# The University

## Cal State Fullerton... where learning is preeminent

California State University, Fullerton plays a major role in the intellectual, cultural and economic lives of Orange County.

Given the charge of teaching as a member of the state's three-tiered system of higher education, Cal State Fullerton does an exceptional job of educating the residents - and future - of Orange County. It prepares highly skilled and well-prepared university graduates.

Now in its 39th year, the university points proudly to its product, approximately 115,000 graduates. With 85 percent of them remaining within a 50-mile radius of campus, they occupy key spots in business, industry, government, the political arena and education.

The university - with its main campus in Fullerton and a branch in Mission Viejo - is one of the county's largest employers and purchasers. Its presence is a key factor in the prosperity and progress of this area. With more than 24,000 students currently enrolled and more than 2,200 faculty and staff employees, it is estimated that Cal State Fullerton impacts the community by \$600 million annually.

With a mission of making learning preeminent, the university's 700 faculty members combine the best qualities of teaching and research universities to work in close collaboration with students and staff to expand knowledge.

The instructional program is offered by seven schools: The Arts; Business Administration and Economics; Communications; Engineering and Computer Science; Human Development and Community Service; Humanities and Social Sciences; and Natural Science and Mathematics.

With full accreditation for its overall program, Cal State Fullerton has national recognition for its programs in art, athletic training, business, chemistry, communications, computer science, dance, engineering, music, nursing, public administration, speech and hearing, teacher education and theater. In all there are 96 degree programs - with 44 of them at the graduate level - plus a wide variety of credential and certificate programs.

Students are provided the best of current practice, theory and research and integrate professional

studies with preparation in the arts and sciences. Through experiences in and out of the classroom, students develop the habit of intellectual inquiry, prepare for challenging professions, strengthen relationships to their communities, and contribute productively to society.

Cal State Fullerton is the most affordable and ethnically diverse university in the area. It ranks 16th nationally in the total overall number of minorities who graduate, with a ranking of 12th for both Asians and Hispanics (No. 3 for both in Communications and No. 4 for Asians in both Education and Business). In California, the university is No. 1 for awarding undergraduate degrees in business and management to Hispanic and Native Americans, and communications degrees to Hispanic, Asian and Native Americans. A No. 2 ranking is held in California for undergraduate education degrees to Hispanic Ameri-

An extended education program, with open enrollment, offers individual courses, seminars and workshops, as well as 31 certificate programs ranging from entrepre-

neurship and sales management to creative writing. Classes are held evenings and weekends both on-and off-campus.

Community members also may visit campus for theater, music and dance performances and art exhibits of off-campus artists, plus those of university students and faculty members. While here, both the Fullerton Arboretum and Heritage House are worth touring. And, an extensive recreation program is aimed chiefly at students, but is open to the public.

Volunteer opportunities are open through Cal State Fullerton's many support groups, such as the Art Alliance, Music Associates, Patrons of the Library and President's Associates.

One such group, Continuing Learning Experience, holds many of its programs in the Ruby Gerontology Center, for which it spearheaded the fund-raising campaign. The center serves as an educational and research facility for the study of successful aging.

In less than four decades, Cal State Fullerton has taken its place as a primary force in the growth and prosperity of Southern California.

# **Administration**

Dr. Milton A. Gordon, President



Dr. Milton A. Gordon was selected the fourth president of Cal State Fullerton by The California State University Board of Trustees and assumed his duties on Aug. 6, 1990.

His university leadership includes serving as vice president for academic affairs at Sonoma State University for four years, as dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Chicago State University for more than eight years and as director of the Afro-American Studies Program at Loyola University of Chicago for six years.

President Gordon also taught at the Illinois Institute of Technology and in the Chicago public schools and served as a mathematician at the University of Chicago's Labor-atories of Applied Sciences.

He is the Big West Conference representative to and vice-chairman of the NCAA Presidents Commission, California state representative to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities and serves on the governing boards of the National Conference of Christians and Jews, California Coalition for Mathematics, Orange County Chamber of Commerce, Orange County Community Foundation, United Way of Orange County, YMCA of Orange County and Fullerton Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he is on the advisory boards of St. Jude Medical Center and The California State University's Institute for Teaching and Learning.

The President has a Ph.D. in mathematics from the Illinois Institute of Technology, an M.A. in mathematics from the University of Detroit and a B.A. in mathematics and secondary education from Xavier University of New Orleans, Louisiana.

#### John Easterbrook, Director of Athletics

John Easterbrook is in his fourth year in charge of the athletic department riding the momentum of a most noteworthy first three years. Under his leadership, the Titans have come out in the black budgetarily and had three teams gain the national quarterfinals led by the 1995 NCAA championship baseball team and the 1994 men's soccer team.

Easterbrook was appointed on Sept. 1, 1994, by President Milton Gordon. He was chosen from a field of 41 candidates on the



strength of his experience at a successful Div. I program and his familiarity with the California State University system as an associate athletic director for nine years at Fresno State. Easterbrook, 58, was involved primarily in compliance, facilities and event management at Fresno State, which annually draws more than 500,000 fans to athletic events.

