**PRESS ROOM:** Room 162 in the eastern wing of the gymnasium building serves as the press room for Titan basketball. Three telephones are available approximately 10 minutes after the final buzzer.

**PRESS TABLE:** Located on the south side of the playing floor, behind the scorer's table. A limited number of working spots are available.

**OFFICIAL GAME SUMMARIES:** Will be collated and distributed in Room 162 of the gymnasium building. Halftime box scores, play-by-play accounts and final box scores will be provided.

**TELEPHONES:** There is one telephone at the press table — **(714) 773-3970** — which must be kept free for messages, out-of-town scores, etc. Additional telephones **cannot** be installed at the press table due to physical limitations of the building.

**RADIO:** The broadcast position is adjacent to the scorer's table. A telephone will be provided the designated commercial station for each visiting school in Titan Gym. No additional phones may be installed due to the physical limitations of the building. Use (714) 773-3970 as your trouble number.

**LOCKER ROOMS:** Located off the hallway on the north side of the playing floor. George McQuarn will conduct post-game interviews in the equipment manager's office just outside the Fullerton locker room. The players' area typically is open to the media after a reasonable cooling off period.

**CREDENTIALS:** Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, Press Will Call is located at the western entrance to the gymnasium. Credentials **MUST BE WORN IN PLAIN SIGHT** to access the doors leading to the locker rooms and press rooms.

**SCOUTS:** Requests should be made at least one week in advance.

**PARKING:** Except on Monday through Thursday evenings, ample free parking is available in the lot immediately west of the Gymnasium. On Monday through Thursday evenings, parking is available by: a) Using athletics Lot A and paying 75 cents (3 quarters) upon entry to gain a daily permit from the vending machine. b) Obtain a complimentary pass from the visitors information booth located on the south side of campus northwest of the intersection of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

# THE UNIVERSITY

---



California State University, Fullerton is a broadly based liberal arts institution that also offers many professional studies such as business administration, education, engineering and nursing.

Classes were offered for the first time in 1959 and the first commencement — for five students — took place in 1960.

The University's 23,500 students come primarily from Southern California with many from other states and other nations. Most students commute each day to and from classes; many come to classes only in the evening.

Drawn from throughout the world, the 750-member faculty is noted for its commitment to effective teaching and scholarly activity. Research is actively pursued, typically with students involved.

The University enjoys full accreditation for its overall program. In addition, national recognition has been accorded to programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, education, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, and theatre. All told there are 85 degree programs — 41 of them at the graduate level plus several credential programs and five certificate programs.

Reinforcing classroom instruction is an internship and cooperative education program that allows students to gain on-the-job experience while continuing their regular studies.

Another amenity is the extended education program. It provides classes, workshops, conferences and study tours without the formalities of regular admission to the University.

Still another strong point is the University's cultural events program. It includes a series that brings nationally-known professional artists to the campus for residencies as well as public performances.

An extensive recreation program aimed chiefly at students but also open to community members is another highlight, as is the network of community support groups. Another is Continuing Learning Experience, which spearheaded the fund-raising campaign to build a gerontology center on campus.

Further examples of community outreach are joint ventures with the City of Fullerton. One resulted in the Fullerton Arboretum, which opened on campus in 1979. Another produced lighting for the baseball field and adjoining soccer fields, while a third yielded two lighted softball fields. The long-awaited reality of an on-campus football/soccer complex and baseball stadium in conjunction with an on-campus Marriott Hotel recently was approved with a Fall, 1989 completion date targeted for the athletic facilities. To reinforce the University's commitment to high academic standards and community services, Cal State has embarked on a comprehensive fund-raising campaign. Its purpose is to raise the necessary non-state funding to make a very good university a great university.

## **Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb, President**



Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb was appointed the third president of Cal State Fullerton on July 8, 1981. Her selection was the culmination of a nationwide search begun in November, 1980.

Dr. Cobb had served as dean of Douglass College at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey, since 1976. There she also held the rank of professor of biological sciences. Prior to her Douglass appointment she was dean of Connecticut College and professor of zoology for seven years. Previously, she was professor of biology at Sarah Lawrence College in New York.

