

Whatever Happened To Ethics?

ILV has steadfastly refused to print anonymous letters such as those which were circulated throughout the Village over the past couple of years.

Just as irresponsible as anonymous letters is the circulation of a *confidential* letter from the L.V. Nominating Committee to a potential candidate for the Board of Directors. This letter, duplicated without the letterhead of the Association, and stripped of the signature of the chairman of the committee, has been mailed anonymously or slipped through the front doors of people in the Village, purportedly to discourage that candidate's election.

This person has qualified by petition for nomination and is a valid candidate. Release of the letter is completely unethical and unfair, especially as the allegations in the letter have not been proven.

Leisure Village, of all places, should be able to conduct a civilized election without malice being spread around. To the person or persons responsible for this latest breach of ethics, FOR SHAME!

The Three-quarters Rule

Leisure Village's "Constitution," the CC&R's, were written on a model plan for common interest communities such as ours. Most of the provisions are straight forward and basically workable. In the course of time, however, it becomes desirable to modify some articles to fit the needs of our more mature residents and other changing conditions.

In changing the CC&R's, however, we are hamstrung by the requirement that seventy-five percent (75%) of homeowners must approve. Where we have so many non-resident owners, so many people on trips at any one time, or so many people who are incapacitated or who just don't care, it is virtually impossible to get sufficient "aye" votes to effect any changes.

The current Board of Directors is sponsoring a move to amend the CC&R's so that 67% of homeowners instead of 75% can approve changes.

Instead of getting 1,602 homeowners to agree on a change, 1,424, or 178 fewer votes would be needed. To make this alteration, however, the whole 75% will have to vote in favor of this change.

It will take the cooperation of everyone in the Village to make a change which ultimately will be to everyone's advantage.



POOL ATTENDANTS VS. LIFEGUARDS

The question of L.V.'s employing a full time lifeguard has been discussed many times over a 20-year placed on deck, the ring buoy and line, and be able to everyone is not aware of the yellow emereasy. As the pool is currently open from 5:30 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., 16½ hours, having a full time guard on duty would require at least 2 shifts. This would provide no relief for the guards to eat or to take breaks. Anything less than this would leave periods unguarded at the pool and expose us to potential liability when it is assumed we are covered by a lifeguard.

On the other hand, taking advantage of our status of not being required to have a lifeguard, a "swim at your own risk" policy, the Village can not be held responsible for mishaps. To many of us, taking advantage of this "status" seems most practical.

To alleviate some con-

cerns over safety, there are sensible things to observe and practice: know where and how to use the extension poles which are gency telephone which is on the wall of the office. The most sensible practice, of course, is to swim with a friend or at a time when other people are present, or during the time the attendant is on duty. In these ways, everyone can personal take reand their neighbors.

The pool attendant who cleans and tends the pool area, is also completely qualified as a quard, but is not continuously available except for supervision during the children's swim period. Obviously, he or she would respond whenever on the premises to help someone.

The Village Voice publishes the hours that the pool attendant is on duty.

INSURANCE WARNING

Ed Evans, chairman of the Insurance Committee, issued a warning to Village homeowners at the May 6 Open Board Meeting. He reported that two major insurance companies have announced they will no longer provide coverage for earthquake damage accessment to homes. These companies are Allstate and the Automobile Club of Southern California.

Homeowners are urged sponsibility for themselves to contact their own insurance agents to find out what their policies cover and if their coverage will change at the time of renewal.

A Nomination Committee may be necessary to encourage candidacies for the Board but why is a screening and rejection of applicants necessary? Should not the Leisure Village electorate have that opportunity in an election?

The discussions of the **Nomination Committee** are closed and secret. Why is this so? Is there written criteria about how the Nominations Committee is to evaluate applicants? No information ever seems divulged as to the number of applicants and how many were rejected and for what reasons.

At the end of their process, the Nomination Committee makes a terse announcement as to the "final" candidates, often with only one or two more candidates than there are Board vacancies. There is no committee report.

The annual June election of new members of our Board of Directors is a most significant event in our Village. As we approach our next election on June 20, 1996, I would like to offer my criteria for making this important choice from among the candidates. These fall in four categories: intelligence; qualifications; motivation; character.