Easterbrook was hired at Fresno State by Dr. Gary Cunningham. The pair had crossed paths at the University of Wyoming in Laramie where Easterbrook was the president and CEO of American National Bank and Cunningham was the UW athletic director.

Easterbrook previously coached college football for 13 seasons at Idaho, Oregon State, Illinois and Wyoming. He was a three-year starter at quarterback and also played two seasons of basketball at Illinois. He was the Most Valuable Player of the Copper Bowl. He earned a bachelor's degree in commerce and law and attended law school for two years before entering coaching.

The Champaign, Illinois, native and his wife, Cynthia, have three adult children and three granddaughters. John and his two sons are avid golfers.

# The City of Fullerton

The City of Fullerton was born of the railroads, grew because of oil and citrus, reached adulthood after World War II and is now maturing as an educational center of urbanized Orange County. It is located about 30 miles southeast of downtown Los Angeles and about 20 miles inland from the beaches of the Pacific Ocean.

The first settlers were an Indian tribe known as the Gabrielenos, who were on hand when the first Spanish explorers arrived in 1769.

By the 1830s, the expanses of mustard fields and cactus became part of a vast 35,000-acre grant of

Juan Pacific Ontiveras, who sold off the land to newcomers from the eastern United States.

The Amerige brothers, George and Edward, entered the picture in 1887 when they heard rumors of the coming of the California Central Railroad. They bought up land and offered a free right of way to George H. Fullerton, president of the Pacific Land and Improvement Co., a Santa Fe Railway subsidiary. They laid out the town from a stake at what is now downtown, Commonwealth and Harbor Blvd., and named it in honor of its benefactor.

Charles Chapman, a descendant

of legendary "Johnny Appleseed," revolutionized the exploding citrus industry by introducing the Valencia orange. Under the same rich agriculture ground, oil was discovered and by 1912, wells extended for 12 miles along the Fullerton hills into what is now Brea.

The city was incorporated in 1904 and Chapman was the first mayor. An airfield was established in 1927 and the Fullerton Municipal Airport remains a busy general aviation fa-

families. As that growth cycle slowed, the city was able to concentrate on providing the necessary amenities and educational opportunities blossomed.

Cal State Fullerton joined Fullerton College, which was established in 1913, and it was followed by Western States College of Law, Southern California College of Optometry and Pacific Christian College, now part of Hope International University. All are within a 2-mile radius in the east part of town.

# **Cal State Fullerton Athletics**

Obstacles and adversity. Grass-roots support and coaches with "sandwich board" signs. Stunning upsets and courageous performances. All have been a part of Cal State Fullerton athletics as "Titan Pride" has taken limited resources to athletic successes disproportionate to such a young institution.

How many universities can claim 11 national championships in seven different sports, a perennial All-Starmajorleague third baseman, baseball players and men and women basketball players in the Olympics, two rookies in the Super Bowl, a Miss America candidate, the subject matter of a Walt Disney feature film and the first player selected in the major league draft?

The tenor was set by the first intercollegiate team - men's basket-ball. In only their second season, Coach Alex Omalev advanced the Titans five rounds into the NAIA national playoffs in 1961-62.

Sixteen seasons later, the entire nation watched another "cinderella" Titan Five advance within one victory of the "Final Four" as Bobby Dye's 1977-78 team won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association post-season tournament and then beat nationally ranked New Mexico and USF to gain the finals of the Western Regional.

The basketball tradition, which included a women's national title in 1970 and Coach Billie Moore and star Nancy Dunkle on the women's 1976 Olympic team, was continued in 1984 as Leon Wood helped the men to a gold medal before he became a first-round NBA draft choice. Coach George McQuarn's teams were usually factors in the PCAA race and had national Top 20 rankings and a victory over the nation's No. 1-ranked and undefeated team to their credit. Fullerton, which seemingly special-

ized in last-second wins in 1988-89 behind 1995 NBA All-Star forward Cedric Ceballos of the Phoenix Suns, also has competed twice in the post-season NIT Tournament while the women have recently been in both the WNIT and NCAA fields. In 1991, Genia Miller was selected a Kodak All-America after ranking No. 2 in the nation in scoring and blocked shots and No. 7 in rebounding. In 1993-94, Autumn Hollyfield was the nation's top 3-point field goal shooter and in 1994-95, Koko Lahanas led the nation in scoring.

Gymnastics has brought Fullerton more fame. Former men's Coach Dick Wolfe won three college division titles (1971, 1972 and 1974) and had recent teams in the Top Ten at the Division I level while winning 10 PCAA titles in a row. His 1987 squad was ranked No. 1 in the nation led by former Chinese Olympian Li Xiao Ping. Lynn Rogers began the women's program in 1976 and the Titans have finished sixth or better in the nation 12 times and won the national title in 1979. One-armed Carol Johnston was an All-American and star of the Disney film, "Lefty," while Tami Elliott (1984-86) won 10 All-American awards before becoming Miss Virginia and competing in the Miss America pageant.