Born in January, 1924, Dr. Cobb is known for her work in cell physiology, her promotion of the advancement of women in scientific fields and her activities on behalf of minorities. She is the first black woman to head a major public university on the west coast.

Cobb earned her bachelor's degree from Talladega College in Alabama and her M.S. and Ph.D. in cell physiology from New York University. She also holds 14 honorary doctorates. She is the mother of a son, Jonathan, who is a graduate of the Cornell University Medical School.

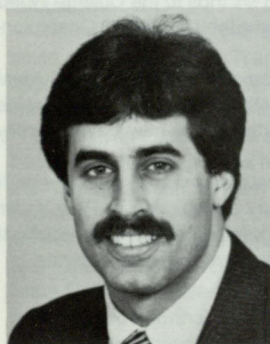

# HISTORY OF TITAN ATHLETICS

---

Obstacles and adversity. Grass roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim national championships in seven different sports, a star major league third baseman, men and women basketball players in the Olympics, a rookie in the Super Bowl and the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film?

The tenor was set by the first Titan intercollegiate team - men's basketball. In only their second season, the Titans of coach Alex Omalev advanced five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan five advance to within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's past five teams have been factors in the PCAA race and have a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton also recently competed in the NIT Tournament.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and has had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. Just ahead is the excitement expected to be generated by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished fifth or better in the nation every year including the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty."

Baseball exploded on the national scene with the arrival of coach Augie Garrido. He broke the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975 and won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, now of the Montreal Expos. And he won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as pitcher Greg Mathews of the St. Louis Cardinals.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making six trips to the College World Series in seven years. The Titans' most recent trip saw them bring home their first NCAA Championship.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson and runner Mark Covert. Football overcame growing pains at the Division I level in the past few seasons and should prosper further with a new playing facility about to be built.

Dick Coury was the inaugural football coach and he built an instant winner at the Division II level. The Titans were 27-16-1 over the first four years under Coury and successor Pete Yoder. The program came of age under the guidance of Gene Murphy and now football is another topflight Div. I program of which Fullerton students, alumni, faculty, staff and the community can be proud.

# — THE NICKNAME AND MASCOT —

---

"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team comes to town for the first time. Herewith are the answers, as best can be gathered over the annals of time at the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explains Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname 'Titans.' "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election.

"The obvious names were already taken — Indians (Fullerton Union High School) and Hornets (Fullerton Junior College), for example. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in the first year of classes, 1959, at was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and had to assess themselves a student body fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker. "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. Along those lines, the originally dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile, just then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History.

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day.

The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and a crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that Spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circuslike elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been made in recent years to make Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek, more tenacious.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color for a school known as Orange County State College and the unofficial color was adopted just as the unofficial elephant was.

When Lynn Eilefson was appointed athletic director in 1982, he furthered the cause of orange because of its uniqueness and brightness compared to a wide variety of shades of blue. Thus, the "Orange Crush" booster group was born and the color remains predominant in most team uniforms.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. But that's only the start of the confusion.

To out of staters, the sky seems to be the limit because most don't realize there are two distinct systems — the University of California and the State University system. So, we've been called everything from Cal-Fullerton to UC Fullerton to California State Fullerton State to simply Fullerton State. Technically, the preferred moniker is Cal State Fullerton, which is what most of the more than 50,000 graduates call it.

# ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT

## Ed Carroll, Athletic Director



The rapid climb of Ed Carroll through the ranks of the Cal State Fullerton athletic department culminated in his appointment as Director of Athletics on July 1, 1985.

University President Dr. Jewel Plummer Cobb made the announcement on May 28, 1985, after a nationwide search and Carroll, now 36, immediately ushered in an era of "positive thinking" for Titan athletics.

"One of my priorities has been to enhance the image of our athletic program by stressing positives," says Carroll. "We must use the power of positive thinking to overcome our limitations and build our program to greater heights."

In his first year as athletic director, Carroll immediately upgraded the football schedule. LSU, West Virginia, Florida and Tulsa signed to host the Titans while the United State Military Academy (Army) agreed to a home and home series in 2001 and 2003.

