## Architectural Permit Required For All Exterior Changes

Homeowners contemplating changes to the exteriors of their homes, such as fences, garage doors, or new lighting, should first apply for an LV architectural permit and get the specification sheets which apply to their particular job. These are obtained from the Association office, located near the west gate.

The LV Architecture Committee has set up a procedure to guide the homeowner in obtaining his improvements, meet Village requirements, often Camarillo city requirements, and not be bound by an unlicensed contractor.

Mannie Abbate, chairman of the LV Architecture committee, can tell many horror stories about residents who leaped ahead, without permits, and got themselves into much trouble. The committee is there to advise and assist residents, so take advantage of its help. The committee meets the third Wednesday of each month at 9:00 a.m. in the GR.

When the LV Architecture Committee reviews the plans and finds them satisfactory, then it will approve

### Automobiles: Blessing Or Bane

How can the power of people weighing 100 and 250 pounds be equalized? When they drive cars, of course. Automobiles have provided transportation, independence, and entertainment for most villagers for most of their lives. Most villagers have been driving since their teen years. Driving has become automatic — one does not even have to think much about it. But wait! Driving has become one of the hazards of senior life and independence.

Admit it. Reaction time is much slower, the old eyes just cannot see what they used to. In some cases, a person's skeletal structure has shrunk. Have you seen some little old lady driving by peering through the steering wheel to steer because she is so short? Other drivers get the heebie-jeebies when they see a thing like that.

L.V. Security officers have to watch for drivers who may have become hazards to themselves and everyone else. One of the biggest errors in the village is the failure to come to a complete stop at a Stop sign. Speeding and other erratic forms of driving add to the officers' woes. Sad thing! When a citation is given for an obvious driving error, so many villagers turn up their egos, puff up their importance and experience, and refuse to acknowledge their mistakes. Excuses flow like water, denials and accusations spew forth. Gentle villagers become tyrants. It is painful.

The drivers course "55 Alive" under the aegis of AARP, is one way for conscientious drivers to renew their knowledge of automobile safety. The small deduction in insurance rates is secondary to the update of awareness and driving responsibilities.

Of course, we realize that the people who should be reading this and taking the suggestions to heart, will not read it because they do not "waste" their diminished eye power on trivia such as *Inside Leisure Village*.

Therefore, it behooves all other drivers to watch out for the driving delinquents. Stop at the stop signs. Obey the speed laws. Signal when turning. Give pedestrians (and bicyclists) a chance to cross the street safely.

We must take care of each other, especially in small, quiet village streets where a neighbor might be strolling unaware of approaching vehicles, or a driver may be backing out of a garage.

Keep your good driving record. Be alert!

#### UP-DATE ON CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY CHANNEL ISLANDS (CSUCI)

On Monday, November 16, the City of Camarillo and CSUCI will hold a public forum to update the community about the new campus. This meeting will take place at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council chambers at City Hall, 601 Carmen Drive in Camarillo.

President Handel Evans of CSUCI will present an overview of academic, cultural and economic activities related to the new university and their impact on the community. Members of his staff will also be available to receive input and answer questions.

The following are some of the subjects to be covered at this meeting: Academically, the first courses to be offered at CSUCI will be those leading to bachelor's degrees in accounting, business administration, child development, liberal arts, psychology and sociology. There will also be graduate programs for teaching credentials and in nursing and social work.

The first classes will take place at the new campus in the fall of 1999, and initially the school will be considered an off-campus center of CSUN (California State University Northridge). It is anticipated that there will be about 2000 full or part time students attending the first year, and that, within five years, enrollment will reach approximately 6000. At that time the Camarillo campus will be officially converted to an independent university.

Culturally, it is expected that the new school will enrich the community through providing lectures, concerts theatrical presentations, art exhibits and library resources. CSUCI will also impact economic growth in Camarillo through various employment opportunities and increased use of local businesses.

**PERMITS.....**from pg 1 the permit so that the homeowner can apply for a building permit from the City of Camarillo, if necessary. With both permits in hand, the homeowner can sign with a contractor to do the work.

Several handymen do jobs in the Village, but if the project they are attempting exceeds a total cost of \$300, including labor and materials, STOP! A handyman is not qualified even to start the job.

The homeowner, for his own safety and legal protection, should investigate the licensing of a person or company he plans to hire. If this important step is not taken, the homeowner could be faced with unexpected consequences.

After homeowners get their LV permit it is wise to observe these tips from the State Contractors License Board: 1. Check references before hiring a contractor. 2. Contractors doing work over \$300 need a state-issued contractor's license. 3. Advertising must

state whether the person has a *contractor's* license, not just a city business license. 4. If an unlicensed contractor makes a mistake, the homeowner has little recourse for correction. 5. To check a contractor's license status, call (800) 321-2752.

