"It was like finding a lost twin sister," exclaimed Judy, describing that special moment in Seattle last month. They thank Christina's diligence and Facebook for the emotional event.

Decades before, the girls shared everyday details of their lives, some secrets and their dreams for the future over a period of eight years. Their communication was in English, which was very significant to Christina, who wanted to master the language. With dictionary at hand, she read Judy's letters and answered them in English. It worked. Christina has taught English, English literature and Swedish in

In fact, that day we shared our stories of life. Afterward, with a big hug, as if we were old friends, she confided in me that she had never received a hug like that.


A hug shows affection and offers support.


American scientists say a hug has the reverse effect of a cigarette: every time you give or receive a hug, you get a few more minutes of life.



REALTOR CORNER

Home sales in California are up, allcash and investor purchases are down and home prices are rising. The housing market here in Southern California is settling into a more normal, healthy pattern.

Economists say that these factors put this regional housing market on a path for growth that could see some longevity. A recent report also says home sales show an 18.1 percent increase in June from a year earlier, while median prices rose 5.7 percent from June 2014. The sales increase is the largest in nearly three years. Sales and prices climbed in all six Southland counties.

People's confidence to buy houses is also up because of sustained job growth - California added 54,200 jobs in May. As the economy improves, more families are entering a recovering market to buy houses they actually want to live in.

Southern California isn't the only area experiencing this sunny patch in the housing market.

Improvements extend nationally, with sales of previously owned homes up in May to the highest pace in six years. Buyers are rushing to lock in historically low interest rates before the Federal Reserve is set to raise its short-term interest rate later this year. The chief economist for the California Association of Realtors warns that the market has too few homes for sale and that prices have risen to a point again where many can't afford a house. Housing affordability has become a big issue.





A sign of prevention

A new sign has been installed at the West Gate. No, not the large one that says "Welcome Home," although it was posted there just a few months ago. The newest addition is an electronic speed signal, which blinks out how fast oncoming cars are approaching that Village exit.

"That sign will prevent an accident from happening," says LV Board Member Ted Lansing, who says he has a front-row seat from his patio of unsafe driving on our main streets.

"From the stop signs on Leisure Village Drive and on Mountain View Drive, drivers take off so fast; some 'lav rubber' as they head to the gate," he reports. "It's particularly noticeable in the mornings between 7 and 8 a.m."

Village security took a close look at that stretch of roadway and agreed. Drivers emerging from Village 1 and the RV lot, and pedestrians crossing the streets were vulnerable. Vehicles were hitting 30 mph as they approached the gate. The speed sign went up. Security officers have noticed an improvement already.



just like to keep busy." He retired from the Navy in 1970, but has not retired from anything else. Volunteering, hobbies, friends and his faith have filled his years ever since. In 2013, the Camarillo Chamber of Commerce honored his contributions by giving Ben its Senior of the Year

He has two sons: a math teacher in Northern California (the acorn didn't fall far from the tree) and a dentist in Boston. He has a family dinner on Tuesdays with his niece, and every night Ben sets a place in

honor of his late wife, Frances.

Ben believes his mother's advice is at the heart of his longevity and love of life. "She always said to me, 'Be Nice.' That's it, as simple as it sounds. That's what I do," he explains, ever so nicely.

A new home for top-of-the-line fitness in the Village

If you have not yet been inside the Village's new Fitness Center, consider this an advisory. You might think you've mistakenly entered a top-of-the-line spa exercise facility. Spa facility? No. Top-of-the-line? Yes. After years of using old-fashioned exercise machines, Leisure Villagers have a 21st century Fitness Center.

More than twice as large as the previous location, the new facility is outfitted with equipment made specifically for senior exercise — for the fittest 55-year-old to those who use a wheelchair. Useful information about how to use the machines is available via videos on the equipment and easy-to-read posters. Overhead fans and lighting create a bright and comfortable place to work out. Two security cameras now operate in the center as a protection for anyone who may need help and

can't get to the phone.

One thing the new Fitness Center is not is curved, as it appears in the photograph. That picture is a panorama shot taken to show readers the entire view of the facility from the door. The camera technology curves the scene; think of it as squeezing everything into the picture.