Long dormant plans for an on-campus Youth Sports Complex to provide a playing facility for football, soccer and baseball have been revived. The faculty Academic Senate and Fullerton City Council approved plans in October which hinge on the construction of a Marriott Hotel to help finance the project. At press time, the remaining hurdle before groundbreaking was approval by the State Board of Trustees.

Carroll began his Fullerton athletic career as a wrestler. In 1972, he served as team captain and was selected the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" in the California Collegiate Athletic Association championship meet. He later served as an assistant to former head coach Don Matson.

Carroll earned bachelor's degrees in history and physical education from Fullerton as well as a secondary teaching credential. He taught physical education classes at Fullerton and earned a master's degree in recreation administration from CSU Long Beach.

After serving in various capacities in the Fullerton recreation department, Carroll left briefly in mid-1980 to serve as a recreational sports programmer and doctoral intern at Indiana University. He returned to Fullerton in November, 1980, as an assistant athletic director and also acting director of the Titan Athletic Foundation. He then served under athletic director Lynn Eilefson, who left in January, 1985, for a similar post at San Jose State.

Ed and his wife Connie live in Fullerton with young son Brandon. A second child is due in February.

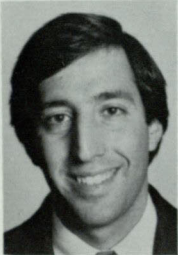

# COACH GEORGE McQUARN

---



George McQuarn stamped his trademark on Cal State Fullerton basketball during the 1981-82 season when he returned the Titans to a competitive posture in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and since then the Titans have averaged 18 victories per year and haven't had a losing season.

During his six-year tenure, McQuarn twice has taken Fullerton into the PCAA Championship Game; earned the Titans their first-ever National Invitation Tournament bid; gained national Top 20 rankings; more than doubled attendance in Titan Gym and tutored six National Basketball Association draft picks.

"I think we have sustained the program at a high level," says McQuarn, 45. "If you look at the PCAA standings over the past five years and discount the presence of UNLV, I think you will see that we have been one of the top three programs in the conference.

"Each year brings new challenges. We have built a solid base and have the potential to continue at the same level. But when you look at what happened to us last season, you realize that predictions and forecasts don't mean much."

The theme of Titan basketball under McQuarn has been "We Play Hard!" Aggressive defense and a high work ethic are the cornerstones of the concept. McQuarn exhorts his squad to play at a level of intensity that negates outside elements over which they have no control, as evidenced by last year's strong finish despite a rash of injuries.

"Our offensive philosophy starts at the defensive end and each year we have tried to become more and more aggressive on defense," says McQuarn. "We want to run but we want to do it out of our defense."

Team and individual honors have been plentiful during the McQuarn era. The 1981-82 team was the nation's most improved squad and the 1982-83 team set a school record with 21 regular-season victories while gaining the school's initial bid in the NIT and ruining the unbeaten season of the nation's No. 1-ranked team (UNLV).

McQuarn was selected District 15 Coach of the Year in 1982-83 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches. In 1984, he coached the West squad to the championship of the annual Aloha Classic in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Three of McQuarn's former Titans are currently in NBA camps — Leon Wood (Washington), Ozell Jones (L.A. Clippers) and Kevin Henderson (Cleveland). Ricky Mixon (L.A. Lakers — 1983), Tony Neal (L.A. Lakers — 1985) and Kerry Boagni (Utah — 1986) also were drafted during the past four seasons.

