








Requests should be made as far in advance as possible. When time permits, credentials will be mailed. If not, press will call is located at the will call/player pass table located on the third base concourse.

#### PHOTO CREDENTIALS

Will be issued on a per game basis only and must be worn in plain sight at all times. Access to the field is limited due to construction. Due to the limited foul territory behind home plate, all photographers must remain to the outfield side of the coaching boxes at first and third bases.

#### PRESS BOX

The press box is located on the walkway behind the seats directly behind home plate. Limited seating is available with beat writers receiving priority. Radio positions and additional seating for the media will be made in the press box or in the rows immediately in front of the press box.

#### **TELEPHONES**

The press box phone number is (714) 278-5327. Additional phones are available on a shared basis in the pressbox and in the Sports Media Relations Office, located about 200 yards to the south of Titan Field. Public pay phones are located directly behind the electrical house behind the press box.

#### RADIO LINES

Up to three telephone lines can be made available to the designated radio station of the visiting team(s). The charge is \$35.00 per game or \$100.00 for a three-game series. Please make arrangements with Mel Franks well in advance.

a) Using lot G at Yorba Linda Blvd. and Associated Road and paying \$1.50 upon entry for a daily permit (Monday-Thursday only). Parking is free on Friday night and all day Saturday and Sunday.

b) Obtaining a complimentary pass upon presentation of news credential to the Visitors Information Booth located on the south side of campus, northwest of the corner of Commonwealth and Nutwood Avenues.

- Cal State Fullerton won national championships in 1979, 1984 and 1995. Its most recent championship came as a result of a 57-9 season where the Titans finished 1995 with an 18-game winning streak. The Titans also became the first No. 1 seed to win the national title since seeding began in 1988.
- Cal State Fullerton is one of only three schools (Arizona State and Florida State are the other schools) to have three Golden Spikes Award winners. The award is given to the top amateur baseball player in the nation by USA Baseball. The three Titans who won the Golden Spikes Award were Tim Wallach (1979), Phil Nevin (1992) and Mark Kotsay (1995).
- Mark Kotsay and Brian Loyd represented Cal State Fullerton and the United States at the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. In winning the bronze medal as part of Team USA, Kotsay and Loyd join three other Titans who have been members of Team USA (Bob Caffrey in 1984 and Phil Nevin and Jason Moler in 1992).
- 28 Titans have gone on to play in the major leagues. Bret Hemphill (Anaheim) and Brent Billingsley (Florida) became the most recent Titans to make it to "The Show" when they were called up in 1999.
- Cal State Fullerton is 80-43 (.650) in NCAA post-season play and is ranked in the top five all-time in winning percentage for teams that have played over 100 games in post-season competition.
- No school has made more trips to Omaha, Nebraska, and the College World Series by winning on the road. Cal State Fullerton has won 10 regional titles and 1 Super Regional title, all on the road.
- The Titans in 25 years at the Division I level have made it to the NCAA Tournament 21 times and have won 17 conference championships.
- Aaron Rowand became the eighth Titan to be selected before the second round of the amateur baseball draft. Rowand, who was selected in the 1998 draft "sandwich" round by Chicago White Sox, joins Mark Kotsay (Florida-1996), Tim Wallach (Montreal-1979), Bob Caffrey (Montreal-1984), Mike Harkey (Chicago Cubs-1987), Brent Mayne (Kansas City-1988), Phil Nevin (Houston-1992) and Dante Powell (San Francisco-1994).
- Cal State Fullerton has had 66 first-team allconference selections in 15 years. CSF first joined the Pacific Coast Athletic Association in 1975 when it made the jump to Division I. The baseball conference was not in existence from 1977 to 1984 (CSF played in the SCBA), but returned in 1985. On July 1, 1988, the PCAA officially changed its name to the current Big West Conference.
- The Titans have never had a losing season in the 25-year history of the program at the Division I level and never have gone winless in 21 years of NCAA competition.

## 36 Years in Review

## In the Beginning (1964 thru 1974)



Titan baseball began in the most modest of fashions as a club team in 1964. The founding father was University physical plant employee Beryl Kempton, who carved a diamond out of an orange grove, literally establishing the foundation for what has become arguably the most successful facet of a University now in its fifth decade and educating more than 27,000 students each semester.

Home plate of the first diamond was located near an old orchard residence, the John Hetebrink House built in 1886, which has served a variety of functions for the campus and will soon house new athletic department offices. The first-base line ran north and the third-base line went to the west paralleling what is now called Gymnasium Drive.

The first coach was Warren Beck, a physical education faculty member who gave way to Bill Fulton when the team assumed intercollegiate status in 1965. The Titans played at the College Division as members of the California Collegiate Athletic Association along with Cal Poly SLO, UC Riverside, Cal State Northridge and Cal Poly Pomona. The Titans had limited resources and were competitive at best until the arrival for the 1973 season of Coach Augie Garrido from Cal Poly SLO.


A new backstop and batter's eye and such "luxuries" as electricity for the pitching machines provided Garrido the most basic of tools. His first season's record was 19-33-1 and it would be the Titans' last losing season. The Titans won the CCAA championship with a 39-11-1 season in 1974 and the stage was set for Division I play.

## New Bully in the Neighborhood (1975 thru 1984)

Garrido's Titans made an instant splash in 1975 as a little fish in the biggest pond. They captured the Pacific Coast Athletic Association

championship and then served notice by snapping USC's string of five consecutive national titles by winning their first NCAA regional tournament at Dedeaux Field. They earned their first trip to the College World Series where they were quickly eliminated by losses to Arizona State and Oklahoma. Pitcher Dan Boone, catcher Andy Pasillas and first baseman George Horton were key players that year and initiated a pipeline into the fertile California junior college ranks.

The Titans were dominant in the regular season for nine more years, running their string of conference championships to 11 in a row. They

won the PCAA in 1976 and won every Southern California Baseball Association pennant through its 1977 to 1984 run. And in the post-season they proved their mettle against regional and national competition despite always playing on the road.

In 1976 they took Washington State to a final game in Pullman and in 1977 they lost to the Cougars again in Tempe. USC and Arizona were their nemesis in 1978 in Los Angeles but the Titans struck paydirt in 1979 in Fresno. After an opening loss to UCLA, they came back to beat Portland



and Fresno State before sweeping a Sunday doubleheader with the Bruins to earn a return trip to Omaha. There they repeated the championship formula, falling immediately into the losers' bracket with a loss to Mississippi State before rolling through Connecticut, Arizona, Arkansas, Pepperdine and Arkansas again to win the first NCAA Div. I men's championship in school history. First baseman Tim Wallach was the College Player of the Year, pitcher Tony Hudson was the MVP of the CWS and Dave Weatherman hurled a complete-game 2-1 victory in the championship game on no day's rest.

