

She was recently chosen by PEN, the foremost leading voice of the international literary community, to pioneer a writing program in Los Angeles inner city schools and was selected to tour nationally as a Road Poet for Lollapalooza '94. Maria Espinosa is a writer and teacher. Her poems and stories have been published in numerous journals and anthologies, and she is the author of two collections of poetry.