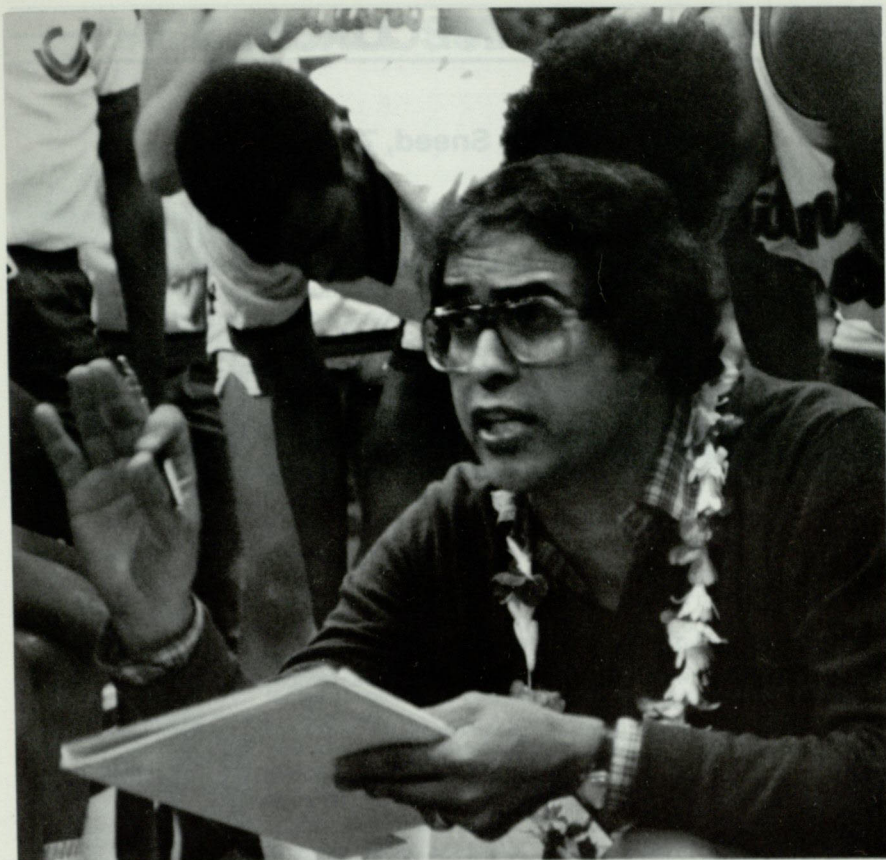
Critical to his success at Fullerton has been McQuarn's attention to discipline and academic progress.

"We are a goal-oriented program and the graduation of our players is an important goal to me," says McQuarn. "While I believe an athlete is responsible for his academic progress, I also believe it is the responsibility of a coach to create an atmosphere and environment conducive to academic success."

He launched his coaching career with four outstanding seasons (123-8) at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles. His collegiate career began with four years as an assistant at UNLV (93-28).

## John Sneed, 7th year

John Sneed will coordinate the scouting of opponents among his myriad of duties for the Titans in 1986-87. He has recruited, coordinated the academic program and tutorial services and also has made a major contribution toward the promotion and marketing of Titan basketball, which has more than doubled home attendance during his six previous seasons at Fullerton.

Sneed brought experience with winning Division I programs and remarkably successful high school teams to Fullerton when he became a member of head coach George McQuarn's original Titan staff in 1980.

Sneed was an assistant for one year at the University of Arizona, a 21-6 season (1976-77) which took the Wildcats to the NCAA playoffs. During 1977-78 he was an assistant at San Diego State and the 19-8 Aztecs won the PCAA title before being eliminated in the post-season tournament by Cal State Fullerton. He also was at San Diego in 1978-79.

Sneed succeeded McQuarn at Verbum Dei High School in Los Angeles in 1974 and won the CIF 4A title and CIF Coach of the Year honors with a 30-2 record. His Eagles won two more Camino Real League titles with 28-1 and 23-5 seasons and three times he was league coach of the year. His career prep mark was 81-8 (.910) and the 1974 team was recognized as national champion by the National Sport News Service.

A Cal State Long Beach graduate, Sneed served two years as an assistant to McQuarn at Verbum Dei. He is a native of Gastonia, North Carolina.



## Donny Daniels, 1st year

Donny Daniels is a new but very familiar face around Cal State Fullerton basketball for 1986-87. The former Titan player and part-time assistant coach was appointed a full-time assistant on May 30. His primary responsibilities will be recruiting and working with the centers.

Daniels returns to Fullerton after two successful seasons at Los Angeles Harbor Junior College in Wilmington. The Seahawks posted an overall mark of 33-29 in his two seasons including a trip to the state playoffs last year and the championship of the Moorpark Tournament.

Daniels played forward for two seasons at Cal State Fullerton (1974-75 and 1975-76) under coach Bobby Dye and was selected the team's top defensive player as a senior. He had previously played one season each at Scottsdale (Arizona) and Harbor junior colleges.

