PRESS ROOM: Room 162 in the eastern wing of the gymnasium building serves as the press room for Titan basketball. Three telephones are available approximately 10 minutes after the final buzzer.

PRESS TABLE: Located on the south side of the playing floor, behind the scorer's table. A limited number of working spots are available.

OFFICIAL COMPUTERIZED GAME SUMMARIES: Will be collated and distributed in Room 162 of the gymnasium building. Halftime box scores, play-by-play accounts and final box scores will be provided.

TELEPHONES: There is one telephone at the press table — (714) 773-3970 — which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones **cannot** be installed at the press table due to physical limitations of the building.

RADIO: The broadcast position is adjacent to the scorer's table. A telephone will be provided the designated commercial station for each visiting school in Titan Gym. No additional phones may be installed due to the physical limitations of the building. Use (714) 773-3970 as your trouble number.

LOCKER ROOMS: Located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. George McQuarn will conduct post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton locker room. The players' area typically is open to the media after a reasonable cooling off period.

CREDENTIALS: Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, Press Will Call is located at the western entrance to the gymnasium. Credentials MUST BE WORN IN PLAIN SIGHT to access the doors leading to the locker rooms and press rooms.

SCOUTS: Requests should be made at least one week in advance.

PARKING: Except on Monday through Thursday evenings, ample free parking is available in the lot immediately west of the Gymnasium. On Monday through Thursday evenings, parking is available by:

a) Using athletics Lot A and paying 75 cents (3 quarters) upon entry to gain a daily permit from the vending machine or

b) Obtain a complimentary pass from the visitors information booth located on the south side of campus northwest of the intersection of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

THE UNIVERSITY

California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 24,000 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 775-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, dance, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and six certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields. The long-awaited reality of an on-campus football/soccer complex and baseball stadium in conjunction with an on-campus Marriott Hotel recently was approved with a fall, 1989 completion date targeted for the athletic facilities. To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President

Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb became the third president of Cal State Fullerton on Oct. 1, 1981.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities, she is the first black woman to head a major public

university on the West Coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 16 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School now serving as a resident physician at Mt. Sinai Medical Center in New York.

THE NICKNAME and MASCOT

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that arise when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to a new town. While the relatively young institution carved out of citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, there are some legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at "Orange County State College" at the outset with only upper division students until 1963. There were 453 students, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes. They voted to organize as a student body and assess themselves \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that Spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called "Tuffy the Titan" was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek.

The mascot easily outlived the race. In 1963, one elephant charged into the crowd causing minor injuries and the early signs of a now-common liability insurance crisis halted a tradition in the bud.


The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was adopted just as the unofficial elephant.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletic director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to the wide variety of blues. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains predominant in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. And that's only the start of the confusion.

To out-of-staters, the sky seems to be the limit because most don't realize there are two distinct systems of higher education in the state — the University of California and the State University system. So, we've been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. The preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, which is what most of the more than 50,000 graduates call it. But since there are only two other major institutions known as Titans (University of Detroit and Oral Roberts University), just call Fullerton teams the "Titans!"

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT



The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 37, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, West Virgina, Florida and Tulsa signed to host the Titans while the United States Military Academy (Army) agreed to a home and home series in 2001 and 2003.

Long dormant plans for an on-campus Youth Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball have been revived. The faculty Academic Senate and Fullerton City Council have approved plans which hinge on the construction beginning in January of a Marriott Hotel to help finance the project. At press time, architects were preparing preliminary drawings of the \$6.7 million project. A multi-million dollar project to expand Titan Gymnasium also is scheduled.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history (1972) and physical education (1974) from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and later served as acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985, for a similar post at San Jose State.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young children Brandon and Kimberly.

COACH GEORGE McQUARN

George McQuarn indelibly stamped his trademark on Cal State Fullerton basketball during the 1981-82 season when he returned the Titans to a competitive posture in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and since then the Titans have averaged 18 victories per year and haven't had a losing season.

During his seven-year tenure, McQuarn twice has taken Fullerton into the National Invitation Tournament and he has guided them into the PCAA Tournament championship game on two occasions. The Titans have broken into the national Top 20 rankings during portions of three different seasons and attendance has more than doubled in Titan Gym while McQuarn has developed more than a handful of National Basketball Association draft picks.