Baseball exploded on the national scene by breaking the USC monopoly in the western regionals in 1975. The Titans won the national title in 1979 behind the play of Tim Wallach, recently retired from the Los Angeles Dodgers. They won the College World Series again in 1984 with players such as CWS Most Valuable Player John Fishel. Coach Augie Garrido directed a national second-place finish in 1992 and a key member of that team, third baseman Phil Nevin, was selected as the No. 1 pick in the amateur draft by the Houston Astros. The Titans placed third in the CWS in 1994 and came back with their best season ever in 1995, posting a 57-9 mark en route to their third national championship, led by player of the year Mark Kotsay.

Five baseball players have become Olympians with Kotsay and Brian Loyd helping the U.S. win a bronze medal in 1996 in Atlanta. Nevin, Jason Moler and Bob Caffrey are the other Olympians who have gone through the Cal State Fullerton baseball program.

Women have sparkled on the Fullerton diamonds, too. Coach Judi Garman founded the softball program in 1980 and the Titans have been a powerhouse, making eight trips to the College World Series and 17 consecutive regional appearances. The Titans brought home their first NCAA Championship in 1986 and often have been ranked No. 1 in the country.

Titan softball players Missy Coombes, Sue Lewis and Chris Zboril were trailblazers in professional playing endeavors, Coombes with the Silver Bullets minor league baseball franchise and Lewis and Zboril with the women's professional fastpitch league.

There have been national titles in men's cross country and women's fencing and individual standouts like golfer Martha Wilkerson, runner Mark Covert and wrestler Laszlo Molnar, who finished second in the nation in 1994 at 167 pounds. Heather Killeen became the Titans' first Div. I cross country All-American in 1994 and then won three

events at the 1995 Big West Conference track championships. She was one of 10 finalists for 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year.

The now-defunct football program made great strides in Division I-A after its humble Division II beginnings. Gene Murphy guided the Titans to two conference championships and four runnerup finishes between 1983 and 1989. Titan products included Super Bowl rookies Bobby Kemp (Cincinnati in 1982) and Mark Collins (New York Giants in 1987). Titans have starred in the Canadian Football League led by single-season receiving record holder Allen Pitts of Calgary, 1995 MVP Mike Pringle of Baltimore and perennial quarterback star Damon Allen, the younger brother of the Kansas City Chiefs' Marcus Allen.

With the loss of the football program, Head Coach Al Mistri's soccer program has tried to fill the void in Titan Stadium. A new women's program was launched in 1993 and it coincided with a memorable men's season that saw the Titans move as high as No. 3 in the national rankings behind All-American forward Eddie Soto and compete at the NCAA Final Four in Davidson, North Carolina.

The 1994 team advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals after hosting and winning in the first two rounds. The 1996 team was ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament by beating No. 1 UCLA.

# **History of Cal State Fullerton Softball**

The history of Cal State Fullerton softball begins in 1979 with the Administration's decision to add the sport to the University's list of Division I competitors. Judi Garman, coach of the very-successful Golden West Rustlers, is hired while Linda Shafor is named the program's first assistant coach.

1980 Pam Edde, a pitcher from Utah State, and Pam Knox, a shortstop who played two years at Golden West and a season at the University of Arizona, transfer to Cal State Fullerton and a local product - Janet Lloyd from Tustin High School - commits to Fullerton and the upstart Titans are ranked as high as 7th in the coaches' pre-season poll.

After compiling a 37 - 29 season record, the Titans earn a trip to the Western AIAW regionals in Fresno, where the Titans eliminate defending national champions UCLA when UCLA makes an illegal defensive substitution in the bottom of the seventh inning. The Titans go to the AIAW College World Series in their first year and finish 9th out of 32.

1981 Terry Keasling and Sue Lewis along with new Assistant Coach Jan Dunlap, arrive at Fullerton and help the team to a 60 - 14 record including a sweep at the Western regional. They earn a return trip to the AIAW College World Series.

In the first game Janet Lloyd, recovering from knee surgery, hits a dramatic threerun home run in the bottom of the seventh with two outs and an 0-2 count to rally for a 7-6 come-from-behind win over New Mexico State.

In game 2, Terry Keasling steals the spotlight by pitching a two-hit shutout, striking out 13 batters and hitting a two-run home run in the bottom of the 15th inning to beat Western Michigan, 2-0.

In game 5, freshman Sue Lewis hits a pair of home runs to defeat UCLA, 5-4, to advance the Titans to the Championship Game. (The Titans complete a six-game sweep over the Bruins in 1981.)

After losing to Fullerton, 6-1, to force the double-elimination tournament to a final Championship Game, Utah State survives a seventh-inning rally by the Titans for a 4-3 victory. Cal State Fullerton finishes as the No. 2 team in the nation in only its second year.