A graduate of Verbum Dei High School and a member of George McQuarn's Eagle basketball team, Daniels' first coaching tour with the Titans came during the 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons.

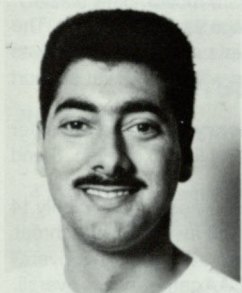

# SEASON PREVIEW

---

The frustrating rash of injuries that derailed a promising 1985-86 basketball season for Cal State Fullerton pays belated dividends in 1986-87 as coach George McQuarn will be able to send a somewhat experienced yet still young team into the most imposing Titan schedule ever.

"We lose only two players from last year, but we still are a very young basketball team," says McQuarn. "The fact that a lot of people were forced into starting roles last year gives us six regulars with considerable game experience as a solid nucleus. However, we are lacking any individual standouts. We don't have any returning all-conference players, so leadership on the floor for this group is something that concerns me."

Kevin Henderson and Kerry Boagni, the Titans' Nos. 1 and 3 scorers, respectively, have moved on. Returning are eight lettermen including six who started at least eight games. Joining them will be a quartet of junior college transfers who are expected to make a significant impact.

"With only 12 players on the roster, depth could become a factor," says McQuarn, entering his seventh season at Fullerton. "We can't afford any injuries, certainly not to the extent we suffered last season."

The timing of last year's mishaps was particularly upsetting as it took the steam out of what was beginning to shape up as a sterling season. The Titans were 7-3 and riding the crest of a 5-game winning streak at a 93-point-per-game pace when Henderson and then No. 2 scorer **Richard Morton** went down with leg injuries. When they returned, they had to play their way into shape in the midst of the drive for berths in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament, where Fullerton ultimately gained the semi-finals and finished with a 16-16 record.

Morton is the scoring leader among returnees with a 13.3 point average as a sophomore. The 6-foot-4 junior from San Francisco had games of 18, 16, 32 and 24 points after Henderson was hurt, but then suffered knee and ankle injuries himself when he collided with the basket support at San Jose State.

Last year's top two rebounders return in the persons of forward **Henry Turner** and center **Herman Webster**. Turner, a 6-foot-7 junior, gained a spot in the starting lineup on Dec. 5 and became a fixture, averaging 10.7 points and 6.2 rebounds for the season.

Webster was the most pleasant surprise on last year's team. The 6-foot-7 senior played only 14 minutes in the first five games, but eventually developed into a consistent inside scoring threat. His 13.4 scoring average in PCAA games was second best on the team and lifted his overall season mark into double figures at 10.6. He averaged 6.2 rebounds per PCAA game and 5.4 overall.

Frontline help will be provided by part-time starter (9 games) **Vincent Blow**, a 6-foot-8 junior. He averaged 2.9 points and 3.7 rebounds on the year.

Veterans in the backcourt include junior point guard **Eugene Jackson** and swingman **Alexander Hamilton**, a versatile all-around athlete who played three positions last year. Jackson, who started 10 games during his freshman season, got the starting call a dozen times in 1985-86 and responded with a 4.4 point and 2.9 assist average. Hamilton, a senior, started three games at point guard and five at off guard while posting nearly identical figures — 4.3 points and 2.3 assists.

Sophomore lettermen **Chris Ceballos** and **David Moody** round out the cast of veterans. Ceballos, a 6-foot-5 guard, appeared in 16 games and averaged 1.7 points. Moody, a 6-foot-8 pivotman, saw action in 22 contests and averaged 0.8 points.

All four newcomers could play key roles.

**Derek Jones**, a 6-foot-7 junior forward who sat out last season after a brilliant two-year career at Long Beach City College, is expected to be an offensive force on the front line. He averaged 21.5 points and 8.5 rebounds in his sophomore year while shooting 58 per cent from the floor.

**Oval Miller**, a 6-foot-8 transfer from Ventura College, should become a regular inside. Miller averaged 13.5 points and 7.5 rebounds as he led Ventura to the co-championship of the Western States Conference after a long siege of mediocrity. He also shot 78 per cent from the free-throw line.

