in the second round, he was traded the same day to Toronto and made the Raptors' opening roster for the 2004-05 season.


The most prominent former Titan is late bloomer Bruce Bowen, whose professional career has been a model for perseverance and determination. Signed originally as a free agent by Cleveland in 1995, he spent a

couple of years in Europe, (Evreux, France, where he averaged 29 points per game) played in the CBA and has been waived and resigned numerous times by several teams while crossing paths with numerous legendary coaches. He first captured the attention of Pat Riley with the Miami Heat in 1996-97, where

he played in only one game before moving on to Boston. There he appeared in 91 games during the 1997-98 and 1998-99 seasons for Rick Pitino, serving primarily as a defensive specialist and playing less than 10 minutes per game. He was well travelel during the 1999-2000 season -- signed by Philadelphia, traded to Chicago, waived two days later and signed by Miami again where he was reunited with Riley. He became a starter during the 2000-01 season and averaged 7.2 points in 82 games before signing a free-agent contract for 2001-02 with the San Antonio Spurs. That year he started every game (59) except for the seven weeks he missed with a broken finger on his right hand. Not coincidentally, the Spurs went only 11-12 in his absence.

"You really don't know how good Bruce is until he isn't around," said captain David Robinson.

The Spurs got knocked out of the




Bruce Bowen earned an NBA Championship ring with the Spurs.

playoffs by the Los Angeles Lakers but then returned the favor a year later with Bowen leading the Spurs' charge to the NBA title. He ended up leading the league in 3-point field goal percentage while usually guarding the opponent's top perimeter threat -- the Kobe Bryants of the world.

> Prior to Bowen's emergence, the most recognizable former Titan was Cedric Ceballos, who became one of the league's top scorers for the Los Angeles Lakers and made the NBA All-Star team in 1994-95, but was unable to play due to an injury. He began his career in Phoenix, returned to the Suns and then also played for the Mayericks, the Pistons and the Heat before getting cut by Denver and retiring. Last year he was coaching in the WNBA and he recently signed to play again with the


> During his first four years with the Suns, he was known primarily for two things: winning the NBA slam-dunk contest in 1992 with his blind-folded "hocus pocus" act and scoring a phenomenal number of points when Charles Barkley was injured. Ceballos' absence due to another injury may have swung the tide toward Chicago in the 1994 playoffs.

as Titans during the 1989-90 season, when Cedric was a senior and Bruce was a freshman.


Success has seemed to come in pairs for Fullerton players in the pros. The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made NBA rosters -- guard Leon Wood with Philadelphia and center Ozell Jones with San Antonio. Wood completed a 6-year NBA career with Sacramento on Christmas Eve, 1990. He played last in the CBA and in France and toured with Magic Johnson's All-Stars. He has spent the last seven seasons as an NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that transition. Wood began his post-Titan career as the point guard on the United States' gold-medal 1984 Olympic team under Coach Bob Knight.

Other former Titans in and out of the NBA and CBA during recent years were 1988 graduates Richard Morton and Henry Turner. Morton started the 1988-89 season with Indiana. Turner, who was a teammate of Morton's in the CBA, spent much of the 1989-90 season with Sacramento. Morton was one of the top scorers in the CBA in recent seasons and has made the loop's all-star team.

Guard Aaron Sunderland, a 1993 product, did well in the CBA and 1994-95 products Winston Peterson and David Frigout have played in Europe. J. D. Green (1990-92) became a star in Australia and former center Dirk Rassloff was summoned four summers ago to join a team in Milan, Italy.

Other Titans to play in the NBA include guard Kevin Henderson, who played with Golden State and Cleveland; forward Mike Niles with Phoenix; and forward Greg Bunch with the New York Knicks. Foreign leagues have featured center Herman (Demone) Webster, forward Kerry Boagni and sharpshooter Kevin Heenan to name a few. Other players drafted in the 1980s were Ricky Mixon (Lakers), Tony Neal (Lakers) and Boagni (Utah Jazz).

Sean Williams gained fame first as an actor ("Blue Chips") and later as a member of the Harlem Globetrotters, for whom he entered the Guinness Book of World Records by dunking on a basket 11 feet, 8 inches tall.

