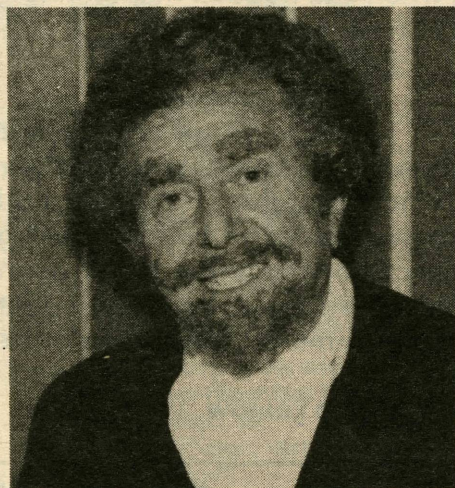


Village Players Produce Comedy

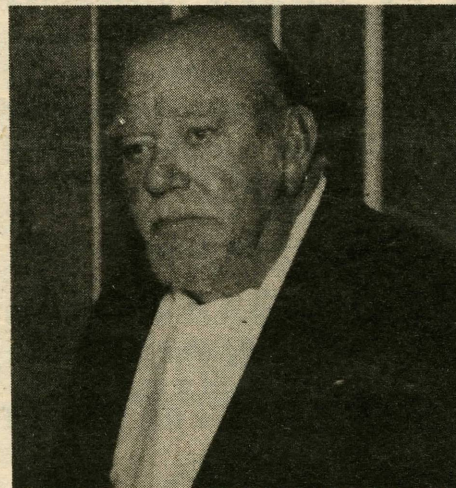
The lead parts were double cast, with each cast performing twice. Both casts were superb. Village players participating were as follows:

What Are They Doing To Our Shrubs?

The Maintenance Department under Supervisor Gary Nottingham has formed pruning crews which are being professionally trained to prune our plants and trees for long-term healthy, attractive landscaping. Therefore, they are pruning--and properly!

This method of pruning ("drop" pruning) is a departure from our past practice of "hedging" by untrained peo-

ple. Recovery from past damage will take time, and for awhile, the plants will look strange. Have patience, please!

Ideally, the right choices of plants should be placed in positions where they can grow without constant attention and pruning except for shaping. We may not have our ideal choices

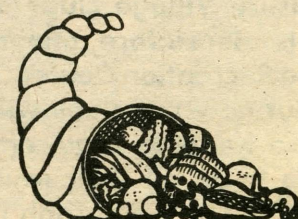

(Expletives Deleted)

Let us be among the first to admit: "Big Brother" did listen--up to a point.

Last month we criticized the action of the Association's Board of Directors at the September meeting in adopting a regulation governing financial record keeping and auditing procedures for clubs, groups and organizations in the Village.

We were particularly concerned that the Finance Committee would be burdened by having to review annual room reservations. We also pointed to the bureaucratic folderol in limiting petty cash disbursements to \$2.00 or less.

As we predicted, when the message sank in, many clubs turned thumbs down on this addition to the Rules and Regulations.

Consequently, the Board met with club presidents and other representatives on October 24th, together with members of the Education and Recreation Committee, "to discuss ... the issue of record keeping and room fee charges." (The latter had been referred back to the Ed. & Rec. Committee on Oct. 3rd for further study.)

A MISTAKE

At the Oct. 24th meeting, after listening to club presidents attack the proposed procedures, it was refreshing to hear the Association president declare: "It was a mistake. We are trying to correct it."

The question, of course, is, What was the mistake and how is it being corrected?

An amended version of ARTICLE XIX, paragraph 19.22, of the "Rules and Regulations" was offered at the Oct. 24th meeting. Apart from certain cosmetic changes, the most notable was the complete elimination of the Finance Committee from the requirement to review annual financial reports of the various clubs, groups and organizations prior to the granting of annual room reservations.

Where was this onerous activity shunted? It was dumped on the Recreation Manager.

Could it be that the Board had received word that the Finance Committee, after listening to testimony from many club representatives at its Oct. 24th meeting, unanimously adopted a motion recommending to the Board that it rescind its action on the financial record keeping requirements?

A THIRD VERSION

Villagers in attendance at the November 7th Board meeting heard the Finance Committee report its resolution, but the Association Board--with not so much as a nod in acknowledgement of the work of the Finance Committee in probing this matter--proceeded to a unanimous vote in favor of a third version of the Record Keeping and Auditing Procedure amendment.

This time the heavy hand of bureaucracy is limited to "approved" clubs, groups and organizations, exempting those with assets under \$100 from certain banking and disbursing requirements.

Let it also be recorded in the dustbin of Village history that the \$2.00 limit on petty cash disbursements went the way of the \$2.00 bill.

Leisure Village clubs are voluntary associations of responsible adults. Heretofore, minimal regulations governed the use of rooms in the Recreation Center. The clubs thrived and the system worked.