**Tyrone Ree** has three seasons of eligibility remaining after one outstanding year at Murray State JC in Tishomingo, Oklahoma. The 6-foot-1 sophomore will challenge Jackson for the point guard role after leading his team in scoring with 22.5 points per game. He also averaged 6.3 assists



and 4.5 steals per contest while earning second-team all-conference honors and leading his team to a conference title.

Muscular **Rodney Smith** will provide needed bulk on the frontline as the 6-foot-5 power forward and one-time Golden Gloves boxing champion challenges for playing time. He averaged 12 points and 7 rebounds last year to lead Northeastern Oklahoma A & M to a 25-9 record.

"We lack a true center and will have to rely on finesse and quickness rather than strength up front," says McQuarn. "That lack of size will really concern me against teams like Washington, UCLA and UNLV.

"I'm more concerned about the point guard position. For five years our most gifted offensive player (Leon Wood and Kevin Henderson) has been playing that spot and this year we will have to adapt to a more traditional role for the point guard. I think we have excellent depth there, however, and I will feel comfortable with any one of three guys on the floor.

"The other thing that concerns me is the 3-point field goal rule. I think it is going to become more of a factor now that everyone is using it — coaches will give it time and consideration and incorporate it into their game plans. We know Morton is a shooter but we are looking to find a second consistent perimeter shooter.

"I expect we will be very competitive once again. Our goal always is to reach the NCAA Tournament. We have been one win away on a couple of occasions and we will continue to strive for that opportunity."

Tournament-tested teams dominate the Titans' schedule. UNLV, Texas Tech, Pepperdine and Washington all went to the NCAA tourney last year and UCLA, Loyola Marymount and U.C. Irvine participated in the post-season NIT along with Brigham Young, the opening night foe in the Cougar Classic which also features Arizona State and Texas Christian.

"UNLV always will be the favorite in the PCAA, but behind them it really is difficult to figure," says McQuarn. "After what happened to us last year, predictions and forecasts don't mean a thing."

Although still one of the youngest Division I conferences in the country, the 17-year-old Pacific Coast Athletic Association has become a major factor on the national scene through a combination of aggressive administrative leadership and outstanding coaches and student-athletes. In terms of attendance, television exposure, post-season play and development for the professional ranks, the PCAA ranks among the elite.

- Attendance — the PCAA had the highest percentage increase (plus 9.82) in attendance among the top 20 conferences in the nation last year. An average of 6,070 fans saw PCAA games for a conference-record total of 837,647 for the 10 institutions.

- TV Exposure — the PCAA is one of the few conferences to retain a "Game of the Week" package on a regional network basis. Raycom Sports of Charlotte, North Carolina will broadcast a game every Saturday in January and February as well as the championship game of the post-season tournament. Locally based telecasts include the Prime Ticket Network in the Los Angeles area as well as numerous community cable production companies. Most of Fullerton's home games also will be seen on Channel 46 (KHS) in Los Angeles.

- Post-season play — the PCAA has done remarkably well in recent seasons under the pressure of post-season competition. League champion UNLV advanced to the "Sweet 16" of last year's NCAA Tournament and runner-up UC Irvine advanced in the NIT with a win over UCLA at Pauley Pavilion. In 1983, four PCAA teams advanced to post-season play and Fresno State won the NIT championship with a victory over DePaul in Madison Square Garden.

- Post-Season Tournament — the PCAA was the first conference in the West to initiate a post-season tournament to select its automatic entry into the NCAA Tournament. After outgrowing the Anaheim Convention Center, the PCAA moved to the Fabulous Forum in Inglewood where more than 30,000 fans annually see three exciting nights of basketball.

- NBA Draft Picks — nine members of PCAA institutions were selected in the 1986 National Basketball Association draft including the Titans' Kevin Henderson (Cleveland, 3rd round) and Kerry Boagni (Utah, 5th round). As impressive as that number is, it's far from the record established by the "class of '84" which produced a total of 15 NBA draftees!