The Titans would return to Omaha twice more in the next five years and it would have been more but for the strength of the western region in that era. In 1980 they went to the Tucson regional and Arizona went on to win the national title. In 1981 they went to Tempe and were ousted by the Sun Devils, the eventual national champs. Behind the play of Mike Rubel, Mark Pirruccello and freshman John Fishel, the Titans went through powerful Arizona State in Packard Stadium in 1982 to get back to the World Series, which was now being televised nationwide on the new ESPN network. Unfortunately, the Titans left their game in Tempe and became the first CWS team to go scoreless in losses to Wichita State and Maine.

In 1983 the Titans were sent to Tempe for the third consecutive year and they were eliminated by

Fresno State. But the Bulldogs had to sit and watch the next year as Fullerton won the 1984 regional over Mark McGwire's USC team and Chris Gwynn's San Diego State squad in well over 100-degree weather in Fresno. John Bryant's single in the 11th inning of the finale scored Bob Caffrey and the 8-7 win over the Aztecs sent Fullerton to Omaha for the fourth time in its 10 years of Div. I competition.

Bryant was a hero again in Omaha. After eliminating Michigan, Miami, Arizona State and Oklahoma State, the Titans used Bryant's triple for a 2-run rally that was the difference in a memorable 3-1 victory over Texas and gave the Titans their second NCAA

championship. The Titans won 37 of their last 42 games. Fishel was the series MVP but 5-foot-7, 133-pound lefthander Eddie Delzer captured the headlines in *Sports Illustrated* with his courageous 7-inning mound effort to get the win that was preserved by Scott Wright with his NCAA record 22nd save. Caffrey would go on to become the first Titan Olympian and join Wallach as a first-round draft choice, also by Montreal.

## A Couple of Blips on the Radar (1985 thru 1987)

The Titans returned a solid nucleus for 1985 and ended up with a roster that featured seven players who would eventually play in the major leagues. But they failed to win the conference championship and the string of consecutive NCAA playoff appearances was snapped at 10 when they lost a PCAA playoff series at Fresno State and did not get an at-large berth with a 36-32-1 record.

The 1986 team wasn't much better, posting a 36-21 record that again left Fullerton out of the top spot in the standings and out of the NCAA Tourney. The 1987 team restored order with a 42-15 regular season record and an 18-3 PCAA championship mark. But the Titans stumbled in the post-season when sent out of the West for the first time. In New Orleans, they lost an improbable opening game to Southern and converted reliever Allan Ratliff in a 1-0 game in which the defensively-suspect Southern infielders had no chances. Mike Harkey and Larry Casian tossed shutouts to give Longo Garcia another start, vs. LSU. But the unlucky Garcia lost again, this time victimized by his fielder's mitt coming apart on what should have been a routine come-backer.

When Garrido left to accept a lucrative offer from University of Illinois Athletic Director Neale Stoner, who had hired him at Fullerton 15 years earlier, it appeared the Titans' national prominence was waning.

## Cochell Does Even Better (1988 thru 1990)

Well-traveled Larry Cochell replaced Garrido and a different style and approach still produced success similar to what Garrido had manufactured. The Titans won a pair of regional tournaments in unlikely spots – Mississippi State and Texas – to earn Fullerton its fifth and sixth trips to Omaha in Cochell's 3-year term.

The 1988 team looked like it might be a team of destiny. After a 5-6 start, Garrido's players adapted to the Cochell style. Despite a late-season slump after a 30-5 run, they ventured to Starkville for the NCAA playoffs. With reliever Paul Johnson turning in a clutch performance, the Titans twice beat the host Bulldogs and then posted a 5-run ninth inning capped by a two-out, three-run home run by Mike Ross to beat top-seeded Texas A&M. In Omaha, they took control of the revamped format with wins over Miami and Stanford behind Garcia and Mark Beck. But the Cardinal came back to beat both Titan aces on their way to the NCAA title.

Despite the presence of a pair of All-Americans in Brent Mayne and David Staton, the 1989 Titans struggled all year and finished at 30-27 for their worst Div. I record ever. They finished in the second division


of the standings at 10-11.

The 1990 team was picked to finish fifth in the renamed Big West Conference. When they began the year 9-9 there were stories printed that the Titan dynasty was over. It was still only a 18-16 team until back-to-back sweeps of Fresno State and UNLV sparked a 14-5 finish and a 13-5 record good enough to win the Big West and an NCAA berth. Behind two solid starts by righthander James Popoff, the Titans went 4-0 at the Austin regional, beating Texas twice. In Omaha, the Titans were stunned twice. They lost to Oklahoma State in a game that saw outfielder Rich Gonzales carried off the field after crashing into the steel wall in left field. And they lost in extra innings to The Citadel when a catcher took the mound and shut down a Titan rally.

## If You Build It, He Will Come Back (1991 thru 1996)


Cochell accepted a lucrative financial offer to go to Oklahoma and, with constuction of a new field underway, Garrido returned from Illinois to launch the Titans' most successful decade yet. *Baseball America* would rank the program No. 3 for the decade behind only LSU and Miami.

It started in bitter disappointment. The 1991 team won 10 of its last 12 games to post a 34-22 record that the Titans thought was sufficient to earn an at-large NCAA berth considering the circumstances of Garrido's

late return, the strength of schedule, playing at Amerige Park downtown and the strong finish. The team would have gotten the Big West's automatic bid as a Big West tri-champion, but Long Beach State lost its season finale to Pacific, leaving a 2-way tie with Fresno State that worked to the Bulldogs' advantage. An at-large berth was not forthcoming (the third-place 49ers got one) and Fullerton was left to focus its frustration on the 1992 oppositon.

Led by juniors Phil Nevin and Jason Moler, the Titans christened their long-awaited new stadium with a return to the national championship game. An overpowering performance at Baton Rouge - they outscored the opposition 35-3 – earned the Titans their seventh trip to Omaha. They beat Florida State twice and Miami two out of three times, the last time in a heavy rain shower, to get a shot at unbeaten and well-rested Pepperdine. Two schools located about 50 miles apart put on a classic show almost 2,000 miles away for a national CBS



televison audience with the Waves winning, 3-2, thanks to the pitching of Patrick Ahearne, a home run by light-hitting shortstop Eric Ekdahl and a brilliant eighth-inning play by second baseman Steve Rodriguez. Nevin nevertheless earned MVP honors after being selected college player of the year. His also was the first name selected in the pro draft a week earlier. Both he and Moler were selected to the U.S. Olympic

team and Nevin joined Wallach as a Golden Spikes Award winner.


