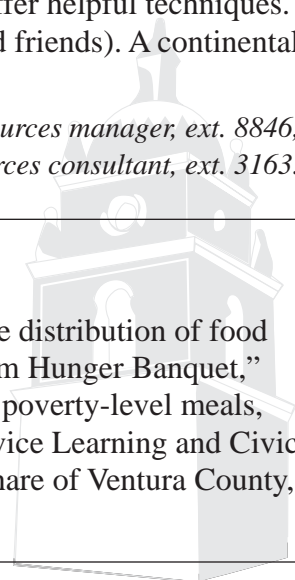
Stress Management Workshop Scheduled for October 4