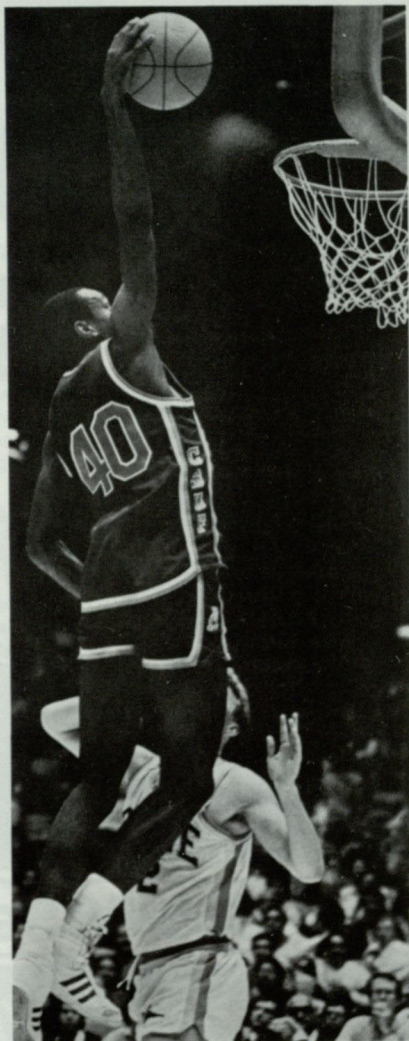

The absent firepower proved too much of an obstacle to overcome against the eventual PCAA champion Rebels, who typically relied on their triumvirate of Freddie Banks, Anthony Jones and Armon Gilliam to pull away to victory.

An 11-4 burst at the end of the first half gave UNLV a 10-point margin at 30-20 and the Rebels built it to as many as 16 points before the Titans made a belated charge behind Henry Turner, cutting the deficit to 7 points with 2 minutes to play.

Richard Robinson, the worst free throw shooter on the floor for UNLV, was fouled three times and responded by hitting 6 of 6 free-throw attempts to hold Fullerton at bay.

Another attempt at a deliberate-paced game failed at UC Santa Barbara when the host Gauchos parlayed a 24-4 edge in made free throws to an eased up victory.

Three Titans fouled out before the contest was over including both remaining point guards in Eugene Jackson and Alexander Hamilton.

The outcome was decided during two time frames. At the outset of the second half, the Gauchos built up a 33-27 advantage as the Titans were hit with six personal fouls to none for UCSB. The Titans were still hanging close at 39-34 with 7:42 to go when the Gauchos exploded for an 8-0 burst, hitting 8 of 10 at the foul line. The Gauchos hit only 2 field goals in the second half (in 8 attempts) but were 23 of 30 at the foul line while the Titans were 1 of 2.

Deeper Titan teams had ventured into Las Cruces but the 1985-86 edition came closest to a first-ever Fullerton win in the Pan American Center. Herman Webster joined the injured Kevin Henderson and Richard Morton on the inactive list when he missed the plane and couldn't make connections to Las Cruces on his own.

It hardly looked like a cliffhanger as the Aggies built an early 14-5 lead and had a 29-17 bulge at halftime. They still were up 40-31 with 11:45 to play before the Titans made their move behind Kerry Boagni, who scored 17 of what would be a Titan career high of 31 points in the second half.

Fullerton took leads of 50-47 and 51-50 in the closing minutes of regulation but Alexander Hamilton missed a free throw with 0:19 to play and the game went into overtime for the fourth time in the season, the second against the Aggies.