The 1993 team couldn't overcome the losses to graduation and the pro draft. The Titans placed second in the Big West and twice lost to USC, whom they had beaten twice in the regular season, to be eliminated from the NCAA Regional in Austin and finish 35-19. It would turn out to be the only year Fullerton High School product D. C. Olsen would miss a trip to Omaha in four years in a Titan uniform.

Classic and it would be a preview of the 1994 College World Series. The Titans beat San Diego, Oklahoma and Georgia Tech in February and all but USD would be reunited in Omaha. Fullerton earned its eighth trip with a dramatic regional victory at Oklahoma State. The Titans had to beat Memphis in oppressive afternoon heat and

humidity and then come back at night and beat a rested Cowboy team on its home field. A ninthinning, 2-out pinch-hit single by Brian King tied the game and Robert Matos was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to win it in the tenth.

A year later, the Titans were not denied as they compiled perhaps the best college season of all time. With Olympians Kotsay and Brian Loyd and future Kansas City Royal Jeremy Giambi pacing the offense and Ted Silva and Kotsay anchoring the pitching staff, Fullerton went virtually wire to wire as the No. 1 team in the nation. They won everything in their reach – the Hilton Classic with Olsen the MVP; the Big West regular season; the Big West Tournament with Loyd the MVP; the regional at LSU with Jack Jones the MVP and the CWS behind MVP Kotsay. They won their final 18 games to finish 57-9 and become the first No. 1 seed at Omaha to win the title. Kotsay won Fullerton's third Golden Spikes Award.

The momentum continued into 1996. Fullerton opened the year with a 38-4 record before hitting an inexplicable slump where they lost 12 of their final 19 games. The Titans tumbled to fourth place in the Big West and were eliminated from the BWC tourney at home by UNLV, but still got an NCAA berth at Wichita State. Kotsay tied an NCAA record with nine rbi in a rout of Delaware and a victory over Rice set up a showdown with the host Shockers. WSU got a great pitching performance from tourney MVP Brandon Baird and Rice ended the Titans' season and Kotsay and Loyd's collegiate careers with a comefrom-behind 13-10 decision. As part of its millenium edition, *Baseball America* selected Kotsay the college player of the decade.

## And the Beat Goes On (1997 thru 1999)

Garrido left again for greener pastures, this time the historical program at Texas. His former first baseman and associate head coach for six years, George Horton, took over. Again, the program marched forward. In three years, Horton has won a pair of conference titles, gone to the NCAA Regionals three times and taken the Titans back to Omaha for a tenth visit. His winning percentage (.711) after three years is better than either Garrido or Cochell posted.

The 1997 team won 11 of its last 13 regular season games and then bounced back from an opening

game loss to win the Big West Tournament, sweeping Long Beach State at Blair Field for an automatic NCAA bid. Good pitching and an aborted ninth-inning rally knocked the Titans out of the regional at Stanford. The 1998 squad reversed the pattern, winning the Big West regular season title but losing the tournament at home to Long Beach. They got sent to Baton Rouge for the third time in the decade and won two games before taking a big lead over the host Tigers behind pitching ace Benito Flores. But LSU flexed its muscles and came back to beat Fullerton twice.

The most productive Titan offense ever – .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game – carried Cal State Fullerton back to Omaha in 1999. Again, the Titans advanced via the road, winning the regional at Notre Dame and capturing the Super Regional at Ohio State. But the bats went quiet in Fullerton's tenth trip to Omaha, where they were honored to share in the 50th Anniversary celebration. The Titans settled for fifth place and just a taste of the experience for a young squad that hopes to return in 2000.

As George Horton prepares for his fourth year as head baseball coach at Cal State Fullerton, the Titan program clearly bears his personal trademark. All the players on the current roster were recruited by Horton and his staff and have played only for Horton, who replaced former Coach Augie Garrido on Sept. 4, 1996, after serving six years as his associate head coach.

The obvious traits of Titan baseball have gone unchanged in Horton's regime. His teams have posted a 136-55-1 (.711) record, won two Big West Conference championships and a divisional pennant and captured a pair of regional titles in 1999 to earn a trip to Omaha in the revised NCAA Tournament format. They have usually been ranked in the national Top 20 polls and even reached No. 1 according to *Collegiate Baseball* for one week late in the 1999 season.

Horton won his 100th game as Titans' head coach on Mar. 7, 1999, vs. Houston in only his 147th game (100-46-1) to easily beat predecessors Augie Garrido (100-69-2) and Larry Cochell (100-64) to that benchmark. He already owns two Big West Conference coach of the year awards. Seven Titans were chosen in the 1997 professional draft, five more in 1998 including outfielder Aaron Rowand in the supplemental round between the first and second rounds by the Chicago White Sox and five more were drafted this past June 2.

"There had been pressure to get back to Omaha and it was mostly self-imposed," said Horton, a first baseman on the Titans' first CWS team who has become only the ninth man to both play in the CWS and return as a head coach. "There was very little satisfaction in only getting close the first two seasons and now we are looking forward to repeating our Omaha trip and this time bringing home a fourth national championship."

In Horton's debut season in 1997, the Titans struggled to a 23-19-1 start, but then rattled off 15 victories in their final 18 regular season games. They lost the opener of the Big West Conference post-season tournament at home to Pacific ace Dan Reichert, but then came back to win four games in a row at Blair Field. They swept a doubleheader on the final day against host Long Beach State to capture the league championship and the automatic NCAA tournament bid. At Stanford, the Titans went 1-2 to place third, losing to Santa Clara and Fresno State.

In 1998, the Titans used a remarkably balanced squad to start strong and then dominate the Big West Conference regular season with a 25-5 record. But they stumbled at home in the Big West Tournament and then ran into a powerful buzz saw in Baton Rouge in the NCAA regionals, placing second at 3-2 with a pair of losses to the host LSU Tigers.

In 1999, the Titans again went 25-5 to win the BWC by four games. They swept three games at the Notre Dame Regional and then overcame an assortment of disadvantages to triumph in three games in the Super Regional at Ohio State to qualify for the school's tenth College World Series appearance.

