A MUSICIANS FESTIVAL

A Musicians Festival, headlined by internationally known composers Anthony Braxton and Philip Glass, will be inaugurated in San Jose this summer in conjunction with that city's mammoth downtown cultural extravaganza Tapestry In Talent.

NEW SOUNDS SAN JOSE will be a two-day marathon July 1



and 2, 1978 from noon until midnight presenting top performers in symphonic, pops, chamber and jazz concerts. Planned also are a major symposium on new music, lectures and jam sessions.

For chamber music fans, NEW OUNDS will provide a musical cornucopia with a succession of afternoon concerts featuring such nationally - known artists as Daniel and Machiko Kobialka, Bonnie Hampton, Nathan Schwartz, Paul Hersh and Pamela Resch. Ensembles such as the San Francisco Quartet, the Gamelan

with Lou Harrison and the Electric Weasel will also be heard.

For those who like their music on the lighter side, an outdoor pops concerts will be presented by the San Jose Symphony, under the direction of Denis deCoteau.

Participating in a symposium on new music will be an illustrious roster of contemporary composers: Richard Felciano, Braxton, Glass, Robert Hughes, Daniel Kobialka, Allen Strange, Don Buchla and Lou Harrison.

San Jose State University expressed interest in the project and decided to co-sponsor.

The festival proper, which will



TRIBUTE TO A LITTLE

EUGENE G. E. BOTELHO Part II

The April trip to Rosarito Beach, Mexico, was because of a promise. As the 6th approached, though, I began to think I would not be able to keep my word.

I had offered to find a bicycle for Sergio's 16th birthday. The few used ones I located were priced too high for a limited budget. I was worried in case I would let the boy down. Then a very rusty long-unused bicycle was offered for \$25.00. That, at least was within the price range. A teen-age friend pronounced the bike safe to ride although the speed-mechanism was shot. Another \$25.00 for a rack suitable for my little car — and off I headed for the border.

Some melmac dishware and clothing for Sergio were in the load, too. Not much, but enough to take note of the day. This will, also, be the third year the boy would be taking care of his five younger siblings since his mother died of cancer. The father, an alcoholic, gets better care from his children than he gives them.

Sergio's sisters reported he had found a job and would be back around 6 o'clock. This gave me time for a trip to the bakery. The clerk offered to write birthday greetings on the cake. She started out bravely. Then she asked me to write the phrase for her. I had expected it in Spanish, but she had already written an "H". So. "Happy Birthday" was copied faithfully in large pink letters on the yellow frosting.

A friend from Del Mar was with me so we took the cake and a gallon of milk into the shack.

The dishes and clothing for Sergio were carried by his siblings. When my friend and I returned to the car, I said I was sure there was no food in the house.

My first visits to the family through the winter had given me the feeling the house reflected a certain hopelessness. Anyway it seeemd it needed cleaning and articles were always scattered around. Since the beginning of the year, however, the house has been clean and things seem kept in place. My friend was so impressed by his inspection, he mentioned the cleanliness to his family when he returned to Del Mar.

The bike was locked on the rack. When Sergio came running up at dusk, I gave him the key. Even in the growing darkness, the children's eyes shone with shared happiness.

Sergio admitted, reluctantly, there was no food. He did not yet know of the cake and milk. So, off we went to market.

The boy shopped carefully. At times I insisted he increase the quantity of item chosen. It was obvious Sergio was unhappy about spending my money. Because there is no electricity in the house, I made sure there was enough canned food to feed the family for awhile.

The house was deep in shadows when we returned from the store. The only light was the votive candle in front of the Virgin of Guadaloupe on a shelf in the middle of the one room. Maria lit another candle so we could make our way up the steps. As we put the snacks of foo ddown, I noticed 13

the cake box was open so that Happy Birthday could be seen. Not only that, despite the lack of food and the children's hunger, not one — not even 5-year-old Jose, had even fingered the frosting on the cake.

But as my friend and I headed back for the States, I wondered how long the cake would remain

intact!

The trip in May was during the Cinco de Mayo weekend. The girls reported the father was "malo," as usual from too much drinking. I learned, also, Sergio is an apprentice at a garage in town. He attends school every morning and, then, works till after 6 every afternoon — all day Saturdays. This means he works between 35 and 40 hours a week — for about 10 pesos an hour. Theoretically, he earns about \$17.50 a week.