"I think we have sustained the program at a high level," says McQuarn, 46. "If you look at the PCAA standings over the past six years and discount the presence of UNLV, I think you will see that we have been one of the top three programs in the conference.



"Each year brings new challenges. We have built a solid base and have the potential to continue at the same level. But when you look at some of the bizarre things that have happened to us the last few seasons, you realize that predictions and forecasts don't mean very much."

The theme of Titan basketball under McQuarn has been "We Play Hard!" Aggressive defense and a high work ethic are the cornerstones of the concept. McQuarn exhorts his squad to play at a level of intensity that negates outside elements over which they have no control, as evidenced by strong finishes the past few seasons despite sieges of injuries and illness.

"Our offensive philosophy starts at the defensive end and each year we have tried to become more and more aggressive on defense," says McQuarn. "We want to run, but we want to do it out of our defense."

Team and individual honors have been plentiful during the McQuarn era. The 1981-82 team was the nation's most improved squad and the 1982-83 team set a school record with 21 regular-season victories while gaining the school's initial bid in the NIT. Along the way they gained the nation's attention by ruining the unbeaten season of the nation's No. 1-ranked team (UNLV).

McQuarn was selected District 15 Coach of the Year in 1982-83 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1984, he coached the West squad to the championship of the annual Aloha Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Three of McQuarn's former Titans are currently in NBA camps — Leon Wood (New Jersey), Ozell Jones (Phoenix) and Kevin Henderson (Golden State). Ricky Mixon (L.A. Lakers — 1983), Tony Neal (L.A. Lakers — 1985) and Kerry Boagni (Utah — 1986) also were drafted during recent seasons.

Critical to his success at Fullerton has been McQuarn's attention to discipline and academic progress.

"We are a goal-oriented program and the graduation of our players is an important goal to me," says McQuarn. "While I believe an athlete is responsible for his academic progress, I also believe it is the responsibility of a coach to create an atmosphere and environment conducive to academic success."

An academic enrichment program for basketball players has been established featuring a tutorial program, study halls and advisement sessions. All are utilized year-round and enrollment in a Speech Communications class is required of all Fullerton student-athletes.



McQuarn graduated from Cal State Long Beach in 1966 with a degree in physical education. An All-CIF performer in high school in basketball and baseball, he earlier attended UCLA on a baseball scholarship and earned All-West Coast honors as the Bruins' catcher.

He launched his coaching career with four outstanding seasons (123-8) at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles. His collegiate career began with four years as an assistant at UNLV (93-28).



ASSISTANT COACHES



John Sneed, 8th year

John Sneed again will work with the forwards and coordinate the scouting of opponents among his myriad duties for the Titans in 1987-88. He has coordinated recruiting and the academic program and tutorial services and also has made a major contribution toward the promotion and marketing of Titan basketball. Home attendance has more than doubled during his seven previous seasons at Fullerton.

Sneed brought experience with winning Division I programs and remarkably successful high school teams to Fullerton when he became a member of head coach George McQuarn's original Titan staff in 1980.

Sneed was an assistant for one year at the University of Arizona, a 21-6 season (1976-77) which took the Wildcats to the NCAA playoffs. During 1977-78 he was an assistant at San Diego State and the 19-8 Aztecs won the PCAA title before being eliminated in the post-season tournament by Cal State Fullerton. He also was at San Diego in 1978-79.

Sneed succeeded McQuarn at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles in 1974 and won the CIF 4A title and CIF Coach of the Year honors with a 30-2 record. His Eagles won two more Camino Real League titles with 28-1 and 23-5 seasons and three times he was league coach of the year. His career prep mark was 81-8 (.910) and the 1974 team was recognized as national champion by the National Sport News Service.

A Cal State Long Beach graduate, Sneed served two years as an assistant to McQuarn at Verbum Dei. He is a native of Gastonia, North Carolina. He and wife Rose live in Garden Grove and are expecting their first child during this season.



Donny Daniels, 2nd year

Donny Daniels returns for his second year as a full-time assistant at Cal State Fullerton, where he has been a familiar face for many years. The former Titan player and part-time assistant coach was appointed a full-time assistant on May 30, 1986 and his primary responsibilities are recruiting and working with the centers.

Daniels resumed his Fullerton relationship after two successful seasons at Los Angeles Harbor Junior College in Wilmington. The Seahawks posted an overall mark of 33-29 in his two seasons including the championship of the Moorpark Tournament and they made two trips to the state playoffs.