Horton fulfilled a life-long dream of being a Division I head coach when he was promoted on September 4, 1996, to replace Garrido, who left to take over the program at the University of Texas. A 1978 CSF graduate, Horton had returned to the campus in 1991 when Garrido came back after a three-year stint at Illinois. In the next six years the Titans posted a 264-99 record and made three trips to the CWS, winning the 1995 crown with a phenomenal 57-9 season. Horton had imput on virtually every aspect of the Fullerton program with his primary concern being the development of the pitching staff. His organizational skills, patience as a teacher and his attention to detail provided the backbone of the Titan coaching staff.

During the years Horton was responsible for the pitching staff, seven pitchers received All-America honors and Matt Wagner (1994) and Ted Silva (1995) won Big West Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. Dan Naulty became the first Titan pitcher under Horton's guidance to reach the major leagues when he made the 1996 opening-day roster for the Minnesota Twins. He got a World Series ring in 1999 with the Yankees and will be going to Vero Beach with the Dodgers in 2000. Brent Billingsley made two appearances for the Florida Marlins early in the 1999 season.

Position players recruited and coached by Horton include Mark Kotsay (Florida), Jeremy Giambi (Kansas City) and Dante Powell (San Francisco/Arizona/St. Louis). Horton also coached the Padres' Phil Nevin, who in 1992 was the Golden Spikes Award winner, *Baseball America* player of the year, baseball's No. 1 draft pick (by Houston) and the College World Series MVP.

Kotsay and Nevin along with Brian Loyd, Jason Moler and Bret Barberie are five eventual Olympians tutored in part by Horton. Kotsay recently was chosen the college player of the decade by *Baseball America*.

Horton, 46, began his head coaching career at Cerritos College in Norwalk, where he guided the Falcons to three junior college state championships in six years. He compiled a 226-53 record and won the California titles in 1985, 1987 and 1989. Each of those years he was selected National Junior College Coach of the Year. His best season was 1987 when the Falcons went 46-5. He had a South Coast Conference record of 102-28 (.785) and was a four-time South Coast Conference Coach of the Year (1985, 1987, 1989 and 1990).

He had many players graduate to the major leagues including Brian Hunter, who played for the Atlanta Braves in the 1991 World Series. Other names include Mike Benjamin, Craig Worthington, Ever Magallanes, Al Osuna, Joel Adamson, Dan Patterson, Louis Medina and Jeff Hearron.

Horton was a player on the Cerritos College teams in 1972 and 1973. He won the most inspirational award in 1972. In 1973 he was the Falcon team captain, won the Dallas Moon Award and was a member of the state championship team. Horton played two seasons for Garrido at Cal State Fullerton in 1975 and 1976 and won All-PCAA honors as both a junior and a senior. He was on the first Fullerton team to go to the College World Series in 1975. He batted .308 as a junior and .290 as a senior while playing first base. He graduated in 1978 and went on to earn a master's degree in 1980 at Cal Lutheran.

Horton's coaching career began as an assistant at Cerritos in 1976-77 and he went to Los Angeles Valley College the following three seasons where he coached with current Long Beach State Coach Dave Snow. In 1980, he moved back to Cerritos as an assistant to Gordie Douglas before taking the head job in 1985. In addition, he coached during the summer for the Fairbanks Goldpanners (1981 and 1983) in Alaska and the Hutchinson Broncs (1982) in Kansas. A few famous names played







for him on those summer teams such as Shane Mack, Oddibe McDowell, Joe Magrane, Dan Plesac, Phil Stevenson and Roger Clemens.

In 1994, Horton was inducted into the California Community College Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Horton was born on Oct. 5, 1953. The Yorba Linda resident and his wife, Francie, have four daughters: Michele (20), Heather (16), Loyal (11), Rebecca (9) and a new granddaughter.

Dave Serrano returns for his fourth season at Cal State Fullerton as pitching coach and recruiting coordinator, a pair of functions he has performed in exemplary fashion. He molded an assortment of question mark arms in 1999 into an exclamation point staff that reached all the way to Omaha and he has been very instrumental in putting together the most recent recruiting classes, each of which has been ranked in the national Top Ten by *Collegiate Baseball*.

Serrano, 35, in five years of coaching has been to Omaha twice with two different programs. He was the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the 1995 and 1996 seasons at the University of Tennessee for Head Coach Rod Delmonico. In 1995, the Volunteers reached the College World Series for the first time in 44 years.


Serrano has coached more than two dozen pitchers who are currently playing professional baseball. In his two years at Tennessee, he produced two first-round draft picks in Todd Helton (1995, Colorado Rockies), and R.A. Dickey (1996, Texas Rangers). The top three starters on both the 1997 and 1998 Titan staffs were drafted – Matt Wise by Anaheim in the 6th round, Brian Tokarse by Anaheim in the 11th round and John Alkire by Detroit in the 13th round in 1997 and Erasmo Ramirez by San Francisco in the 11th round, Greg Jacobs by Anaheim in the 13th round and Benito Flores by Boston on the 17th round in 1998.

Flores was the Big West Conference pitcher of the year in 1998 and is one of Serrano's eight (with Wise, Tokarse, Ramirez, Adam Johnson twice, Matt Sorensen and Mike Greenlee) all-conference Titan hurlers

This is Serrano's second go-around as an assistant to Horton. He assisted him at Cerritos College for three years (1988-90) before Horton moved to Fullerton in 1991 as an assistant to Augie Garrido.

Serrano remained at Cerritos through the 1994 season. In his seven-year tenure, Cerritos won the state championship in 1989 and won the conference title six times, including 1991 when Serrano was the head coach.

Serrano graduated from Cerritos High School in 1982 and played two



seasons at Cerritos College. He earned all-conference and JC All-America honors in his final season at Cerritos. He pitched one season at Cal State Fullerton in 1986, posting a 3-4 record with one save in 15 appearances.

He resides in Fullerton and has a son, Kyle (4).

Rick Vanderhook is in his 14th season with the Titans as a coach. He will again coach the outfielders and hitters, set the defense and handle third-base coaching duties this season. He also is a key evaluator of talent in the recruiting process and is the director of Titan Baseball Camps.

"Hook" has coached two first-round draft picks (Dante Powell by the San Francisco Giants and Mark Kotsay by the Florida Marlins) and a supplemental round pick (Aaron Rowand by the Chicago White Sox in 1998) as well as 12 All-Americans at CSF since 1991.

The Titans' offense exploded last season. After setting four school records in 1998, the offense set two more new standards in 1999 with a .338 batting average and 9.2 runs per game. They finished in the school's top 10 in 11 of the 12 offensive categories and got a 37-game hitting streak from Spencer Oborn.

