

As Ventura County's Chief Executive Officer, John Johnston is responsible for budget, finance, legislation, human resources, labor relations, risk management and economic development.


He boasts 36 years of executive management experience, both in the public and private sector.

How attainable is 100?

My good friend, Elmer Eymann, told me that in Forbes magazine, he read that, on average, of each 100 men who reach age 90, only 1.3 make it to 100, while with 100 ladies who reach age 90, three will make it to 100.

I know of more than 10 LV residents who are 90 and over and almost wanted to dispute the findings. Then my thoughts went back over the 25 years I've contributed stories to ILV, and only one man, to my memory, made it to 100. He was Judge Dring Needham, well-remembered by many of us. Matter of fact, my late wife Mary and I attended his

100th birthday party, sponsored by his two daughters, both of whom are Leisure Village residents.

The party was held on Las Posas Avenue, in a building that is now home to the Camarillo Police Department. At the party and for years after, Dring remained sharp as a tack, though he told me he just wanted to be remembered as an "Iowa farm boy."

I recall his wife, Ruth, who had a great sense of humor. When interviewing Dring on his 95th birthday, I asked her, then about 93, what factors contributed to her longevity.

Lillian, born in Hot Springs, Ark., moved to Long Beach in 1923 and later to Los Angeles. She was married to Leonard for 30 years and sometime after married Max, a man wellknown in Leisure Village.

Max, a devoted volunteer for the City of Hope, was the driving force, for many years, behind the Saturday Night Dance.

Lillian decided to cancel her driver's license when it expired on October 4.

"I only used my car to drive to the Monday Night Bridge," she says. "I have always had friends take me to the dance, and other friends will take me to bridge and Scrabble.'

Additional honors came her way this month: U.S. Sen. Barbara Boxer sent congratulations, as did the California State Legislature.

Perhaps the honor creating the most talk came from the Saturday Night Dance committee. They awarded Lillian a Certificate of Exemption, which grants her a lifetime exemption from paying an admission charge for the dances.

Just imagine: For the rest of her life, Lillian no longer must pay to attend the weekly dance.

Hundreds of Lillian's friends trust she will enjoy that gift for a long time.



Senator: Senior Legislature makes a difference

It has been a pleasure to serve as a Senior Senator in the California Senior Legislature the past six years. In May, I was elected to serve another four-year term and am looking forward eagerly to fulfilling this service.

Since 1980, when the State Legislature passed enabling legislation forming the California Senior Legislature, more than 50 percent of the proposals submitted to the elected legislature for consideration have been enacted into law. More than 100 laws benefiting seniors have been enacted.

The CSL is a non-partisan volunteer organization made up of 120 members 60 years of age and older.

The sole purpose of the CSL is to make proposals, benefiting seniors, that the elected Senators, Assembly Members and Governor can enact into law.

Each year, the third week in October, the CSL meets in Sacramento, in the Capitol, where members participate in presenting, hearing testimony, debating issues and voting approval

of our senior legislative proposals.

Of the approved proposals, the members adopt 10 state and four federal proposals, which receive special attention from the 10-member CSL Legislative Committee, lobbying elected legislators for their support towards enactment.

During the year, CSL activities are directed by the JRC — the Joint Rules Committee — a body of 12 members that meet monthly in the Sacramento office.

Members of the CSL meet monthly with their local Council on Aging PSA (Planning and Service Area) members, keeping council members abreast of the latest news on impending progress.

CSL activities receive no

operating monies from the General Fund. Funding is entirely dependent on donations to the California Fund For Senior Citizens, which is also a checkoff item on the California State Income Tax Form, Line 54.

Checks should be sent to the California Senior Legislature, 1020 N Street, Room 513, Sacramento, CA 95814. Also, checks are given to me, and each week

I mail them to the CSL in Sacramento.

To date since January 2006, more than \$900 has been received from Leisure Village residents. Thank you, from the bottom of my heart! We are making a difference!




The news is still all about the terrible earthquake, and

Do you know what to do when a quake hits?

Everyone should develop strategies if an earthquake strikes during any of numerous everyday scenarios. Examples would be driving a ear, preparing a meal, sleeping, eating, watching television, or working.

Where will you be when the next strong ground shaking occurs? What will you be doing? Obviously, no one has answers to these questions, but you will have to create almost instant strategies when an earthquake strikes.

Can you remember how you reacted around 4 a.m. when the June 28, 1992, magnitude-7.6 Landers quake rattled Southern California?

Hopefully, most people know by now to stay in bed when awakened by strong shaking. Bedding offers substantial protection from shattered glass and flying objects, and pillows can be used to protect the head or face.

Can you recall what you were doing about four hours later the same Sunday when the magnitude-6.7 Big Bear Lake aftershock occurred? By this time most Southern Californians were awake, possibly eating breakfast, showering, driving to or from the donut store, attending a house of worship, or telephoning distant friends or relatives to describe their early morning seismic experience.

Did you duck, cover and hold under a sturdy table or desk until the shaking stopped. Or did you rush outdoors, risking injury from flying glass or falling bricks from your chimney?

If you were driving, did you pull to the side of the road, avoid overhead wires and bridges, and stay in your car until the shaking stopped?