Daniels, who graduated with a degree in criminal justice, played forward for two seasons at Cal State Fullerton (1974-75 and 1975-76) under coach Bobby Dye and was selected the team's top defensive player as a senior.

SEASON PREVIEW

The return of seven lettermen including the top two scorers from last year's NIT Tournament team and the addition of three "redshirts" give coach George McQuarn an exciting foundation for the 1987-88 Cal State Fullerton basketball season.

Guard **Richard Morton** and forward **Henry Turner** top a nucleus that features key reserves **Vincent Blow, Eugene Jackson** and **Oval Miller.** Morton, a 6-4 shooting guard, led the team with an 18.4 point average while earning second-team All-PCAA honors. Turner, a 6-7 leaper, averaged 15.2 points and 6.0 rebounds and made the all-tournament teams at the Cougar Classic in Provo and the PCAA Post-Season Tournament at the Forum.

Blow, a 6-8 center-forward; Jackson, a 6-3 point guard; and Miller, a 6-8 center, have started on several occasions and played in virtually every game last year as the Titans compiled a 17-13 overall record and earned national Top 20 rankings with an impressive 7-2 non-league mark in December.

The Titans suffered a major loss on August 30 when returning starting forward **Derek Jones** was wounded in the back in a random shooting in front of his home in Long Beach. The 6-foot-7 southpaw averaged 8.7 points and 5.7 rebounds last year, but his basketball future is in doubt due to damage to an artery and the ulna nerve in his left arm.

"It was a very unfortunate and tragic incident for Derek and our team," said McQuarn. "Derek definitely will not play this season, and that creates a real depth problem for us at forward. Obviously, we couldn't go out and replace him with school already in session,

"I've always liked a three-man rotation at the forward positions where we have a player coming off the bench with ability comparable to the starters. It gives us better competition among the players in practice since they must maintain their intensity and compete for playing time. It makes for better basketball players and a better team over the course of the season. With Derek, Henry and **Bobby Adair**and **Brent Calvin**, we would have had our best forward depth since I've been at Fullerton."

To fill the void, McQuarn has several options that will be evaluated during pre-season practices. One includes swinging Blow between center and power forward while another swings Oregon State transfer **Van Anderson** between shooting guard and small forward. Adair, a redshirt who averaged 4.8 points and 4.4 rebounds in two seasons as a part-time starter at the University of Utah, now becomes an even more prominent addition to the Titan roster.

"I'd prefer to let Blow concentrate on one position, but he has experience at forward," said McQuarn of the three-year letterman who has averaged 2.6 points and 3.3 rebounds during a career that has included 17 starting assignments. "Calvin (transfer from College of the Sequoias) is a question mark because he has fallen behind due to a stress fracture in his foot. When he is healthy, he will give us considerably more depth at that spot."

The Titans have added a walk-on forward candidate in 6-7 **Benson Williams**, who played briefly at the University of Illinois-Chicago.

One of the players McQuarn knew he had to replace was at center, where Herman Webster was a two-year regular and set school records for field-goal shooting percentage.

"We should be able to replace Herman with the trio we have at center, but how good we will be remains a question," says McQuarn. "We have depth and good competition with an equal opportunity for someone to earn the starting role.

"John Sykes is bigger and stronger than Herman, but he sat out last season (at Merced JC after transferring from the University of Texas) and you just don't know about that time away from competition. Miller started five games for us last year and has a year's experience at this level. Both he and David Moody, who's been in our program two years, should compete with Sykes."

Sykes, a 6-8, 235-pound sophomore from Merced High School, averaged 2.9 points and 2.9 rebounds in 24 games for Texas in 1985-86. Miller averaged 3.3. points and 3.0 rebounds in 27 games last year after transferring from Ventura College. Moody has played only 143 minutes in his two seasons as a Titan.

The backcourt boasts a veteran starting duo in Morton and Jackson, but the depth is very inexperienced.

Morton has emerged as a scoring force and heads into his senior year with a chance to surpass

all previous Titan career scorers with the exception of All-American Leon Wood. Morton's 18.4 average last year was the Titans' third-best single-season figure and he capped it with a memorable 35-point effort at California in the NIT.

"Richard should be one of the outstanding guards on the West Coast," says McQuarn. "Neither he nor Henry are resting on their laurels. They both worked hard this summer. We need Richard to develop more consistency, but his potential is exciting."

