95 years of loving art benefits LV

Gertrude Goldsmith recently celebrated her 95th birthday. She's been a resident in our Village for more than 30 years, and she founded the Art and Music Group, which has 14 active members.

The group meets weekly in the morning in a member's home. There are no dues. The one rule is that every member must do research and make three reports a year on the arts and music throughout history.

"That's the secret of getting old," said Goldsmith. "If people don't keep their mind active, they end up going to what I call the organ recital. They sit and talk about how this hurts and that hurts and their heart and liver or whatever."

Goldsmith said she wanted to avoid that, so she started the group as a way to learn more about her favorite subjects and keep herself

3 ways to improve your credit score

Your credit score not only determines the interest rate you will pay on a mortgage or other loan, but it also affects the premium you will pay for homeowner's and auto insurance. Many employers use credit scores as part of their employment application process.

The credit scoring system looks at the percentage of debt you owe compared to your

overall credit line. It does not look at the dollar amount of debt you have, only the balance you owe, compared to how much credit is available to you. So, if you employ the following strategies, you will see a near immediate benefit that improves your credit scores:

1. Do not close your credit accounts. It is better to have many open accounts with little or no balance than to have just one or two accounts regardless of the balance.

2. Do not concentrate large balances on just a few accounts. Pay outstanding debt down as close to zero as possible. The key is to keep the balances at or below 30 percent usage level of the available credit line.

3. Call your card companies and try to increase your available credit lines, if they can do so without pulling a new credit report.

'History of California' college class starts Jan. 11







PET CORNER

In tough economic times as these, many pet owners are fearful of what it costs to keep their pet healthy. They love their pet dearly but are mindful of how unexpected medical problems can lead to sizable veterinary bills. The good news is that pet owners can play a major role in their pet's health, without spending a massive amount of money. Here are easy measures pet owners can take to survive on a tight budget.

We have all heard the old adage, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." This applies to animals as well as humans. Prophylaxis, or being proactive about your cat or dog's health can save you significantly.

There are four very common risk factors leading to disease in dogs and cats: obesity, dental disease, fleas and infectious diseases. More than one third of our pet population is overweight. Obesity can go without notice because it happens slowly, but it predisposes animals to serious medical problems like heart disease,

respiratory disease, liver and digestive problems and mobility problems.

How do you prevent this?

The first step is to make your pet a four-legged exercise machine. If you have a dog, plan a daily walk or two. It will benefit both of you.

If you have a young cat, you can train it to accept a harness so that the two of you can enjoy the great outdoors; but if your cat is indoors, you need to use environmental enrichment toys to get your feline to burn calories. Most pet stores or catalogs sell toys that your cat will chase or pounce on. A laser light is a great kitty exerciser and is very entertaining for owners as well. Other components are an indoor cat gym with climbing towers and collapsible tunnels.

As important as exercise is diet. Make sure your pet is on the appropriate diet for its age and activity level. Do not overfeed! Keep treats to a minimum.

A souper start to new year

As the New Year begins, almost everyone resolves to lose weight or eat a more healthy diet. Just try getting into a Weight Watchers meeting after Jan. 1! They are always packed. I should know; I go every year!

And now with the weather getting a little cooler, one of my favorite ways of filling up without "filling out" is to use soup. Butternut squash is my favorite. You can buy this soup readymade, but it is simple to do yourself, and so much better! Most groceries now sell bags of the pre-cut squash. When I'm busy or just lazy, I use the pre-cut squash and even chopped frozen onion!

If you want to use the whole butternut squash, here's a tip that makes it easier: Pierce the squash with a fork in several places. Then microwave on high for 6 to 10 minutes, depending on size. It will be warm, so use mitts! Then peel,

cut and seed as per the recipe below. You can serve this soup with a dollop of sour cream on top and some whole grain bread. On a cloudy, cool California day, this is the best!

Ingredients

- 1 2- to 3-pound butternut squash, peeled and seeded
 - 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
 - 1 medium onion, chopped
 - 6 cups chicken stock
 - Nutmeg
 - Salt and pepper

Directions

Cut squash into 1-inch chunks. In large pot melt butter. Add onion and cook until translucent, about 8 minutes. Add squash and stock. Bring to a simmer and cook until squash is tender, about 15 to 20 minutes. Remove squash chunks with slotted spoon and place in a blender and puree. Return blended squash to pot. Stir and season with nutmeg, salt and pepper. This makes 6 servings.



"A lot of these women didn't really know how to do the research or the writing, and a few were nervous getting up in front of a group talking, and we helped them do that," she said.

At a recent meeting, Eunice Drell planned to discuss the history of photography, in particular the Bauhaus movement in Germany and Adolf Hitler's quashing of it, claiming it was obscene.

My first report was on myself. I was an acrobatic dancer and singer in the 1940s, and I made movies called Soundies. I danced swing and country western. Soundies were short films that were installed in similar places as juke boxes. Many big band leaders made Soundies, such as Duke Ellington, Cab Callaway and Paul Whiteman. The Soundies were a

precursor to MTV.

My other reports were more on contemporary artists like John Denver, Cher and Duke Ellington, and I plan on doing Sarah Brightman soon.

"We like meeting weekly because it keeps us focused," said Goldsmith.



The rest of the story

Leisure Technology Inc., the corporation responsible for developing Leisure Village as we know it today — a project that began construction in 1973 and culminated in 1986 — originally had the option to purchase much of the farmland across Conejo Creek to the east, with the proposed intent to develop even more homes than the 2,136 units currently comprising our community.

The original thought was to build a bridge across the channel midway in the Village (vicinity of Village 34), thereby connecting the two distinct sub-units into a much larger complex.

Problems surfaced, however, when it was determined that a separate, or additional access to the freeway (U.S. 101), could not be guaranteed by local, state and federal officials at the time, and the developers were concerned about funneling all the projected traffic across the creek from the east with ingress and egress through the existing community.

Because of these potential problems, and through a wise decision on the part of the developers, we have some 3,200 (plus or minus) residents of Leisure Village, as opposed to over 6,000 as originally planned.

And as Paul Harvey used to say: "Now you know the rest of the story."