The State Contractor's License Board is staging a crackdown on handymen bidding on jobs for which they are not qualified.

## Looking At Channel 8 Or 12

Guy Moshier, chairman of Channel 12, had an outstanding career as a combat war pilot, followed by years as a specialist in helping solve aircraft accidents.

He was born in Springfield, Oregon, and developed pneumonia at age 8 when doctors recommended a dryer, warmer climate.

The family settled in Southern California with his dad gaining employment at Paramount Studios.

While in high school, Guy and his best friend took ROTC training and thought about entering the war as pilots for the Canadian Air Force. This was before 1941, though both boys believed the U.S. would eventually enter the war.

They tossed a coin heads to go to Canada, and tails to stay in the U.S. The toss was tails and they elected to remain here.

With war clouds gathering, Guy completed a crash-course in Air Force flying and gained his pilot's wings.

Early in the war he found

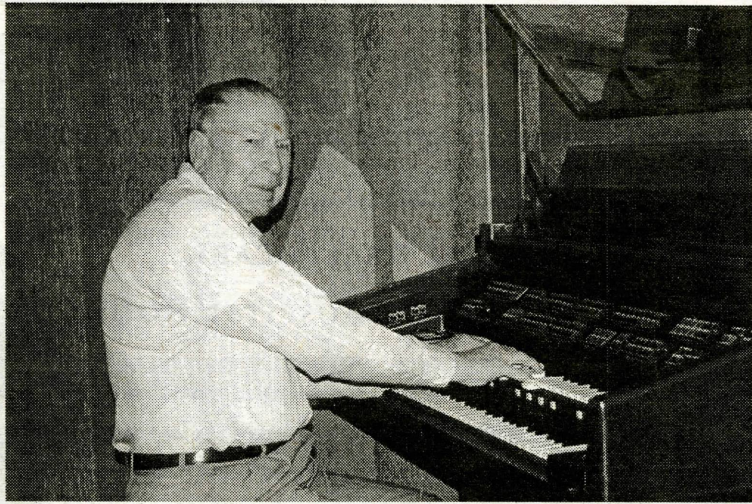

himself in North Africa, bombing Italy and helping chase Rommel out of Africa. Upon completing his prescribed combat missions, Guy was returned to the U.S. to help recruit new pilots.

He continued service in the U.S. Air Force following the end of hostilities, and during rescue operations in Saudi Arabia, earned the Distinguished Flying Cross, one of the nation's highest awards.

Later in Washington, D.C., he had the honor of flying many of President Truman's staff members on trips throughout the world.

As a civilian employee, still involved with flying activities, Guy was a flight dispatcher at Norton AFB in San Bernardino, then in Fort Worth, Texas, duty with the the Civil Aeronautics Board, responsible for determining the cause of aircraft accidents.

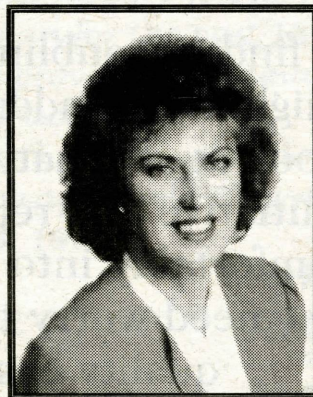

**Amateur Radio Club  
By Paul Kelwin**

With so many new electronic technologies and equipment demanding radio frequencies, allotted "HAM" frequencies are being eyed by many desiring some of those frequencies. The October 6 meeting of Amateur Radio club addressed this subject. After writing Congressman Gallegly, he replied:

"Thank you for contacting me about H.R. 3572, the Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act of 1998.

"This bill amends the Communications Act of 1934 to prohibit the Federal Communications Commission from making any reallocations of amateur radio service (ARS) frequency bands. The balanced Budget Act of 1997

requires the FCC to conduct spectrum auctions to raise new revenues. Some of that revenue may come from the auction of current amateur radio spectrum. H.R. 3572 would require the FCC to provide the ARS with equivalent replacement spectrum if it re-allocates and auctions any of the current spectrum.

"I understand that organized volunteer radio amateurs provide emergency communication services when regular channels are disrupted by a disaster, such as an earthquake. Your help during these difficult times is valuable and greatly appreciated.

"H.R. 3572 has been referred to the House Committee on Commerce. I am not a member of the Commerce

Comte. At this time, it is not known what bills will be considered by the full House of Representatives. If H.R. 3572

is presented for a vote, I will keep your views in mind." This is to be continued! For more information, contact