Pam Edde, Sue Lewis and Janet Lloyd are named to the All-America team and Terry Keasling establishes the single-season record for strikeouts among Titan pitchers in a season, fanning 328 batters.

The 1981 team travels to Sweden at season's end, beginning a tradition of excursion excellence.

1982 Kathy Van Wyk joins the team when Defending Champion Texas Woman's University drops softball. She compiles an incredible NCAA record 33 consecutive wins in a season - still the

record - on her way to a 35 - 1 record, with a 0.18 ERA.

The Titans compile a 55-6-2 record and earn a trip to the first-ever NCAA College World Series where Cal State Fullerton finishes 3rd.

Kathy Van Wyk wins the Broderick Award (national player of the year) and is named to the All-America team, along with Sue Lewis. Terry Keasling finishes her two-year career with a 13-3 record and her average of eight strikeouts per seven innings pitched still ranks her sixth on the all-time NCAA list for career strikeout ratio. Additionally, Lewis leads the nation in home runs and RBI - 9 and 50, respectively.

1983 JoAnn Ferrieri, Elise King and Susan LeFebvre begin their careers as Titans and Kathy Van Wyk becomes the program's third assistant coach. Cal State Fullerton finishes 56-15 overall and 17-3 in a tie with UCLA for 1st place of the WCAA Conference.

The Titans defeat the University of New Mexico in the West Regional to advance to their fourth-straight College World Series. They beat Indiana, South Carolina and UCLA to advance to the Championship Game against Texas A&M, where they lose to the Aggies, 2-0. It is the program's second appearance in the Championship Game in only four years.

Elise King and Susan LeFebvre are selected to the All-America team.

1984 Debbie Mygind begins her Fullerton career and combines with Susan LeFebvre and Lori Neff for a 54-12 record as the Titans qualify for their fifth consecutive post-season appearance. Although the Titans lose to Defending Champion Texas A&M in the Western Regional, Titan Sue Lewis is selected to the All-America team for the third time. She becomes the only Titan to accomplish this feat.

1985 Terri Oberg begins her twoyear Titan career. A return trip to the College World Series pits the Titans against their old rivals, the Bruins of UCLA. The Titans had already suffered a loss at the hands of Nebraska when the Bruins beat the Titans, 1-0, in a game which landed Fullerton in the No. 3 spot for the tournament. However, after UCLA beat the Cornhuskers in the Championship Game, it was determined that Nebraska had used an illegal player throughout the CWS. Although the NCAA record book doesn't reflect it, Cal State Fullerton claims its third No. 2 finish.

Debbie Mygind, JoAnn Ferrieri and Terri Oberg are selected All-America.

1986 Connie Clark and Chenita Rogers begin their careers at Fullerton.

After one ninth-place, one third-place and three second-place finishes, Cal State Fullerton finishes the 1986 season with the NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP. Be-

hind the strong pitching of Susan LeFebvre, Connie Clark and **April Jones**, the Titans finish with a 57-9 record.

In Game 1 at the College World Series the Titans defeat Long Beach State in what proved to be the most difficult game of the series for Fullerton. Connie Clark pitches a four-hit shutout in the nine inning game. Alani Silva leads off the ninth inning with a double and Robin Goodin advances her to third. Rina Foster drills a single up the middle to knock in the winning run.

LeFebvre pitches a one-hit shutout over Cal in the second game of the series and the Titans beat the Bears, 3-0. The third game was highlighted by a no-hitter from Clark, her second of the season over the Aggies, and the Titans beat Texas A&M, 3-0. Riding a streak, Fullerton faces Indiana in one semi-final game and for the first - and only time in the series - the Titans are scored on. But LeFebvre and the Titans prevail and take the game, 3-1, to set up the Championship Game - Cal State Fullerton vs. Texas A&M. Clark pitches a onehit shutout and the Titans score in the fifth inning when Rina Foster triples and scores the winning run on a fielder's choice on the next play. Fullerton adds two more and wins its first national title, 3-0. The Titans tie a CWS record by going undefeated in the tournament.

Susan LeFebvre culminates a brilliant Titan career, receives the Broderick Award and joins teammate Chenita Rogers on the All-America team. Still the career leader in wins with 100, games played with 149, shutouts with 59, strikeouts wih 702 and innings pitched with 894.2, LeFebvre remains on the NCAA top 20 list for season-best ERA with a 0.23 average in her freshman season, 1983.

1987 Missy Coombes, Valerie Douglas and Carey Hess begin Titan careers and Connie Clark returns for her senior year. The Titans finish 59-10 and earn a trip back to the CWS to defend their championship.

Cal State Fullerton defeats Florida State 3-0 in Game 1 of the CWS to set up a rematch of the 1986 Championship Game, the Titans and the Aggies. In what many people consider the greatest softball game in CWS history, the country's two best pitchers, Clark and Shawn Andaya, pitch 13 innings. Deadlocked 0-0 through ten innings (including two tie-breaker innings), the Aggies got on the board in the top of the eleventh. But, in Fullerton's half of the inning, Foster opens at second, is sacrificed to third and, with two outs, Missy Coombes drives Foster in with an infield single. The effort continues deadlocked at 1-1 until the 13th inning when Andaya herself scores the winning run for the Aggies. After 13 innings, the 3 hour and 25 minute contest is over.

