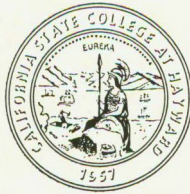

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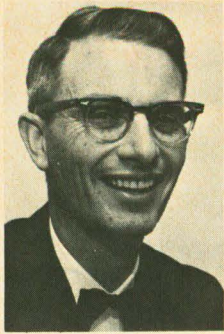

As one newcomer to Cal State, I am delighted to extend a cordial welcome to you, my fellow newcomers.

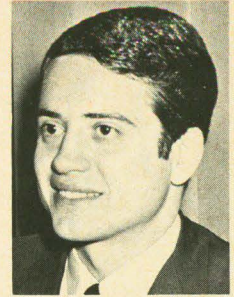

DEAN EDMISON

The Dean of Students is responsible to the President of the college for the over all administration of student services. As a member of the executive staff he is responsible for interpreting, and serves as a representative of the student society of the campus. Policies pertaining to student life are developed in concert with his staff and recommended to the President. Similarly, policies which affect student life are delegated through his staff.

The Dean of Students also serves as chairman of the Student Association Budget Committee.

He is the disciplinary officer of the college. It is his responsibility to protect the rights and freedoms of students as well as to insure the acceptance of responsibilities which are the marks of mature citizens in a democratic society.

Dean of Women



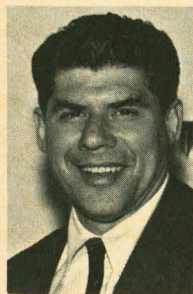
DEAN SEAVEY

The Dean of Women's Office is a counseling office where both men and women may seek information and assistance. Students are invited to come in at any time.

The Dean of Women serves as Coordinator of the Out-of-Class Education Program and of quarterly Orientation Activities. She and her assistants are in charge of the college activity program. Individuals or groups seeking to establish clubs, organizations, honor societies, social and recreational activities, and other out-of-class activities should clear with the Dean of Women or the Activities Advisor in her office.

The Dean of Women also acts as a liaison between the Student Government (Associated Students) and the college faculty and administration.

Dean of Men

The Dean of Men is in charge of financial aids, scholarships and loans, foreign students, housing, personal counseling of students, and other duties as may be assigned by the Dean of Students.

Members of his staff work with students to assist them with financial problems. The Dean of Men has available scholarships, emergency loans, N.D.E.A. loans, and other means of financial assistance.

He is also concerned with housing of students and the administrative control of the residence halls and other college-approved housing.

In addition, he advises foreign students of rules and regulations of the U.S. Department of Immigration and Naturalization and of the college. The office assists students in completing forms and documents necessary for their matriculation at Cal State.

history

In June, 1957, money was appropriated by the legislature for a state college in southern Alameda County. After months of controversy over possible sites, the Hauschildt ranch in Hayward was chosen as the home for the new college. When the results of the decision were known, the Municipal Band of Hayward marched down B Street in celebration, preceded by a sign proclaiming, "Hayward now has a state college."

Even before a site for the college was definite, the State College for Alameda County had opened its doors in 1959 to a student body of 293 who met in Sunset High School and the County Office Building on Winton Avenue.

In 1960, the college moved into the former Hayward High School complex on Foothill Boulevard. In April, 1963, approximately 900 students were attending classes in the old buildings and using a library that was once the girls' locker room.

Cal-State got its first freshman class and its name, "California State College At Hayward," in the fall of 1963 when the college moved to its hilltop home. Now Hayward had a state college in name as well as in fact and four years later Cal State students would be studying in a library boasting 170,000 volumes.

In a period of less than eight years, Cal-State has firmly established itself as an important member of the growing state college system, its students and faculty working in new and better buildings toward the same goal President Harclerod described from cramped high school offices in 1959, "I believe we can provide a program for students to raise the level of excellence."