As camp director, Vanderhook oversees all aspects of Titan baseball camps, which help young (7 to 17 years) players to reach their top performance level. Among the graduates of Titan camp are former Titans Steve Chatham and Rowand. The teaching of fundamentals make Titan camps second to none.

Vanderhook, 37, first coached the Titans from 1985 to 1988. After serving as a bullpen coach and working with the pitchers and catchers in 1985 and 1986, he stepped into the third-base coaching box in 1987 and worked with the hitters and defense in 1988. In his 13 previous years with the Titans as a player and a coach, they have made it to the College World Series five times.

Vanderhook spent 1989 and 1990 with Coach Bill Kernen at Cal State Northridge. In 1990, Northridge was the Division II national runnerup. Vanderhook returned to Cal State Fullerton prior to the 1991 season. He has coached for Fairbanks in Alaska and the Goldpanners finished third in the nation in 1986.

A product of the prominent Cerritos College program and a player for George Horton, Vanderhook originally came to Cal State Fullerton in 1983 and redshirted his first season with the Titans before becoming a

member of the Titans' 1984 national championship team.

Vanderhook prepped at Lakewood High School under Coach John Herbold, now the head coach at Cal State Los Angeles.

He currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, April, and daughters, Noelle (4) and Autumn (2). They are expecting their third child in April.

Tim Wallach, the first nationally recognized Titan baseball player, returns to his roots and makes his debut as a college coach for the 2000 season. He will coach first base and work primarily with the infielders.


Wallach began his post-playing career as manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers' San Bernardino team in the Class A California League.

The 1979 College Player of the Year and winner of the U.S. Baseball Federation's Golden Spikes Award went on to play 17 seasons in the major leagues after leading the Titans to their first national championship. He was a five-time National League All-Star third baseman for the Montreal Expos (1980-1992) before finishing his career with the Los Angeles Dodgers (1993-95 and final part of 1996) and Anaheim Angels (early 1996).

Wallach, a first baseman for the Titans, led the National League in fielding in 1991 and won three Gold Gloves for fielding excellence. He was selected Comeback Player of the Year in 1994 when he batted .280 with 23 home runs and 78 RBI in 113 games. He had a career batting average of .257 with 260 home runs and 1,125 runs batted in. He hit a home run in his first major league at bat (walked in first plate appearance) for the Expos on Sept. 6, 1980, against Phil Nastu of the San Francisco Giants.

Born in Huntington Park on Sept. 14, 1957, Wallach graduated from University High School in Irvine and attended Saddleback Junior College. In 1978 he led the Titans in batting (.394), home runs (16) and rbi (80). He was drafted by the Angels in the eighth round but elected to return for his senior year and again led the Titans with 23 home runs and 102 rbi while hitting .392, second to teammate Sam Favata at .417. He was the tenth player selected in the first round of the draft by the Expos and promptly hit a home run in his first professional plate appearance for Memphis on June 15, 1979.

Tim currently resides in Yorba Linda with his wife, Lori, and sons Matthew (13), Brett (11) and Chad (8).





#### 2000 PREVIEW



### Looking Ahead to 2000

"Guarded optimism" is what Coach George Horton and the Titans are taking into the final year of the century.

Can there really be any other kind in college baseball? An arm injury here, a late pro signing there. A disgruntled substitute in the locker room or a heralded high school product who can't handle a higher level. There are potential landmines everywhere in a game decided by fractions of inches and the bounce of a hand-stitched ball over dirt and grass.

A year after most of the pieces fell together almost perfectly, at least until the team reached Omaha, the Titans know they have the nucleus of another fine squad, but also that there are inevitable areas of concern.

"We have all the ingredients for a lot of success," says Horton, now in his fourth year in charge of a program he has helped build as a player and an assistant. "What we feel best about is on the mound—we're going into this year with the most optimism about our pitching capabilities since 1994, when we had a large group back from a successful 1993 season. In fact, we are deeper in quality pitching than in the 10 years I've been here."

Some say pitching is 90 per cent of the game, but Horton thinks that's undervaluing the other areas of the game – "pitching's not 90, but maybe 70 per cent." And away from the mound is where he sees potential storm clouds.

"We lost the heart of last year's lineup and we lost a lot more than just the numbers they produced," he said. "Spencer Oborn, Reed Johnson and Ryan Owens were our Nos. 2, 3 and 5 hitters but they were also team leaders. Their absence leaves a big hole."

Were it not for a health problem, the Titans also would be trying to replace their cleanup hitter. First baseman Chris Beck led the 1999 team with a .408 batting average and was drafted in the 19th round by St. Louis. But a spinal cord ailment scared the Cardinals away from offering a contract and Beck still was an amateur when a second medical opinion led him to a therapy program that appears to have alleviated the problem.





"It will be a huge boost for us to have Chris back," said Horton.
"There might be a little tentativeness, but he is going to be our centerfielder and his presence makes a big difference."

Fullerton set a school record in 1999 by averaging 9.2 runs per game, so less offense is to be expected. Horton is more concerned about the defense, particularly on the left side of the infield.

"Since I've taken over as head coach, we have played musical chairs at shortstop," admits Horton. "It's made me uncomfortable that we haven't been able to solidify the situation and I only have myself to blame. We haven't had someone step forward like a Nate Rodriguez, Jack Jones or Jerome Alviso in the early 1990s. We must work hard and not have three shortstops. It has a major bearing on your pitching."

The early portion of the schedule figures to be a proving ground for junior Chad Olszanski or freshman Mike Martinez from Katella High School in Anaheim. Olszanski split time last season with Owens and Shawn Norris, but the latter will get first call at third base.

There is more proven talent elsewhere. Junior All-American candidate David Bacani returns for a third season at second base and .378 hitter Aaron Rifkin will likely move from designated hitter to first base. Seniors Craig Patterson and Jeff Gates return to handle most of the catching duties with Brett Kay challenging.

Expected to join Beck in the outfield are letterman Robert Guzman in right field and Mendocino JC transfer Matt Belfanti in left field. Sophomore Chris Stringfellow figures to see action as well and the Titans picked up some experienced bats in University of Missouri transfer Jake Epstein and University of Texas transfer Steve Woodward.

