

When completed, a section of the building 30 feet wide and 68 feet deep, fronting on Sonoma, will be occupied by an auto accessory store to be operated by Mr. Raymos. The Maine Street frontage will be taken by the Yellow Cab company for a repair and tire shop, and storage space.

Between the Yellow Cab quarters and Mr. Raymos' store will be a paint shop, to be managed by John Neely, a auto repair shop with Fred Rodgers as proprietor, and a fountain lunch to be operated by Mr. Raymos.

The existing service station will not be changed in the improvement program.

Mr. Ryamos, who holds a lease on the corner, said the building represents an investment of \$15,000, and that an additional \$25,000 will be expended in furnishing and equipping the various shops.

Local Restaurant to Occupy Larger Space

Approximately \$5,000 is being expended in an expansion program at the northeast corner of Marin and Tennessee Streets.

A. A. Anderson, owner of the property, is building a 30- by 40-foot addition to the cafe operated by Pete Vahotis, who will utilize the space for a family dining room. This part of the work will be finished Nov. 1.

The improvement also includes the creation of a basement room already occupied by the Johnson and Thompson radio repair shop.

NEW BUILDING COSTS \$15,000

At a cost of \$15,000, a one-story building with 125-foot frontage is under construction at the foot of Georgia Street, in front of the main ferry entrance to Mare Island.

The builders are Lincoln and Victor Raahauge, brothers, who are erecting the structure as a peacetime investment. They have not yet leased any part of the floor space.

Details of the unit include concrete walls and summerbell truss roof supporting a high ceiling. Sixty days will be required to complete the project.

Adventists Build New House of Wo

After four years of disappointments and delays, the local congregation of the Seventh-Day Adventists is at last making rapid progress in the construction of a new house of worship at Colusa and Alabama streets.

The church, to be completed in time for opening ceremonies at Christmas, will be one of the largest in the city. It will have an auditorium capable of accommodating 600 worshipers.

Modernized renaissance design is incorporated in the stucco-walled structure, ground dimensions of which will be 87 by 117 feet.

The disappointments and delays experienced by the members centers around the loss of five sites on which it had been hoped to erect the new church.

In 1941, the congregation had its first application to build denied because of a lack of parking space. A second site was taken over by the federal government late in the same year for school purposes. The government also took the third site for housing needs in 1942, and the fourth site went to the state in 1943 for highway extension. The church is finally being built on the fifth site to be chosen.

Interior decoration plans have not been completed, but the ceiling will be dome-shaped, formed by six summerbell trusses with a span of 46 feet. The structure is of frame construction.

Two organ lofts will be installed and a choir section seating 50 has been planned. One unique feature will be a mothers' room in the balcony at the rear of the auditorium. Mothers will be able to hear and see all that goes on