Lyle Parks, Jr., Titan Hustle Award

The *Titan Hustle Award* was established during the 1989-1990 season by a group of Cal State Fullerton basketball boosters then known as the *Playmakers*. The trophy traditionally has been presented to the Titan, who, in the opinion of the boosters, has displayed the greatest amount of "hustle" on offense, defense and during practices.

In 2002, the *Titan Hoop Club* board of directors unanimously voted to rename the trophy the *Lyle Parks*, *Jr., Titan Hustle Award*, in honor of the long-time president of the *Executive Playmakers*, whose perseverance kept the basketball booster group going throughout the mid-to-late 1990's. The *Executive Playmakers* were responsible for successfully raising funds that were used for physical improvements to the basketball locker room and the coaches' offices.



Within the ranking, Cal State Fullerton is second in conferring bachelor's degrees in communications, fifth in public administration, seventh in criminal justice, eighth in foreign languages and 10th in business. The university is also ranked 10th in the nation for the number of Hispanic administrators and faculty members CSUF employs.

The Performing Arts Major's College Guide lists Cal State Fullerton among its "Most Highly Recommended Undergraduate Programs" for drama and musical theater, and among "Noteworthy Programs" for dance.

The Templeton Guide: Colleges That Encourage Character Development: A Resource for Parents, Students and Educators lists CSUF's Student Leadership Institute among the guide's "Exemplary Programs" in the student leadership category.

The College of Business and Economics is home to the nation's second largest undergraduate enrollment in business, according to the **American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business**.

preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships with their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks sixth nationally in the overall number of bachelor's degrees awarded to minority students.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing.

Community members also may visit the campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students, also is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates. One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, which serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.



Titan Athletics...A Proud History

From modest beginnings and never with abundant resources, the Cal State Fullerton Titans have achieved successes that are the envy of many older and larger institutions across the country.

"Titan Pride" has been the rallying cry for 12 national team championships in seven different sports, hundreds of individual All-Americans, dozens of eventual professional athletes, numerous national coach of the year award winners, Olympic basketball players, a Miss America candidate and the subject matter of a Walt Disney film.

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only his second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA playoffs in 1961-62. Sixteen seasons later, the nation watched another "Cinderella" Titan Five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association postseason tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the NCAA Western Regional.

The basketball tradition began even stronger on the women's side. Recent Naismith and Women's Basketball Hall of Fame inductee Billie Moore coached the Titans to the national championship in 1970 and star forward Nancy Dunkle was one of her players on the women's 1976 silver-medal winning Olympic team. The most recent Titan All-American was center Genia Miller-Rycraw in 1991.

The Titans earned gold in 1984 when point guard Leon Wood directed the men's Olympic team to victory in Los Angeles. The first-round draft pick of the Philadelphia 76ers went on to a 6-year National Basketball Association career and is now a veteran NBA referee, only the second former NBA player to make that career switch.

Future NBA performers Richard Morton, Henry Turner, Cedric Ceballos and Bruce Bowen (a member of the 2003 NBA champion Spurs) were some of the stars of the 1980s and 1990s, when the Titans made NIT appearances on both the men's and women's sides. Ceballos gained notoriety for winning the NBA Slam-Dunk contest one year while the women can point with pride to Autumn Hollyfield, the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter in 1993-94, and Koko Lahanas, the nation's scoring leader in 1994-95. Rycraw still holds NCAA records and came back from a career in Japan to earn a spot with the Los Angeles Sparks before returning to Fullerton as an assistant coach.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton considerable fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division NCAA titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had subsequent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation. Coach Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded onto the national scene behind former Coach Augie Garrido by breaking the USC monopoly in the NCAA western regionals in Fullerton's first Div. I season in 1975. The Titans have gone on to win four national championships and establish a remarkable winning tradition over four decades. The Titans captured their first NCAA title in 1979 behind Tim Wallach, who would go on to play 17 major league seasons. They won again in 1984 behind College World Series MVP John Fishel, in 1995 behind national player of the year Mark Kotsay and again in 2004 behind All-American pitcher Jason Windsor, who won two games and saved a third in Omaha to cap a two-year, 8-0 post-season record. Coach George Horton has won national coach of the year honors in each of the past two seasons.