Sergio was still home at 9 p.m., a little to my surprise. Not many teenagers would stay home and baby-sit voluntarily. This gave me a chance to confirm plans for our trip to Ensenada the next day.

Maria and Juanita must have been up early. I arrived promptly at 9 — and the laundry of the day before had been replaced on the line by freshly-washed clothes. When the youngsters appeared, they were well-scrubbed.

It is fortunate all the children are small for their ages. My oldest grandson, age 12, would tower over Sergio. Anyway, all six childhen fitted with me in my little Cricket. We were all very comfortable, too.

Everything was enjoyed—from the view down the cliffs across Salsipuedes Bay to the rusting wreck of a Naval ship that went aground some years ago. La Bufadora, below Ensenada, put on an especially good show for the crowds of Mexicans and foreigners from the U.S. who wanted to see the sea geyser in action. On our way through Ensenada, was had lunch at the Hotel La Pinta. A new experience handled easily and well by all.

Back in Rosarito, we stopped for a brief visit with our good friends, Keith and Doris Wilson of the Ameri-Mex Amigo Club, which does so much to help people in the area. Then — home with memories and some welcome supplement for the larder from Doris.

If the children had as much fun as I, they really enjoyed the day. There had been no behavior problems. The care Sergio gave his

siblings impressed me. Oh. The bicycle?

On Saturday, while waiting for Sergio to return from work, 11year-old Gonzalo rode it expertly although he cannot always reach the pedals. Once, tiny 13year-old Juanita wobbled by smiling to show me next visit would see absolute proficiency. Not to be outdone, little Jose tried a friend's bicycle. He had one fall, but got up gamely and rode alone for ten feet as everybody cheered. Romero, the 10-year-old, is much too small to ride Sergio's bike - and, apparently, feels too big to ride the friend's small one. So he did some spectacular acrobatics. He must be getting training at school as he knew what he was doing. Certainly, he could not watch the Olympics on TV.

Despite the adversities and lack of paternal help, there is a lot of Tender Loving Care in the family. A lot of Togetherness, too. With a bit of help, Sergio will keep his promise to his dying mother to hold the family to-

gether.

A Call For Help

There's a group of Mexicans of American descent who have been working sometimes ankle-deep in mud to build themselves a clubhouse. These are not teen-agers but members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 8900 of Fresno.

These are Chicanos who want something so badly they have been sacrificing their days off, weekends, even vacations to do volunteer labor.

What they're trying to do is build a \$500,000 VFW clubhouse for \$100,000. They think it can be done but they've run out of money and need help.

It would be no problem if the estimated 500,000 Chicanos of the Central San Joaquin Valley do-24 noted the much-needed \$50,000 to complete the project. But such has not been the case—so far.

The men of Post 8900 are making a public appeal for assistance to other VFW posts in California. They have labor; they need materials.

Post 8900 came into being 32 years ago. It began with 61 members, all Mexican-Americans, veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict.

They met in private homes, in fire stations, churches, saloons, even a Police Academy, anywhere they would have them.

And they fell on hard times. Not only did they not have a club-house of their own but the membership dropped off to only 10 and they almost lost their VFW charter in 1946.

Ten years ago they decided to build their own clubhouse, something modest but adequate to hold meetings in, perhaps even smallscale social functions.

The dream took form with the purchase of an five-acre lot, northwest of Fresno, for \$9,500. Today, on that 3585 N. Blythe Ave. site, there is a partially completed 6,000 square-foot main auditorium and two 4,000 square-foot wings. The wings are actually old army barracks which were purchased from the City of Fresno for a token price of \$1.

The barracks were cut in two last year and transported to the site. Someone suggected connecting them with a main auditorium. It was done and a small-scale vision suddenly took on grander

proportions.

Post 8900's membership has already poured \$43,000 into the building fund, but it has not been enough. This money was collected the hard way — \$13,000 of it with the sale of non-negotiable certificates which will be redeemable at the completion of the clubhouse: hot dog sales; menudo and pancake breakfasts, and dances.

The very first fund-raising project, a hot dog sale, was a shocking failure, netting only \$3.75. But a New Year's Eve dance last December netted more than \$6,-000 and every penny was poured into the clubhouse project.

But the job is less than half-completed. They have all the volunteer labor they can use from their members: they need ma-

terials.