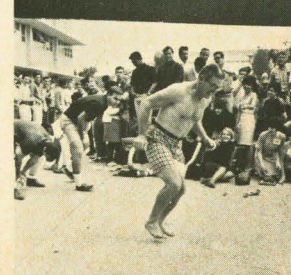
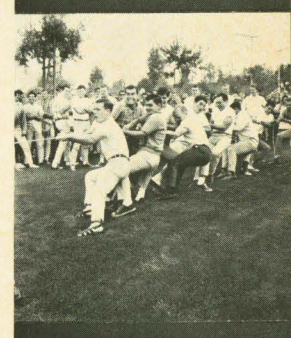
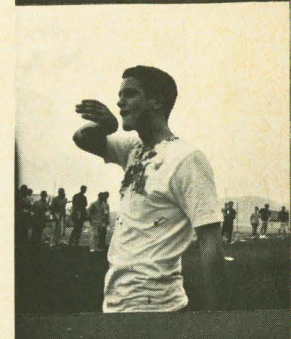
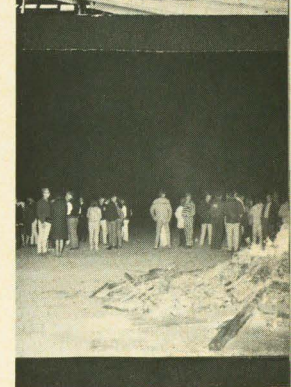
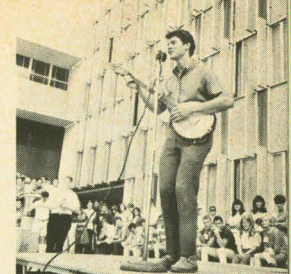
freshman orientation

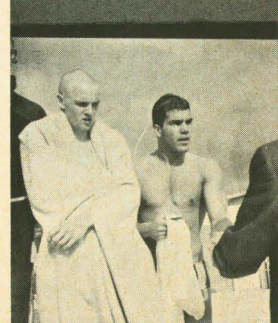
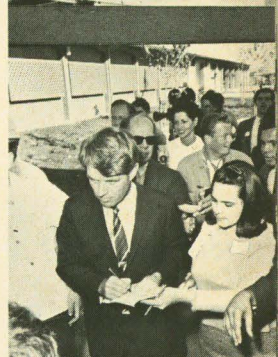
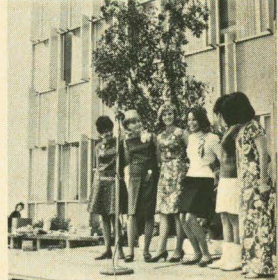
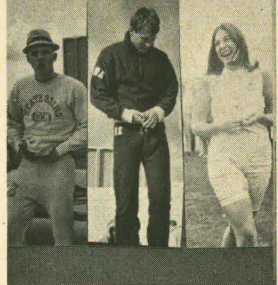
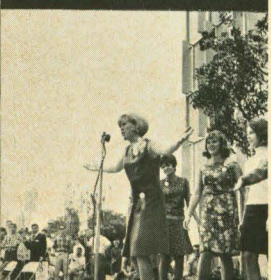
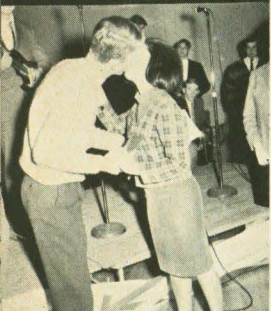
The new traditions and activities of last year, other contests, and more surprises will make Pioneer Week bigger and better than before. Pioneer Week will be a week to drop the books and have fun.

the pioneer

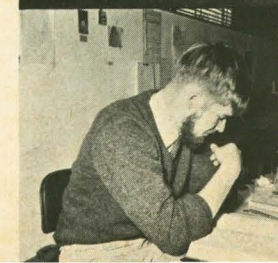
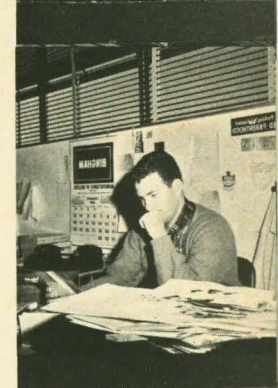
The Pioneer, the student newspaper, is published on Tuesdays and Fridays. Newspapers are free to students and are distributed on the red stands throughout the college. Subscriptions by mail cost \$1 per year.

elan

The Elan, the student yearbook, is distributed to the students during the first week of June. The yearbook will be on sale the first two weeks of the fall quarter for \$5. This may be paid in installments due at the beginning of each quarter. A total of \$3 must be paid by the second week of the Winter Quarter or the deposit will be forfeited. After this date only cash sales will be made.

Each year, the students of the Humanities Divisional Council collect literary articles from students and publish the Cal State literary magazine.



student services

counseling services

The College Counseling Service is available to all students free of charge to provide help on any topic of personal concern whether it be academic, vocational, social, or emotional in nature. Consultation is voluntary, based on individual and/or group counseling sessions which can at times be extended to include several weekly appointments. When indicated, a student may be assisted with a referral to a community mental health clinic, social agency, or private therapist.

