





LETTERS

For the months, the past two kept reading, in Inside Leisure Village, negative comments regarding both our Board of Directors and the effect of the proposed change to our CC&R. There is a saying that states, "liars don't figure and figures don't lie." unfortunately, figures can be manipulated, particularly if you neglect to take into consideration the "cause and effect!" That is the case with the figure I see bandied about regarding the CC&R change.

Leisure Village had to pay, in claims, \$88,000 last year. If you divide that figure by 2,136 homeowners, it only cost each homeowner \$41.19. Sounds good, but let's take "cause and effect" into consideration.

Because Leisure Village had so many claims last year and insurance premiums are based on the number of claims, as a direct "cause and effect," our new premiums insurance increased by 353 percent. Because of this increase, 15 percent of the Leisure Village annual budget goes to our insurance pay premiums, which in turn, means that 15 percent of your monthly homeowner assessments goes to pay insurance premiums — a direct "cause and effect."

Another direct "cause and effect": the need for a special assessment ranging from \$178 to \$300 to pay for these increased insurance premiums.





For well more than 15 years, the lives of Bob and Lois Atz touched nearly all of us here in the Village.

Bob, formerly an engineer for Rocketdyne, worked in the Santa Susanna hills 30 miles east of here, where he helped test the rocket engines that sent men and machines to the moon and

Here in Leisure Village, he became the ultimate volunteer. In 1991 he became a member of our Board and in 1992 he was elected President of the LV Board of Directors. Over the years he worked with and in many clubs, and perhaps his most

satisfactory was with the Engineering Committee. He also obtained the original blueprints used in the construction of our Village, going back to 1972, and these plans proved invaluable on several occasions.

Lois played a major "behind the scenes role" with Channel 12, now Channel 8, but her great love and passion was our monthly newspaper, Inside Leisure Village. Along with Betty Murray, she spent some 30 to 50 hours a month, proofing all the copy, doing layout and meeting deadlines, all to produce a newspaper that Villagers enjoyed. She did it with


With the recent departure of the Kelwins, Art Thomson and Ken Curry have been appointed the new Co-Chairmen of the Emergency Services Committee to help to keep the Village safe in an emergency situation.

Their committee utilizes the combined services of the Village Coordinators and their many helpers, plus integrated support from first aid and medical, security, search and rescue, supplies and materiel, computer data bases and other contingency groups, including vital ham radio net control contacts with city and county emergency services.

The immediate objective the quarterly safety drills by providing the shortest possible time period for damage assessment and support deployment throughout a Village of this size and residential makeup.

Their revised staff for the Cobra ("walkee-talkee") radio network is well into training to man all of the 40 stations for the Village and 10 area network posts. This network will quickly transmit damage-control information to the ham radio net control in all future practice drills while still maintaining the well-established ham radio backup system available during any real disaster situation, such as major fire, earthquake, chemical spill, flood, or other such event.

The new Co-Chairmen stated that more volunteers are really needed for this rewarding work to prepare the Village with adequately trained teams of helpers. This type of safety volunteer work is an easy and stimulating way for residents to learn and to keep in contact with other Villagers on a