But now the clubs will be saddled with the excess baggage of record keeping requirements and filing procedures. And who is going to do all their reviewing and paper-shuffling demanded by ARTICLE XIX, paragraph 19.22?

No wonder the Finance Committee wanted "out"!

Report on Senior Legislature

The Senior Legislature was a unique and electrifying experience for the 40 Senators and 80 Assemblymen elected by seniors throughout California. The committee meetings and the sessions in the Assembly Chambers were all carried on in the same formal manner as the official State Legislators follow. Our indoctrination and procedures were conducted by the presiding officers of the California Senate and the Assembly.

There were eighty-six issues deliberated on, and priorities set for 10 State and 4 Federal proposals. Of the 10, the majority were to correct Long-Term Care problems.

The problem we know least about is Alzheimer's disease. Nationally, the disease is responsible for 50 per cent of all admissions to nursing homes. The costs are about 20 billion dollars a year. It will strike down about 2 1/2 million persons this year, and is the fourth leading cause of death. The disease usually strikes older people, 15% of those over 65; however, some persons in

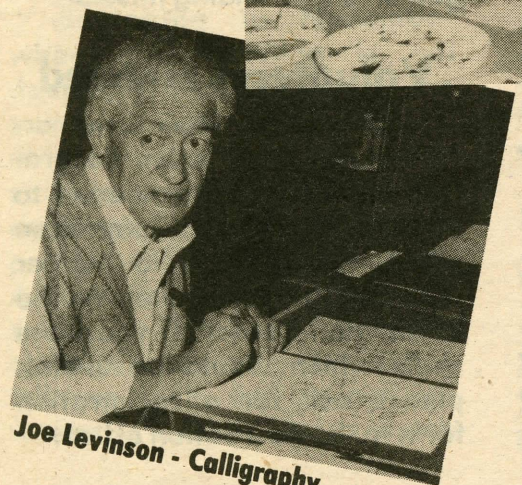

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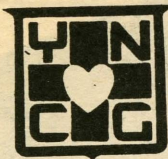

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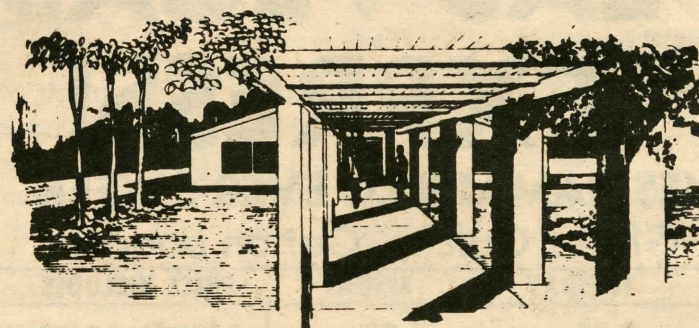

in the planter beds, but we must maintain what we have, despite the cost.

Plants need three essentials: light, air, and moisture. By pruning as in the past, the plants do not get adequate light and air inside the plant in order to produce new leaves and branchlets, therefore the mass becomes dry and dead sticks, with a thin covering of new growth. But growth continues up from the top where they DO get the light and air. Shearing, or "hedging" should be done only on certain types of plants being trained into formal hedges, "living fences," or for a specific purpose.

Beginning in November when grass cutting is not needed so frequently as in the summer, field crews will be able to assist in pruning, re-staking trees, and caring for drainage and other landscape problems that have developed. A partial schedule for pruning, subject to rain and other eventualities, follows. Remaining villages will be pruned in weeks to follow. Please watch

The Senior Legislature has placed this as 3rd priority for legislation to fund some of the five major medical schools in California to set up diagnostic and research centers to help the victims of Alzheimer's disease.

And all as they depart.*



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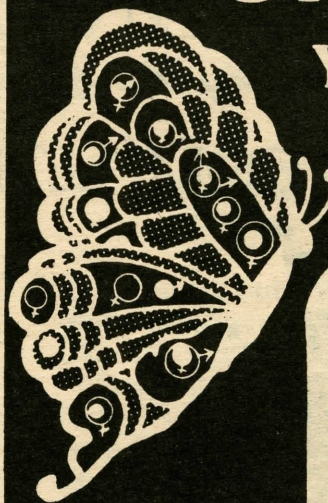
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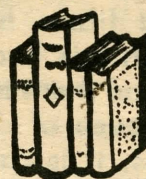
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BOOK REVIEW GROUP