Backing up Morton will be the combination of Anderson and Santa Monica City College transfer **Randall Moos.** Anderson averaged 4.2 points during the 1985-86 season for Oregon State and faces a challenging role as a swing man between the shooting guard and small forward spots. Moos averaged 9.1 points and 7.7 rebounds last year for the Corsairs and will be a significant asset against zone defenses with his 3-point shooting touch.

Point guard is a very critical position in the Titan lineup and with the graduation of late-season starter Alexander Hamilton, McQuarn will give the trio of Jackson, **Tyrone Ree** and **Marlon Vaughn** some bonus attention with extra morning practices.

"We are comfortable with our situation at the point," said McQuarn, "but I am going to put in some extra work with them. It's the most difficult position to play in our system. Jackson has been a starter most of his three years here, but Ree and Vaughn have little experience."

Jackson was the starter last December when the Titans won seven of their first eight games to break into United Press International's Top 20 rankings. He has started 35 games as a Titan and carries career averages of 3.9 points and 2.4 assists. Ree played only 71 minutes last year as a sophomore transfer from Murray State JC and Vaughn was idled by the provisions of Proposition 48.

"Our offense is going to begin at the defensive end once again," summarized McQuarn. "We have another challenging schedule with several teams coming off post-season play."

The Cal State Fullerton basketball team has dedicated its 1987-88 season to forward Derek Jones, who will be sidelined for at least one year as he recovers from gunshot wounds.

The senior-to-be was the innocent victim of a random shooting that occurred in front of his Long Beach home on Sunday evening, Aug. 30. An unknown assailant fired a shotgun into a crowd, wounding Jones and one other person. Jones was struck from behind by numerous pellets and surgery was required to repair an artery and the ulnar nerve in his left or shooting arm. He faces a lengthy rehabilitation, but the prognosis is that he will recover at least normal use of his arm.

An extra year of eligibility will be sought for Jones, who this season would be in his fifth collegiate year. If he is physically unable to attend classes, the NCAA could grant him a sixth year due to the extenuating circumstances to play his fourth and final collegiate season.

The 6-foot-7, 195-pounder played two years at Long Beach City College before sitting out the 1985-86 seasonto obtain his Associate Arts degree. Last year he appeared in 29 of Fullerton's 30 games, 23 as a starter, missing only the Feb. 14 contest at UC Irvine due to a dislocated shoulder suffered at UNLV on Feb. 12. He averaged 8.7 points to rank No. 4 on the team and was the No. 3 rebounder at 5.7 per game. He scored a career-high 22 points and grabbed a career-high 11 rebounds against UCI in the opening game of the PCAA Post-Season Tournament.

Although still one of the youngest Division I conferences in the country, the 18-year-old Pacific Coast Athletic Association has become a major factor on the national scene through a combination of aggressive administrative leadership and outstanding coaches and student-athletes. In terms of attendance, television exposure, post-season play and development for the professional ranks, the PCAA ranks among the elite.

- Attendance the PCAA had one of the highest percentage increases in attendance among the top 20 conferences in the nation last year.
- TV Exposure the PCAA is one of the few conferences to retain a "Game of the Week" package on a regional network basis. Raycom Sports of Charlotte, North Carolina will broadcast a game every Saturday in January and February as well as the championship game of the post-season tournament. Locally based telecasts include the Prime Ticket Network in the Los Angeles area as well as numerous community cable production companies.
- Post-season play the PCAA has done remarkably well in recent seasons under the pressure of post-season competition. League champion UNLV advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament last year while Cal State Fullerton made its second trip to the NIT. The previous year, UNLV advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tourney and runner-up UC Irvine advanced in the NIT with a win over UCLA at Pauley Pavilion. In 1983, four PCAA teams advanced to post-season play and Fresno State won the NIT championship with a victory over DePaul in Madison Square Garden.
- Post-Season Tournament the PCAA was the first conference in the West to initiate a post-season tournament to select its automatic entry into the NCAA Tournament. After outgrowing the Anaheim Convention Center, the PCAA moved to the Fabulous Forum in Inglewood where more than 30,000 fans have annually seen three exciting nights of basketball. This year the format expands to four nights with all 10 teams participating and next year the venue will be changed to the Long Beach Sports Arena with its superior hotel location.
- NBA Draft Picks six members of PCAA institutions were selected in the 1987 National Basketball Association draft, down from previous years due primarily to the high number of quality underclassmen playing last season. In 1986, nine players were drafted including Kevin Henderson and Kerry Boagni of the Titans, but that number pales in comparison to the "Class of '84" which produced a total of 15 NBA draftees!