A tired Titan team takes the field the next afternoon and defeats Fresno State, 2-1. Going into the bottom of the seventh ining down by one run, the Titans rally with an opening single by Alani Silva. Michelle

Gromacki reaches on an error. After a failed sacrifice attempt, the Titans have one out, Gromacki at second and Charis Monroe at first. Then, with one out, Cathi Hall, in the biggest hit of her collegiate career, doubles off the wall to score Gromacki. Chenita Rogers sends a sacrifice fly to deep right and the Titans come from behind to beat the Bulldogs.

Playing that same night, the Titans face familiar rivals UCLA. The Titans are unable to beat the Bruins and settle for a third-place finish. (Texas A&M goes on to beat the Bruins twice the following day to record its second national title.)

Connie Clark pitches every game and inning of the CWS and is awarded the Broderick Award, the third time a Titan pitcher has been given the honor. She is joined by Chenita Rogers on the All-America team, her second selection. Rogers leads the nation in hits with 89 and posts a .401 batting average.

1988 Marty Rubinoff becomes the fourth Titan assistant coach and Mich DeBree becomes a Titan. Fullerton uses four young pitchers throughout the season who combine for a 52-20 record and a third-place finish in the final season of the PCAA Conference. (The conference becomes the Big West for the 1989 season.) In a difficult West Regional, the Titans draw eventual National Champion UCLA and lose in a best-of three format.

Valerie Douglas is selected to the All-America squad.

1989 Ann Van Dortrecht begins her pitching career for the Titans. Fullerton posts a 47-15 record and finishes 28-8 in second place in the Big West. The Titans draw cross-town rivals Cal Poly Pomona in the NCAA West Regional and are knocked out by the Broncos.

Missy Coombes and Carey Hess are named to the All-America team. Additionally, Hess leads the nation with 52 runs scored.

1990 Joy Tiner becomes a Titan and Kathy Van Wyk returns as an assistant coach. The Titans finish 45-23, 22-13, good for third place in the Big West and draw Long Beach State for the West Regional. Both teams were ranked in the top five. After beating Long Beach State, 3-2, on the opening night, the Titans suffer a 4-0 defeat and then a difficult 2-1 loss in 16 innings to the 49ers. It is the eleventh consecutive year that the Titans compete in post-season play.

Joy Tiner and Ann Van Dortrecht are chosen to the All-America squad.

1991 **Tiffany Boyd** arrives at Fullerton and the tradition of Fullerton pitching dominance continues as she and Van

Dortrecht combine for most of the Titans' 52-16-1 record and Cal State Fullerton finishes 25-9-1 in the Big West. Again, Cal State Fullerton qualifies for post-season play and for the second time loses a best-of-three series to Long Beach State. However, the Big West has three teams - Long Beach State, Fresno State and UNLV representing it at the CWS.

Tiffany Boyd and Mich DeBree are selected to the All-America team.

1992 **Denise DeWalt** selects Cal State Fullerton and the Titans post a 45-20 record and a 25-11, second-place finish in the Big West. Tiffany Boyd is named Conference Pitcher of the Year and DeWalt is named Conference Field Player of the Year. But, for the third year in a row, the Titans are eliminated after qualifying for post-season play by Long Beach State in a best-of-three series.

Tiffany Boyd and Denise DeWalt are chosen members of the All-America team.

1993 **Traci Fischer** begins her career at Fullerton after sitting out most of the 1992 season as a medical redshirt. The Titans use four pitchers to combine for a 37-21 record and take second place in the Big West. Fullerton qualifies for the West Regional and is sent to UCLA for another best-of-three series. The Defending Champion Bruins down the Titans and return to the CWS where UCLA loses to Arizona. (Winning pitcher-**Susie Parra**.)

Denise DeWalt posts a .418 batting average and is selected to the All-America team. DeWalt's career .396 average marks the all-time best for the Titans.

The "yellow ball" is introduced in collegiate softball. Three pitchers, led by Jennifer Mortensen and Trinity Johnson, combine for a 35-29 record and the Titans place third in conference play. Participating at the NCAA Regionals at Cal State Northridge, Cal State Fullerton is a part of a four-team Regional. The Titans beat Washington in the first game, 2-1, then lose to Northridge in game 2. The Titans beat Washington again, 4-0, and Northridge, 2-0, to force a final showdown between the Titans and the Matadors. Johnson takes the loss as CSUN bests Fullerton, 4-0, to advance to the CWS.