For what we hold most dear in life,

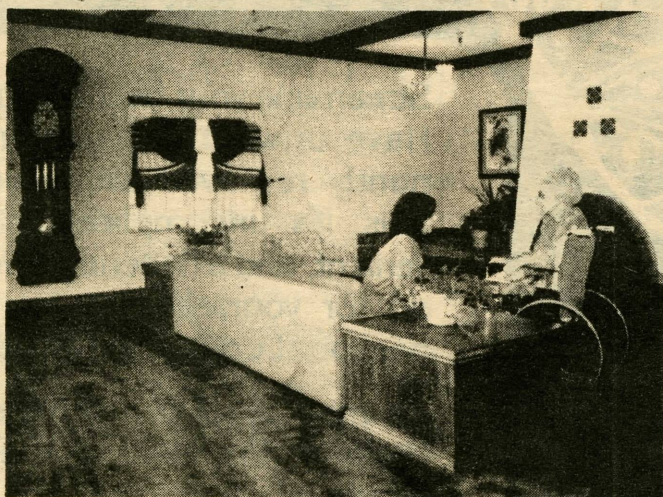
The love of joy and living—

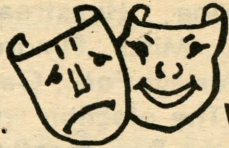

The SDJ Dance Group is honored to be asked to provide the taped music for the annual New Year's Eve dance, sponsored by Susan Norris and the Recreation Department.

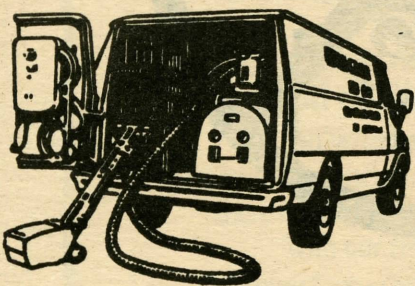
A very pleasant evening was had by all who attended our Oktoberfest dance on October 22.

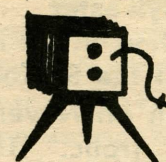
Members are asked to bring a non-perishable food item or a small cash donation to the December meeting to contribute to the Camarillo Community Food Drive for the needy during the holidays.

Our next meeting on December 7 will feature a slide and print competition with Florence Johnston of PSA as the judge.

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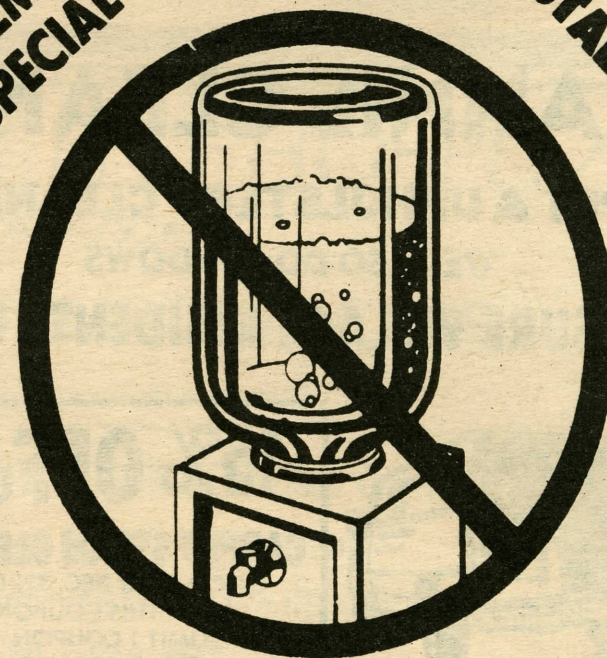
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All Hart

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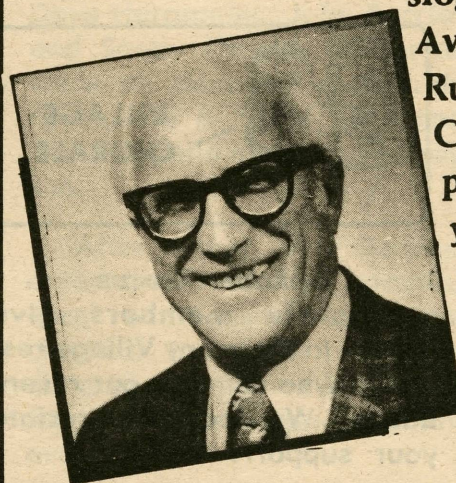
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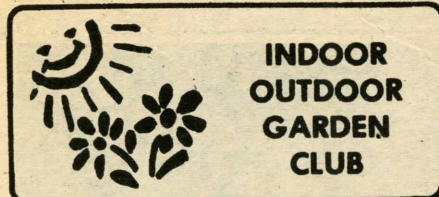
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INDOOR OUTDOOR GARDEN CLUB

Pancake Breakfast Giant Success

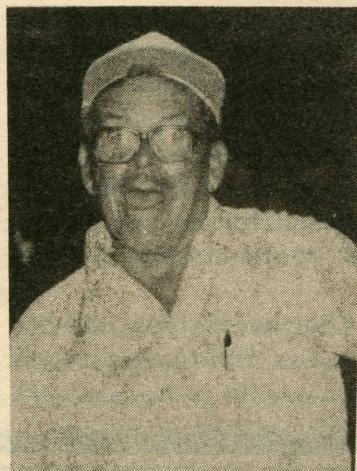