And then there is the solid pitching. The top three starters return along with last season's closer and that quartet is joined by a handful of highly regarded transfers. Righthander Adam Johnson is rated the best professional prospect on the staff and he has the arm and mentality to be a dominating pitcher. He was 10-4 with a 3.55 earned run average as a starter in 1999 after logging 8 saves as the closer in 1998. In 155 Titan career innings he has struck out 199.

Lefthander Jon Smith, an Academic All-American last year, is 9-1 with a 3.18 ERA in two seasons despite shoulder problems which should be alleviated by a change in delivery. Righthander Matt

Sorensen sported a perfect 12-0 record in 1999 and led the staff with 126 innings, striking out 84. The fourth returning hurler to grace the media guide cover is ironman reliever Kirk Saarloos, who went from Johnson's set up man in 1998 to the closer role in 1999. He was 7-3 with 7 saves and finished all but two of his near-record 39 appearances.

A couple of newcomers could break into the "Big Four's" prominence. Cypress College transfer Ronnie Corona was 12-3 with a 2.69 ERA for the Chargers last season and Mike Nunez was 4-1 with a 2.02 ERA as the San Jose CC closer.

"Corona and Nunez should join those four veterans as our top six guys," said Horton. "We expect the next group to include (junior) George Carralejo, (redshirt) Sean Martin, (newcomers) Nick Lovato (Mater Dei HS) and Jake Moon (Virginia Commonwealth)."

Horton is a supporter of the new aluminum bats and feels they should again benefit his team in 2000.

"I think the bats this year should perform similar to those of last year, but with a more formal stamp of approval," he said. "I thought they came close to reaching their goal and the game wasn't as distorted. The deadened bats are better for our style of play and the kind of athletes we have."


Those athletes will once again be playing a schedule worthy of a national championship contender, beginning with the traditional season-opening series with Stanford.

"We pick up right where we left off, seeing them the last time in Omaha," said Horton. "They are like us – a solid nucleus returning with quality pitching. In years past, including last season, what we have seen in February hasn't often been representative of their final team. But this time they have an experienced lineup and they are very good on the mound and, in fact, have more high profile guys than we do.

"We also play Baylor, which made a national statement last year, and then we have our tournament – Georgia Tech has had two great recruiting years, Mississippi State is strong again and USC might have the best talent in the country. West Coast baseball should be very strong and that's who we play the most. UCLA's strong recruiting class is in its junior year and Pepperdine has almost everybody back.







"The conference should be a battle among us, Long Beach State and Nevada one more time. Cal State Northridge coming into the Big West in 2001 will help our power rating, too."

Former Titan All-American and Golden Spikes Award winner Tim Wallach joins Horton's coaching staff in 2000 and will work with the infielders and man the first-base box. Rick Vanderhook is the outfield coach and mans the third-base box. Recruiting coordinator Dave Serrano is the pitching coach and Horton will handle the catchers for the first time.

"We're looking forward to the season," concluded Horton with unguarded enthusiasm.

# 1999 SEASON REVIEW



# The 1999 Titans

If you took all of the pieces that must be assembled to form a winning collegiate baseball team and tossed them up into the air as if they were scraps of paper, the odds of all of them falling into the proper location when they hit the ground would be extremely long. But it's almost as if divine intervention helped put together the 1999 edition of the Cal State Fullerton baseball team.

Head Coach George Horton and his staff had a huge rebuilding job on their hands in the Fall of 1998 with graduation and the professional draft siphoning away virtually the entire pitching rotation and the top four hitters from the 1998 lineup. They rolled up their sleeves, grabbed a pot of glue and patched up a roster that no one expected would compile a .781 winning percentage (50-14), run away with the Big West Conference championship and earn the school's 10th trip to the College World Series.

Banished to the road for NCAA regional play by commencement exercises in the first round and "greener" pastures in Columbus for the Super Regionals despite their overall No. 3 seed, the Titans knocked off three fabled athletic institutions in Notre Dame, Michigan and Ohio State to get back to Omaha.

### Consider:

- The top three starting pitching candidates were a converted closer, a junior college quarterback and a lefthander with a mysterious shoulder ailment. The new closer was the old setup man and the new setup man was learning to pitch sidearm.
- Defensively, only one returning player would line up in the same position he played in 1998 and the new first baseman had never worn anything but an outfielder's glove.
- Offensively, the muscle in the lineup would come from a pair of transfers – one with suspiciously glowing numbers from high altitude Provo, Utah, and the other a lightly recruited lefthanded hitter with only Div. III experience – and a career .289 hitter (Ryan Owens).

Yet somehow it all worked out. Winning quickly became a habit and the Titans slowly climbed in the national polls, finally attaining a No. 1 ranking, albeit for only one weekend. They advanced to Omaha despite developing hardships such as:

- losing their opening day third baseman for most of the year to a broken arm in February
- using three different starting shortstops and two catchers
- · recurring shoulder problems for their only lefthanded starter
- losing a part-time outfielder to the Penn State football program
- spending almost 2 weeks in the Midwest for regional play and losing two starters and two infielders to disciplinary moves

Adam Johnson, the converted closer, and Kirk Saarloos, the former setup man, combined to shut out Stanford on opening night but the Titans lost their next three games. It would be the longest losing streak of the season as they promptly started winning. And kept on winning. They won nine games in a row before a couple of one-run losses at nationally ranked Alabama. They threatened the school record with a 17-game winning streak that carried through all of March and into April. After a 3-3 "slump," they strung together 10 more consecutive wins to coast to the Big West championship by a four-game margin over runnerup Nevada.

Righthander Matt Sorensen posted a perfect 12-0 record. Previously, he was the Cerritos JC quarterback and as a pitcher had a 12-1 record for the Falcons. Jon Smith is the sorearmed pitcher who had a team-best earned run average of 3.16 to go with a 7-1 record and the most effective pickoff move this side of the major leagues. Saarloos finished virtually every game in which he appeared (39) while going 7-3 with 7 saves while Marco Hanlon perfected his new sidearm delivery late in the season and eventually replaced the ailing Smith in the rotation.


Sophomore second baseman David Bacani was the only returning player in the same spot. Owens opened the season at shortstop but had to replace third baseman Ryan Moore, who hit 16 home runs in 1998, when Moore broke his arm on Feb. 28. Last year's left fielder, Reed Johnson, moved over to center to make room for Brigham Young transfer Spencer Oborn, who hit in all but five games including 37 in a row (Feb. 6 - Apr. 14). Oborn was the Big West Conference Player of the Year, proving his BYU stats were not a fluke by ranking in the Top Ten of all 10 Big West offensive categories. The best batting average on the team belonged to former outfielder Chris Beck (.408), who played first base like a veteran and ignited the offense from the clean-up spot.