1995 Chris Zboril begins her career as a Titan and Michelle Gromacki returns as the program's fifth assistant coach. Also, Melanie Roche becomes the program's first pitching-only coach. Cal State Fullerton posts a 46-17 overall record and a 20-8 Big West mark, good for second place. The Titans draw a return trip to Northridge for the NCAA Regional with CSUN, Missouri and Illinois State. Shaking off seven years of regional frustrations, the Titans blast Illinois State in the opener, 9-1, and then beat Northridge twice, 1-0 and 2-1, to gain a berth as one of the final eight in the CWS at Oklahoma.

The Titans beat first-place conference foe UNLV, 1-0, and then lose to two-time Defending Champion, Arizona, 11-0, and to Iowa. 6-5. to finish fifth.

Chris Zboril is named to the All-America team. It is Cal State Fullerton's 26th berth on the squad, and the 20th player so chosen.

1996 Susie Parra joins the Titans' staff as pitching coach. In this Olympic year, the Titans travel to New Zealand and Australia to participate in exhibition softball in an international setting.

On the strength of two young pitchers and a barrage of veteran offensive talent, Cal State Fullerton finishes 41-28 overall and 17-15 in fourth place in the Big West. The Titans bid, and receive, the NCAA West Regional and play host to Northridge, UCLA and Southwestern Missouri State. It is the 17th consecutive year that the Titans qualify for post-season play.

The Bruins and Titans meet for the first time in three years and for the first time in the newly expanded Titan Softball Complex. Chris Zboril leads off the game for the visiting Titans (by seeding) with a home run, followed by another by Traci Fischer and the Titans don't look back as they hand the Bruins a 5-1 defeat in front

of a crowd of 551 for the afternoon affair. The Titans continue their roll as they greet Northridge with 9 runs in the first inning and an 11-0 mercy rule pounding. The first inning is capped by a Zboril grand slam. But the Titans' offense falters and their pitching inexperience shows when Fullerton loses its surprising bid to return to the CWS as the Bruins beat the Titans, 14-1, and 7-2, to advance to the CWS.

Traci Fischer is selected to the All-West Regional team and the Titans finish the season with a ninth-place Coaches Poll nod.

1997 The season features the most newcomers a Fullerton team has ever fielded, but the Titans go 29-26 on the year. Although the squad isdissappointed by not making post-season play for the first time in the history of the program, 1997 is not without highlights.

Donna Coombes throws a perfect game as the Titans defeat Purdue at the Florida Tournament and Fullerton goes on to capture the crown there.

The Titans get off to their worst conference start, 0-6, but never give up, battling to conclude the season with a split with Long Beach State, eventual Big West Champions. Second baseman Nikki Hart

is named to the 1997 All-Big West Team, along with shortstop Julie Williams. Outfielder Rachel Olvera is named to the second team and pitcher/utility player Jana Oetgen earns Honorable Mention.

Cal State Fullerton has produced a professional baseball player (Missy Coombes of the Silver Bullets) and at least 26 former players who are still involved with softball as international players or coaches, collegiate and high school coaches, athletic trainers or sports information professionals. Titan teams and players have traveled all over the world as players or coaches and have influenced the international softball community with their knowledge and experience.

The history of Titan softball includes a National Championship, three second-place finishes, three Broderick Award winners (now called the Honda/Broderick Award), 26 All-Americans and dozens of all-conference and all-region selections. Additionally, it includes countless individual highlights and memories.

Cal State Fullerton is one of only four schools to win the NCAA Championship and has participated in post-season play 17 of 18 years.

## 1998 Season Preview

The nucleus of a good team returns. Although Cal State Fullerton's 29-26 record in 1997 was dissappointing for the Titans, there were bright spots. The youth of the program – no seniors, four juniors, seven sophomores and eight freshmen – matured by mid-season to yield a team that, despite losing 11 of its first 17 games, would not give up.

Evidence of that? In the final game with no realistic hope of post-season play, the Titans were down 6-1 heading into the bottom of the seventh. Instead of retreating into season's end, Fullerton rallied, scoring four runs on scattered hits, and came up one run short, 6-5. The half inning took over 20 minutes, with no Titan player ready to throw in the towel.

Returning are two pitchers who at times were brilliant and at times were human. **Donna Coombes** ended the season with an 11-11 record, but threw the only perfect game in the 90's for Fullerton on Feb. 23 against Purdue. **Jana Oetgen** finished the season with a 16-13 record, a 2.33 ERA and a .299 batting average on 40-of-134 hitting.

Returning are 11 other players who, combined, out-hit the opponents, .285 to .265, over the course of the season. Leading the offensive charge will be sophomore catcher **Dara Marzolo**, who finished with a .346 average, 3 home runs, 7 doubles, 2

triples and 23 RBI; sophomore centerfielder Rachel Olvera, who hit .329 and stole 14 of 18 bases; junior second baseman Nikki Hart, who wound up with a .312 average and a team-leading 15 doubles; and junior outfielder Wendi Griffin, who hit .281 last season and earned MVP honors at the ASA nationals in the summer. Christy Sears, the Titans' starting third baseman who suffered a knee injury down the stretch, has been cleared to play. Carrie Davis, another of the Titan speedsters who stole 9 of 10 bases, had been sidelined due to a shoulder injury which has healed.

