

MAJOR IN CHILD DEVELOPMENT

Fresno State College offers an interdisciplinary major leading to the Bachelor of Science Degree in Child Development. The major is appropriate for students interested in vocational opportunities based on children. It may lead to employment in the areas of preschool, child center, private nursery, early childhood and elementary teaching, special programs for disadvantaged children, special education, adult education programs, and other child-related vocations. Interested students should consult the Elementary Education Department for assistance in program planning and assignment of advisers.

The curriculum is designed to provide insight on children in a variety of sub-cultures and social contexts. Courses may be selected from several departments to provide theoretical bases and sequential varied experiences in the study of children. The program includes a behavioral science base from psychology, sociology, and anthropology; home economics courses in child development, family relationships, and nutrition; and courses on young children which are offered in the departments of art, music, physical education, social work, and speech.

The major consists of twelve basic courses and three selected alternates from anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

Students planning to complete an elementary credential before 1973 will need nine additional units in upper division behavioral sciences prior to the completion of the fifth year.