Lefthanded hitting DH Aaron Rifkin was the Div. III transfer from Chapman University who was batting over .400 until the final weeks of the season. Letterman Craig Patterson and JC transfer Jeff Gates split the catching duties, although not in a platoon situation since both are righthanded hitters. Splitting the job at shortstop after Owens was moved were true freshman Murph Norris from Draper, Utah, and sophomore Chad Olszanski. Another true freshman, Robert Guzman, held down the right field job after USC transfer Rod Perry quit the team to prepare to renew his football career with Coach Joe Paterno.

Key games? Third-year coach Horton pointed to the opening four, when his team of mostly strangers hung tough with Stanford and Pepperdine, two veteran squads. Some of the players pointed to the tough series at Alabama, which proved to them that their early 9-game winning streak would mean little if they didn't keep working hard.

The caliber of schedule ranked with the best. The Titans swept Conference USA champion Houston in a 3-game home series and went 2-0 against USC and 1-0 vs. UCLA and Arizona State from the Pac-10. They dominated the Western Athletic Conference going 7-0 with series sweeps of UNLV and Fresno State and winning a game at San Diego State.

For the second year in a row, the Titans went 25-5 in Big West Conference play, losing only one of 10 3-game series and sweeping six of them. In Horton's three-year career, Long Beach State is the only school to win a Big West series from him.






Trademarks? This team scored a lot in the first inning, triggered by Bacani and his .500 batting average in the first at bat of each game. They came from behind and held onto early leads, going 46-0 when ahead after seven innings. They stole bases with almost reckless abandon as six players reached double figures. In Sacramento and late in the season they flashed power with Owens totaling 23 home runs and Oborn and Reed Johnson adding 14 and 12, respectively. It all added up to the most productive offense in school history with a record .338 batting average and a record 9.2 runs per game. The team total of 144 stolen bases was the fifth best mark and the home run total jumped up to 91, the third best total. Unfortunately, the Titans slumped in Omaha and scored only eight runs in three games and settled for fifth place.

# THE CITY OF FULLERTON



The City of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first to settle here was an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became part of a vast 35,000-acre grant of Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off the land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picure in 1887 when they heard rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They bought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.


Charles Chapman, a descendant of legendary "Johnny Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by introducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the Fullerton hills into what is now Brea.

The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman was the first mayor. An airfield was established in 1927 and the Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation facility.

Another boom began as veterans returned from World War II and demanded homes for their young families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing the necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed. Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was established in 1913, and it was followed by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, now part of Hope International University. All are within a 2-mile radius in the east part of town.



# CAL STATE FULLERTON GELEBRATING FORTY YEARS OF EXCELLENCE

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 41st year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 120,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and satellites in Mission Viejo and Santa Ana - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 25,000 students currently enrolled and more than 3,400 faculty and staff employees, it is estimated that Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by \$489 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge. The instructional program is offered by sevenschools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Science and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. In all there are 97 degree programs - with 45 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 12th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduated.

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as more than 50 certificate programs ranging from entrepreneurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on- and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. # THE NICKNAME





"What exactly is a Titan?"

"Why do you have an elephant for your mascot?"

Those are two of the first questions that pop into the minds of media and fans when a Cal State Fullerton athletic team makes its inaugural visit to an area. While the relatively young institution carved out of the Orange County citrus groves may be too new for many traditions, here are the recognized legends.

"It was the students' decision in a vote," explained Dr. Ernest Becker, founding Dean of Students, of the nickname "Titans." "More than a hundred names were suggested, and the Student Council took on the job of narrowing the list down to a few for the purposes of an election. The vote was close, with Titans narrowly prevailing over Aardvarks and Rebels."

It was a unique student body at the outset, all upper division students until 1963. There were 453 of them, mostly female, in 1959, the first year of classes at what was then known as Orange County State College. They voted to organize as a student body and to assess themselves a fee of \$10 per semester.

"Even when it was decided that 'Titans' would be the nickname, there was confusion as to what it represented," said Becker, "I was thinking of a large mythological figure from Greek history, not unlike Tommy Trojan, but with perhaps straighter, more modern lines. In the same vein, the original dormitories were named Othrys Hall. There were others, however, who related the name to the Titan missile then in prominence."

Nothing official was done about a mascot because no one knew quite what to do. Until, of course, the "First Intercollegiate Elephant Race in Human History."

What began as a practical joke turned into probably the biggest "happening" on the campus to this day. The "gag" attracted elephants from universities around the nation and even Oxford from England. A crowd estimated at more than 10,000 people turned out on "Dumbo Downs" as the hastily graded field became known that spring afternoon in 1962.

To publicize the event, a circus-like elephant called Tuffy the Titan was used and it began appearing on sweaters and notebook covers around the campus. With no other mascot, the elephant was unofficially adopted. Several revisions in the caricature have been

made in recent years to create a more tenacious Tuffy, or Titus as he also was called in an attempt to make him Greek. The costume that brings the elephant mascot to life also has changed as evidenced by the adjacent photographs. Tuffy even attracted a female Tiffy in 1992.

Currently there are two acceptable versions of the logo – a reversed, stylized full elephant for letterhead and a more cartoon-like character for athletic uniforms.

The origin of the school colors also bears discussion. The students voted for royal blue and white when they chose Titans, but the athletic equipment manager at the time thought orange was an appropriate color on uniforms for a school known as Orange County State College. The unofficial color was "adopted" and finally was formally acknowledged by the Athletics Council in 1987. A change to a navy blue in uniforms and printing instead of the "reflex" blue of recent years was initiated in 1992 with a de-emphasis of the orange, originally favored by former Director of Athletics Lynn Eilefson in the mid 1980s.

And, finally, there is the matter of the school's name. As mentioned earlier, the name originally was Orange County State College. It's also been Orange State College and later California State College at Fullerton or California State College, Fullerton. The change to university status necessitated a further change to California State University, Fullerton, but the school's address could not be changed from 800 N. State College Boulevard. To its alumni of more than 120,000, it's simply Cal State Fullerton.

# John Easterbrook Athletic Director, Cal State Fullerton

John Easterbrook is in his sixth year in charge of the Cal State Fullerton athletics department, which has seen continued and easily measured success during his first five years of leadership. The Titans have annually come out in the black budgetarily, on-campus facilities have been dramatically improved and the program continues to lead the way among Big West Conference rivals in post-season success as measured by the annual Sears Cup standings. Four teams have reached NCAA quarterfinals during his tenure topped by the 1995 national championship baseball team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the strength of his experience at a successful Division I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 60, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and chief executive officer of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree (1962) in commerce and law and attended the University of Illinois Law School.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children, four granddaughters and one grandson. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of the Arts and Sciences for Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as mathematician at the University of Chicago's Laboratories of Applied Sciences.

