You Can't Take It With You!

It happens once a year that a former Broadway smash hit comes to Leisure Village and is performed by members of the Village Players. This time, they brought you as their sixth presentation, the comedy, YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU', by Moss Hart and George S. Kaughman.

The cast of twenty-two aptly demonstrated the effectiveness of John Zoller's direction during months of grueling rehearsals, in which he was assisted by Isabel Hamerman.

The plot probably hit home with many, for its zany characters might very well have reminded them of some of their own 'tetched' relatives; whimsical, conniving, naive, and nutty. Doesn't every family tree bear some strange fruit?

From the very opening, the cast came to life as the playwright's scatter-brained creations. The important roles of Penny, the mother, and Grandpa, were played by two of the Players' star performers, Eve Freeman and Phil Aaronson. Both names on a program forecast the promise of a wellacted production and with YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU' they fulfill that promise. As Penny, Eve again proves herself a very fine actress. She personified with sensitivity the gentle, flighty, ambitious mother, who dabbles in art and play-writing, yet manages to find time to over-see this screw-ball manor.

Phil's salty portrayal of Grandpa was—well—just perfect, both in line delivery and



appearance. He cameoed with realism the benevolent patriarch respected and loved by his progeny, living by his own rules of citizenship and not those of the government, especially where taxation is concerned.

The love interest was supplied by Blanche Follen and Mannie Hersch; the former with her aura of effervescent youth and its collective charms; the latter, tall handsome and macho, both projecting believably the image of a couple in love valiantly fighting the odds

of belonging to families from two different worlds.

Daisy Bien was an excellent choice for the role of Essie, the would-be ballerina; a naive, baby-faced little wife who thinks she has to ask Grandpa's permission to have a baby. Her weird rather infantile husband, Ed Carmichael, was portrayed by Irving Leeds, showing promise for his future activity in Players' projects in which he can make diversified use of his acting potential.

INSIDE LEISURE VILLAGE OPINION A Current Issue

A not-so-funny thing happened on the way to the Current issues Forum in October:

Storer Cable received permission from the LVA Board to televise the nuclear freeze debate, with the proviso that the television cameras were to be turned off during the question period.

It was reported that one Board member later justified the injunction with the explanation that Leisure Villagers appearing on television might give the viewing audience a misleading impression of this community.

At the open Board meeting in November, two well-known Villagers, Joe Gaynes and Dr. Wales Smith, protested this infringement of personal freedom. ILV endorses their protest.

The issue is of such great importance that we are printing as a guest editorial the statement made by Dr. Smith.

Of Human Dignity

By Dr. Wales Smith

"Where arose the anxiety about continuing the televising and the instruction that was quoted, that the Board of Directors had ordered the televising to be stopped when two main speakers had presented their talks?...

"I feel that this is a form of censorship imposed by the Board of Directors...By what section of the C.C. and R.'s is authority given to the Board of Directors to manifest any form of oral or printed censorship?

"Even if some section of the C.C. and R.'s is asserted, is that assertion accepted specifically by the homeowners? Lacking such specific authorization, I urge the Board to remember...that the homeowners reserve to themselves all rights and freedoms except those granted specifically through the C.C. and R.'s.

"Reserved to each homeowner is the right of free speech. Implied in free speech is the right to be heard without unreasonable interference.

"I understand the present order of the Board. This proposed order for the future would be an unreasonable interference in prehearing of free speech. As such, it raises the issue of its own constitutionality under the Federal Constitution and the State of California Constitution.

"Finally, it robs the residents of Leisure Village...those persons who want to be heard of their sense of worth - their 'dignus' - their dignity.

'I beg the Board to re-consider this temporary mistaken action."






Grace Back as the alternate Gay Wellington demonstrated once again her acting capabilities which have been evidenced in previous performances on the L.V. stage.