Jessica Maloney, Kate Degener, Rocky Medina, and Linda Anderson all return to the Fullerton squad after providing key support and leadership throughout the 1997 season.

Newcomers to the team are pitchers Chrissy Hartman, a three-time all-Orange League selection from Magnolia High in Anaheim, who also hit for a .467 average and Kati Franck, who led Yosemite High in Oakhurst (north of Fresno) to two CIF titles. Her three-year record of 61-8 included six no-hitters, a 0.50 ERA and 504 strikeouts in 435 1/3 innings.

An infusion of talent from transfers (Oetgen and Hart) last season helped Fullerton. This year Cal State Fullerton adds sophomore **Kristy**  Osborne to its roster. Osborne, from La Mirada High School, played a season at Fullerton JC before moving on to Oklahoma State. A knee injury prevented her from seeing action as a Cowgirl.

Juniors Christa Saindon and Stacy Pierson join the Titans after outstanding junior college careers at Cypress and Chabot Colleges, respectively. Saindon holds five career batting records at Cypress and was a member of the United States' gold-medal winning team in the 1995 Junior World Games while Pierson was a two-time conference player of the year and twice won second-team All-American honors.

Freshmen Brenda Iglesias from Sierra Vista High and Julie Giambi round out the newcomers. Iglesias was a two-time Montview League Most Valuable Player who batted .582 with seven home runs in only 55 at bats. Giambi was a four-year starter on the South Hills High School team and is the younger sister of Jason of the Oakland A's and Jeremy, who was a member of Cal State Fullerton's 1995 College World Series Championship baseball team.

The Titans hope to add the services of **Stephenie Little**, a junior catcher who played two seasons at Oklahoma State, 1995-1996. She joined the team in the Spring.

## **Head Coach Judi Garman**



Selected as a recipient of the 1995 Woman of Excellence in Sports Award, Judi Garman was honored by the Orange County community for her efforts to provide opportunity for girls and women to participate in softball. As she enters her 18th season at Cal State Fullerton, Garman's reputation as a mainstay at the institution and in the sport precedes her. Consider: Since establishing the softball program in 1980, the Titans have participated in post-season play every year; Garman has helped to raise over \$750,000 to provide opportunities for girls in the

sport; she is a sought-after speaker across the nation and abroad; and, many of her student/athletes have represented the United States in international competition.

Long regarded as one of the top softball coaches in the nation, Judi Garman saw that reputation permanently acknowledged on Dec. 4, 1993, when she was elected to the National Softball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

The nation's winningest collegiate coach, Garman reached a milestone on March 7, 1996 when she won her 1,000th game — 1-0 over Long Beach State. The first 211 victories came at Golden West Junior College from 1972 through 1979.

Her Cal State Fullerton career record is 845-318-4 (.726) and her career mark is 1,027-332-4 (.756) including eight seasons at Golden West. The Hall of Fame induction is only the latest in a seemingly endless stream of honors and accomplishments for Garman, who established the CSUF softball program in 1980 and only once has placed lower than ninth in the nation in her 18 seasons.

Her inaugural team finished third in the conference, second in the region and ninth in the AIAW Tournament. Since then, Garman's teams have won or shared eight conference titles and seven regional championships while finishing second in the College World Series in 1981, 1983 and 1985; third in 1982 and 1987; fifth in 1995 and winning the 1986 NCAA Championship.

Garman's accomplishments stretch across the continent from Canada to Santa Barbara to Golden West College to Cal State Fullerton.

She earned her bachelor's degree from the University of Saskatchewan in 1966 and moved to California where she began working on her master's degree at UCSB. While at Santa Barbara, she started club softball and soon had a varsity team.

Upon completion of her studies, she took the women's athletic director position at Westmont College in Santa Barbara and coached the volleyball, basketball and tennis programs in addition to softball.

Garman moved to Golden West College where, along with softball, she coached basketball (1973-76) and cross country (1977-79). Garman coached the Rustlers' softball team to an unprecedented four consecutive national championships (1975-78) while compiling a record of 211-40 (1972-79). Twenty-one of her softball players received scholarships to four-year institutions. Due to those outstanding feats at GWC she was named to the California Community College Hall of Fame in 1992.

An established player, she was a Canadian all-star outfielder and member of two Canadian National Teams - the Saskatoon Imperials. Additionally, she was a member of the Imperial team which represented Canada at the World Championships held in Osaka, Japan in 1970.

When she came to Fullerton there was no on-campus diamond. Her first five teams called a municipal facility at Lions Field their home diamond until an outstanding two-diamond complex with lights was constructed as part of a joint venture with the city of Fullerton.

Very involved professionally, Garman served a two-year reign as president of the National Softball Coaches Association from 1990-1991. Each year she hosts clinics which bring over 200 coaches and 1,500 players to the campus. Additionally, she has produced highly successful pitching video tapes with acclaimed pitching coach Don Sarno.