The flu and an improved UC Santa Barbara team put an end to Fullerton's winning ways in Titan Gym as the Gauchos broke open a close game in the closing seconds

Key Fullerton reserves Vincent Blow. Alexander Hamilton and Oval Miller didn't play and ailing coach George McQuarn doesn't even remember this game, not that he would want to recollect it, Fullerton's lowest point production of the year.

UCSB took an early 17-11 lead before the Titans rolled off a 7-0 "spurt" over 5:28 for an 18-17 lead that grew to four at the half but never more. Brian Johnson's 3-point bucket put the Gauchos ahead to stay at 36-34 with 10:20 to play. After Rodney Smith scored to make it 43-40 UCSB with 2:45 to go, UCSB scored the next 8 points to clinch the win, its first at Fullerton since 1981.

The Titans' top scoring tandem of Richard Morton and Henry Turner combined to hit only 9 of 35 shots and only 3 of 11 3-point tries.

They cut the margin to 3 at the half and continued the spree with a remarkable 20-5 run that gave them a commanding 49-37 lead with 13:23 to play. Several of their baskets came on breakaway layups as they either stole the ball from Titan guards or threw long football passes after CSF buckets.

The lead grew to 16 before Fullerton cut it to 6 behind Henry Turner, who ended up with a career high 25 points, but an 8-2 UCI run left it 74-62 before Turner scored the last 8 Titan points.

For the second time in four years, UNLV came into Titan Gym with the nation's No. 1 ranking and an unbeaten record. But with coach McQuarn still ailing and the team still weakened by the flu, the Titans couldn't pull off an upset as they did in 1983.

UNLV took the early advantage, utilizing a stifling trap zone defense to jump into an 11-4 lead on a series of layups. The Rebels built the margin to 11 and then toyed with Fullerton just before halftime, letting the Titans close within 3 but then spurting 7-0 in the final 90 seconds.

Were it not for a dislocated shoulder suffered by Derek Jones in the first half, the Titans might have pulled off a shocker on a night when the Rebels had cold shooting hands.

Unlike their meeting in Titan Gym, the Titans didn't let the Rebels blow them away in the opening minutes. They even led 8-6 before a 10-0 Rebel run established the tone for the half. Utah State scored the game's first three points and then it was all Fullerton. The Titans immediately went on an 18-4 sput over eight minutes for an 18-7 lead. The Aggies closed it to 18-12 but the Titans got the next seven points — a Eugene Jackson jumper, two Richard Morton free throws on a coach Rod Tueller technical and Herman Webster's dunk and free throw — and held a comfortable 44-32 halftime margin.

For the second game in a row, the opposition shot 61 per cent, but this time it was the Titans taking a one-sided decision on the chin.

The tone was set early when the host Gauchos scored 11 points on their first four trips down the floor — two 3-point baskets plus a traditional 3-point play and a routine bucket — and the Titans were down 11-4 despite scoring on two of their first three possessions.

The Gauchos' backcourt duo of Brian Johnson and Carrick De-Hart didn't let up. They combined to hit 6 of 8 3-pointers on their way to 27 first-half points, as many as the entire Fullerton team could manufacture.

After intermission, UCSB went inside and got effective production from Khris Fortson and Brian Vaughns to build a lead as large as 19 points at 57-38 with 10:43 to go. The three previous meetings between the Aggies and the Titans had produced overtime games and this encounter almost made it four in a row.

It was a strange game with an unusual climax. The Aggies made a late run, hitting 3 out of 3 3-point attempts, the last by Kenny Travis cutting their deficit to 61-59 with 10 seconds to go. But the Aggies took a sixth timeout, resulting in a technical foul that put Richard Morton on the foul line for two shots (which he made) and gave Fullerton the ball at midcourt.

In a sluggish first half, Fullerton had assumed a 29-24 lead at intermission and then quickly stretched it to 38-28. The Aggies went on an 11-0 run to take the lead, 39-38, and force a Titan timeout. Fullerton responded with a 9-0 run for an 8-point lead that the Aggies immediately halved. Fullerton built it back up to 9 points at 55-46 with 3:15 to go before NMSU made its final charge.