"A hall this size usually costs

\$30-a-square-foot to build," explained fund coordinator John Garibay, "That's market price finished. So far it's only cost us \$3-a-foot. When you compare that with what it should cost we've done wonders."

Andy Rodriguez, past post commander, shakes his head when he think about how the modest plan for a clubhouse has mushroomed into a two-winged Spanish-style

major undertaking.

"When we started thinking about a clubhouse," said Rodriquez, "it was something small. You know, a couple of clubrooms with a bar in the corner. Now look around you, take a look at what we've got ourselves into. It's really something isn't it? If we get it finished.



CULTURAL PROGRAMS DON'T SOLVE SCHOOL FAILURE

Attributing school failure to culture continues to be the latest fad in education. Minorities no longer fail because they're gentically deficient, or because they lack intelligence. No, they now fail because their cultural background is not conducive to achievement and success! Make them feel proud of their culture, supplement that culture with much needed expert guidance, and presto! you're got

an achieving success.

We would have thought that the minorities, particularly the Blacks and the Mexican - Americans, would have been incensed at such insinuations. The nerve, to imply that their culture doesn't care about achievement and success; don't that they're lazy and "cotton" to education; that they are in essence, a bad influence on the education of their children. Well, it didn't happen, at least not enough to make a difference; since that's basically what the programs say, that's what they try to correst, and the schools are saturated with their ideology and practice.

Cultural enrichment programs undoubtedly do make minorities feel better about themselves and their cultural heritage. They probably do instill a certain amount of pride and identity among themselves. But these objectives have little to do with the study of subject matter which

leads to a better opportunity in the world beyond the school. They have little to do with the subject matter which prepares them to compete with others in the job market. In a nutshell, they have little to do with the original and persistent problems — minority school failure!

Success or failure in school is measured by grades and achievement test scores. These tests ask the student to read and interpret a paragraph, they ask the student to work a math equation, they ask the student about some scientific problem. They don't ask the student to answer questions about his culture! They don't ask him



whether he is satisfied with his heritage, or whether he now has cultural identity! In fact, if any cultural questions are asked at all, they are questions about the dominent culture, not his own.

Success in school has very little to do with one's own culture, as it turns out. (1 The latest and more reasonable explanation of minority failure, is attributed to the lack of access to the typical rewards that whites receive. A better thesis is developed fully by John Ogbu in his 1974 book, The next Generation: An Ethnography of Education in an Urban Neighborhood, Academic Press, N.Y. A new Carnegie Council on Children study is another source.)

A student may well hate himself and his culture to boot, and still achieve and succeed in school. And why not, as long as he knows the material that is tested. Thus, success in school has everything to do with learning and knowing subject matter which correlates with the definition of "success." That definition is high grades and high achievement scores, which are in turn based on such subjects as composition, mathematics, and science—not culture.

While minority students are bounced around from class to class getting doses of "cultural enrichment" like Bobby Riggs takes vitamins, they are missing out on the regular more important subjects. The dominent group is doing no such thing. These guys have cultural identity and plenty of it! They stay put, studying and learning the things that they'll be tested on later. While minorities are in special classes playing cultural awareness games, the dominent group has its nose to the grindstone, studying things which will 28 yield high achievement scores.

If school success or failure depend on knowing about one's culture, then by all means teach culture. But if it depends on learning how to figure out a math problem. then teach math. If it depends on knowing what the fine print on a contract means, teach reading. If it depends on knowing how to write a paper, teach writing. Success in school depends on these things, not just because they are important, but because they are the kinds of things that are questioned in tests, and those tests define what success in school means!

On the basis of what success in school means, cultural enrichment programs are doomed to failure because they interfere with the learning of what is necessary and essential to compete and succeed academically. It is of little value to produce a student who gloats about his cultural heritage, bragging about it at the unemployment lines, or doing a song and dance at the welfare office!

For the minorities, such well meaning programs must always take a back seat to the learning of material on which the word "success" in school depends, for that success is the best ticket they have to success in the world at large. That ticket is the best means to opportunity and competition in the job market. The way to get that ticket is to succeed in school. The way to succeed in school is to learn the material on which that success depends. Leave culture and other social nicieties for a time when it can be both afforded and enjoyed. And never mind the ever present problems of discrimination and prejudice. They can be dealt with as they occur. Besides, no one ethnic group or no one race has an exclusive patent on that.