He is the vice chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission and the California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. He also serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of Louisiana.

# Director of Athletic Academic Services, Cal State Fullerton

The Athletic Academic Services department was established at Cal State Fullerton to help ensure the academic success of intercollegiate athletes.

The mission of Athletic Academic Services, according to Assistant Athletic Director Christine McCarthy, is to provide effective support services to help each student reach his or her academic goals.

"We want all of our student-athletes to benefit fully from his or her educational experience at Fullerton," said McCarthy.

The department's many programs and services are directly aimed at this goal. The office is responsible for academic advisement, coordinating study plans, class schedules, study skills workshops, tutoring, study hall, faculty and peer mentoring and referrals to the many campus services available.

The office is staffed by three full-time personnel in McCarthy, Academic Services Coordinator Barbara Kempton and Academic Counselor Mike Miller.

Kempton has been at CSF for more than 30 years and her knowledge of the campus and the athletics department is immensely valuable.

Graduate assistants for the 1999-00 academic year are former Titan athletes Dirk Rassloff (basketball) and Tammi Vories (gymnastics).

Coaches rely on Athletic Academic Services to track student-athletes' progress in classes and to alert them and the students to any potential problems. The department has an "Early Warning" system – periodic grade checks – in place. It encourages faculty members to notify the office if a student is having problems with course work and may require academic support.

Student-athletes at CSF take an average of four and a half years to five years to graduate and some of that success can be credited to Athletic Academic Services. The staff members assist in selecting and registering for classes, referring students to faculty advisors and tracking and evaluating their progress toward graduation. The office's services are available to all past and current student-athletes.

# Big West Baseball Omaha Tradition

Cal State Fullerton brought home the Big West's first national title in 1995. # Reaching the Next Level

Those are just a few names of major leaguers who have played in the Big West Conference. A total of 60 major leaguers have played for teams that currently compete in the Big West. Former Big West member schools have also accounted for a sizable number of players in "The Show."

The Big West produces an annual bumper crop of players in the major league baseball amateur draft that ranks the conference among the highest represented in the nation. In the 1999 MLB amateur draft alone, 21 Big West players were selected by 15 different ballclubs. Seven of those players were selected in the first 10 rounds of the 50-round draft.

# Important Dates in Big West History

July 1, 1969

The desire to form a Division I football conference sparks the formation of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) with seven charter members: Fresno State, Long Beach State, San Jose State, UC Santa Barbara, Pacific, Cal State Los Angeles and San Diego State. The conference sponsors 11 men's sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, swimming & diving, tennis, track & field, water polo and wrestling. J. Kenneth Fagans is named commissioner on a part-time basis.

# June 3, 1976

The conference approves the split of the PCAA baseball league into two leagues separate from the PCAA. The Southern California Baseball Association (SCBA) and the Northern California Baseball Association (NCBA) consist mostly of members of the PCAA and the West Coast Athletic Conference. PCAA Commissioner Jesse Hill agrees to govern the SCBA.

### June 8, 1979

SCBA member Cal State Fullerton wins the NCAA Baseball Championship with a 2-1 victory over Arkansas.

# May 17, 1984

The conference council approves the reformation of PCAA baseball for the 1985 season, thus eliminating the SCBA and the NCBA.

### June 10, 1984

SCBA champion Cal State Fullerton wins its second NCAA Baseball Championship. The Titans prevail over the University of Texas, 3-1.

# July 1, 1988

The conference changes its name from "PCAA" to "Big West Conference."

# May 14, 1995

Cal State Fullerton defeats Long Beach State, 8-4, to claim the title in the inaugural Big West Baseball Tournament in Long Beach, Calif.

### June 10, 1995


Cal State Fullerton claims its third College World Series title with an 11-5 win over USC. The Titans become the first No. 1 seed in College World Series history to win the title. In addition, CSF becomes the 14th team in CWS history to advance through the regionals and series undefeated.

### January 8, 1996

Sacramento State and Cal State Northridge are invited to join the Big West as associate members in softball starting in 1997. Sacramento State's baseball team is invited to join the league as an associate member also in 1997.

# TITAN FIELD

The current and ever-evolving Titan Field became the home of Cal State Fullerton baseball on Apr. 18, 1992, when the Titans swept a doubleheader from Loyola Marymount, 8-2 and 11-3. It is the third on-campus diamond to serve Cal State Fullerton, which also has played "home" games at city parks such as Amerige in Fullerton and Boysen in Anaheim as well as borrowing junior college fields at Fullerton, Santa Ana and Orange Coast Colleges during the installation of lights in 1983.

The first Titan diamond was laid out to the west of Titan House, located to the southeast of the current stadium. Home plate was in the southeast corner of the field plowed out of citrus groves. A new field was built around 1970 on today's site, but with home plate located where the current left field foul pole rises. The largest crowd to see a game at that field, with small portable bleachers and plenty of standing room, was estimated at 5,000 in 1979 when Fullerton hosted the University of Hawai'i and heralded pitcher Derek Tatsuno.

The current stadium boasts 1,540 permanent chairback seats with another 200 spots available on the concrete steps above each dugout. There is ample standing room around the concourse to the left and right of the press box. Structural improvements since the 1992 opening have included construction of permanent restrooms and the base for a press box. The field has been redone several times and a new outfield fence was installed prior to the 1999 season.

Titan Field's playing surface sported a brand-new look for the 1996 season thanks in part to the efforts of the Sports Turf Managers Association led by Steve Guise. The organization donated materials and labor in rebuilding the pitcher's mound and batters' box, along with planting new grass in the outfield. Turface was added to the warning track. Additional landscaping has been placed on the outside of Titan Field, including palm trees along the batting cages in left field.

Construction currently is underway that should provide about 1,000 bleacher seats down each foul line by the end of the 2000 season. The combined baseball-softball project also will provide a first-base-side structure that will include coaches' offices, players' and umpires locker room and clubhouses and a multi-purpose entertainment area. Permanent seating and a new press box for the softball complex also are being built with the softball diamond getting a 90-degree clockwise rotation at the end of the season.






- Mark Kotsay played in 154 games his rookie season and hit .279 with 20 assists.