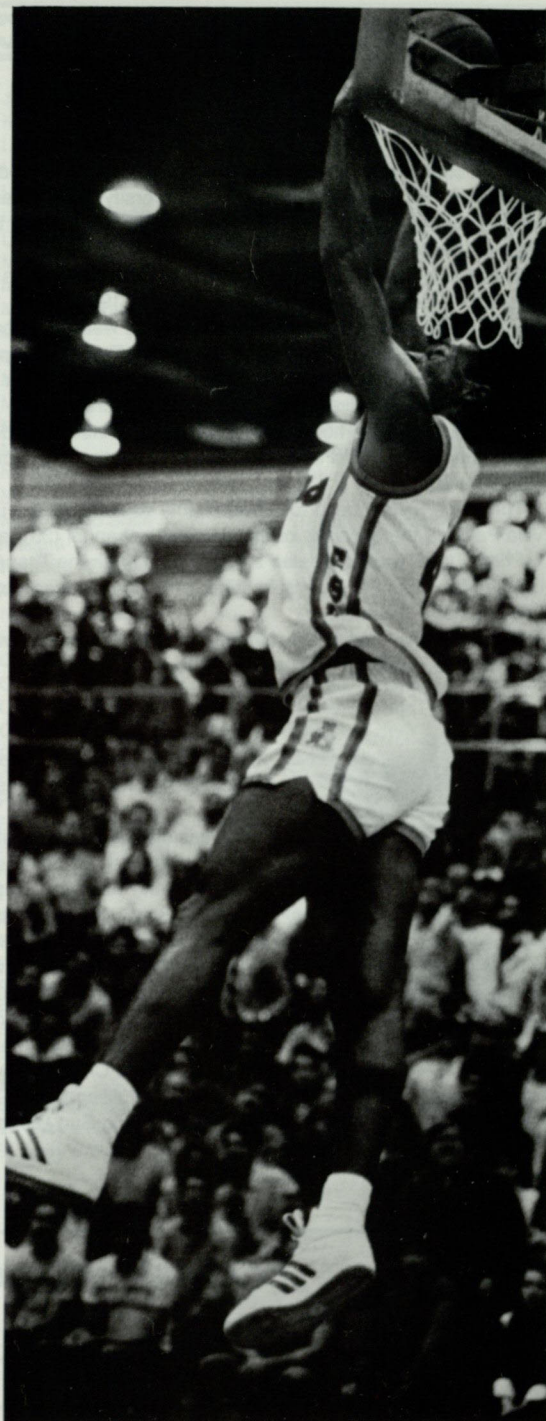

# BROADCAST PACKAGES

## TELEVISION

A varied combination of a regional network package, delayed coverage of selected home games, the Prime Ticket cable channel, the University cable channel and the various packages of institutions the Titans will visit will keep Cal State Fullerton basketball "on the tube" most of the 1986-87 season.

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association continues its "Game of the Week" schedule with Raycom Sports of Charlotte, North Carolina again in 1987. All 10 teams will be spotlighted over the course of the Saturday afternoon telecasts as well as the two teams who gain the finals of the PCAA Post-Season Tournament at The Forum. The Titans' appearance is scheduled for Saturday, Jan. 24 at San Jose State with games seen on a network of stations throughout the western United States with Mike Walden calling the action.

Many of Fullerton's home games will be televised on a delayed basis on KHS, Channel 46 of Ontario, with a signal that covers most of southern California. Ed Larkin provides the play by play coverage.

The same feed is used to provide cable subscribers in Fullerton, Yorba Linda, Placentia and Villa Park via the auspices of the University channel (33), also on a delayed basis.

Prime Ticket was scheduled at press time to air the Titans' home games vs. Washington and Loyola Marymount to their subscribers, which comprise approximately one-fourth of the huge Los Angeles TV market.

Of course, the Titans also gain the exposure on the road when home teams send their games out on cable, VHF and UHF stations.

## RADIO

Rebenstorf began calling Titans' action during the 1981-82 campaign. He has also called most of the football and baseball action since then and has brought to Titan fans the excitement of the California Bowl, the National Invitation Basketball Tournament and the College World Series.

Titan basketball is sponsored by Anheuser Busch (Straub Distributing Co., Orange), Selman Chevrolet in Orange and The Sizler on Yorba Linda Boulevard in Fullerton.

Rebenstorf, 36, last summer was the voice of the Oklahoma 89ers of the American Association in Oklahoma City. He previously did play by play for Cal Poly Pomona and UC Riverside sports as well as filling in for CSU Long Beach. His radio station work has included stops at KBON and KMEN in San Bernardino, KNTF in Ontario and KFI in Los Angeles.

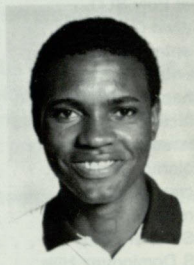