The duck, cover and hold rules are practical in many situations, but some potential scenarios call for exceptions to these rules. For example, a family member could be preparing a meal when an earthquake strikes. Pans filled with boiling liquids or hot grease could lead

to serious burns. Every effort should be made to leave the kitchen quickly.

Earthquake hazards in the kitchen should be reduced as much as possible. This means anchoring refrigerators to wall studs, and adding childproof latches to cupboard doors. Heavy utensils such as waffle irons, electric skillets and baking dishes should be stored at floor level.

You could be taking a bath or shower when strong shaking begins. You should stay where you are until the shaking stops. If you are standing, sit down quickly and brace yourself as much as possible. Bath tubs are

dangerous even when the earth's surface is not shaking, so don't get out of the tub or shower until you can do it safely.

Thorough mental preparation can save lives and prevent serious injuries during a severe seismic event.

the giblets and then cut them up. Mix all the ingredients.







Planning a home improvement? Read this

A judge sentenced Louis Ronald Troisi to six months in jail for defrauding a Ventura woman and her son of more than \$54,000 in a home improvement contracting scheme, according to prosecutors.

Ventura County Superior Court Judge Bruce Clark also ordered that Troisi of Ventura pay \$54,000 as restitution to the 85-year-old woman and her 65-year-old son. Deputy District Attorney Clyde Doheney said the victims believed that Troisi, an electrician, had a contractor's license. Doheney said a person who does home improvement projects is required to have a contractor's license.

"Sometimes, the contractor is unaware of the license requirement," Doheney said. "It is mostly to protect consumers."

The District Attorney's Consumer and Environmental Protection Unit and the Contractors State License Board investigated the contracting scheme.

Troisi, a former longtime friend of the victims, repre-

sented himself as a licensed contractor and convinced the victims he could complete extensive improvements on their home in Ventura, Doheney said. Troisi wasn't able to complete the jobs according to city building code standards and never bothered to obtain any of the required permits, Doheney said. The work was done from December 2004 to February 2005.

The victims complained to authorities that Troisi installed a circuit breaker box in the shower and that the new toilets were flushing hot water, according to Troisi.

"They never moved into the house because it could not pass (city) inspection," Doheney said.

The city inspector stopped work on the house, he said.

One reason unlicensed home-improvement contractors are able to get projects is that they do the work cheap, Doheney said. They don't have to pay work-

ers' compensation or get a contractor's bond, Doheney said.

"It is a disadvantage to the honest, licensed contractor," he said.

The victims had to pay \$40,000 to hire licensed contractors to fix the shoddy work, Doheney said.





Editor's note: John Wirtz, a resident of Village 20, went on an 8,352-mile cross-country motorcycle trip last year. In 26 days, he went through two countries, 28 states, used 225 gallons of gas - the price averaged \$3.10 a gallon — ate a lot of ice cream and gained four pounds.

Day 3

Start time at 7 a.m. This was going to be a short trip over to visit Bill's grand-daughter, so no need to wake up early. Day 4

The kids had to go to school this morning, so after breakfast we took them both to school on our bikes. They thought it was cool! We packed up our bikes and were on our way to Rapid City, SD. About 2:30 in the afternoon we ran into our first rainstorm. We had changed into our rain gear and continued on as far as Custer, SD, leaving us with just a short ride in the morning to Mount Rushmore.

Day 5

Start time at 7 a.m. Our ride took us from Custer by Crazy Horse Monument and on to Mount Rushmore. After taking some pictures and watching the movie,

we got back on the road to Sioux Falls, SD. Out on the interstate we were listening to the radio back in Rapid City (in back of us), and they were having a bad storm — thunder, lighting, hail, etc. We had gotten out of there just in time. We arrived at Sioux Falls around 5 p.m.

Day 6

Start time at 6:30 a.m. and heading for Duluth, MN. Lots of farm fields, corn and beans all day. No interstate, but long stretches with no one in sight. That night in Duluth we did our first clothes washing so we had a fresh start the next morning.

Day 7

Thought this was going to be a great day of riding along the water's edge of Lake Superior. I was a little disappointed when we did not get to see that much of the lake. There were three small towns that we went through where we were able to see the water's edge, but the other 250 miles we saw trees. When we did see the lake, it looked like an ocean

I wasn't that impressed that day, but we traveled in Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan, staying that night in Newberry, MI. The next day we expected to have another short ride over to see Bill's nephew in Michigan.

Day 8

We left at 6 a.m. to ride over to Lake Michigan. We rode along Lake Michigan shores and over the Mackinaw Bridge and our first toll (getting closer to the East Coast). That night we stayed with Bill's nephew in Grand Blanc, MI, near Flint. When we arrived, they had a family cookout planned. We had great steaks and lots of food, conversation and a good night's rest.

Day 9

We got up early and headed out to Port Huron, MI, and the border into Canada and over to Niagara Falls. When we arrived at Niagara Falls we tried to park the bike and get a few pictures, but they wanted \$17 to park, and we were going to have to walk further than we wanted to. So, we drove to the top of the hill to the Hilton Hotel. We parked our bikes in valet parking while we were going in to to see how much it cost to rent a room. It was

a little too steep for our pockets, so we just took the elevator to the top floor of the hotel and went into the restaurant. There we saw the whole view of the Falls and were able to take a few pictures, have a cool drink and get back on our bikes — all for free!

We then crossed over the bridge into Buffalo, NY, and stayed overnight.