Women also have sparkled on Fullerton diamonds. Hall of Fame Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and won more games (913) than any previous coach The Titans have made eight trips to the College World Series and 22 regional appearances. They brought home an NCAA Championship in 1986 and boast three national players of the year in pitchers Kathy Van Wyk, Susan LeFebvre and Connie Clark.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Div. II beginnings in 1970. Coach Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runner-up finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have had remarkable success in the Canadian Football League. Allen Pitts was the CFL's all-time leading receiver and Damon Allen, who was still active this season, is the all-time leading passer. Mike Pringle is the No. 2 all-time rusher and could become No. 1 if he stays healthy.

With the loss of football, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program filled the void in Titan Stadium. A women's squad was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans climb as high as No. 3 in the national rankings. They were led by All-American forward Eddie Soto and competed at the NCAA Final Four, placing third. There have been three subsequent trips to the playoffs and a No. 2 national ranking in 1996. On the international level, former Titan Brian Dunseth captained the U.S. Olympic team in the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

There have been national titles in men's cross country (1971) and women's fencing (1974) and individual standouts such as golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994, won three events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships and was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year Award. Brandon Campbell was the Big West track and field male athlete of the year in 2001 after starring in the high jump, long jump and quarter mile. He also was a starter on the basketball team.

Several current and recent Titans have garnered international attention including appearances in the 2004 Olympics in Athens. Catcher Jenny Topping played for the gold medal-winning U.S. Softball team while outfielder Lindsey Bashor was on the Greek team. Competing for Mexico were pole vaulter Giovanni Lanaro and soccer player Marlene Sandoval.

What about the nickname?

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done but then along came the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions of the caricature have been made to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the mascot to life also has changed. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was appropriate on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange.

NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills

Cal State Fullerton is a participating institution in the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program, which is aimed at enhancing the



quality of the studentathlete experience within the university setting. Throughout their career, Cal State Fullerton studentathletes are provided with resources that will assist their development in five primary areas: academics,

athletics, personal development, career development and community service.

The Athletic Academic Services department, tabbed more simply as Titan Scholars, provides effective support services to help student-athletes reach their academic goals. The academic services staff takes a proactive role by coordinating study plans, study skills workshops, tutoring sessions, study halls, faculty and peer mentoring and campus services referrals. Staff members also monitor progress toward graduation, assist student-athletes in selecting and registering for classes and teach a Life Skills 100 class.

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "early warning" system in place, which utilizes periodic grade checks and clear communication with faculty members when student-athletes may require additional academic support.

The department also provides a re-entry program for former student-athletes who return to Cal State Fullerton to complete their degree.

ATHLETIC TRAINING

The athletic training program at Cal State Fullerton plays a major role in maintaining the health of Titan student-athletes. Team physicians, three full-time certified athletic trainers, two certified graduate assistants and more than 20 student assistants comprise a program that is generally regarded as one of the very best in the country.

Titan athletic training personnel specialize in preventive medicine, recognition of injuries and rehabilitation. Student athletic trainers who are admitted into the highly selective ATEP (Athletic Training Educational Program), which is administered through the Department of Kinesiology and Health Promotion, must meet demanding requirements. In addition to taking 100 units of kinesiology and athletic training courses, they must serve five semesters and 1,500 clinical supervised hours. Before becoming certified, candidates must pass the National Athletic Trainers' Association Board of Certification examination. Since 1997, nearly 80 percent of Cal State Fullerton graduates have passed on their first attempt, compared to the national rate of about 30 percent. Since the inception of the program, dozens of alumni have moved into coveted positions across the country (see below).



Julie Max, MeD, ATC Head Athletic Trainer

Julie Max, Cal State Fullerton's Head Athletic Trainer, has been the driving force behind the development of an athletic training program that has received national acclaim. Max is in her 25th year at her alma mater since replacing her mentor, the late Jerry Lloyd. Recently, Max completed a second two-year term as president of the 25,000-member National Association of Athletic Trainers (NATA). Max, the first female president in the organization's history, previously served a sixyear stint on the organization's board of directors and a one-year term as its vice president. In 1997, Max was honored with the NATA Service Award, which recognizes out-standing service to the athletic training profession at the state and district level.

ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Titan Gymnasium

Titan Gym continues to undergo major renovations. In the past few years, chairback seats have replaced most of the bleachers, portable basket supports have replaced the fold down backboards, new paint and banners have been applied to the walls and the playing surface has been redone. Recently completed was an expansion that features numerous classrooms, physical testing laboratories, a new upstairs practice facility, as well as additional seating. A new "drop down" scoreboard over center court was installed in the spring of 2003. The facility also features practice and match rooms for the wrestling, gymnastics and fencing programs.

Goodwin Field

Goodwin Field has played host to four NCAA Regionals and three Super Regionals in the past five years. A \$3 million expansion project, spearheaded by a \$1 million gift from Jerry and Merilyn Goodwin, has transformed the field into one of the premier collegiate facilities on the West Coast. The field now features the Wilson Clubhouse – which includes lockerrooms, a reception area and offices for the coaches – and the Doubek VIP Room.

Titan Softball Complex

Having received a complete makeover since the 2000 season, the Titan Softball Complex boasts one of the top facilities in the nation. Utilizing the adjacent Wilson Clubhouse and Doubek VIP Room, the two-diamond complex can now adequately serve as a host site for postseason competition (it was the site of an eight-team NCAA Regional in 2003) in addition to the annual Kia Klassic, the top regular-season tournament in the nation.

Titan Stadium


Titan Stadium is considered among the finest soccer facilities in the nation and regularly hosts professional and international soccer matches in addition to the Titan men's and women's programs. The facility, completed in 1992, was home to the Titan football program for one year before the sport was dropped after the 1992 season. The stadium is also a hot-spot for the entertainment industry and is regularly featured in television commercials and programs. UCLA also utilized the facility in 2003 for its fall football camp.

Cal State Fullerton student-athletes have year-round access to the services offered by the Strength and Conditioning Program, under the direction of **Andy Williams**. Aimed at developing speed, power, strength and endurance in Cal State Fullerton's student-athletes, the program plays a key role in the success of Titan teams.

Individual workouts are designed, implemented and regularly adjusted by Williams to help each student-athlete develop the stamina needed to maintain the rigorous year-round workouts associated with Division I sports.

Located inside Titan Stadium is a 6,000 square-foot weight room facility featuring eight platforms, eight squat racks, plyometric devices and nearly 8,000 pounds in free weights. The facility will service more than 300 student-athletes over the course of the year.

Andy Williams was named Cal State Fullerton's second full-time strength and conditioning coach on Oct. 11, 2004. Williams came to Cal State Fullerton after spending the previous 20 months as the director of human performance at Somerset Sports and Rehabilitation in New Jersey.

Armed with a wide range of experience, Williams spent two years as the head strength and conditioning coach at Tennessee State, working with football and women's basketball, and a year each at Middle Tennessee State (assistant strength and conditioning coach) and the University of Connecticut (graduate assistant).

In 1999, Williams was the head strength and conditioning coach for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe during their World Bowl Championship season and also served as the assistant special teams coach. He also served a two-year internship with the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs from 1996-98 and was an intern with Major League Baseball's Kansas City Royals during spring training in 1997.

Williams earned his bachelor's degree in exercise science from Missouri Western State College in 1997, where he also played three seasons at outside linebacker, and completed his coursework for a master's degree in education at Middle Tennessee State in 2002.

Dr. Milton Gordon University President

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 9, 1990

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician

at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and has been appointed to the committee to name a successor to outgoing NCAA President Cedric Dempsey. He also is the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.