The Counseling Service, located in FA 260, is open for appointments from 8 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Dr. Strong, Director of Counseling Services, is available to answer any questions which may arise in regard to these services.

placement

The function of the Placement Office is three-fold: part-time or student job placement, educational placement, and business-industry-government placement.

Registered students wishing to utilize this service should complete part-time registration forms in the Placement Office, FA 294. Available part-time jobs are listed on the bulletin board just outside the office. Registration forms should be brought up to date once each quarter.

student health services

The objective of Student Health Services is to protect and preserve the physical and mental health of our students. This encompasses health education, the prevention and treatment of illnesses and injuries and the provision of a safe and healthful environment.

All currently enrolled students are eligible for services of the health center and its staff. Part-time students are limited to emergency and first aid care.

The Student Health Services office is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. During the *noon hour (12:00 to 1:00 p.m.) emergencies only* are taken. Requests for service should be on appointment basis, if possible.

Student Health Services include such basic benefits as: Evaluation of Student Health Record, health counseling and health education, special tests, laboratory and X-rays, insurance, and clinical services.

A health insurance plan which provides protection against the expense of hospitalization and care which is not provided by the regular college health service is offered through the Associated Students Office.

miscellaneous

auxiliary foundation

Auxiliary Foundation is a nonprofit California State College Corporation existing for the benefit of the student, faculty and administrative community. Generally its services include a snackbar and vending facility in the Science Building, a cafeteria and bookstore facility in the Fine Arts Building, the administration of the cultural and athletic programs sponsored by the Associated Students, and the administration of a "Trust Fund" which will provide "Grants-in-Aid" and Scholarships for California State College Students.

library

Located in the North wing of the Science Building, the Cal-State library houses a collection of approximately 170,000 volumes and 16,000 periodicals. All education and music collections are now located in the new Music building and there is a depository for documents located in the South Science wing.

Special services include pay typewriters, space for student typewriters and access to a Xerox Copy Machine.

Fines are charged for overdue books at 5 cents a day for regular books each day the library is open. Larger fines are charged on reserved materials and periodicals.

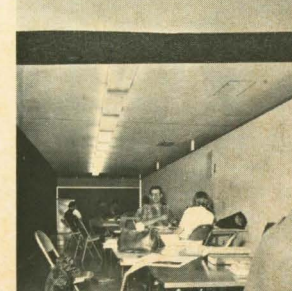
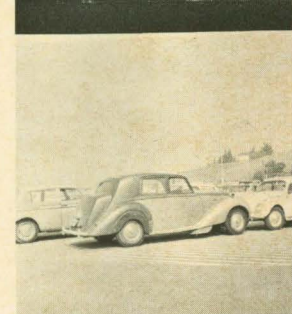
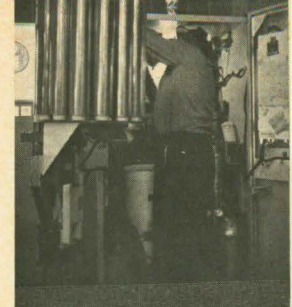
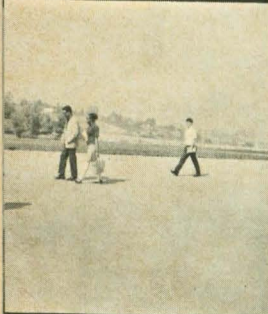
During the regular school year the library is open 7 days a week.

parking

Campus parking facilities are available to students with the purchase of parking permits at the cost of \$9 per quarter for regular students and \$4 for part-time students. The stickers may be obtained at the Accounting Office, FA 247, on the day of registration. A coin operated parking lot is available on campus at a cost of 25 cents per entry.

veterans affairs

A Coordinator of Veterans Affairs is located in the Records Office, FA 1227, to assist students seeking information, counseling or registration in a V.A. program. Only Cal-Vet dependents are eligible. For further information pertaining to any of the public laws contact the records clerk.

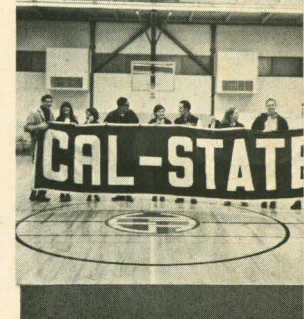
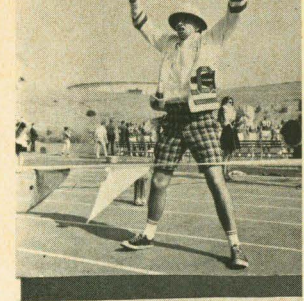