In evaluating "intelligence" I look not only for intellectual ability, general knowledge, and educa-Nomination processes tion, I also look for the abil-

ity to approach issues from occur. a broad system point of view, and for common sense. I am wary of "tunnel vision," one-issue advocates. Common sense means to me the ability to recognize what can be done realistically, as opposed to what one might wish idealistically.

As for qualifications, every one has some. Most of us have been effective in many endeavors in our "working" years. What I would look for are qualifications that are relevant to the arduous tasks the Board Member will face in office: tasks that will require skills in management, finance, engineering and maintenance, and personnel relations. Knowledge of our Village is an essential part of these qualifications, as is prior involvement in committees and Village activities.

Equally important to me is motivation. It seems vital to make sure that the candidate is not just running for reasons of selfpromotion, but is truly interested in doing what is best for the Village, that he or she has no "hidden agenda." A wrongly motivated Board Member is a latent disaster waiting to

Last and not least in my book is the obvious requirement of character, honesty and integrity, ideally combined with compassion and some humility. It is not just a matter of not cheating or not lying. Board members must be truthful in dealing with staff and homeowners. They must be willing to face and answer questions, even if the answers include "no" or "I don't know."

It is also very important to me to remember for whom not to vote. I am very much concerned about certain "wrong" reasons some use in deciding for whom to vote. One should not vote on the basis of friendship alone, or just because a candidate is "such a nice person." One can surely find many ways to express affection or respect or gratitude for friends, but selecting them to represent you in this most important function should not be among those ways.

On a closing note, I am especially wary of candidates who have a "personal agenda" for running: a specific personal cause

At the recommendation of the Ed. and Rec. Committee the board has approved a plan to charge for the use of the rooms in the recreation center for private parties. In the future when planning a party that will be attended by persons living outside the Village you will be subject to the following charges.

the following charges.

The Assembly Room may be used only with board approval. The minimum charge will be \$150.00 for four hours and \$20.00 for each hour over

that time.

Multi Purpose Room and Garden Room will be \$75.00, and \$10.00 an hour over the four hours. The Pavilion minimum charge will be \$50.00 with a \$10.00 per hour charge over four hours.

over four hours.

The Village Room charge will be \$35.00 and the Lanai and Sun Room will each charge \$25.00. The additional charge over four hours for these three rooms will be \$6.00. an hour.

Application for the use of these facilities should be made in the recreation office. These fees apply regardless of the percentage of non-residents using the facility. The homeowner should remember that he/she is responsible for their guests using only the reserved facilities.

Clogged Rain Gutters

Residential services of LVA will do the job for a fee of \$20 per man hour and it will take two men to accomplish the task. Plan, on \$40 or more to get the job done.







A Pique At **Politics**

On March 11, 1996, I flew to Sacramento to represent the National Council of Jewish Women, Camarillo unit, at the meeting of the Interfaith Council Coalition's 1996 Legislative Issues Briefing.

I was seated among 300 people and speakers, all of whom seemed to be in shock at what was being proposed as law in the '96 session. Here is what I learned.

I believe the proper way to manage a business is to give direction towards certain specified goals, delegate authority and responsibility, and follow up to verify that satisfactory progress is being accomplished. Believe me, this will get the Board out of the Administration Building on a daily basis, thus allowing Staff to spend their time working on the goals we have set. The charge of micro-managing will be eliminated.

Second, several matters involving large sums of money need close attention. I believe my being a Board member will greatly increase the possibility that these savings will be achieved.

One project is to obtain reimbursement from the California Water Resources Board Superfund of the \$130,000 L.V. has spent on the Fuel Spill Project. We trust closure will be obtained soon for this item.

Another project is to implement the water savings possible by adopting a Water Management Program. Last year the budget for water was \$545,000. This year the first step was taken to lower water usage by adopting the PRIMO Grass Growth Retardant Program. PRIMO is expected to reduce water costs by \$65,000.

Another \$90,000 savings can be made by scientifically scheduling watering times for the 70,000 sprinkler heads in L.V. Thus, this \$155,000 savings can be applied to controlling our monthly assessment fees.