In February, 1991, Garman was honored at the Fifth Annual National Girls and Women in Sports Luncheon sponsored by the Amateur Athletic Foundation of Los Angeles for her contribution to collegiate athletics in Southern California.

A popular speaker at clinics around the country, Garman has also made numerous trips abroad to Sweden, Holland, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Japan and, most recently, Australia. She runs a camp each summer in Italy.

Fishing and snow skiing in Aspen occupy Garman's time away from the softball field. She also has numerous business interests and is actually involved in running a family business in Canada that manufactures moccasins.

Her sister, Lorraine Garman Klippel, was twice named the LPGA professional of the year for her accomplishments as the head pro/owner at Bumble Bee Hollow golf club in Mechanicsburg, Pa.

## **Assistant Coach Michelle Gromacki**



Michelle Gromacki, a former allconference catcher at Cal State Fullerton and a former member of several gold-medal winning USA teams, returns for a fourth year on the Titan coaching staff for 1998.

"Michelle brings a lot of positive energy to our program and as a current player she provides a great working example," said Garman. "Her experiences on both the national and international level mean that she will bring the latest techniques and a winning attitude to our program."

After playing the 1984 season at Butte Community College in her native northern California, Gromacki was a reserve for the Titans in 1985 and then the starter the next two years as Fullerton won the national championship in 1986 and placed third in 1987.

She won All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association honors in 1987 and received a large share of the credit for the development of pitcher Connie Clark, the 1987 Honda Broderick Award winner who posted a 53-7 career record. Gromacki also caught the 1986 Broderick winner in the Titans' Susan LeFebvre.

Gromacki has won Amateur Softball Association All-America honors eight times and was a member of the three-time national champion Redding Rebels. She also was reunited with Clark on a team that won the national championship of New Zealand. Other trips have taken



herto Japan, China and Australia, and, in the summer of 1994, Guatemala.

## **Assistant Coach Susie Parra**



Susie Parra returns to the Titan staff this year for her third season as pitching coach.

No stranger to competition, Parra came to Fullerton after a distinguished collegiate playing career at the University of Arizona, in Tucson.

She graduated from the University in May 1995 and was an assistant coach for the team during the 1995 season, when the Wildcats finished second at the College World Series.

"Besides her pitching knowledge and ability to teach young players, Susie brings an understanding of the hard work and dedication that is required at this level," said Coach Garman.

Susie was a two-time All-American pitcher and Honda/Broderick Award winner who led her Wildcats to the National Championship an incredible three out of four possible years from 1991 through 1994. In her final collegiate appearance, May 30, 1994, she tossed a one-hitter as the Wildcats defeated Cal State Northridge by a score of 4-0. It capped a 33-1 season for her.

As pitching coach for the Titans, Susie looks forward to bringing her knowledge of the game - and of winning - to younger players.

She is already gaining a reputation for her work with pitchers. In November of 1996, she and Gromacki were featured lecturers at a softball clinic in Rome, Italy.





#### **Tournament Play at Titan Softball Complex**

Cal State Fullerton annually hosts what is generally regarded as the premiere mid-season collegiate tournament in the country in the CSF Softball Classic (formerly called PONY) to be held in 1998 from March 18 through March 22.

Sixteen teams, most of them in the pre-season Top 20 national poll, will collide in a pool-play format consisting of four pools of four teams. Results from pool play will

seed a 16-team single-elimination championship bracket. The champion will be crowned on Sunday, March 22.

Defending National Champion Arizona will return in this year's tournament and will be joined by other final top 20 teams, including last year's winner and runner-up Oklahoma and Oregon State, respectively.

Cal State Fullerton has won eight

of the 18 previous CSF tournament events. The now defunct Cal Poly Pomona program and Arizona are the only other multiple winners, capturing titles in 1983 and 1984; and 1988, 1995 and 1996 respectively.

Fresno State (1990), Oklahoma State (1989), Cal State Northridge (1993) and USL (1994) each have won a title and are featured once again.

#### **CSF Showcase Tournament**

This year the Titans will host an additional, pre-season tournament, the CSF Showcase. Play will begin Thursday, February 26 at 3:00 p.m. and will continue through Sunday, March 1.

Teams featured are Eastern Michigan, CSF, Long Beach St., San Diego St., San Jose St., Stanford and Virginia. (Game schedule is found on page 27.)

#### **Titan All-America Selections**

The National Softball Coaches Association annually honors the top collegiate softball players with the selection of the NSCA All-America teams. Head coaches choose three teams with 13 athletes on the first and second teams and 15 athletes on the third team. The teams are announced each year in conjunction with the College Softball World Series in May.

Cal State Fullerton's All-America history is deep. Twenty different Titan players have been selected to a total of 26 All-America berths. First baseman Sue Lewis is the only three-time winner among the Titans. Tiffany Boyd, Denise DeWalt, Susan LeFebvre and Chenita Rogers are two-time winners.




Wendi Griffin returns to the 1998 Titan lineup after earning MVP honors at the ASA Women's National Tournament in 1997.