Chalk one up for tournament history. Not to mention superior rebounding as the Titans won the game on the offensive glass to knock the Anteaters out in the first round for the third year in a row.

Henry Turner's hot hand — he hit his first six shots — helped catapult the Titans from a 19-19 deadlock into a 34-25 lead midway through the first half and Fullerton never trailed as its rebounding dominance — 40-25 overall but more glaringly 17-4 in the offensive department — and late free-throwing ability offset a UCI charge fueled by the 3-point field-goal shooting of Joe Buchanan and Scott Brooks.

To beat UNLV, the nation's No. 1 squad, a team must play a near perfect game and hope for some breaks. When it's the Rebels playing at the top of their game, the result can get ugly real fast.

Gerald Paddio hit a 3-point field goal only seven seconds into the game and it took the Titans almost two minutes to counter with a Derek Jones layup for two points. Little did the Titans know, that would be as close as they would get. With UNLV on its way to a 71 per cent shooting first half including 6 of 11 3-pointers, and Fullerton not getting its second basket until the 12:37 mark, UNLV jumped out to a 17-4 lead on its way to a 57-point first half against a team that was allowing only a little more than 60 points for an entire game.

The end result was the most lopsided loss in George McQuarn's Fullerton career since his first game, a 100-65 defeat at the University of Portland in 1980.

But Jon Wheeler and Kevin Johnson ran off seven unanswered points to get the crowd back into the game and launch a 16-3 Cal spurt that gave the Bears a 47-45 lead with 9:00 to go. After a series of lead changes, Cal pulled out at 58-53 and fouled Hamilton out. But Richard Morton sent the game into overtime at 60-60 with a 3-point bucket with four seconds on the clock.


HISTORY OF TITAN ATHLETICS -


Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team — men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team





Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year but one including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while more recently, Tami Elliott won 10 All-American awards before suffering a fractured vertebra in her senior season.

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. And he won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals. Pitcher Mike Harkey was the fourth player selected in baseball's June free agent draft, going to the Chicago Cubs.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making seven trips to the College World Series in eight years. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and have been ranked No. 1 in the nation most of the past two seasons.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. In football, the Titans have won their share as well.

Dick Coury was the inaugural coach in 1970 and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder before the growing pains of moving up to Div. I were endured. But the program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy, who won back-to-back PCAA championships in 1983 and 1984 and remains a topflight program.

Cal State Fullerton has been well represented at the professional level despite the relative youth of the intercollegiate basketball program.


Coach George McQuarn has seen six of his Titans drafted in the past four years. The Titans hit it big in 1984 when two players made National Basket-Association rosters guard Leon Wood with the Philadelphia 76ers and center Ozell Jones with the San Antonio Spurs. Each has subsequently been traded twice -Wood to the Washington Bullets and more recently the New Jersey Nets while Jones went to the Los Angeles Clippers before landing with the Phoenix Suns.

The third former Titan currently in the NBA is guard Kevin Henderson, who was drafted in 1986 by the Cleveland Cavaliers but first gained a roster berth with the Golden State Warriors during the 1986-87 season.

A varied combination of a regional network package, delayed coverage of selected home games, the Prime Ticket cable channel, the University cable channel and the various packages of institutions the Titans will visit will keep Cal State Fullerton basketball "on the tube" most of the 1987-88 season.

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association continues its "Game of the Week" schedule with Raycom Sports of Charlotte, North Carolina again in 1988. All 10 teams will be spotlighted over the course of the Saturday afternoon telecasts as well as the two teams who gain the finals of the PCAA Post-Season Tournament at The Forum. The Titans' appearances are scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 23 at San Jose State and Saturday, March 5 at home vs. Cal State

Long Beach. The games are seen on a network of stations throughout the western United States.

Financial News Network was scheduled at press time to air nationally the Titans' home game on Jan. 13 vs. UNLV.

Most of Fullerton's remaining home games will be televised on a delayed basis via Titan Cable Sports under the production of professor Larry Ward with Ed Larkin providing the play-by-play coverage. The feed is used to provide the games to cable subscribers in Fullerton, Yorba Linda, Placentia, Anaheim and Villa Park via the auspices of the University channel (54) in Fullerton and (39) and Anaheim/Villa Park.

Of course, the Titans also gain exposure on the road when home teams send their games out on cable, VHF and UHF stations.