Brian Quinn Athletics Director

Brian Quinn assumed the post of director of athletics at Cal State Fullerton on Jan. 14, 2002

Under his leadership, the Titans are successfully weathering a state and systemwide fiscal crisis with minimal impact on student-athletes. Academic performances have improved dramatically and Titan Gym has undergone a dramatic facelift. In each of the last two years, the Titans have outperformed the rest of the Big. West Conference in the NACDA Cup standings capped by consecutive appearances by the baseball team at the College World Series, where the Titans placed third for the fourth time and then won their fourth national title. Quinn, 63, was assistant dean and AD at Loyola Marymount

University from 1985 through 1998. During his tenure the Lions won nine West Coast Conference titles and advanced to the NCAA men's basketball tournament three times. Both the baseball team and the women's volleyball team made five trips to the NCAA Playoffs with the baseball team reaching the College World Series in 1986. Among his accomplishments away from competition were bringing the department into full Title IX compliance and earning a 10-year NCAA accreditation without conditions in 1997

In June of 1998, Quinn was appointed executive director of athletic development and promotion. He was responsible for major gift solicitation to build new recreation and health facilities, new athletic offices and auxiliary services as well as improved playing facilities.

Quinn graduated from Loyola in 1963 with a degree in business. He was a starter for the Lions in both baseball and basketball and was captain and most valuable player of the latter for the 1962-63 season. He was inducted into the LMU Athletics Hall of Fame as both a player and administrator.

Quinn began a teaching and coaching career at St. Anthony H.S. in Long Beach in 1968 and earned a master's degree at Long Beach State in 1973. He moved on to St. Bernard H.S. in Playa Del Rey, University H.S. in Irvine and Irvine H.S., where he was the head basketball coach. He was a parttime physical education instructor at Saddleback College (North campus) and assistant principal at Woodbridge H.S. in Irvine from 1980-85.

Quinn and his wife, Collette, live in Manhattan Beach. They have four adult children: Andrew, who lives in Atlanta; Janet, who lives in Rye, New York; and daughters Suzanne and Maureen. The Quinns have five grandchildren - Brendan, Ryan, Dylan, Owen, and Colin Brian.



Dr. June Kearney Acting Assoc. A.D./ Compliance

Dr. June F. Kearney tried to retire during the summer after 17 years on the Cal State Fullerton campus where she has worn many hats. But she was summoned back on a part-time basis to serve as the athletic department's compliance officer while an employment search was conducted to find a permanent replacement.

She also served last year as senior woman administrator, replacing Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah in June, 2003, who relinquished that role to return to coaching the women's basketball team. Dr. Kearney had been Assistant Director of Athletics, Compliance since 1995 and in 2001 gained the added duties of supervising the studentathletes' academic assistance program.

Dr. Kearney came to Cal State Fulleton in 1985 to serve as an assistant women's basketball coach during Dr. Jeremiah's first tenure (1985-86 thru 1991-92). During those seven seasons, the Titans were 112-93 including a 25-9 performance in 1990-91 that included a trip into the second round of the NCAA Tournament. She coached one more season (1992-93) under head coach Debbie Ayres.

Dr. Kearney also assisted Dr. Jeremiah for three seasons at Indiana University, but the roots go even deeper. Kearney coached Jeremiah at Cedarville College in Ohio when the latter was an aspiring student-athlete. Kearney coached four sports for the Yellowjackets and had a lifetime winning percentage of nearly .600. Her basketball teams won 70 percent of their games.

Dr. Kearney played basketball at Taylor University in Upland, Indiana, where she earned a bachelors degree in 1962. She gained a masters degree from Wittenberg University and her Ph.D from The Ohio State University.

Cal State Fullerton is nestled in sun-drenched Orange County, with its mountains, amusement parks, professional sports, cultural showcases and seashores among the top attractions. Students can reach ski slopes in 45 minutes and the beach in less than a half hour. Los Angeles, with its never-ending cultural and entertainment opportunities, lies just 30 miles northwest of the campus and San Diego is 100 miles to the south. The city of Fullerton itself, which has a fascinating history dating back to the late 19th century, boasts a beautiful historic downtown area that features dozens of restaurants, museums and shops.

The extensive development of the 42 miles of beaches in Orange County and attractions such as Disneyland, Knott's Berry Farm, the Laguna Festival of Arts and Pageant of the Masters, the Arrowhead Pond of Anaheim, Angel Stadium and the Orange County Performing Arts Center continue to make tourism an increasingly important activity. So does the Mediterranean-type climate, with rainfall averaging 14 inches per year, and generally mild days (either freezing or 100-degree temperatures uncommon) with frequent morning fog during the summer.


